"The museum is three blocks south of Texas Highway 152 at the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 48," said Joe VanZandt, one of the organizers.







Gov. Perry touts budget cuts

DALLAS (AP) - Gov, Rick Perry is visiting Dallas and Tyler to tout his tough stand on budget cuts and what he calls a pro-business climate in Texas.

Perry will first stop in Tyler before heading to Dallas on Tuesday afternoon, where he will attend a fundraiser for American for Tax Reform. That group opposes all attempts to raise taxes.

Texas is facing its worst budget crisis in generations. Some Republican lawmakers have proposed tapping the state's Rainy Day Fund to make up for a \$27 ¢ billion shortfall. But Perry continues to oppose any effort to raise more state revenue, or to tap the fund. Perry is expected to use his public appearances to drive home that message.

leen could be tried as adult

TYLER (AP) — East Texas prosecutors have filed a petition asking for a 15-year-old accused in the shooting death of his older sister to be tried as an adult.

The Smith County District Attorney's office made the request Friday.

The New Chapel Hill teen, charged with delinquent conduct in the fall, is accused of fatally shooting his 19-yearold sister four times in the head on Sept. 15.

Prosecutor Tonda Curry tells the Tyler Morning Telegraph that if the teen was to be sentenced to time in the Texas Youth Commission, he could be released in three years "without the input of the judge or the District Attorney's Office.

The next hearing for the teen is March 14.

United cuts growth; Southwest raises fares

Continental Holdings Inc., the world's biggest airline company, scrapped its 2011. growth plans on Monday and said it will cut unprofitable routes because of rising fuel

The airline also said it may remove less fuel-efficient planes from its fleet.

United said the amount of flying it does this year will remain about the same as last year. It had previously planned to grow as much as percent.

Fuel has become into the largest single expense for most airlines. Flying less is one way they can offset it. Raising fares is another and they've been doing that aggressively.

the weekend Over Southwest Airlines Co. joined a \$10 increase started by other airlines on many domestic round-trip fares. Southwest's increase may have ensured success for a price hike by major airlines that seemed to be faltering. Southwest carries more U.S. passengers than any airline and wields great influence over prices.

It's the sixth time airlines have raised fares already this year. FareCompare.com CEO Rick Seancy says leisure travelers, may now have to pay \$260 for a ticket that cost \$200 back on Jan. 1.

Dems release ad on schools

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas House Democratic Campaign Committee has released the first political ad of the season with an attack on Republican-proposed budget cuts.

The radio ad blames Gov. Rick Perry and the Republicancontrolled legislature for the current \$27 billion budget shortfall. Republican-drafted budgets in both the state Senate and House call for laying off roughly 100,000 teachers.

The committee said the ad will begin airing in Corpus Christi on Tuesday, and possibly expand to other markets. The group is committed to winning Democratic control of the state House of Representatives.

The state has been in financial trouble since Republicans increase through hedging - in passed legislation that reduced property taxes, but failed to effect, paying extra to lock in bring enough new revenue from a revamped business tax. The recent recession has only exacerbated the problem.

Saudi suspect waives hearing

LUBBOCK (AP) — A Texas student from Saudi Arabja accused of trying to build a bomb with chemicals and equipment ordered online has waived his right to a detention big airlines sided with a \$10 hearing.

FARMINGTON, N.M. (AP) - A defense attorney representing a second New Mexico man charged in a dog beheading case says his client might be a "moron," but he is not and two of those occurred guilty of animal abuse.



Today's Highlight in History:

On March 8, 1862, during the Civil War, the ironelad CSS Virginia rammed and sank the USS Cumberland and heavily damaged the USS Congress, both frigates, off Newport News, Va. On this date:

In 1782, the Gnadenhutten massacre took place as more than 90 Indians were slain by militiamen in Ohio in retaliation for raids carried out by other Indians

In 1854, U.S. Commodore Matthew C. Perry made his second landing in Japan; within a month; he concluded a treaty with the Japanese.

