Voter registration deadline is this Monday

November promises to bring one of the most talked about midterm elections in recent history, and Gray County Election Administrator Linda Lewis wants to make sure local residents don't miss out on the party.

Texas' voter registration deadline is Monday. Registration forms can be picked up at the election office, Rm. 103 on the ground floor of the courthouse, or at the post office. Prospective voters can also register online at VOTEXAS.

To register to vote in Gray County, you must: ues from 2008.

· be a U.S. citizen; • be a resident of the county;

• be at least 17 years and 10 months old (you

must be 18 by Election Day); · not be a convicted felon (unless your sentence is completed, including any probation and parole); and

· not be declared mentally incapacitated by a court of law.

All Texans can check their registration status at VOTEXAS.org.


Lewis said that she hopes that the groundswell of voter interest in Gray County contin-

"We had a large upswing of registration for the presidential election and it was incredible," said Lewis. "That election got a lot of people out to vote, and we think that people still do want to participate.

'So far, it's been pretty steady as we get closer to the midterm. I've been registering four or five people a day, which is up from what we normally do during the summer months... People want to invest in the electoral process and they're pretty diligent in making sure that they're able to do that.'

It's been more than 65 years since the war that brought these men together in the Pacific ended, yet their memories of its horrors and heroism burn

The dozen or so men that will gather at Pampa's AmericInn this weekend are about all that are left of their unit, the Second Armored Amphibian Battalion of the Fourth Marines.

The unit was in the first wave to hit the volcanic ash on the beaches of Iwo Jima in February, 1945.

Lynn and Larry Ray invited the unit to Pampa earlier this decade for their annual reunion. Friday will be the unit's third trip to Pampa.

Ray, who served in the Marine Corps in the 1950s, explained that his wife had been diagnosed with breast cancer in 1999, and the couple was in Tulsa for her treatment.

Ray had left his wife's room at the hospital and was getting a breath of fresh air when he passed a car in the parking lot. He said the car had a Marine Corps sticker on it and indicated that owner had served at MARINES cont. on page 3





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AUSTIN (AP) - Police at the University of Texas at Austin say a gunman who opened fire inside a campus library has shot and killed himself and police are seeking a possible second suspect.

Laredo police officer convicted

LAREDO (AP) - A Laredo police officer has been convicted in a 2008 undercover drug and weapons case in which prosecutors say loads of cocaine were escorted through rush-hour traffic.

U.S. Attorney Jose Angel Moreno says jurors Monday convicted 27-year-old Officer Orlando Jesus Hale of conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine, plus using a firearm to further drug trafficking.

The drug conspiracy conviction carries a sentence ranging from 10 years to life in prison. The maximum fine is \$4 million. The firearms conviction charge carries a minimum five years in prison, plus a \$250,000 fine.

Investigator Jose Baeza on Monday told The Associated Press that Hale was suspended when he was arrested and, as a convicted felon, he can no longer be a police officer.

AFTERNOON RUSH Envoy to try to salvage Mideast peace talks

JERUSALEM (AP) — Washington's special Mideast envoy, using a slim lifeline from the Palestinians, rushed to the region on Tuesday on an emergency mission to keep peace talks from collapsing just weeks after they began.

Israel's decision to resume new West Bank settlement construction after a 10-month moratorium expired on midnight Sunday has provoked Palestinian threats to walk out of the talks. It has also caused new friction between Israel and its powerful U.S. patron, which said it was "disappointed" with Israel's refusal to relent.

On Monday night, Washington dispatched special envoy George Mitchell to the region to try to bridge gaps that Palestinian, Israel and American officials failed to close in a frenetic round of meetings in the U.S. last week.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas gave U.S. mediation more time to work when he announced Monday he wouldn't decide whether to abandon the talks before consulting senior Arab officials in Cairo next week. An Arab League official has told The Associated Press that Arab foreign ministers were expected to endorse whatever position Abbas took.

