



# Group aims to keep bird from endangered list

Oil and gas producers and area ranchers gathered at the Gray County Annex this week to discuss the importance of a small ground-dwelling bird.

David Hall and L.H. Webb, ranchers in southeastern Gray County, want to avoid having the lesser prairie chicken listed as an endangered or threatened species.

Like many Panhandle ranchers, they have worked with state and federal wildlife officials to help with the recovery of the prairie chicken to keep it from being listed, but with proposed power lines scheduled to cut through prairie chicken habitat, they fear it will hasten the listing of the small bird.

They and the Gray County Commission have proposed power lines take a route around prairie chicken habitat in an effort to keep the bird from being listed and land use curtailed on private property.

They have been joined by Pampa State Legislator Warren Chisum and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in calling for routing power lines around the habitat of the CHICKEN cont. on page 7

In addition, there will be attendance prizes awarded throughout the fair, including two six-month Anytime Fitness memberships, children's bicycles, and a variety of gift certificates.



# State board considers Islam in textbooks

AUSTIN (AP) — A social conservative bloc of the Texas State Board of Education has drafted a resolution saying textbook publishers should limit what they print about Islam in world history books.

The board is scheduled next week to consider the resolution, which warns publishers not to push pro-Islamic, anti-Christian viewpoints in world history textbooks, The Dallas Morning News reported Wednesday.

The resolution cites world history books no longer used in Texas schools that it says devoted more lines of text to Islamic beliefs and practices than Christian beliefs and practices.

"Diverse reviewers have repeatedly documented gross

"Once again, without consulting any real experts, the board's politicians are manufacturing a bogus controversy," Miller said. No textbooks cited by sponsors of the resolution are being used in Texas schools, she said.

The resolution concludes by warning publishers the State Board of Education will look to reject future prejudicial social studies submissions that continue to offend Texas law with respect to treatment of the world's major religious groups by significant inequalities of coverage space-wise and by demonizing or lionizing one or more of them over others."

Kathy Miller, spokeswoman for the Texas Freedom Network, a religious freedom group, called the resolution "another example of board members putting politics ahead of just educating our kids."

Oil industry: Higher fees could cost jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The oil and gas industry says an Obama administration plan to double fees charged for inspections of offshore operations could cost jobs.

The industry recognizes the need for improved inspections and oversight following the massive BP oil spill, American Petroleum Institute president Jack Gerard said. But doubling the fees is not appropriate, especially during a recession, he said

"This is not the time to go back and impose additional costs on industry," Gerard said Tuesday in a conference call with reporters

The oil and gas industry contributes billions of dollars to the U.S. government in royalty payments, taxes and other fees, Gerard said, adding that government policies should encourage development of domestic energy while making sure it is safe.

The White House asked Congress late Monday to approve the higher inspection fees as part of a request for \$80 million in new spending for the agency that oversees offshore drilling

The proposal would more than double the amount collected from oil and gas companies, to \$45 million next year from about \$20 million this year.

Obama said in a letter to Congress that the fee increases and other changes are needed to strengthen oversight of offshore oil and gas operations; address deficiencies in mineral revenue collection; and complete the reorganization of the agency formerly known as the Minerals Management Service.

The drilling agency's new director said Tuesday that he was not involved in the fee increase decision, but supports additional revenue for his organization, now known as Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforcement. 'We need the additional resources to do the job that we've

He said the books have been modified and made more balanced, but that he still sees a "serious problem" with bias in history books.

been asked to do," said Michael Bromwich, the drilling agency's new chief. Under its former name, the drilling agency was long plagued by staffing shortages and an overly cozy relationship with the industries it oversees.

Bromwich acknowledged those problems, but said the ocean energy bureau is turning a corner - and needs additional money to get even better.

'We've been faulted for not doing the job people expected us to do, and the central reason for that is we haven't had adequate resources. If we don't get the resources we need we won't be able to do the job effectively," Bromwich said Tuesday in a separate conference call.

Congress recently approved \$29 million in emergency spending to hire hundreds of new offshore drilling inspectors and take others steps to improve the drilling agency. No new inspectors have been hired yet, but Bromwich said officials were conducting a "full-court press" to find and hire qualified inspectors to bolster the 60 or so inspectors now responsible for about 3,500 drilling rigs and platforms in the Gulf of Mexico.

### Bodies found; Hermine toll at 8

AUSTIN (AP) — The bodies of two more people killed by floodwaters from Tropical Storm Hermine last week have been found in the Austin area.

