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United Way reports fundraising progress

Kenny Rigoulot, vice chairperson for the Pampa United Way campaign this year, said at the organization's second check-in meeting this year that the campaign is almost a quarter of the way to its goal.

"We have had a really good day," Rigoulot said. Last week, he said, the campaign reported about \$41,000 in collection and pledges.

"Today," Rigoulot said, "we got \$30,603 reported." That's a total of \$72,454 for the first two weeks of the campaign.

"That represents about 23 percent of our goal of \$310,000," he said. "We're making progress."

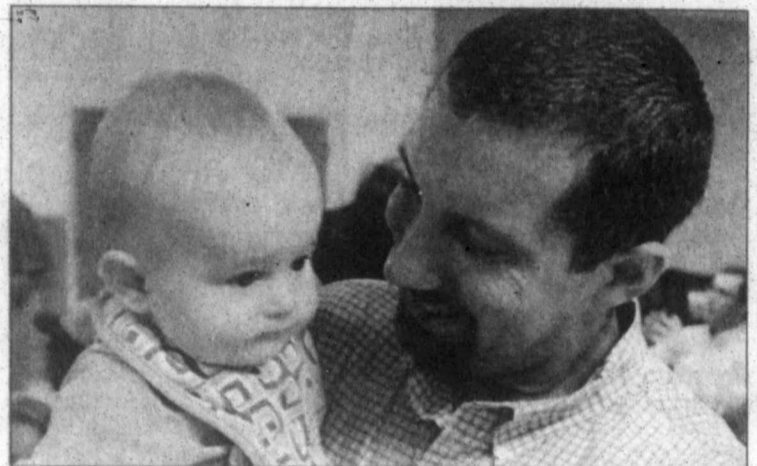
He said the campaign had a few more weeks to go in order to make that goal.

"We need to let everybody know what United Way is doing and how it is benefiting our community," Rigoulot said. "Once they know that, 'I'm sure they're going to want to be a part of it and be a part of it in a big way.'"

Rigoulot said the loaned executives, volunteers and representatives from agencies involved with the United Way are all doing their best to stand united with the folks in Pampa to make it a better place to live.

"They truly are a blessing," he said.

Electronic poll books new for '10

Gray County Election Administrator Linda Lewis is excited about her new hardware.

Electronic poll books, which will be used in Gray County for the first time during next week's early voting session, will help expedite the voting process and give the election office faster statistical output, Lewis said.

"The new poll books, which are like little Netbooks, will be able to scan barcodes on people's registration cards," she said. "I think that it's going to make it a little quicker for people. We're looking forward to a little bit less of a line."

The easier, faster procedure is going to be beneficial in Gray County, which, according to Lewis, usually has as many voters come in during early voting as during Election Day.

The new poll books will also report real time voting numbers to the election database, Lewis said. No actual votes for candidates will be tallied, but exact voter turnout numbers will be available to the election office as the voters come in.

PISD, Haenisch pledge to 'Make Education a Priority'

With Texas facing a stark reality of financial cutbacks after its 2011 legislative session, the Pampa Independent School District is banding together with other state school districts to remind legislators of the importance of a good education.

The PISD is announcing that it adopted a resolution in late September to encourage state legislators to work with local school board members in prioritizing education.

In doing so, the PISD has effectively joined "Make Education a Priority," started by the Aledo Independent School District Board of Trustees in north central Texas. The

campaign, launched by the Aledo Independent School District Board of Trustees in north central Texas, involves a broad coalition of school districts (112 as of Tuesday) in sending a message to state lawmakers.

"It's kind of a unified effort by many school boards and school districts across the state to remind legislators to keep education a priority — a sincere priority," Haenisch said.

"We're being told every day that there's going to be a \$21 billion shortfall going into

this legislative session. We're calling for our legislators to be aware of the importance of education for our kids."

No formal proposals have as yet been made public regarding slashing educational funds, although Haenisch said that some potential scenarios could be bleak.

"There have been plans from individual legislators and some of them run pretty deep," Haenisch said.

Haenisch emphasized that the "Make Education a Priority" campaign seeks to maintain a respectful line of communication with the legislature in voicing their concerns about state education.

