## Infant dead, teen in hospital after wreck

A Pampa infant died in a one-vehicle rollover that also left a teenager in critical condition at an Amarillo hospital.

Seven-month-old Jaquan Nickelberry was killed Friday morning when the van his mother, Keonti Nickelberry, 18, was driving rolled north of Amarillo. She was

treated and released from Northwest Texas Hospital.

Terry Michael Gonzales, 18, suffered internal injuries Friday when he was thrown from the van. He was rushed to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers said the Ford van was northbound on Texas Highway 136 about 22 miles north of Amarillo in Potter County about 5:30 a.m.

Friday when the van ran off the west side of the road.


The driver appeared to have overcor-

rected and the van rolled, according to investigating officers. DPS Trooper Gabriel Medrano said today that neither the infant nor Gonzales were wear-

ing restraints. Both were ejected from the van. The infant was pronounced dead at 1

## Price called to career as emergency services technician

Most people have jobs. A select few have callings.

Alan Price was called to a career of helping others. Born in the fall of 1972, the

paramedic with Pampa EMS is passionate about his work. It runs in the family, although Price didn't know it at the time.

"I grew up in Stinnett, Tex.," Price said.

After high school, he went out into the world as young men do, thinking that working in the world of computers would be his future.

"I did a job interview for a warehouse job," he said. "At the time, I was going to school for computers.

Price said the man with whom he interviewed challenged him to look at the work environment, not



Consequently, Price said he started looking more deeply into the employment opportunities and questioned whether he really wanted to sit behind a desk

He was living in the Dallas-Fort Worth area at the time and the plants in the area were looking for

"That's the reason I took my first course," Price said. "I took my first class and fell in love with it."

He returned to the Texas Panhandle to go to Amarillo College and enrolled in their paramedic program.



## Imam says resolution Jo NYC mosque ahead

NEW YORK (AP) — The imam leading the effort to build an Islamic center and mosque near the World of E. Craven. Trade Center site said Monday that a resolution to the graging debate over its location is being examined.

"We are exploring all options as we speak right & now, and we are working to what will be a solution, God willing, that will resolve this crisis, defuse it and not create any unforeseen or untoward circumstances that we do not want to see happen," Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf said during a question-and-answer session following a speech before the Council on Foreign Re-

He did not elaborate on whether the options in- ed in the 200 block of W. cluded moving the center from a site two blocks from

But in response to a later question, Rauf said the proposed location, while controversial, was impor-

"We need a platform where the voice of moderate Muslims can be amplified. ... This is an opportunity that we must capitalize on so the voice of moderate . Muslims will have a megaphone," he said.

The imam said he wanted to clarify a "mispercep-\$ tion" that the Islamic center's proposed site was sa-; cred ground.

noting its proximity to strip joints and betting parlors. whether the project was worth the controversy.

"The answer is a categorical yes," he said. "Why? Because this center will be a place for all faiths to come together in mutual respect.

#### BP claims process to be reviewed

HOUMA, La. (AP) — The administrator of the \$20 billion victims compensation fund that BP set up after the massive Gulf of Mexico oil spill is considering making a significant concession following strong criticism from residents about the claims process.

The issue involves the current requirement that wages o people have been paid to help skim oil and perform other cleanup work must be subtracted from the amount they

get from the compensation fund.

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Fund czar Kenneth Feinberg told hundreds of people who packed a convention center in Houma, La., on Monday that he is reconsidering that requirement. He said no decision has been made, but he understands the loud concerns raised by people who are still hurting.

#### Thick coat of oil on Gulf sea floor

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Researchers say they've found patches of oil believed to be from the BP leak on the Gulf of Mexico sea floor. Some of these are two inches thick

University of Georgia researcher Samantha Joye (JOY) c says she and her colleagues have found oil as much as 80 miles from the Deepwater Horizons well. She says the latest sample was taken early Monday and the oil covered newly dead creatures, such as shrimp and deep-' sea worms.

The scientists have collected at least 10 samples from the sea floor, about a mile down. Testing is needed to confirm it is BP oil. But Joye says it has the appearance of recent oil from the busted well, not old oil.