A senior Palestinian official said

Liberation Organization's 18-member decision-making body would meet Wednesday Thursday to formulate a position Abbas before meets with the

League envoys. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was discussing internal Palestinian deliberations.

State Department spokesman P.J. Crowley praised Abbas for not immediately walking out of the talks and chided Israel for resisting international pressure to halt new housing starts in the West Bank — territory that Palestinians claim as part of their future state.

"We are disappointed but we remain focused on our long-term objective and will be talking to the parties about the implications of the Israeli decision," Crowley said Monday, adding that Mitchell would "sort through with the parties where we go from here.

U.N. chief Ban Ki-moon and senior European officials have also criticized Israel's decision.

In Paris on Tuesday, the Palestinian leader urged Israel to halt new West Bank settlement construction as long as Mideast peace talks continue, saying he feared the two sides might miss a "historic opportunity" if Israel refuses to renew a just-expired freeze on the

"If settlement stops, we will continue the negotiations. If not, we will stop, Abbas said. "We cannot destroy this hope (for peace) with things that are secondary, like settlements," he said.

Palestinian leaders, he added, hope Israel will halt settlement building "as long as there are negotiations.'

Immediately after the restrictions expired, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu appealed to Abbas to keep negotiating. Netanyahu has indicated he would be prepared to limit new building, but has refused to agree to a complete halt.

Netanyahu, a settlement champion who agreed under duress to impose the moratorium in late November, has told the U.S. that he cannot extend it because his partners in Israel's pro-settlement government oppose such a move. But he has indicated he would be willing to impose some limitations on construction.

FTC OKs Coca-Cola bottler deal

WASHINGTON (AP) - Regulators have approved Coca-Cola's \$3.4 billion buyout of its largest North American bottler on the condition that the soft drink maker restrict its access to confidential competitive business information from Dr Pepper Snapple Group.

The Federal Trade Commission said Monday that according to a settlement, Coca-Cola will set up a "firewall" so that its ownership of the bottler won't give it access to marketing information and plans for Dr Pepper Snapple, which had an existing deal with the bottler.

In June, Coca-Cola announced it would pay \$715 million to Plano, Texas-based rival Dr Pepper Snapple for the rights to distribute Dr Pepper and Canada Dry in the U.S. after the bottler deal goes through.

Reynosa gunbattle leaves 9 dead

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexico's navy says a gunbattle in the Gulf coast border state of Tamaulipas left eight gunmen and one marine dead in the border city of Reynosa.

Meanwhile, in Ciudad Juarez, across from El Paso, Texas, the Public Safety Department announced the capture of a drug gang member who allegedly helped set up a car bomb that killed three people. Suspect Jose Contreras allegedly killed a man and dressed him in a police uniform to lure federal agents to the area where the car bomb exploded, killing a federal police officer and a doctor who was helping the shooting victim.

Contreras is a member of La Linea gang, which works for 'the Juarez drug cartel, the department said in a statement.

Regional military prison opens

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kan. (AP) - A regional prison is opening at Fort Leavenworth, combining the operations of military prisons elsewhere in the United States.

The Joint Regional Confinement Facility will be operated by the Army Corrections Command. It's located on the northeast Kansas post near the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks, the military's maximum-security prison.

Dedication ceremonies were scheduled Tuesday for the prison and a new brigade that will staff it.

The 464-bed facility will get its first prisoners next month from Fort Sill, Okla., and reach 120 inmates by January

In 2005, the Base Realignment and Closure Commission decided to close prisons at Fort Sill, Fort Knox, Ky., and Lackland Air Force Base, Texas.

Guilty pleas in UNT slayings

DENTON (AP) - A University of North Texas food services employee has pleaded guilty to the 2009 shooting death of his boss after she criticized him for unsatisfactory

Testimony was scheduled to continue Tuesday in Denton in the penalty phase for 48-year-old William Xu. He pleaded guilty Monday to murder and faces up to life in prison.