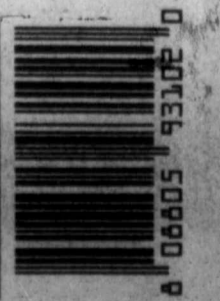

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

Gates: Ending DADT would have consequences

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Robert Gates said Wednesday that abruptly ending the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy as a federal judge has ordered would have enormous consequences.

A day after a judge in California ordered the Pentagon to cease enforcement of its policy barring gays from openly serving in the military, Gates told reporters traveling with him to Brussels that the question of whether to repeal the law should be decided by Congress, and done only after the Pentagon completes its study of the issue.

"I feel strongly this is an action that needs to be taken by the Congress and that it is an action that requires careful preparation, and a lot of training," said Gates. "It has enormous consequences for our troops."

The defense secretary said that besides the changes in training, regulations will need revisions and changes may be necessary to benefits and Defense Department buildings.

The White House said time is running out for the ban on gays serving openly. "This is a policy that is going to end," spokesman Robert Gibbs said Wednesday.

Yet, the battle in the courts over gays in the military may not be over. The Justice Department is considering whether to appeal the court ruling and its first response may well be another trip to the courtroom of U.S. District Judge Virginia Phillips in Riverside, Calif., to seek a stay, or temporary freeze, of

her ruling. If Phillips turns down the request, the Justice Department would likely turn to the federal appeals court in California.

It was unclear whether Phillips' injunction against the 17-year-old policy on gays in the military would affect any ongoing cases.

If the government does appeal, that would put the

Obama administration in the position of continuing to defend a law it opposes.

Gay rights groups warned gay troops not to disclose their identity for now. Aaron Tax, the legal director for the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, said he expects the Justice Department to appeal the case to the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

Dyer drops out of race

IOWA PARK (AP) - An Iowa Park man who has suspended his independent bid for Congress says he apparently is ineligible after voting in the March GOP primary.

Keith Dyer ceased campaigning Tuesday, but his name will remain on the Nov. 2 ballot for U.S. House District 13.

Secretary of State's Office spokesman Randall Dillard says the deadline to remove a name from the ballot was Aug. 20.

Dyer says his office received an e-mail Tuesday from the elections agency in response to a question about his eligibility. The agency's website says an independent candidate may have his or her name added to the general election ballot if he or she is not affiliated with a political party.

The *Wichita Falls Times Record News* reports GOP Rep. Mac Thornberry of Clarendon says he called Dyer about the issue last week.

Court considers ballot dispute

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Supreme Court has been asked to allow a challenge to the Travis County electronic voting system to proceed.

The 2006 lawsuit by the Texas Civil Rights Project also names the secretary of state's office.

The *Austin American-Statesman*, for its Wednesday editions, reported the suit alleges the electronic system violates state law because it does not produce paper ballots, so voters have no way of knowing whether their picks are properly recorded.

Appeals lawyer Kristofer Monson, representing Secretary of State Hope Andrade, says voters cannot show they have been harmed and the lawsuit should be dismissed.

Attorney Timothy Herman, for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, says a paper record is necessary to protect voting rights.

The high court did not immediately rule Tuesday.

Commissioner debate tonight

AUSTIN (AP) - State Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson and Democratic challenger Hector Uribe will face off in debate in Austin.

The Wednesday night debate will be at St. Edward's University and will be hosted by the university's School of Humanities.

The Republican Patterson is seeking a third term while fellow former state senator Uribe is running for statewide office for the first time.

Chopper crashes in Newton Co.

NEWTON (AP) - The sheriff of Newton County says a man on the ground has been hurt after a helicopter used for spraying herbicide crashed during takeoff.

Sheriff Joe Walker told KFDM-TV that the accident happened Wednesday morning when a refueling hose apparently was still attached to the helicopter as it tried to lift off north of Newton, about 140 miles northeast of Houston.

Walker says the helicopter blade struck the victim, who was transported to Christus Jasper Memorial Hospital in Jasper. His name and condition were not immediately released.

Walker had no details on the fate of the pilot. Walker says the helicopter is used to spray herbicide on forest properties and a refueling truck apparently was used.

Newton is about 10 miles west of the Texas-Louisiana border.

Soldier sentenced to 35 years

BELTON (AP) - A jury in Belton has ordered life in prison for a Fort Hood soldier convicted in the shooting death of a homeless man.

Jurors late Tuesday decided the penalty for 23-year-old Spc. Jared Lee Bottorff.