#### Man saves Quran from burning

AMARILLO (AP) - A skateboard-toting man grabbed a Quran from an evangelist who planned to burn the scripture at an event in an Amarillo park

Twenty-three-year-old Jacob Isom grabbed the book from Repent Amarillo director David Grisham and delivered it to a leader from the Islamic Center of Amarillo.

According to the Amarillo Globe-News, about 200 people had gathered at Sam Houston Park in Saturday to show either support or opposition to Grisham's plans.

Witnesses say Grisham was arguing with opponents of the book-burning when Isom grabbed the Quran. Amid jeers from the crowd, Grisham got into a car and left without burning any copies of the Islamic scripture. Grisham told the newspaper that he "kind of expected the

#### EPA holding drilling hearings

BINGHAMTON, N.Y. (AP) — Hundreds of people are gathering outside a theater in Binghamton, N.Y., ahead of what is expected to be a pair of contentious public hearings on a federal study of a natural gas-drilling technique.

People opposed to hydraulic fracturing, or "fracking," have signs saying "Kids can't drink gas," while those supporting the method are chanting "Pass gas now!"

The Environmental Protection Agency is holding fourhour hearings at The Forum in Binghamton beginning at noon and again at 6 p.m. Two more sessions are scheduled for Wednesday.

The EPA is taking comment on how broadly to construct its study of fracking. The drilling technique involves blasting chemical-laced water into the ground to release natural gas from rock formations thousands of feet under-

#### Two dead after bus stop hit

DALLAS (AP) — Police say two homeless men asleep at a Dallas Area Rapid Transit bus stop died after a truck driven by an alleged drunken driver slammed into the partly enclosed structure.

Police detained the pickup driver following the wreck around 2:30 a.m. Monday.

Detective Mark McKnight says the driver failed a field sobriety test and will face two counts of intoxication manslaughter. The driver's name was not immediately released.

#### Judge to hear health plan case

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — The Obama administration will try to persuade a federal judge Tuesday to throw out a lawsuit by 20 states that claim the president's health care overhaul is unconstitutional.

The fight will primarily be over sections of the law that will require individuals to have health insurance or face tax penalties and require states to pay additional Medicaid costs not covered by the federal government.

Attorneys defending the law will argue that the section requiring health insurance doesn't take effect until 2015 and it's up to an individual taxpayer — not the states — to challenge the law then. The government has said it has the right to create the insurance mandate under the commerce

and general welfare clauses of the Constitution. Florida's Republican Attorney General Bill McCollum filed the lawsuit just minutes after President Barack Obama signed the 10-year, \$938 billion health care bill into law last March. He chose a court in Pensacola, one of Florida's most conservative cities. The nation's most influential small business lobby, the National Federation of Independent Business, has joined McCollum's suit, and a similar case is unfolding in Virginia.

#### School opens at RFK site

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The site where Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was assassinated has opened as a \$578 million complex of schools for thousands of Los Angeles

The Robert F. Kennedy Community Schools complex was renovated to resemble the Ambassador Hotel, where the New York senator was slain in 1968 moments after declaring victory in the California Democratic presiden-

The 23-acre complex debuted Monday with six learning centers for 3,700 kindergarten through 12th grade

The long-running effort to turn the location into an educational complex involved disputes with conservationists who wanted to save the historic hotel from demolition.

The Kennedy family opposed efforts to save the hotel pantry where the senator was shot by Sirhan Sirhan. The pantry was disassembled and placed in storage.

When Hurricane Rita came ashore within days of Katrina, he was part of the first response team at Lake Charles.

With six kids, he grinned and said he'll probably

He did say, though, that he would be proud if one of his children chooses a career in medicine, since it will continue a family tradition.


Price's grandfather was initially against his grandson going into emergency medicine, because of his own experiences.

## Today in History

Today is Monday, Sept. 13, the 256th day of 2010. There are 109 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 13, 1970, the first New York City Marathon was held; Gary Muhrcke finished the 26.2-mile run, which took place entirely inside Central Park, in 2:31:38.

On this date:

In 1759, during the final French and Indian War, the British defeated the French on the Plains of Abraham overlooking Quebec City.

