The city of Pampa will be joining other municipalities across the nation in observing a minute of silence to commemorate the tenth anniversary of September 11, 2001.

The observance, which will begin at noon on Sunday, was made official by a proclamation signed by Mayor Brad Pingel on

Tuesday. Specifically, the proclamation calls for Pampa citizens and businesses "to join in with the President of the United States to observe a solemn moment of remembrance... by ceasing all work or other activity; and marking the moment in an appropriate manner in tribute to all the victims of 9/11 and the many who rose in service in response to the 9/11 terrorist attack."

Pingel said that despite the

distance between Pampa and Ground Zero, it's still important for the city as a whole to take time to reflect on what New York and the country went through a decade ago.

"Being a 10-year anniversary to one of our nation's biggest terrorist attacks, as far as we are from New York, it still affects the City of Pampa," Pingel said. "To have that one minute of silence to honor those people that were directly affected by the 9/11 attack, I think it just shows great tribute to them."

A minute may not be a long time, Pingel said, but he's already budgeted how he'll be spending

"I'll be praying, like I said, for those who were directly affected," he said. "Their families, New York City and our nation as a whole. Any time you have 9/11 cont. on page 5


Churches to join in 9/11**Bible reading**


The event is sponsored by the National Day of Prayer and will be held through the local Ministerial

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

his speed and struck a 1990 Chevrolet 1500 parked legally on the street.


The report also states that a blood specimen was taken to be tested for alcohol, though the investigation is still ongoing.



National Guard extends stay at border

PHOENIX (AP) — The Department of Defense is extend-ing the deployment of 1,200 National Guard troops in Arizona and other states that border Mexico for an additional 90 days.

Lt. Col. Robert Ditchey, a spokesman at the Office of the Secretary of Defense, told the Arizona Republic (http://bit. ly/q5dtl8) that Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta announced the extension the deployment of Guard troops Thursday at the request of the Department of Homeland Security.

The troops have been stationed along the border since the summer of 2010 to help stem the flow of drugs and illegal immigrants into the United States. They primarily provide support to the Border Patrol and other law enforcement agencies.

The deployment of National Guard troops along the border was scheduled to end on Sept. 30, the end of the federal government's fiscal year. The troops will now remain until the

end of December, Ditchey said.

The troops are intended to provide a bridge while the Department of Homeland Security continues to add more agents. technology and barriers along the border.

Although 1,200 troops are authorized, currently there are. about 1,120 troops stationed along the border, including 492 in Arizona, 277 in Texas, 266 in California and 68 in New. Mexico, said Rod Korba, a spokesman for the National Guarc Bureau in Arlington, Va.

Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer said she was pleased to hear that the National Guard's border mission will be extended through the end of the year, calling it "an encouraging step."

"The federal government shouldn't contemplate pulling these troops until law enforcement officials who operate near the border indicate it has been sufficiently secured," Brewei said in a statement.

Sheriff's Office. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge as well as the Fraternal Order of Police.


During his tenure at the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office, he was officer of the year three times, made investigator of the year and headed the community relations unit in its early stages.



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

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Firefighters turn corner on blaze

BASTROP (AP) - Officials say there's an increase in fire activity because of wind and falling humidity levels, but they still feel like they've turned a corner in battling the devastating Bastrop fire.

The numbers of acres and homes affected by the fire remained the same Thursday afternoon -- 1,400 homes destroyed with about 45 square miles of land blackened by the fire. About 5,000 residents have been forced from their homes.

Bastrop County Sheriff Terry Pickering says crews are making progress even as winds and dry air sustain the fires. Smoldering hotspots are keeping firefighters on the move

Officials say they'll meet with crews overnight to discuss plans for using a huge aircraft that would drop fire retardant over the blaze.

Many deported without judge

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A report shows about 150,000 immigrant detainees were deported between 2003 and 2010 without having the opportunity to consult with a lawyer and many of those detainees didn't see a judge.