The case involves the August 2009 slaying of 36-year-old Dan Smith Jr. after a party at Bottorff's house in Killeen. Investigators say Smith had hitched a ride with Bottorff.

Attorneys for Bottorff claimed the shooting was self defense. Bottorff was convicted early Saturday of murder.

Bottorff's soldier roommate, Spc. Philip James Thomas, was charged with tampering with physical evidence.

Texas woman US citizen at 101

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - A South Texas woman marked the 101st anniversary of her arrival in the United States as an infant by finally becoming a citizen of her adopted homeland.

Eulalia Garcia-Maturey took the oath of allegiance Tuesday from a federal magistrate in Brownsville on during a special naturalization ceremony administered by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

The agency says Garcia-Maturey was born in Mexico on Feb. 12, 1909, and arrived in Brownsville with her parents on Oct. 12, 1909. She has lived there ever since, raising two children.

Her family says part of the reason Garcia-Maturey waited so long to take the oath was her husband, who died in 1982, didn't want her to.

Pantex among sites honored

AMARILLO (AP) - A U.S. Department of Energy agency has named Pantex, the country's only nuclear weapons assembly and disassembly plant, as one of five U.S. sites honored for pollution prevention and environmental excellence.

A National Nuclear Security Administration statement Tuesday said employees at Pantex, near Amarillo, came up with ideas that helped save the plant 18 million gallons of water last fiscal year.

Also named to receive awards were New Mexico's Los Alamos National Laboratory and Sandia National Laboratories. The Y-12 National Security Complex in Oak Ridge, Tenn., and the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California also received awards.

The agency giving the awards is semiautonomous within the DOE.

poll books represents a philosophical change of sorts for the early voting period, which had seen a more traditional process than on Election Day itself. Paper ballots, for example, are still used during early voting, as opposed to the polling machines used in November.

The election office is holding extensive preparations with the new poll books to familiarize its volunteer staff with the equipment.

"We're having training sessions all through early voting hands-on," said Lewis. "We're going to be training all our judges and clerks as they're watching the voting go through. We'll be pretty prepared for it."

the legislators," said Haenisch. "We are pledging our support to the legislature to help them hopefully fix a broken system."

Haenisch said that the current structure of funding Texas public schools has proven to be inefficient. In a statement released on Tuesday, the PISD cited House Bill 1, enacted in 2006, in creating a funding problem for Texas schools by cutting property taxes by one third without creating a new stream of revenue to make up the difference.

The result, the PISD said, is that over half the school districts in Texas are forced to use money from their fund balances for daily operating costs. With the state faced with more possible budget cuts to the educational system, the state's schools might be facing an exacerbated long-term threat.

Haenisch said that the PISD recently sent a letter to Texas Rep. Warren Chisum and Texas Sen. Robert Duncan asking for a reexamination of the current system. He added that PISD Board of Trustees will likely be taking a more proactive stance when the state legislative session convenes in the new year.

"This board will be a little more actively involved in this legislative session," he said. "We are committed to keeping education a priority for our legislators. We're going to communicate our concerns to them, and my job is going to be to keep the board informed."

Just the Facts, Ma'am

There is nothing as deceptive as an obvious fact. — Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

People always give themselves away. In my many years as a dog trainer, I've learned to look and listen for the clues.

These little nuggets of truth are dropped in letters or in conversation or even in body language.

Thinking about them after, a brow will often rise. They are that shot of pepper spray with green dye that lights up the perpetrator for identification purposes. In this case, the dye spells "denial."

"My 3-year-old Lab-Chow mix, "Scooter," attended puppy obedience class when he was younger and was kicked out for being unruly. Since then, two trainers have labeled him a hopeless case. I am very patient with him.

I take him for 30-minute walks or runs every day. He is great off-leash and knows all the basic commands — stay, OK, sit, down, here, leave it, back up, your bed, off. He also plays well with other dogs and adores humans.

"The problem started with food aggression. He began growling if we walked by him or looked at him while he was eating. I have broken him of this habit. Scooter now will wait for my command to eat and will back up if I ask him to, although he still gets tense.

"At this point, his mood swings are the biggest problem. My boyfriend and I know the signs — ears back, refusal to make eye contact, head down — and leave him alone. If he growls at us, we grab the fur on the back of his neck and hold him until he lies down with one of us directly on top of him. He shakes and growls

for about 10 minutes and then submits into a good mood again. He has responded well to our training.