In 1788, the Congress of the Confederation authorized the first national election, and declared New York City the temporary national capital.

In 1803, Commodore John Barry, considered by many the father of the American Navy, died in Philadelphia.

In 1860, General of the Armies of the United States John J. Pershing was born in Laclede, Mo. In 1948, Republican Margaret Chase Smith of Maine was elected to the U.S. Senate, becoming the first woman to serve in both houses of Congress.

In 1959, Elvis Presley first met his future wife, 14-year-old Priscilla Beaulieu, while stationed in West Germany with the U.S. Army. (They married in 1967, but divorced in 1973.)

In 1971, a four-day inmates' rebellion at the Attica Correctional Facility in western New York ended as police and guards stormed the prison; the ordeal and final assault claimed 43 lives. In 1989, Fay Vincent was elected commissioner

of Major League Baseball, succeeding the late A. Bartlett Giamatti (juh-MAH'-tee).

In 1990, the combination police-courtroom drama "Law & Order" premiered on NBC.

In 1993, at the White House, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and PLO chairman Yasser Arafat shook hands after signing an accord granting limited Palestinian autonomy.

Ten years ago: With the government all but abandoning its case against him, former Los Alamos scientist Wen Ho Lee pleaded guilty in Albuquerque, N.M. to a single count of mishandling nuclear secrets; he was then set free with an apology from U.S. District Judge James Parker, who said the government's actions had "embarrassed our entire nation."

Five years ago: President George W. Bush took responsibility for federal government mistakes in dealing with Hurricane Katrina and suggested the calamity raised broader questions about the government's ability to handle both natural disasters and terror attacks. President Bush sought China's help to stop nuclear weapons programs in North Korea and Iran and won a pledge from President Hu Jintao to step up pressure on Pyongyang.

One year ago: The body of missing Yale University graduate student Annie Le (lay) was found behind a research lab wall on what would have been her wedding day. (A lab technician, Raymond Clark III, was later charged with murder.) Kim Clijsters, capping a comeback from two years out of tennis, became the first unseeded woman to win the U.S. Open as she defeated No. 9 Caroline Wozniacki, 7-5, 6-3. At the MTV Video Music Awards, Taylor Swift's acceptance speech for best female video for "You Belong with Me" was disrupted by Kanye West, who took the microphone to say Beyonce should have won instead for "Single Ladies (Put a Ring on It)."

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## Texas shortfall threatens grants for needy students

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A \$614 million state grant program for needy higher education students could be threatened by the projected \$18 billion Texas budget shortfall, a newspaper reported Monday.

About 24,000 first-time recipients of the TEXAS Grant program, for Toward EXcellence, Access & Success, could be shut out in the next two years, according to the San Antonio Express-News.

Gov. Rick Perry has ordered all state agencies to plan for a 10 percent cut in the next two-year spending

"It would be catastrophic ... if we cut financial aid just as that front edge of the changing demographic hits our colleges," said Raymund Paredes, Texas commissioner of higher education. "Those students will go home to their neighborhoods and say, 'Higher education is not

for me.' That could have a negative impact on educational attainment in Texas for a long time to come."

The 2009 Legislature boosted the program by \$186 million over the previous biennium and exempted the grants from a 5 percent cut ordered this year.

"Nobody really has any stomach for cutting financial aid," said Paredes.

Texas leaders in 2000 set a goal of enrolling 630,000 more students in higher education by 2015. Each year, the state falls short of its goal for enrolling Hispanic students, the fastest-growing demographic group, the newspaper reported.

"The No. 1 reason businesses locate in Texas is the quality of our work force. If we fail to grow our own college graduates, we are just going to be living in a third-world country," said state Rep. Mike Villarreal of San Antonio.

The TEXAS Grant program has been historically underfunded, only serving a portion of eligible students. With the 2009 boost, the number served increased to about 113,000 students, including 75 percent of firsttime recipients who qualify.

Paredes, to make better use of funds, has proposed a priority model that doles out money first to needy students who are also high achievers and stand a much better chance of graduating.