The report issued Thursday by the National Immigration Law Center and two law professors examines how the immigrants left the country under a program known as stipulated removal.

The report's authors fear immigrant detainees aren't being given due process under the program, which lets them leave the country quickly but bars them from returning legally. The report based on government documents says immigration agents often misinformed detainees about the program.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement says the program is voluntary and the paperwork for stipulated removal is signed by an immigration judge.

Fire cans tribute to firefighters

AUSTIN (AP) - A weekend tribute to Texas firefighters has been canceled because the honorees are busy battling wildfires.

A spokeswoman with the Texas Wildfire Relief Fund says the group's ceremony, scheduled for Sunday on the steps of the Texas Capitol, has been canceled.

Kelsey Coleman told The Associated Press that the people being honored, volunteer firefighters, are working to put out wildfires.

The nonprofit Texas Wildfire Relief Fund has been working to raise money for volunteer firefighters whose resources have been drained during the wildfire season.

The Texas Forest Service says wildfires since November have burned at least 3.5 million acres, including destroying nearly 1,400 homes this week in Bastrop County.

Convert a flat ceiling into a sloped ceiling

Dear Pat: My living room has a pitched roof over it. I was thinking about removing some or all of the roof trusses to convert it to a sloped ceiling with a skylight. Is this a feasible project, or will the roof be too weak? - Ann C.

Dear Ann: Converting your living room ceiling to a high sloped ceiling would make a world of difference in the appearance and spaciousness of the room. With a sloped ceiling, a skylight for natural lighting is much more effective and attractive.

This type of remodeling job is not uncommon, but it requires more than just removing some of the roof trusses from the attic and finishing the ceiling on an angle. You are correct in questioning the strength of the roof with the trusses removed. It would not be very strong and would not meet building codes.

This is definitely not a job for the typical do-it-yourselfer, but here are a few options that your remodeler will have. Consider using vented, structural foam core panels to build an entirely new sloped roof and ceiling. Installing a skylight or two at the same time is simple to do with these panels.

This is the most efficient and strongest construction method, but you will have to replace the roof shingles, too. These panels have a strong plywood skin on each side of thick rigid foam insulation with built in ventilation channels. This will give you a sloped ceiling at the same pitch as the roof.

If your contractor is not familiar with these roofing panels, try contacting these manufacturers for detailed information: Johns Manville (800) 654-3103; and Rmax (800) 527-0890.

Another option is a scissors truss. These trusses are manufactured to the slope of your existing roof. The truss members below it are designed such that the bottom surface of the truss is sloped at about half the angle of the roof. This provides room for insulation and ventilation in the roof.

Scissors trusses work best in areas where high roof pitches are common. In many Southern climates with a low-pitched roof to start with, the resultant slope of the living room ceiling would not be very



great. Talk with truss designers to see what they might be able to design for you.

Installing a skylight is trickier when using scissors trusses. You must build a lightwell to connect the roof to the ceiling below. A flared lightwell, with a larger opening in the ceiling, will provide better light distribution and look better than a simple straight-sided lightwell.

A third option is stripping off the entire roof and existing truss system and building it again from scratch. This will allow you to support the roof properly and include adequate insulation for your climate. There are many different truss designs, beams, glulams (glued laminated beams), etc. that you can use to create any look you wish.

When selecting your skylight, consider a venting model you can open and close. With a sloped ceiling, hot air rises during the summer and will naturally vent out the skylight. Since the skylight is high, a remote, motorized model is most convenient.


If you use scissor trusses and a lightwell, either a flat or domed skylight will be effective. For skylights without a lightwell, a flat skylight looks better and provides a better view of the sky.


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

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

Today in History

Today is Friday, Sept. 9, the 252nd day of 2011. There are 113 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 9, 1971, prisoners seized control of the maximum-security Attica Correctional Facility near Buffalo, N.Y., beginning a siege that ended up claiming 43 lives.

On this date:

In 1776, the second Continental Congress made the term "United States" official, replacing "United Colonies."