In 1874, the 13th president of the United States. Millard Fillmore, died in Buffalo, N.Y., at age 74. In 1917, Russia's "February Revolution" (so called because of the Old Style calendar used by Russians at the time) began with rioting and strikes in Petrograd.

In 1944, two days after an initial strike, U.S. heavy bombers resumed raiding Berlin during World War II

In 1960, Democrat John F. Kennedy and Republican Richard M. Nixon won the New Hampshire presidential primary

In 1965, the United States landed its first combat troops in South Vietnam as 3,500 Marines were brought in to defend the U.S. air base at Da Nang. In 1971, JogsFrazier deteated Muhammad Ali by decision in what was billed as "The Fight of the Century" at Madison Square Garden in New York.

In 1988, 17 soldiers were killed when two Army helicopters from Fort Campbell, Ky., collided in mid-flight.





Senate to vote on rival Democratic, Republican budgets

WASHINGTON (AP) - A freshman Democratic senator accused Barack Obama Tuesday of failing to provide presidențial leadership on a worsening national deficit as the Democratic Senate leader charged that Republicans are trying to block an up-or-down vote on a GOP bill containing substantial budget cuts.

Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., called on Obama to lead 'tough negotiations" on wrapping up last year's unfinished budget work and said that "right now, that is not happening.

"When it comes to an issue of significant national importance, the president must lead." Manchin said.

Immediately thereafter. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid charged that Senate Republicans are running away from a divisive House GOP plan that would cut domestic agencies by 13 percent, on average. He said Republicans instead want procedural votes that would give them political cover from the House GOP measure's harsh elements, such as cuts to Head Start for preschoolers from poor families and Pell Grants for low-income college students.

"Republicans know that once the country sees what's in the fine print, it will run away from it as fast as they can," said Reid, D-Nev, "Now it seems Republicans themselves must have finally read their own budget. Because now even they're running away from it."

The idea behind promised votes on the House GOP plan and a milder alternative from Senate Democrats is to prod the Obama administration. Republicans dominating the House and the Democratic-led Senate to settle gaping differences. The goal is a measure setting agency operating budgets through the rest of the fiscal year. which ends Sept. 30.

Looming in the background is the issue of keeping the government running after a short-term funding measure expires in less than two weeks. Another bill would be necessary to prevent a government shutdown, which neither side claims is desirable.

Democrats say the votes in the Senate would demonstrate to tea party-backed House GOP freshmen that their bill is a dead issue in the Senate and that they need to move closer to their demands for smaller budget cuts.

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Neither measure can muster the 60 votes required under Senate procedures to advance; not a single Democrat is likely to vote for the GOP measure, and some may shy away from the Democratic bill as well. That could put pressure on House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, as well as other congressional leaders of both parties to find a compromise.

"I'm sure that Speaker Boehner will be sitting down with his caucus and say: 'Well, what's our next position? Where do we go from here?" " said Sen. Dick Durbin,

Exxon Mobil wins Alaska case ruling

- ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - Exxon Mobil Corp. has won a round in a dispute with environmentalists who want more money to clean up oil left on the shoreline of Prince. William Sound from the 1989 Exxon Valdez tanker spill.

By the same standard, the vote on the Senate Democratic alternative --- it would cut about \$5 billion from domestic agencies compared with about \$60 billion under the House GOP plan - is unlikely to get unanimous support from Democrats, especially moderates - like Manchin up for re-election in 2012

Meanwhile, Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said the ongoing debate over funding federal agencies through Sept. 30 "is just a dress rehearsal" for a bigger debate on benefit programs like Medicare that are the real drivers of the spiraling federal budget. He said the Senate Democratic plan, which ponies up \$5 billion in further spending cuts - compared to about \$60 billion in cuts passed by the House --- falls woefully short.

"Democrats are going to have to do a lot better than this if we stand a chance of getting our nation's fiscal house in order." McConnell said. "Frankly, it's embarrassing

The House GOP measure makes sweeping cuts to domestic programs whose budgets are set each year by Congress, including politically sensitive programs beyond Head Start and Pell Grants. Money for food inspection, enforcing environmental regulations, grants to local schools and police and fire departments, and community development grants for local governments would also be sharply reduced.