One of the bodies has been identified as that of 51-yearold Jennifer Ring of Austin. The mother of two children had been missing since swift water swept her sport utility vehicle down Bull Creek from Farm Road 2222 on Sept. 8. Austin police say two fishermen found the body floating in Lake Austin Monday, and her identity was established Tuesday.

Meanwhile, 25 miles to the north in Georgetown, police found the debris-wrapped body of a man Tuesday in a drainage field of Pecan Branch. A police statement says the cause of his death hasn't been determined but the Hermine flooding was a factor. His identity hasn't been released.

That brings the Hermine-related death toll eight — seven in Texas and one in Oklahoma.

### Judge refuses to confine child

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A state judge has refused to restrict to Texas an 11-year-old boy who's at the center of an ongoing international custody fight.

Attorneys for the father of Jean (ZHAHN) Paul Lacombe had asked state District Judge Larry Noll of San Antonio for an emergency order that the boy be restricted to Texas. The San Antonio Express-News reports that a Monday hearing on a non-emergency motion is expected.

The boy was returned to San Antonio from France last month after a French court ruled that his father, a man with dual Mexican-French citizenship, didn't have lawful custody of the boy.

Law officers last October removed the boy from a San Antonio school bus after the father allegedly used incomplete Mexican court documents to falsely claim custody.

The father faces Texas charges of kidnapping, aggravated perjury and interfering with child custody.

### Pilot hurt in Mineola crash

MINEOLA (AP) — A small plane has crashed in a wooded area of east Texas, slightly injuring the pilot.

Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman Tom Vinger says the accident happened Wednesday morning near Mineola, about 85 miles east of Dallas.

Vinger says 54-year-old Mark England of Tyler sustained minor injuries.

DPS had no further immediate details.

### Arguments begin in Afghan trial

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Prosecutors say two former defense contractors were fueled by alcohol and anger the night they killed two Afghan nationals on the streets of Kabul.

Their attorneys countered during opening statements in U.S. District Court that Justin H. Cannon and Christopher Drotleff believed they were under attack on the world's most dangerous road when they opened fire May 5, 2009.

Cannon, of Corpus Christi, Texas, and Drotleff, of Virginia Beach, face murder, assault and weapons charges. Their trial began Wednesday in Virginia.

### Ex-priest to be extradited

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — A former Catholic priest wanted on sex crime charges in Texas has agreed to be extradited from Kansas.

John M. Fiala, 51, said Tuesday during a Douglas County Court hearing that he was willing to be sent to Texas.

Fiala is wanted in Edwards County, Texas, on four counts of sex crimes against children. He was arrested Sept. 3 in Lawrence and was being held in the Douglas County jail on \$100,000 bond.

The Lawrence Journal-World reports that Fiala was removed from the priesthood in 2008 after the allegations in Texas surfaced.

Fiala had served as a priest in Shawnee and Holton, Kan., and lived in a religious house in Kansas City from 1998 to 2001. He did not have a parish assignment with the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph, Mo.

No sexual abuse charges have been filed against Fiala in Kansas or Missouri.

### **Gay-friendly church leaves BGCT**

DALLAS (AP) — A more than century-old church in Fort Worth that welcomes gays has left the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The break by Broadway Baptist Church of Fort Worth ends a relationship that began in 1886, when what became the state's largest Baptist group was formed.

Pastor Brent Beasley told *The Dallas Morning News* that the church is "committed to welcoming all people here" and would not want to do anything that would be hurtful to anyone just to please the BGCT.

Broadway in 2008 drew attention with its internal dispute over whether same-sex couples should be included in the church's photo directory. Leaders eventually decided to instead feature group pictures of all church members.

The Southern Baptist Convention, which along with BGCT believes homosexuality is a sin, cut ties with Broadway in 2009.

### Girl raped before death

HOUSTON (AP) — A prosecutor says a Houston-area man who was dating a nurse raped her 4-year-old daughter before the child died last year.

Testimony was scheduled to resume Wednesday in the Houston aggravated sexual assault trial of Lucas Coe.

An autopsy found that Emma Thompson had a severed pancreas and fractured skull.

Prosecutor Tina Ansari, during opening statements Tuesday, said medical personnel will testify that the child also had a torn vagina.