The body of 55-year-old Jennifer Ying Ying Maik was discovered in August 2009 in her Denton home. Maik was a food service supervisor at UNT's Clark Hall. Police records indicate Maik had reprimanded Xu for poor work.

The Denton Record-Chronicle reports Xu has asked to be sentenced by Judge Bruce McFarling, instead of by a jury.

Two Fort Hood soldiers killed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Military officials say two Fort Hood soldiers have died following a bombing in Afghanistan.

The Defense Department on Tuesday announced the deaths of 40-year-old Sgt. Mark A. Simpson, 40, of Peoria, Ill., and 23-year-old Spc. Donald S. Morrison of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Military officials say the men died Sunday at Kandahar. Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when insurgents bombed their military vehicle a day earlier.

Simpson and Morrison were assigned to the 20th Engineer Battalion, 36th Engineer Brigade at Fort Hood.

RED DEER, Alberta (AP) — A man was in police custody on Monday after allegedly shooting his family cat

It gave us time to mostly get over our own initial tears. We weren't sure how things would go that day for him. As he made his way to the front door we just tried to pour love all over him with a regular hug-a-thon. It was a hard day, but he made it through. Some days he was fine; others were a real struggle. Sometimes he just needed Miss Julie to sit with him or hold him. She wasn't mom, but it always made things a little better.

A few time he had questions that better suited our greeter, Preacher Mike. "I would just try to ask a question or two that would let him share some of the great times that he remembered about his mom. One day I asked him, 'What was your mom's favorite color?' He couldn't remember. I could see that it startled him that he couldn't remember. So I said, 'Since you can't remember a particular color, that must mean that your mom liked all the colors, right?' He nodded and was relieved. 'Well that would make her a rainbow mom, huh?' He smiled

"About that time I looked behind my desk for something that I could give him to maybe make things better, that day. Sometimes God just gives you the perfect thing to help someone else. I had a bag of different colored balls that we had given away at the Christmas Parade. So I had him pick-out one of each color and told him to take them home and that every time he felt sad about missing his mom, just hold on to one of the balls and think about the good times that he had with his 'rainbow mom.' It didn't bring his mom back, but it helped that day and some other times too."

He is still one of our CREATE-a-Beat! kids. We had a great year last year. In September of 2006 we achieved capacity in our After School ARTS Program. We maintained that capacity for the entire school year and have only 19 places left for this upcoming school year. Last year we were also able to provide fee waivers for our After School ARTS Program to over 100 children, because of generous donations from the community and local grant agencies. With all of our volunteers, staff,

cont. from page 1 board members, and participants we touched the lives of over 250 people in Pampa last year. We look forward to many more years, serving the community and surround-

ing area of Pampa.

I love the slogan for the United Way Campaign this year "Live United." I want to tell you why it is so important for us to Live United and to receive funding from the United Way. Each of you sitting in this room is here because you care about our community but more importantly the people in our community. At CREATE-a-Beat we have a philosophy: "If we can't become a part of these children's lives, then we need to close the doors." We don't want to be just a place where children check-in for a couple of hours. Now it is true that a few of the children seem only to be affected for the time they are actually at CREATE-a-Beat. However, many of the children are touched so deeply that they remember with fondness their time at CAB for a long time. Two of our current High School Employees were originally participants in our pro-

gram, actually in our first group of 15 children.

Several years ago we had 3 children attending our program. One day they stopped coming to our program. Their parents had been arrested and put in jail because they were living in the old Bra Factory and making and selling Crystal Meth. The kids were there with them hungry and alone because their parents were so messed up on drugs they didn't even think to feed them or bathe them. The kids were placed in the custody of an aunt. When she found out they were registered in our program she brought them back to us. The day they came back she told me she was so glad to "get rid of them" for a while because she didn't want them and was tired of having her family disrupted by them. The middle child (6 yrs old) ran to me and held on to my leg. He said, "I missed you Miss Julie." He stayed with me most of that afternoon. A few weeks later both mom and dad were released on bail and took the kids and ran. We haven't ever heard from those kids again, but in my heart I know that for a little while those kids came to a place where they felt safe and they were loved. That's the difference the United Way can make to remind us that in our community we can "Live United" and make a difference. Thank you United Way for your support as we make a difference in the lives of the Children of Pampa.