In 1830, Charles Durant flew a balloon from New York City across the Hudson River to Perth Amboy, N.J.

In 1850, California became the 31st state of the union.

In 1919, some 1,100 members of Boston's 1,500man police force went on strike. (The strike was broken by Massachusetts Gov. Calvin Coolidge, who brought in replacement officers.)

In 1926, the National Broadcasting Co. (NBC) was incorporated by the Radio Corp. of America.

In 1948, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea) was declared.

In 1957, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the first civil rights bill to pass Congress since Reconstruction.

In 1976, Communist Chinese leader Mao Zedong died in Beijing at age 82.

In 1986, Frank Reed, director of a private school in Lebanon, was taken hostage; he waş released 44 months later.

In 1991, boxer Mike Tyson was indicted in Indianapolis on a charge of raping Desiree Washington, a beauty pageant contestant. (Tyson was convicted and ended up serving three years of a six-year prison sentence.) Tajikistan became the eighth Soviet republic to declare its independence.

Ten years ago: Afghanistan's military opposition leader Ahmed Shah Massood was killed in a suicide attack by assassins posing as journalists. Barry Bonds of the San Francisco Giants hit three home runs against the Colorado Rockies to give him 63 for the season, passing Roger Maris' oncemagical mark and moving him closer to Mark McGwire's record.

Five years ago: After two frustrating weeks of delays, space shuttle Atlantis and its six astronauts blasted off on a 12-day mission to install a big new piece of the international space station.

One year ago: A natural gas pipeline explosion killed eight people and destroyed dozens of homes in the San Francisco suburb of San Bruno, Calif.

NEW YORK (AP) - The planes will crash. You'll hear police sirens, the voices of those who lived and many who didn't. You'll feel like you're in the buildings. And then they'll fall.

There's long been talk of a room in the Sept. 11 museum that will look something like this. Planners spoke years ago of an "immersive" area where visitors will hear, see and know what Sept. 11 really felt like.

Maybe you'll hear Brian Sweeney, a passenger on United Flight 175, calling his wife minutes before his plane barreled into the World Trade center's south tower.

"Jules, it's Brian. Listen, I'm on an airplane that's been hijacked." his voice cracks. "If things don't go well, it's not looking good, I just want you to know I absolutely love vou. Or Betty Ong, a flight attendant on the second plane that was steered toward New York, talking about a stabbing in business class, a hijacking and something that had been sprayed around the cabin. "We can't breathe," she says. An immersion room? Who needs one. Ten years after it happened, Sept. 11 is everywhere. It's difficult to move around the country and not experience a sliver of it "the day" in some way. To some extent, the entire nation remains an immersion room Look no farther than your smartphone, where StoryCorps promises an oral history for every victim on a 9/11 memorial app. More than half a million text and pager messages sent that day are online, courtesy of Wikileaks. ("DO NOT GET ON THE PATH TRAIN...THE WORLD TRADE CENTER IS ON FIRE,' reads one. And there's "President has been rerouted wont be returning to washington but not sure where he will go.") The Internet Archive just put 3,000 hours of footage online of a week of Sept. 11, 2001, coverage beginning that Tuesday morning at 8:30 a.m. You can watch the twin towers vaporize into a dust plume on 20 different U.S. and international networks, and hear television anchors struggle to make sense of that incomprehensible event as it happens.

ed events ever. And so it remains. Abraham Zapruder's grainy film of President John F. Kennedy's assassination is invaluable, but it's just one, heavily analyzed angle. There are no emails from Pearl Harbor or D-Day, no text messages from the passengers of the Titanic sent as the great ship went down.

So Sept. 11 will always be different, for the generations that follow. More people will be able to see it and curate their own Sept. 11 story from a wealth of sources. We will never be too far from this past.

For those who lived through it, we can re-experience it on demand, as often as we want. And this anniver-sary, again, we're doing it.