The Democratic alternative would cut spending by \$11 billion from last year's levels and limit increases for the Pentagon's core military operations to just 1 percent, far less than increases received in previous years.

The Senate Democratic plan falls well shy of the cuts sought by Republicans but demonstrates considerable movement from where the party was last year when it sought to pass an omnibus spending bill with a price tag \$30 billion higher than the current measure. Senate Republicans blocked the effort.





trying to force the oil company to pay a \$92 million claim failed in 2006 by the state and federal governments.

Government lawyers are waiting for studies on the remaining oil and the effectiveness of cleanup techniques before pursuing the claim, the Anchorage Daily News reported Tuesday.

"The court urges the governments and their trustees to proceed with all possible speed to complete studies that are under way and any necessary evaluation which they may require," Holland wrote.

Exxon says it doesn't have any obligation to pay more. The Irving, Texas, company paid \$900 million in restitution in a 1991 settlement. But the settlement also had a "reopener" clause allowing the state and federal governments to later claim up to \$100 million more from Exxon if there were unforeseen damages.

Steiner argued at a hearing Friday that the judge should force Exxon to pay the money immediately with interest, along with criminal fines. The judge ruled that Steiner didn't have standing to try and force a resolution and declined to do so himself.

Steiner said after Monday's ruling that he thinks the reopener clause was an empty promise made in 1991 to gain public support for the settlement with Exxon.

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



Gadhafi forces nail rebels with rockets

RAS LANOUF, Libya (AP) --- Forces loyal to Moammar Gadhafi hammered rebels with rocket barrages and airstrikes Tuesday, trying to check their advance out of the opposition-held east of Libya toward the capital Tripoli. At least 20 were wounded, some of them seriously.

On another front, government forces were reportedly battering down resistance in the closest rebel-held city to Tripoli, Zawiya. A government official claimed Gadhafi loyalists had recaptured the city, but some residents reported that rebels still held the city's main square amid a heavy barrage of residential areas. The city was sealed off and phone lines have been cut, making it impossible to verify the account.

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All told, the government seems to have gained the upper hand for now in its counteroffensive against the rebels over the past few days. But the battle is far from over and could be drawn out into a long and bloody civil war.

Gadhafi's forces have brought overwhelming force from the air to try to beat back the rebels in the east seeking to march on Tripoli and on the ground to try to retake control of Zawiya, just 30 miles west of Tripoli.

The one thing that seems to hold potential to tip the scales in the rebel's favor is international intervention. The U.S. says it has not ruled out using some type of military. force against Gadhafi and with its allies, it is considering imposing a no-fly zone over the North African country to stop air attacks on the rebels.

In the east on Tuesday, government forces unleashed a heavy barrage of rockets on a rebel contingent that tried to move out from their position at the oil port of Ras Lanouf. At least 20 wounded were rushed to the hospital in the town, some of them with legs lost and other serious injuries.

"I was hit in the arm and leg, my friend was wounded in the stomach," Momen Mohammad, 31, said while lying in a hospital bed.

The fighting began when the rebel forces advanced west out of Ras Lanouf toward Bin Jawwad, a small town 375 miles (600 kilometers) east of the capital, fighters said.

Earlier in the day, warplanes launched at least five new airstrikes near rebel position in Ras Lanouf, one hitting a two-story house in a residential area, causing some damage. None of the strikes appeared to cause casualties, suggesting they were intended to intimidate the fighters, according to an Associated Press reporter who saw the strikes. The anti-regime forces were not taking any chances and were spreading out deep inside the desert around the area in small groups.

Over the past few days, rebels moved out of their stronghold in the east; capturing with relative speed the oil ports of Brega and Ras Lanouf. But they were met with superior firepower and airstrikes when they tried to push westward and beat a fast retreat to Ras Lanouf over the past two days.

The rebels seem to have reached a point of their campaign where they need to figure out how they could organize resupply lines and avoid becoming easy targets for warplanes in their march across the open desert region with little cover. The extent of their westward reach is a checkpoint about six miles (10 kilometers) west of Ras Lanouf.