Texas Secretary of State Hope Andrade said registration

is quick and convenient.

"Registering to vote is easy," Andrade said. "The voter registration application only has nine questions, including one which asks for your name.' To complete the application, a person must provide a

Texas Driver's License number or Texas Personal ID number as issued by the Department of Public Safety. If an applicant has neither of those numbers, he or she

is asked to provide the last four digits of their Social Security Number. The number submitted by the applicant is verified before a voter registration certificate is issued.

If none of the required numbers are provided on the application, the person can still be registered, but they must show a proper form of identification at the polling location before they can receive a ballot.

Election Day is Nov. 2. Early voting in Gray County begins on Oct. 18.

eventually adopted Ray and made him an honorary member of the unit. For the last couple of years, Ray has proudly hosted


their reunion in Pampa.

Today is Tuesday, Sept. 28, the 271st day of 2010. There are 94 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 28, 1920, eight members of the Chicago White Sox were indicted for allegedly throwing the 1919 World Series against the Cincinnati Reds in what became known as the "Black Sox" scandal. (Despite initial confessions by several of the players, all were acquitted at trial; still, all eight were banned from baseball for life.)

On this date:

In 1066, William the Conqueror invaded England to claim the English throne.

In 1542, Portuguese navigator Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo arrived at present-day San Diego.

In 1787, the Congress of the Confederation voted to send the just-completed Constitution of the United States to state legislatures for their approval.

In 1850, flogging was abolished as a form of punishment in the U.S. Navy.

In 1924, two U.S. Army planes landed in Seattle, having completed the first round-the-world flight in

In 1939, during World War II, Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union signed a treaty calling for the partitioning of Poland, which the two countries had invaded.

In 1960, Ted Williams hit a home run in his last career at-bat as his team, the Boston Red Sox, defeated the Baltimore Orioles 5-4 at Fenway Park.

In 1970, Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser died at age 52. Author John Dos Passos died in Baltimore at age 74.

In 1974, first lady Betty Ford underwent a mastectomy at Bethesda Naval Medical Center in Maryland, following discovery of a cancerous lump in her breast. In 1989, deposed Philippine President Ferdinand E. Marcos died in exile in Hawaii at age 72.

Ten years ago: Capping a 12-year battle, the government approved use of the abortion pill RU-486. Former Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau died in Montreal at age 80. Ariel Sharon, leader of Israel's hard-line opposition, sparked new Israeli-Palestinian clashes by touring the Temple Mount. In Sydney, Australia, Venus Williams earned her second Olympic gold medal, teaming with sister Serena in the final of women's doubles to beat Miriam Oremans and Kristie Boogert of the Netherlands, 6-1, 6-1. Choreographer and dancer Peter Gennaro died at age 80.

Five years ago: House Majority Leader Tom DeLay was indicted by a Texas grand jury on a charge of conspiring to violate political fundraising laws. (DeLay has yet to stand trial.) A woman disguised as a man slipped into a line of Iraqi army recruits and detonated explosives strapped to her body, killing six recruits in the first known suicide attack by a woman in Iraq's insurgency. The U.S. Treasury unveiled the new \$10 bill, featuring splashes of red, yellow and orange.

One year ago: Iran tested its longest-range missiles and warned they could reach any place that threatens the country, including Israel, parts of Europe and U.S. military bases in the Mideast. Former Panamanian president Guillermo Endara, 73, who led his country to democracy after the U.S. invasion that toppled Gen. Manuel Noriega, died in Panama City.