A jury in July convicted the girl's mother, Abigail Young of Spring, of injury to a child by omission and ordered 20 years in prison. Ansari says the couple and the victim all had genital herpes.

Defense attorney William Van Buren says the child was not sexually assaulted and the herpes could have been transmitted by casual contact.



### **Today's Highlight in History:**

On Sept. 15, 1940, during the World War II Battle of Britain, the tide turned as the Royal Air Force inflicted heavy losses against the Luftwaffe, forcing Adolf Hitler to indefinitely postpone his plans to invade Britain.

#### On this date:

In 1776, British forces occupied New York City during the American Revolution.

In 1789, the U.S. Department of Foreign Affairs was renamed the Department of State.

In 1807, former Vice President Aaron Burr was acquitted of a misdemeanor charge two weeks after he was found not guilty of treason.

In 1821, the Kingdom of Guatemala proclaimed its independence from Spain.

In 1857, William Howard Taft — who served as president of the United States and as U.S. chief justice — was born in Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 1935, the Nuremberg Laws deprived German Jews of their citizenship.

In 1950, during the Korean conflict, United Nations forces landed at Incheon in the south and began their drive toward Seoul.

In 1959, Nikita Khrushchev became the first Soviet head of state to visit the United States as he arrived at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington, where he was greeted by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1963, four black girls were killed when a bomb went off during Sunday services at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Ala. (Three Ku Klux Klansmen were eventually convicted for their roles in the blast.)

In 1982, Iran's former foreign minister, Sadegh Ghotbzadeh, was executed after he was convicted of plotting against the government.

Ten years ago: The 2000 Summer Olympics opened in Sydney, Australia, with a seemingly endless parade of athletes and coaches and a spectacular display; Aborigine runner Cathy Freeman ignited an Olympic ring of fire.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, addressing the nation from storm-ravaged New Orleans, acknowledged the government had failed to respond adequately to Hurricane Katrina, and urged Congress to approve a massive reconstruction program. Hurricane Ophelia continued to lash the Outer Banks of North Carolina with rain and wind. Producer Sid Luft, who was credited with reviving the career of his then-wife, Judy Garland, died in Santa Monica, Calif. at age 89.

One year ago: Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said the worst recession since the 1930s was "very likely over," although he cautioned that pain especially for nearly 15 million unemployed Americans — would persist. An unrepentant Muntadhar al-Zeidi, the Iraqi reporter who'd thrown his shoes at President George W. Bush in Dec. 2008, was freed from prison.



### Make a family disaster plan



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

lesser prairie chicken. Gray County Commissioner-elect Jeff Haley said there has been little response from Pampa State Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, to requests from Gray County ranchers for help.

The bird was first proposed for listing more than a decade ago. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at the time said the bird should be listed, but they didn't have the funding to do so, so the bird became a candidate species. It was on the list to be listed as endangered or threatened, but it does not presently enjoy any federal protection.

On Tuesday, Hall and Webb hosted a meeting at the county annex to discuss the bird, its habitat and the effect wind farms and the associated high voltage power lines will have on the legal status of the bird.

Homecoming

While the Gray County Commission is asking wildlife and power company officials to come to the courthouse and talk about the situation, H. Wayne Hughes, a While Deer native and executive director of the Producers and Royalty Owners Association, told Tuesday's gathering that it is only a matter of time before the lesser prairie chicken is listed, a view seconded by Heather Whitlaw with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Whitlaw said it would probably be four years before the bird would be listed since the listing process can be complicated and drawn out.

However, she said that a New Mexico-based conservation group, the Wild Earth Guardians, have filed a lawsuit to force the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Agency to move forward with listing.

While listing through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proce-

dures could take several years, Whitlaw indicated that a federal judge could shorten that time period as a result of the Wild Earth Guardians' lawsuit.

The fear is that the proposed power lines planned to cut through Gray County will fragment lesser prairie chicken habitat and force the listing of the bird as an endangered species.

Webb said that could impact land use by landowners. There could be restrictions, he said, on grazing cattle or servicing oil and gas wells during certain months of the year when the prairie chickens are mating or raising their young.

Pat Bagley, chief appraiser for Gray County, told the gathering that if the lesser prairie chicken were listed as endangered or threatened, it would probably adversely impact land values in the county.


Hampton said her and Gage stayed calm to pull out the victory.

"I just used my inner strength," Hampton said.


The Harvesters play two matches in Lubbock starting at 9 a.m. Saturday against Big Spring and Andrews.