When it comes to the day, and everyone returns to the day, Sept. 11 is relived more than it is remembered. Why else is it that when the topic comes up in conversation, the first story is one's own. Were you there? Did you know anyone who was? In the era of 9/11, Wikileaks and a minute-to-minute news cycle, we crave information, and authentic experience. So our experience, and everyone's experience, is of enormous value. It was a shared one. And maybe we just can't understand it still and need to look again. This anniversary, everyone's looking for 9/11 stories, authentic, up close and personal stories: the survivors, the families, the transformed, the winners, the losers, and the dead. And we're looking for how it affected everyone. The AP posted the question on Facebook, asking people around the world to describe their most vivid memory of 9/11. The answers came within minutes, visceral, you-arethere remembrances as if it had just happened yesterday. Jeremy Suede, now 28, lived in Santa Clara, Calif., at the time. His mother banged on his door to awake him and put him in front of the television. "I got to the tv just in time to see the second plane hit and then I watched in utter disbelief as they fell," he writes. "I remember feeling so helpless and it was the first time in my life something major had happened." "The Day-9/11." That's the title of the memorial museum's day-of section, which won't open for a year. As it's described online, it will present the events as they happened, moment by moment. "Using artifacts, images, video, first-person testimony, and realtime audio recordings from 9/11, the exhibition will provide insight into the human drama under way within the hijacked airplanes, the twin towers, and the Pentagon."

Families had long asked for an exhibit like this, so people would know and understand what happened. Charles Wolf, who lost his wife at the trade center, says it's going to be rough. But "we don't want this to be forgotten."

The Sept. 11 museum is by no means the first to recreate or simulate cataclysmic American experiences. It's something Americans love - under the right, and sometimes delicate, circumstances.

Civil War re-enactors gather on battlefields every year to feel what their predecessors felt in the midst of the fight, even though their weapons are filled with blanks.

Videogames like "Call of Duty" simulate what it's like to be an American soldier in the middle of modern warfare, be it Afghanistan or Iraq. At the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, visitors can peer into the hotel room where Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated. In Dallas, in the former Texas School Book Depository Building, you can stand steps from where Lee Harvey Oswald did when he aimed at the president. Back in the 1960s, the Cedar Point amusement park had a San Francisco Earthquake Ride modeled after the 1906 disaster, where fiery buildings would look like they were falling down as visitors hurtled in a car down a dark track. At Universal Studio theme parks, tourists survive the frighteningly real (tornadoes), the once real (dinosaurs) and the fancifully fictional (the villains of "Shrek") At Orlando, Fla., visitors can go to "Titanic: The Experience." They board the ill-fated ocean liner, tour staterooms, eat dinner, and touch a frosty stand-in for an iceberg. They are assigned passengers' names and find out at the end if they're among the 700 or so who survived or the 1,500 who drowned on that night in 1912. How many years away are we from an interactive experience, or an "attraction," in which people go into a reconstructed World Trade Center and try to get out. Fifty years? Twenty? Ten? It could be called "Escape from the World Trade Center." And everyone who goes could finally know what Sept. 11 really felt like.

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Gates: More defense cuts 'a threat

DENTON (AP) -Former U.S. Defense Secretary Robert Gates said Wednesday the \$400 billion in cuts that the Pentagon is preparing to face over the next 10 years should be manageable, but anything beyond that poses a threat to national security.

Doubling those budget cuts, which has been suggested by some lawmakers, would have "a catastrophic effect," Gates told a crowd of about 1,200 people gathered at the University of Texas in Denton, just north of Dallas. "The U.S. must not diminish its ability to reply to threats."

Gates spoke as part of a week of events planned at the university to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Gates, the former director of the CIA, became defense secretary in 2006 under President George W. Bush and continued in the role under President Barack Obama until retiring in June.

He said bombings and attacks around the world in the decade before Sept. 11, including the 1993 bombing of the World Trade Center in New York, gave clues of what was to come.

"The understanding of a threat was there, but there was no urgency," Gates said.