"The one thing we cannot break him of is how he is around other people. He has bitten my mom, my boyfriend's mom, two friends and my boyfriend.

"All of these attacks were in times of stress: Twice he was turned over on his back and someone reached down to pet him; once was when he was barking at another dog and someone touched his rear; once was when my friends stopped by when I was not home and came inside; once was when someone picked up food out of his bowl as he was eating. Please advise."

The obvious fact: Scooter is an aggressive dog who requires professional training. His unpredictable nature makes him a danger to others.

Where the facts don't add up, though, is here: Scooter doesn't adore humans, at least not consistently. He is mistrustful of their intentions; he is fearful; he is overly territorial. Indeed, he will bite the hand that feeds him.

Further, Scooter has not responded well to their training. And it's hard to blame him. Lying on top of a dog is an act of dominance, not training.

Personally, I consider it animal abuse. But whatever you call it, it isn't helping, and Scooter isn't responding. He's biting people.

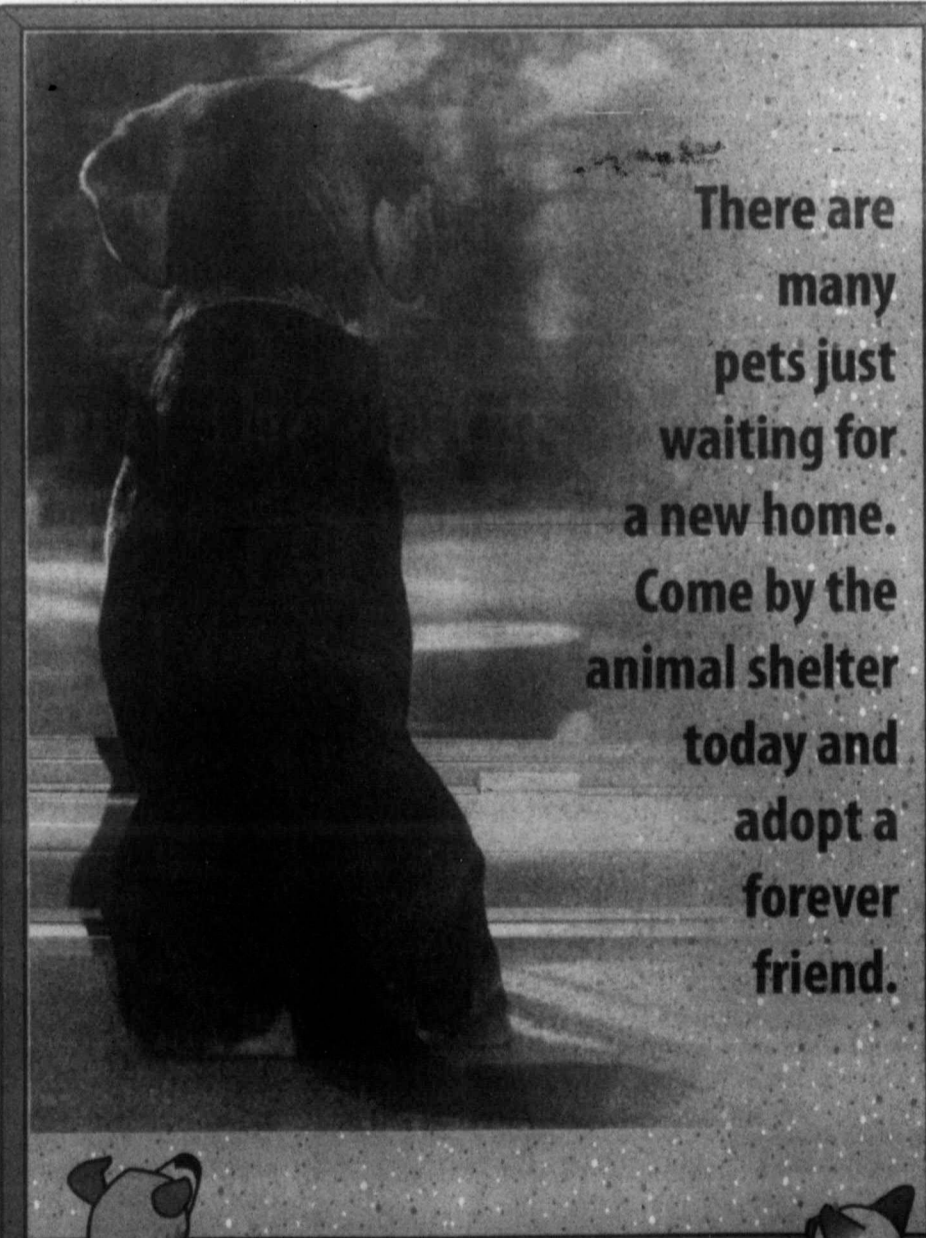
Scooter has a serious problem with aggression. I would never advise a dog owner to attempt to tackle a problem like this without hands-on professional guidance. This isn't something that can be cured in a letter. Someone (else) could get hurt.