Stagflation is the worst of all worlds TERRY SAVAGE

The word "inflation" has been in the headlines recently because of the rising price of oil and other commodities ranging from corn to cotton, from coffee to copper. But inflation is more than just rising prices. It's also a monetary phenomenon - and a state of mind.

So far, we have only one of those characteristics in place: rising commodity prices. But there is plenty of fuel (money creation) to generate full-fledged inflation. along with a rising psychology of inflationary fears. You can see that in the price of gold and the value of the U.S. dollar

It's undeniable that some important prices are rising. The Consumer Price Index (which is created by the Bureau of Labor Statistics) shows only moderate price inflation - especially when the cost of food and energy are taken out. That monthly aspect of the report makes us laugh - "CPI ex food and energy." The BLS is widely criticized for its inflation calculations.

Most people can't live without consuming food or energy, which are excluded in one aspect of the monthly report because those commodities are the most volatile. Yes, these prices are volatile and they are in a huge uptrend.

But there are other commodities that are not rising.

Take housing, for example. The latest Case-Shiller report on housing prices in major metropolitan areas shows that at the end of 2010, home prices had skidded downward again, marking the sixth straight month of home price declines.

And wages are not rising. In fact, wages are falling (or people are working harder for-the wages they earn) because of the pressure of unemployment. Many people are working for far less than before, just to keep a roof over their family's head. Unions are having a tough time keeping wages (and benefits) from falling. So there's little upward pressure on inflation from wages.

Inflation is a general rise in the



price level of all aspects of our life. In today's economy, we are having a different kind of inflation - one that impacts only certain prices.

Inflation is a monetary issue a reflection of the value of money Inflation exists when the value of currency is falling so quickly and obviously that people will do anything to exchange the currency for items of "real value" - whether that be gold, farmland, commodities or even other currencies.

The first step toward that kind of inflation is the over-creation of money (or credit) by the central bank. That's actually started to happen, as our government borrows to fund its debt and the Fed. buys the IOUs (bonds), injecting newly created credit into the system.

If all his money creation was generally recognized as excessive, people would be rushing to get rid of their cash -- or demanding much higher interest rates for lending dollars for the long term. After all, if you knew the dollars you would get back at the end of the loan would have much less buying power, you would certainly demand higher interest rates.

Inflation®is not happening yet because most of that newly created credit/money is sitting on the books of the banks who are afraid to lend, and the companies who are afraid to use their profits to expand. And you can hardly blame them, given the uncertainty surrounding taxes, regulations and the global economy

As long as banks are taking their time making mortgages and business loans, the economy moves along at a crawl. And so do most prices - except for commodities that are priced globally

We haven't had much inflation here in the United States - yet. But the fuel, the money, is sitting on the sidelines and could ignite

It's entirely possible that we could see a combination of rising prices for important global commodities like energy and food, which are priced in global markets -- but falling prices for other aspects of the economy. such as services and wages. This mixture is called "stagflation" and it combines the worst of all worlds

Here in America, the rising prices of oil and food take a bigger bite out of consumer paychecks. It's estimated that a 10 percent rise in the price of gasoline takes \$40 billion out of consumer wallets:

Suddenly, commuting expenses conflict with shopping and entertainment. People cut back on those unnecessary expenses, and the economy slows. That brings along talk of recession - and more or continued unemployment.

The combination of rising global prices for necessities (for which we must pay the global price) and a slowing economy here results in stagflation.

It's a condition that's hard to cure. If the Fed pushes more money into the system to get the economy moving again, it risks igniting true inflation. If the Fed sits quietly, hoping no one will notice, it risks an economic slowdown that could turn into a double-dip recession.

And that is where America finds itself today - between two tough places, and in a temporary balance. that is uncomfortable, to say the least. Unless and until our political leaders find the strength to. agree on some set of policies that offers hope for future growth, our economy will remain in a standoff that mirrors our politics. And that's the sad, Savage Truth.





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

Miller said he was shocked by the selection.


"I didn't expect it," Miller said. "I felt my play was consistent. It's an honor more than anything.