Mayllyn Luz, 21, of Houston is a senior at the University of Texas at San Antonio. The communications major from Houston is set to graduate early, in December, after getting nearly \$20,000 in TEXAS

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## Mexican marines arrest presumed drug kingpin

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican marines captured Sergio Villarreal Barragan, a presumed leader of the embattled Beltran Leyva cartel who appears on a list of the country's mostwanted fugitives, in a raid Sunday in the central state of Puebla, the government said.

The alleged capo known as "El Grande" did not put up any resistance when he was arrested along with two accomplices, a navy official who spoke on condition of anonymity in line with department policy told The Associated Press. The President's Office later issued a brief statement confirming the arrest took place in Puebla, capital of the state of the same name.

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Villarreal's capture is the fourth major blow delivered to drug cartels by Mexico's government in the past year. First came the death of Arturo Beltran Leyva on Dec. 16, 2009. Then soldiers killed the Sinaloa cartel's No. 3 capo, Ignacio "Nacho" Coronel, on July 29. And on Aug. 30 federal police announced the capture Edgar Valdez Villarreal, alias Barbie." The two men are not related.

Villarreal, "El Grande," appears on a 2009 Attorral's Office list of co's mostwanted drug traf-

fickers, with a reward of just over \$2 million offered for his capture.

He is listed as one of the remaining leaders of the Beltran Leyva cartel, whose top capo, Arturo Beltran Leyva, was killed in a raid by marines outside Mexico City.

Villarreal's capture comes about two weeks after the arrest of Valdez Villarreal, another alleged capo linked to the Beltran Leyvas.

once-powerful The Beltran Leyva cartel split following the death of Arturo known as the "Boss of Bosses" — which launched a brutal war for control of the gang, involving mass executions and beheadings in once-peaceful parts of central Mexico. The fight pitted brother Hector Beltran Leyva and Villarreal against a faction led by "La Barbie." Hector Beltran Leyva remains at large.

The Beltran Leyva brothers once formed a part of the Sinaloa cartel, but broke away following a dispute. . An indication of the problems facing the cartel is that three of the four main blows dealt to drug gangs in the past year involve Beltran Leyva leaders or operatives.

More than 28,000 people have been killed in Mexico since December 2006, when President Felipe Calderon launched a military offensive against the cartels soon after taking office.

In the central state of Morelos, police discovered nine bodies in clandestine graves Saturday in the same area where four more were recently found. The Public Safety Department said in a statement that all 13 victims were believed to have been killed on the orders of "La Barbie" in his battle for control of the cartel.

On Sunday, the military announced that it filed charges against four troops for the Sept. 5 shooting deaths of a man and his 15-year-old son along the highway linking the northern city of Monterrey to Laredo, Texas.

Authorities have said soldiers opened fire on the family vehicle when it failed to stop at a checkpoint, though relatives who were also in the car say they were shot at after they passed a military convoy.

The mother and wife of the two victims was also wounded in the shooting.

A captain, a corporal and two infantrymen are in custody in military prison and have been charged with homicide, the Defense Department said in a statement.

Mexico's military was already under scrutiny for this year's killings of two brothers, ages 5 and 9, on a highway in Tamaulipas, a state bordering Nuevo Leon.

The National Human Rights Commission has accused soldiers of shooting the children and altering the scene to try to pin the deaths on drug cartel gunmen.

The army denies the allegations and says the boys were killed in the crossfire of a shootout between soldiers and suspected traffickers.

The scandal renewed demands from activists that civilian authorities, not the army, investigate human rights cases involving the

## On nation's 200th birthday, Mexico battered, not broken

MEXICO CITY — The movie that Mexican director Luis Estrada is putting out for his country's bicentennial is bluntly named "Hell."

Like many Mexicans, Estrada says there is little to celebrate in Mexico today, with its violence, corruption and inequity. Yet in another way, the harshly critical movie shows how far the country has come - it was made with government funding, and nobody tried to censor it.

"I think this should be seen as enormous progress," Estrada says.

As Mexico limps into the bicentennial of its 1810 independence uprising, it is battered and full of self-questioning, but with more openness and debate than perhaps at any other time in its history.