Americans must recapture optimism and confidence

Of the only man ever elected four times to the White House, the historian James MacGregor Burns wrote: "If other leaders bent under the burdens of power, Roosevelt shouldered his with zest and gaiety. He loved being president. ... The variegated facets of the presidential job called for a multitude of different roles, and Roosevelt moved from part to part with ease and confidence." FDR's optimism was contagious.

Americans, the most optimistic of people, have historically been attracted to optimistic leaders. Three years into Ronald Reagan's presidency -- following major economic dislocations and international tensions -the Gallup Poll found that "Americans are more optimistic in outlook for the year 1984 than at any other time in the last quarter century.'

With the exception of those whose ancestors were here when Columbus arrived or those who were brought here, against their will, in chains, all Americans are either immigrants or the direct lineal descendants of immigrants. Much has been written about the courage required of the immigrant to leave friends and family, to strike out across the sea to a "foreign" place to live among people you had never met, to speak a language, in many cases, you had never heard. But it was also a statement of optimism -- a belief that in this New Land "I could make things better if not for myself, then for those who followed me."

Optimism has been a national characteristic. It is deep in the American DNA.

mism, the parent of confidence, which settled a continent and rescued and rebuilt the world, is all but

vanishing. When asked in the NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll in 1995, "The United States is generally considered to be the world's leading nation. Twenty years from now, which country do you think will be the leader?" 54 percent answered the U.S., followed by Japan and the European Union (tied at 6 percent), and China at 3 percent.

When the question was most recently asked, the answers were profoundly different: China was predicted by 39 percent of American respondents to be in 20 years "the world's leading nation," while only 37 percent named the U.S., with the European Union and Japan at 5 percent and 2

percent, respectively. When asked in the same survey if they felt "confident or not confident that life for our children's generation will be better than it has been for us," only 27 percent of Americans said they were confident about their children's futures, while 66 percent answered they were not confident." Add to this the two out of three who "think America is in a state of decline," and the picture grows bleak.

Without its trademark optimism, the United States would be little more than a continental Belgium. No disrespect is intended to anyone from Brussels, but tonight there are not human beings all over this planet working, saving, praying and scheming on how to get to Belgium -- as there always have been to get to the United States.

An America without optimism is an America lacking confidence either in herself or in her future. It is almost destined to become an America that is increasingly defensive, self-absorbed and unwilling to share her talents or treasure acting in common cause with the people of other nations.

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Mexican governor: Hundreds feared dead in landslide

OAXACA, Mexico (AP) — A hillside collapsed on a rural Mexican community on Tuesday and the region's governor said hundreds of people are feared dead.

Oaxaca state Gov. Ulises Ruiz told the Televisa television network that the early morning landslide in the town Santa Maria de Tlahuitoltepec buried 100 to 300 houses and speculated that 500 to 1,000 people could be buried.

Donato Vargas, an official in Santa Maria de Tlahuitoltepec reached by a satellite telephone, said 500 people were missing and that 300 homes were buried.

"We were all sleeping and all I heard was a loud noise and when I left the house I saw that the hill had fallen," Vargas said.

He said he called the Mexican army and state officials for help.

"It has been difficult informing authorities because the road are very bad and there isn't a good signal for our phone," Vargas said shortly before the call dropped.

Ruiz said the landslide followed days of rain in the Sierra

Rescuers were flying in from Mexico City and emergency personnel have been sent to the town about 50 miles (80 kilometers) east of Oaxaca city and 130 miles (220 kilometers) from Mexico City.

"There has been lots of rain, rivers have overflowed and we're having a hard time reaching the area because there are landslides on the roads," he said.

Luis Marin, an official with Oaxaca state's civil protection department, said rescue crews had yet to reach the area. The federal Interior Department issued a statement that

The landslide in Oaxaca follows weeks of heavy rains that have caused havoc in southern Mexico and Central America.

Huge swaths of riverside communities in southern Mexico were still under water Tuesday — flooding exacerbated by the passage of Hurricane Karl and Tropical Storm Matthew. At least 15 deaths in Mexico were blamed on the hurricane.

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