State's school funding mess needs fixing

I have often heard the old saying, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." Over time I have come to understand that it means if things are working well, leave them alone — don't go messing around with them. Quite often I have found it to be good advice.

During the next few months, many of you may hear quite a bit about the school finance system used in Texas to pay for our children's education. The system used by the state of Texas is called Target Revenue, and the system has its critics. The concept is easy. How much did the local school district spend per student to educate children in their schools in 2005-2006? The amount spent per student is the amount the local school district will get each year in the future. The Target Revenue ranges from \$3,900 per student in some schools to over \$13,000 per student in others.

As the Texas legislature prepares to meet in January, 2011, they will be encouraged by many to re-examine their system for financing schools. The re-examination will be requested because of the financial hardship that the Target Revenue system places on school districts. The system does not provide for budget strains due to inflation and increased costs. As any family is aware, the purchasing power of the dollar seems to shrink each year, and this is no different for school districts. Increased costs require a new finance system that will better meet the needs of school children.

The Target Revenue system creates inequities in schools, also. There are

certain groups of students whose education is costlier than others. Those with disabilities (whether physical or mental), those who come to school without mastery of the English language, and those who live in poverty have needs that exceed those of the other students in our schools, yet the system makes no provision for these children. If all of our children are to be provided with a fair chance to blossom to their full potential, a new finance system to serve the children of our state is needed.

The average Target Revenue in our state is about \$5,450 per student per year. In the Pampa ISD it is \$5,152. What would it mean to your children if the Pampa schools were funded at the state average? It would mean a bit over \$1.25 million per year in revenue. What could be done with the additional revenue? The list is endless, but a few are reduced elementary class sizes, a full vocational program provided to high school students, and additional support offered to the struggling students. An addi-

tional \$1.25 million each year would improve opportunities for every student in school!

How does Pampa's Target Revenue compare to our neighbors? According to a Texas Education Agency report, this year the Target Revenue amount for the Lefors ISD is \$8,144, White Deer's Target Revenue is \$6,081, Canadian has a Target Revenue of \$6,604, and in Miami it is \$8,415. To make a point of the difference in funding, for instance, the funding gap between the Pampa ISD and Miami ISD is \$3,263 per student per year. If Pampa's students were funded at the level of Miami's students, Pampa schools would have an additional \$13,704,600 per year to spend on their education! The purpose of the comparison is not to imply that Miami's students are over funded. My point is that Pampa's children deserve all of the opportunities that Miami's students get because of their larger Target Revenue amount. Pampa's students are held to the same high TAKS standards established by The Texas Education Agency as are Miami's students. Time to stop the bleeding in Afghanistan

Are you aware that America has now been at war for nearly a decade? We've been fighting, bleeding and dying in two hellacious, multitrillion-dollar conflagrations since 2001 — and our blood continues to flow, with no end in sight.

Well, not our blood. Not yours and mine. We continue to go about our daily routines — go to work, go to the mall, go out to eat, go golfing, go to church, go on vacation, go dancing and drinking. War? Americans will pay far more attention to the World Series than they will to the ongoing carnage in Afghanistan and Iraq.

In a little-noticed speech, Pentagon chief Robert Gates recently pointed out, "For most Americans, the wars remain an abstraction — a distant and unpleasant series of news items that do not affect them personally."

"Service in the military," he bluntly said, "has become something for other people to do."