The bicentennial marks the 1810 uprising led by Catholic priest Miguel Hidalgo, who gathered a band of Indians and farmers under the banner of the dark-skinned Virgin of Guadalupe. He was caught and executed soon afterward, but by 1821 the movement he started ousted the Spanish, a feat Mexicans celebrate Sept. 15-16.

"A bicentennial should inspire and generate hope, and this one hasn't," notes longtime environmental and consumer activist Alejandro Calvillo. "It comes at a time of

deep crisis. Why couldn't it have been in 1977, when Mexico was flush with oil money? Or in 1993, when Mexico negotiated the North American Free Trade agreement with the U.S., portrayed as a ticket to prosperity? Or in 2000, when the country experienced the first

democratic transition of power in its history? But all those "victories" proved hollow. The oil is running out. NAFTA failed to lift Mexican wages or stem migration. And democracy - in a country with no ballot initiatives, independent candidates or open city council meetings — has only strengthened the grip of the three main political

A Pew Research Center poll released in August shows 79 percent of Mexicans are dissatisfied with the country's direction. Even U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton jumped into the fray last week, saying that Mexico, plagued with drug-running and violence, is looking more and more how Colombia looked two decades ago.

Mexico seems to be slipping behind: Chinese auto workers who once earned wages their Mexican counterparts wouldn't stoop to take now earn more. Mexico's cher-'ished role as defender of Latin America's right to self-determination has largely been

taken over by Brazil and Venezuela. And Mexico's view of itself as the protector of refugees was badly shaken when drug cartel gunmen massacred 72 mainly Central American migrants in the north in August.

"We are a generous and hospitable people, without doubt, but now we are realizing with shock and shame that we have become a corrupt and murderous country," the Catholic Archdiocese of Mexico wrote in an editorial.

Perhaps what Mexicans have to celebrate is their own endurance — the real glue that's held the country together for centuries.

"We won't migrate, and we won't allow ourselves to be defeated," says Victor Suarez, 57, who started a national farm cooperative movement in 1995, right after NAFTA opened the door to imports of U.S. grain. Suarez' group now negotiates better prices for about 60,000 small farmers, and has built 200 grain warehouses.

"Farmers are the country's future," he says. "We are fighting to save something that is key to the national identity.'

Yet in the past 15 years, Suarez says he's seen increasing numbers of poor farmers migrate to the United States, or be recruited by drug gangs to work as hitmen or lookouts, or to plant marijuana or opium. In a country where roughly 10 percent of the population has migrated abroad - and a Pew Research Center poll shows another 33 percent would like to do so - merely remaining is often a statement in itself.

That's especially true in Ciudad Juarez, where drug violence has killed more than 4,000 people since 2009, making it one of the deadliest cities in the world. The violence is so bad that the city canceled its Independence Day celebration for the first time since Pancho Villa raided towns along the border during the 1910-1917

A restaurant owner in the violencewracked border city - he asked for his name not be printed to avoid reprisals isn't leaving, even after gunmen barged into his eatery one year ago to demand protection money. He moved his family to El Paso, Texas and opened another eatery there, but he remained in Juarez to keep his business open and continue providing jobs for his 10 employees.

"My dad started this place on a shoestring," he says, amid the warm smell of his family's turkey burritos. "I want to stay here, I'm from Juarez, and I'm going to stay and help my employees' families as long as I can...I'm not going to let some bastards run me out."

## Tea party rallies switch focus to November 2 elections

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - Originally billed as a chance to reflect on the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, a series of raucous tea party rallies around the country on Sunday ended up focusing almost entirely on an event still to come - the Nov. 2 election.

"We are your everyday, average, churchgoing families, we represent the majority of people in this nation, and we're ready to take back our government," said Pam Pinkston of Fair Oaks, Calif., one of about 4,000 people to attend Sacramento's "United to the Finish" gathering.

Thousands of tea party activists also turned up at rallies in Washington, D.C., and St. Louis to spread their message of smaller government and focus their political movement on the pivotal congressional elections in November.

Several thousand people marched along Pennsylvania Avenue from the Washington Monument to the Capitol, many carrying signs reading "Congress You're Fired" and "Let Failures Fail and "Impeach Obama."