He said cuts and no budget increases in the years leading up to the attacks in New York and Washington were detrimental to the intelligence community and government agencies such as the Coast Guard and Border Patrol, which were "denied

adequate resources to do what was expected of them." America's role as a superpower also caused resentment, which resulted in many people and governments - whether privately or publicly - to welcome "the calamity" that came on

Sept. 11, 2001, he said. While there's no question that the U.S. has been lucky in the last 10 years not to have suffered another attack, government organizations are now better at working together and the public is more aware, he said.

"We can no more eliminate terrorism than we can eliminate crime," he said.

Gates also talked about U.S. involvement in the Middle East, including the military drawdown in Iraq. He said U.S. has accomplished its mission in the country because it is handing over a stable, democratic government. "Iraq's future is now up to the Iraqis," he said.

In Afghanistan, the U.S. must not "walk away once our combat role ends," he added. "Allowing extremists to once again take control of that country would be incorrigible."

About a dozen people stood outside the venue with protest signs including one that read, "War is terror." His speech was briefly interrupted when a group of about 10 people began singing a refrain of "I ain't gonna study war no more."

Gates joined the CIA in 1966, eventually becoming the intelligence agency's director from 1991 to 1993. He went on to serve as president of Texas A&M University from 2002 until 2006.

On a lighter note, he refused to comment on Texas A&M's move to join the Southeastern Conference, saying football caused him enough stress while he lead the school. He said he once asked his wife why, of all the things he did in his career, Texas A&M football caused him the most stress. His wife's reply, he said: "That's because you have no control.".

But he'll soon resume the role of a college administrator: On Tuesday, he was named the next chancellor at the College of William and Mary in Virginia. Gates received his undergraduate degree in history from William and Mary in 1965 before getting a master's degree at Indiana University. He also holds a doctorate from Georgetown University.

Texas has hottest June-August on record in United States

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas just finished the hottest June through August on record in the U.S., the National Weather Service said Thursday.

Weather service meteorologist Victor Murphy told The Associated Press that Texas' 86.8 average beat out Oklahoma's 85.2 degrees in 1934.

That Dust Bowl year is now third on the list for the three-month span, behind No. 2 Oklahoma's heat wave this June through August (86.5 degrees).

Both states and others in the nation's southern tier have baked in triple-digit heat this summer. Texas had its hottest June on record, the fifth warmest month overall, and July was the warmest month ever.

Oklahoma's July was the country's highest monthly average temperature ever, at 89.1 degrees. Louisiana's heat this June

through August puts it in the fourth spot all-time -84.5 degrees.

The average figures are taken from the entire 24-hour cycle of the day, not just from daily highs.

The reason for all the hot, dry weather lies thousands of miles away in the Pacific Ocean. The La Nina phenomenon is associated with cooler sea surface temperatures in the central and eastern tropical Pacific. It brings dry conditions to the southern U.S. states.

Unfortunately, the forecast shows the likelihood of La Nina re-emerging.

Texas hasn't just been hot this summer. It's in the midst of its worst drought since the 1950s and enduring its driest single year going back to 1895.

The heat and lack of rainfall have clobbered agriculture. An early estimate shows crop and livestock losses at \$5.2 billion. That figure was expected to rise. The drought and scorchtemperatures have ing burned grazing pasture and rangeland, forcing ranchers to severely cull herds. Ranchers keeping animals are paying high prices for supplemental feed or the cost of transporting their

animals to states with grazing land.

Producers who planted more than 2 million acres of cotton that rely on only rainfall to grow in the world's largest contiguous growing patch around Lubbock abandoned their fields.

Texas' economy will take a more direct hit. a Agriculture accounted for r \$99.1 billion of Texas' \$1.1 t trillion economy, or 8.6 w percent, in 2007, the most recent year data on food and fiber was available from the extension service. Losses in r that sector have a ripple effect that's about twice the amount of the actual agricultural loss.