He's right. You see, "we" are not at war. We handed off that awful duty a decade ago to the 2.4 million active and reserve soldiers in the armed services, less than 1 percent of our nation's people. They and their families are the ones "at war," cycled and recycled into debilitating and deadly deployments.

"We the People" are not even making the minimal sacrifice of paying for the burden we've so carelessly stacked on their shoulders. Both the Bush regime and the Obamacans, fully backed by both Republican and Democratic Congresses of the past

is not only dangerous for our democracy, but it's immoral, allowing politicians and corporate profiteers to sink our national soul in the diabolical depths of perpetual war.

Speaking of perpetual war, what the hell are we doing in Afghanistan, anyway? Ten years at war there, and what progress have we made?

According to Washington's war hawks, we're there to win the hearts and minds of the Afghan people.

Key to this strategy, we're told, is to establish the legitimacy of the central government, led by the famously incompetent, vain, arrogant, aloof and corrupt President Hamid Karzai. And how's that going?

Well, at least they pulled off a national parliamentary election on Sept. 18. It was meant to show democratic progress, thus bolstering the stability and credibility of the government. Unfortunately, there were some unpleasant incidents during the balloting. Beaucoup unpleasantness. More than 4,000 cases of election-

eerling fraud have poured into the Election Complaints Commission — with nearly 60 percent of them considered gross enough to have affected the outcome.

"How gross?" you ask? In Kandahar Province, where the president's brother, Ahmed Wali Karzai, rules as an autocratic strongman, some 50 parliamentary seats were being contested. Amazingly, the list of winners were all from the Karzai political faction, and — get this — Ahmed Wali had the list of winners in his hands before the election!

In a third of the provinces, the fraud was blatant and widespread. A cell phone video, for example, caught officials in one district polling place haggling with a candidate over the price of buying votes. In another district, local police handcuffed and removed three groups of election workers from their polling places, then presented the "results" for them to sign at the end of the day. In a northern province, gunmen slapped, dragged and otherwise coerced people to go to polling places and vote for the gunmen's candidate.

This so-called election shows that there's nothing legitimate about Karzai's government — and nothing legitimate about America's involvement in Afghanistan. It's time to get out of there!

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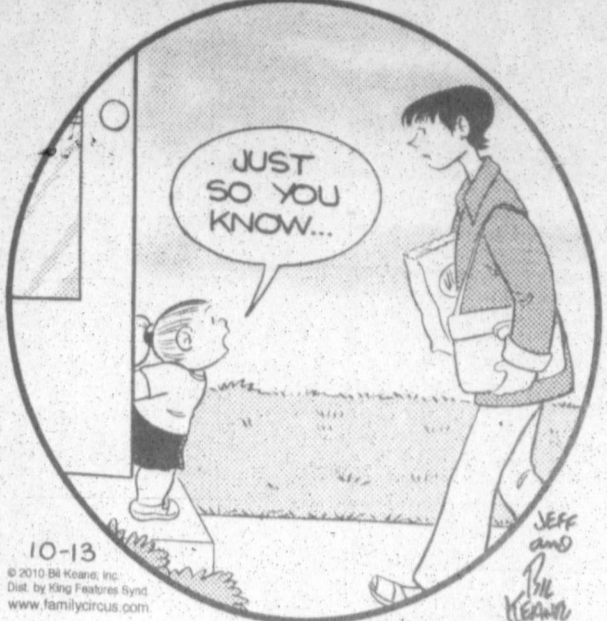

Pampa outscored Perryton 9-3 and took a 14-6 lead. The Rangerettes took a timeout trailing 16-7 but it didn't stop Pampa as they outscored Perryton 9-3 the rest of the game.

The fourth game started as a back-and-forth battle until Perryton pulled out to a 13-9 lead. Pampa went on a 6-3 run with junior Kailyn Troxell scoring four kills.

The Rangerettes went on a 4-1 run to expand their lead to 20-16 prompting a timeout by Garza.

Junior Ramie Hutto said Garza told them they needed to finish.

"She told us to pretty much pull our heads out," Hutto said.

Hutto, who sprained her ankle in practice came to life, scoring six of Pampa's next eight points. Junior Kirsten Kuhn scored the kill to clinch the match. Hutto led the team in kills with 12, Troxell and junior Delaney Clendening followed with 10. Junior Caitlin Sieck led the team in blocks with two and senior Taryn Eubank had one.