"It wouldn't bother me to make a clean sweep," said Michael Power of Decatur, Ala., endorsing term limits for members of Congress. "There are some good ones, but we can lose those."

Leslie and Gary Morrison of Redding drove 150 south to the former McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento with their dog Phoebe, just two weeks after flying to Washington to attend a large rally hosted by conservative commentator Glenn Beck. They said they liked the feeling of solidarity at the tea party events

This is a way to get people focused before the election," Leslie Morrison said. "And it's a way to get the tea party's true numbers seen."

Many attending the various rallies wore red, white and blue clothing and carried yellow flags with the picture of a snake coiled above the inscription "Don't Tread On

In Sacramento, speakers railed against health care reform, the economic stimulus and President Barack Obama while standing in front of a 12-foot plastic replica of the Statue of Liberty.

In St. Louis, crowds packed the area between the Gateway Arch and the Mississippi River while a band dressed in powdered wigs and 18th century clothing belted out KISS's "I Want to Rock 'N Roll All Night."

Organizers say the events intended to call attention to what they describe as big government run amok and to recall the sense of national unity Americans felt the day after the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

The rallies also represent an opportunity to build momentum before the November election. The tea party is counting on its members to turn out in large numbers and prove that the movement is a political force with

staying power.
"We've lost respect in the world. We are going broke. The American dream is dying and our social and cultural fabric is unraveling," said Rep. Mike Pence, R-Ind., who

spoke at the Washington rally. "People are scared. If we do not succeed in November, all that once was good and great about this country could someday be gone.

Most of the rally-goers were already faithful tea party activists, and it will take a lot more than just them to make real waves at the polls, acknowledged Tea Party Patriots co-founder Mark Meckler.

"We want to fire people up today, so that then they'll go out and get the new people," Meckler, of Nevada City, Calif., said backstage at the Sacramento event.

Tea Party Patriots claims to be the nation's largest tea party group, with 2,700 chapters, including at least 175 in California.

Beck and another tea party favorite, former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin, spoke to a crowd in Anchorage, Alaska, late Saturday — the ninth anniversary of the terrorist attacks and discussed their feelings about that day in 2001.

"Here we are so many years later, and I fear we are forgetting," Beck said.

Party activists reject characterizations of their movement as an extension of the GOP, but the vast majority of its members are Republicans and independents who vote Republican.

But not Mary Jane Corcoran, a 58-year-old from Dayton, Ohio, who made the 360-mile trip to St. Louis to show her opposition to big government.

"I've sort of gotten away from being a Republican or a Democrat," she said. "I'm just a conservative."

## Suspicions frustrate **American Muslims**

NEW YORK (AP) - Nine years of denouncing terrorism, of praying side-by-side with Jews and Christians, of insisting "I'm American, too." None of it could stop a season of hate against Muslims that made for an especially fraught Sept. 11. Now, Muslims are asking why their efforts to be accepted in the United States have been so easily thwarted.

"We have nothing to apologize for, we have nothing to fear, we have nothing to be ashamed of, we have nothing that we're guilty of - but we need to be out there and we need to express this," said Imam Mohammed Ibn Faqih in a sermon at the Islamic Institute of Orange County in Anaheim, Calif., the day before the 9/11 anniversary.

There is no simple way for American Muslims to move

Images of violence overseas in the name of Islam have come to define the faith for many non-Muslims at home. The U.S. remains at war in Afghanistan, and although America has formally declared an end to its combat operations in Iraq, U.S. troops there continue to fight alongside Iraqi forces.

Within the U.S., domestic terror has become a greater threat, while ignorance about what Islam teaches is widespread. More than half of respondents in a recent poll by the Pew Forum for Religion & Public Life said they knew little or nothing about the Muslim faith.

Some U.S. Muslims say their national organizations share the blame, for answering intricate questions about Islam with platitudes, and failing to fully examine the potential for extremism within their communities. Muslim leaders often respond when terrorists strike by saying Islam is a "religion of peace" that has no role in the violence instead of confronting the legitimate concerns of other Americans, these Muslim critics say.