Grasses, vegetation li

and trees around the state remain tinderbox dry and wildfires have destroyed more than 3.5 million acres since last November, about when the drought started. Just this week, hundreds of homes were destroyed when wildfires raged southeast of Austin.

Fish and other wildlife are struggling as lakes and rivers are drying up across the state and more than 850 water suppliers have implemented mandatory and voluntary restrictions on usage. Two Central Texas springs relied upon for life by eight endangered and threatened species are perilously close to levels that will require an evacuation by federal wildlife officials. The U.S. Drought Monitor map released Thursday shows that not a speck of Texas is out of drought, and more than 81 percent is in the worst category. A year ago just 15 percent of Texas was abnormally dry, the least dry status on the map.

Other states in the southern U.S. also are in drought. Almost all of Arizona and Oklahoma are in some drought stage. All of New Mexico is mired in drought, with about 38 percent of it in the worst stage - exceptional. About 70 percent of Oklahoma is in exceptional drought.

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Bastrop area residents quickly fled as wildfire closed in

BASTROP, (AP) — Dennis Silman was in line at the store when his wife's urgent call came through: They needed to get out. Smoke was drifting up through the woods and the wildfire that just 30 minutes earlier wasn't near enough to pose a problem was visible over the treetops by the time he got home.

In just 90 minutes, Silman was able to make four trips loading clothes and a few important possessions into his Mustang. He could feel the blaze's heat and hear the crackling roar as he packed his car. Less than two hours after they drove away for the last time Sunday, the Bastrop Complex fire consumed his home and six other houses of relatives who all lived within about four square miles of each other.

"My house, my sister-in-law, her brother, my mother-in-law and three brothers-in-law houses are gone," the 53-year-old bail bondsman said Wednesday outside the county convention center where he came to find out about federal assistance. "Everything's gone now."

Fed by stiff winds and extreme drought, the more than 33,000-acre blaze had blackened about 45 square miles in and around Bastrop, about 25 miles east of Austin, leaving two people dead and consuming nearly 1,400 homes by early Thursday, according to the Department of Public Safety. The White House said President Barack Obama telephoned Gov. Rick Perry to say the federal government would continue providing firefighting assistance and quickly assess requests for more aid.

Many Bastrop residents said they had received cell phone photos or videos from those who sneaked back into the fire zone or from volunteer firefighters and police who checked on friends' homes. Others were left to crowd around lists of the lost street addresses posted at the county convention center.

The fire was about 30 percent contained

The outbreak has made this the state's costliest wildfire season on record, with \$216 million in firefighting expenses since late 2010. The crisis is unfolding months after Perry signed a budget that cut funding to the Texas Forest Service by one-third. Yet the agency insisted that being \$35 million lighter hasn't left Texas less equipped to fight the latest fires.

Under the new budget, which went into effect last week, no firefighters in the Forest Service were laid off, said Robbie Dewitt, the agency's finance officer. Moreover, the forest service said it will spend whatever is necessary from state coffers to deal with the disaster and have the expenses accounted for later by state leaders.

Texas Task Force 1, an elite search team, mobilized Wednesday in Bastrop to search the smoldering ruins for more victims. But several thousand people successfully evacuated ahead of the fire, and Bastrop County Emergency Management Coordinator Mike Fisher said about 2,500 people had stopped by one of the county's shelters. Many more people likely stayed with family or friends.

Some residents needed no urging to leave because they saw the flames lapping at the trees. Others heard from friends and neighbors, while still others found a sheriff's deputy at their door or heard firemen rolling down the street with bullhorns. In most cases no one had to be told twice. A wildfire here two years ago drove people from their homes and everyone knew about the severity of the drought.

That was the case for Jose "Pepe" Gomez, 57, who had just returned from church to his girlfriend's house Sunday afternoon.

"We were going to celebrate my girlfriend's grandson's birthday, who is only two ...We were going to have a pool party at her swimming pool, have cake for the kids, then they said 'get out," Gomez said. "We got evacuated from three locations on that same day. In less than 12 hours we were evacuated three times." after having only enough time to grab a little clothing for her kids and a Bible.