"There's a quaintness and naivete or outright whitewashing of some very complex issues," said Saeed Khan, who teaches at Wayne State University in Detroit. "This has caused a lot of frustration for a lot of Muslim Americans,

myself included."

The summer frenzy about Islam in America has revolved around Park51, a community center and mosque planned two blocks from New York's ground zero. Opponents and supporters of the center converged on the area for protests and counter-protests Saturday after the morning memorial ceremony at the World Trade Center site.

In recent months, mosques in Texas, Tennessee, California, New York and elsewhere have been shot at and vandalized. Threatening messages were left at one mosque. A Florida pastor caused a global uproar with his ultimately unfulfilled threat to make a bonfire of Qurans on Sept. 11.

Many Jewish, Roman Catholic, mainline Protestant, evangelical, atheist and other groups have responded with an outpouring of support for Muslims, but suspicion remains high among many Americans.

Islamic centers have become a focus of non-Muslim fears. Federal authorities have placed informants in mosques, saying doing so is a critical counterterrorism tool. Muslim groups have separately created national campaigns encouraging congregations to monitor for any sign of radicalization, but they have also complained bitterly about the use of informants, worried the innocent will be caught up in the net police have set for criminals.

Akbar Ahmed, professor of Islamic studies at American University, found a wide range of mosques - from literalist to modernist to mystical — while researching his book, "Journey Into America, The Challenge of Islam." He said many mosques are engaged in internal struggles between Muslims with rigid and modernist views, but he found none that fit the imaginings of anti-Muslim conspiracy theorists.

Historians, and several Muslim leaders, see similarities to the prejudice Roman Catholics and Jews experienced as newcomers to America starting in the 19th century. The hierarchical Catholic church was denounced as a threat to the separation of church and state. Synagogues were banned in many states, and Jews were viewed as undermining the nation's Christian character.

Mark Silk, director of the Greenberg Center for the Study of Religion in Public Life at Trinity College in Connecticut, said the experience of Japanese Americans in World War II more closely parallels the current plight of Muslims. After the Pearl Harbor bombing, Silk said Americans asked, "Are our Japanese different from those Japanese?"

"I don't think we're about to round up all the Muslims and put them in concentration camps," Silk said. "But I don't think we've ever seen the degree of legitimacy given by people in positions of authority to straight-up, anti-Islamic

U.S. Muslim condemnations of terrorism have failed to

persuade other Americans.

This year, in response to recent cases of young Americans lured into jihadist movements by Internet preaching, nine prominent U.S. Muslim scholars made a YouTube video denouncing radicalism. Other American Islamic scholars have written edicts, or fatwas, saying violence is contrary to Islamic teaching. The Islamic Society of North America dedicated its 2005 annual convention, which draws tens of thousands of Muslims, to fighting terrorism and extremism.




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

## Miscues doom Cowboys in opener

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — The first half ended with a fumble returned for a touchdown. The second half ended with a touchdown that didn't count.

Nothing less should be expected from a game between the Washington Redskins and Dallas Cowboys. The cast might change — insert Donovan McNabb and -Mike Shanahan into the mix, for example — but one thing is eternal: This rivalry will always have some memorable finishes.

The Redskins came out on top - this time, winning 13-7 in Sunday night's opener even though Tony Romo completed a 13-yard pass to Roy Williams in the end zone on the game's last play. Alas, the score was negated because tackle Alex Barron was whistled for holding linebacker Brian Orakpo, stopping the Dallas celebrations in their tracks and giving Washington a victorious start in its new era with quarterback McNabb and coach Shanahan.

"I knew he held me, but as soon as I seen him throw it to Roy, I'm like 'Are they gonna call it?" Orakpo said. "Then I looked up and saw the yellow flag on the floor. Hey, it's game, set and match. Game over, it's celebrating time."

The Redskins didn't get to celebrate much last year, going 4-12 under coach Jim Zorn and 0-6 in the NFC East. They didn't score a touchdown in either game against the dreaded Cowboys.

For that matter, they didn't score an offensive touchdown Sunday night — cornerback DeAngelo Hall was the only Redskins player to find the end zone — but that hardly seemed to matter.

McNabb's debut performance for Washington wasn't much to brag about. He completed 15 of 32 passes for 171 yards, leading two drives that ended in field goals. Another big name, Albert Haynesworth, didn't have much of an impact, rotating in and out of the game as a backup defensive lineman after months of feuding with Shanahan over offseason practices, conditioning tests and playing time in preseason games.

Romo completed 31 of 47 passes for 282 yards, but he relied heavily on screens and was staring at a shutout until he hit Miles Austin for a 4-yard touchdown late in the third quarter. Austin was the closest thing to an offensive star, making 10 catches for 146 yards.

The spotlight instead will fall on two plays, both of which ended with 0:00 on the clock.

A yawner of a first half was headed toward a plodding finish when Dallas coach Wade Phillips decided to try to score instead of letting the time run down when the Cowboys got the ball at their own 30 with 27 seconds remaining. On the last play - 4 seconds were left when the ball was snapped Romo threw short to Tashard Choice, who had the ball stripped

by Hall with help from Lorenzo Alexander and Andre Carter. Hall picked up the ball and ran 32 yards for the score, somersaulting into

the end zone. "That was my fault before the half," Phillips said. "We should have taken a knee."

Phillips then corrected himself a bit, saying Choice needs to hang on to the ball.

"If you catch the ball with 4 seconds left, you don't need to make an extra yard or two," the coach said.

The Cowboys kept on making mistakes. Penalties were piling up. Three of them, including a holding call on Barron, stalled a promising drive early in the fourth quarter.

Then came the final sequence. Graham Gano gave the Redskins a 13-7 lead with a 49-yard field goal with 1:50 to play. After the kickoff, the Cowboys started at their own 19. They converted a fourthand-10 at Washington's 43 when Romo hit Austin over the middle for a 30-yard gain with 12 seconds to go. Three plays later came the pass to Williams that was wiped out by Barron's second holding call of the quarter and Dallas' 12th

penalty of the game. Barron, who was starting because Marc Colombo was out with a knee injury, sat facing his locker after the game, head in hands, long after most of his teammates had showered. He eventually left without comment.

## Tebow a nonfactor in first Broncos action

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — As Denver Broncos quarterback Tim Tebow jogged onto the field for warmups, television cameras captured his every move.

It turned out to be some of his best footage.

Tebow was a non-factor in his NFL debut, getting on the field for three plays and finishing with 2 yards on two carries in his hometown. Some even questioned whether the first-round draft pick stalled two drives in Jacksonville's 24-17 win over the Broncos.

"It's cool that the first opportunity for me to play in a real game was here in Jacksonville, a place that I've played a lot of games and been here a lot of times," Tebow said. "It was a lot of fun.'

The Jaguars were the only ones celebrating afterward.

David Garrard, who played last season with "Draft Tebow" bumper stickers floating around town and teal-and-black No. 15 jerseys scattered throughout the stands, threw three touchdown passes and finished with the best passer rating of his nine-year career.

It came at the perfect time for Jacksonville, a small-market franchise trying to sell tickets, avoid television blackouts and eliminate more talk about relocation. The Jaguars called this victory one of the most important in team history

"This was big for us," said tight end Marcedes Lewis, who caught two TD passes. "We really got some juice out of our squeeze.

Garrard completed 16 of 21 passes for 170 yards, and had a QB rating of 138.9. Mike Thomas caught six passes for 89 yards. Maurice Jones-Drew ran for 98 yards. Adam Podlesh dropped two punts inside the 10. Tiquan Underwood returned two kickoffs for 99 yards, setting up a touchdown and a field goal

Jacksonville's defense was just as good. After ranking last in the league with 14 sacks a year ago, the Jaguars had three in the opener and hit Kyle Orton several other times. The defense also stopped Denver on fourth down with about 5 minutes remaining and intercepted a pass in the closing seconds.

"You get what you emphasize, usually," said Aaron Kampman, the team's biggest offseason acquisition who was involved in two sacks. "We have emphasized getting after the passer.'

Kampman kept the performance in perspective, pointing out that Denver played with two rookies (center J.D. Walton and right tackle Zane Beadles) on the offensive line and had All-Pro left tackle Ryan Clady starting five months after knee