"She was in hysteria when she was told her house was leveled," Gomez said. It was the second home she lost to fire.

Brenda Sanders, a 63-year-old hospice nurse whose home had so far survived the blaze, said she had been oblivious to the fire until a sheriff's deputy came to her door. She and her husband had about 20 minutes to gather items. They grabbed the flags that were on their fathers' caskets, some important insurance documents, mementos from her husband's high school and college football career and their cats.

"It's just been a nightmare," she said. "It's been surreal, the whole experience."

Her friend Denise Rodgers, 56, a hospice chaplain, was not so fortunate. Her house in Tahitian Village burned. First, a friend sent her a photo showing her house untouched. "I was thinking I was in the clear." But later she received a shaky video of the flames circling her home and climbing up one side.

"I could see it coming, you know, over the trees," Rodgers said of her last minutes in the house. "I could see the pink glow so I knew it was close."



Wednesday and firefighters hoped to take advantage of low winds to make more progress. The destruction has made the blaze the most catastrophic of more than 170 fires that have erupted in the past week — one of the most devastating wildfire outbreaks in state history, which has been blamed for a total of four deaths.

"When you looked up you could see this huge cloud ... we knew it was serious," he said.

Court to dismiss Okla. water rights lawsuits

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A federal appeals court Wednesday upheld the dismissal of two lawsuits that sought authorization to transfer water from southeastern Oklahoma to rapidly growing communities in North Texas, rulings Gov. Mary Fallin called "yet another victory for the state of Oklahoma."

Each of the lawsuits asked federal courts to invalidate Oklahoma statutes that govern the appropriation and use of water within its boundaries that North Texas communities alleged posed burdens to interstate commerce. The suits also sought injunctions to prevent the Oklahoma Water Resources Board from enforcing them.

A three-judge panel of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver unanimously affirmed a federal judge's dismissal of a lawsuit filed by the Tarrant Regional Water District in 2007 against the board that sought access to surface and stream water in southeastern Oklahoma.

The panel ruled that the Red River Compact, which governs usage of water in the basin that includes Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana, insulates Oklahoma water statutes from interstate commerce challenges involving surface water subject to the compact.

The water district, which serves Fort Worth, Texas, and nearby communities, had wanted to purchase more than 460,000 acre-feet of water — about 150 billion gallons — from Oklahoma tributaries of the Red River in far southern Oklahoma.

In a separate decision, a divided three-judge panel ordered a lower court to dismiss a second lawsuit against the board filed by the city of Hugo in far southeastern Oklahoma that sought legal authority to sell water to Irving, Texas. Hugo wanted to sell 200,000 acre-feet, or about 65 billion gallons, of water to Irving, located northwest of Dallas.

The panel's majority opinion said neither Hugo nor Irving, which intervened in the case, had legal standing to sue the board and that the lawsuit should be dismissed for lack of federal jurisdiction. In a dissenting opinion, Judge Scott M. Matheson Jr. of Utah said he believes both Hugo and Irving have legal standing and the case should go to trial.

Former Hugo city manager David Rawls, a member of the Hugo Water Committee, said the city may ask the appellate court for another hearing because the ruling was not unanimous.

James Oliver, general manager of the Tarrant Regional Water District, said in a statement the district wants to pursue a water purchase agreement with the state in spite of the unfavorable court rulings.

Fear greatest threat to spiritual life

How would you answer this question: What emotion poses the greatest threat to our spiritual lives? Or let me ask it this way: What emotion can most effectively rob you of your joy and peace in the Lord?

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I'm sure your answers would all be good, but likely, they would vary. For instance, some may logically say that anger is potentially the most destructively emotion to your spiritual life. And you would certainly have a point. Others may feel that jealousy or the swelling of pride top the chart. Still others may say that lust or greed claim the number one position. However, if we base our judgment on the number of times Jesus spoke against the issue, FEAR would win the title of the greatest threat to our spiritual lives.

The words Jesus most often uttered when He walked this earth are found in the phrase, "Fear not!" When He came upon a group of people whose faces betrayed their feelings of worry, He said simply, "Fear not." When a parent whose only child was sick, came running toward the Son of God, Jesus greeted that parent with a heart-felt, "Fear not."

Illustrations are many that find the Lord Jesus speaking this powerful refrain over and over again, applying it to the innumerable occasions where fear invaded the human heart. But why fear? Why is fear the chart-topper?

What is it about the dynamic of fear that caused Jesus so speak against it so often? Well, though the reasons may be many, let me share with you just one. At its core, fear is sin. Why? Because fear negates faith. You cannot

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

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

'HO'S HOT WHO'S NOT

To Cherish A Win

Like Martin, driver knows that the wins don't come easy these days

HAMPTON, Ga. — Jeff Burton has been down before, so it's a little easier for him to keep his chin up regarding a subpar performance this year.

Burton, the younger of two racing brothers from South Boston, Va. (Ward is no longer active in NASCAR), finished third in the 2000 (then) Winston Cup points standings. He won at least two races in five straight seasons, collecting six victories in 1999 alone. Then Burton went winless for four straight seasons before winning four races over the next three seasons (2006-08). He hasn't won since.

Burton, 44, draws insight from another veteran, onetime teammate Mark Martin.

"I learned this from Mark," he said. "Whenever you win a race, you don't know if you're ever going to win another one. He always said it publicly, and everyone always criticized him for saying it, like he was a pessimist and all that, but he was speculating from reality. The fact of the matter is, when you win a race, you don't know if you're ever going to win another one. I don't care if it's your first year or 30th year; it's just that way. It's very hard to win these races.

"So I really can't tell you that I'm sitting here questioning myself or wondering if I'm ever going to win a race any more than I ever have. I think that, throughout my whole career, I have always wondered, wow, will we ever win another one? So I'm really in the same position right now that I've always been."

Entering Tuesday's scheduled AdvoCare 500, rained out on Monday at Atlanta Motor Speedway, Burton had allowed 101 races to pass since his victory on Oct. 11. 2008, at Charlotte Motor Speedway. It was the 21st Cup victory of his career. His best finish of the current season had been a ninth on the road course in Watkins Glen, N.Y

"The New England Patriots don't win every Super Bowl," Burton said. "The Lakers don't win every NBA championship. You go through times in your career, whatever sport you're in, whatever business you're in, (where) you're not as successful as other times.

"And while you're going through it, it's difficult to really knowwhy."



HAMPTON, Ga. - Jimmie Johnson and Carl Edwards have a bit in common, or at least did entering the postponed running of Atlanta Motor Speedway's AdvoCare 500. Both were near the top of the Sprint Cup point standings and had each won just one race.

Both, in short, were overdue.

"It is pretty amazing in this sport," said Edwards. "It seems now, more than ever, things are very cyclical and the trick is to run so well, when it's good, that, when it goes down a little bit, you can still maintain what you gained through the high points. I think it's just the nature of the sport, and sometimes there are a lot of factors that come into play that look like something is good or bad.

"For instance, it looks like we've had some bad races, but we were real fast at Michigan, we were real fast at Daytona, we were real fast at Pocono, and we just had trouble at those races. If we wouldn't have had hat trouble. it would look a lot differently. A h a spark plug and a wreck are all three completely different things, but it's

interesting. The trick is to make sure you don't have those troubles in the last 10 races, which sometimes feels like it's impossible to actually control, but, somehow, Jimmie Johnson and those guys have been able to do that." Speaking of cycles

- "I think that it's more than just in NASCAR," said Brad Keselowski, whose average finish over four races had been 1.75. "It always does work in cycles. You

The runner-up car was owned by Darrell Waltrip. Cup drivers took three of the top four positions.






