

Early city voting sees big turnout

With a big, divisive issue on the ballot, early voting at the City of Pampa saw a high turnout in 2012, according to city secretary Karen Price.

Five hundred and sixtyeight Pampans took advantage of early voting, which lasted from April 30 until this past Tuesday. It's an incredibly healthy number, Price said.

"It really is," Price said.
"It's a very good turnout.
I think a lot of that turnout was due to the animal shelter being on the ballot. It's an issue that people, whether for or against, really care about."

Price declined to speculate on whether or not the high early voting turn-out would foreshadow high Election Day attendance today, although she expressed optimism that crowds at M.K. Brown would be equally healthy.

"You just never know because there's so much going on on this Saturday," Price said. "There's prom and some other things, but we are hoping that because we did get a high turnout for early voting, that it will bring a lot of people out for the actual election on Saturday. Usually, there is an indication. Usually, when you have a high early voting turnout, you have a high Election Day turnout."

Senior among art students in show

For Pampa High School senior Celby Snapp, taking up painting was something that started from a little bit of creativity and some art lessons with Kay's Creative Kids.

"I've always drawn on homework, and my grandma suggested art lessons, so it was a Christmas gift," said Snapp. "I thought, oh, I just get to color. Then we started painting, and I really got interested. It just blossomed from there."

Snapp paints on canvas with acrylics and oil, a medium she especially enjoys.

"I really love oil, because you can mix it and keep adding layers and adding layers and it won't matter," she said.

For a painter she admires, Snapp looks no further than Georgia O'Keefe.

"Other than that, I'm all over the place," she said. "I've done several of hers, so she's kind of the main one, just taking her perspective and putting it into mine, not really copying what she's done, but adding to it and making it my own."

Snapp describes her Eiffel Tower painting as more abstract than her other work.

"I really like the detail oriented stuff, the stuff that takes a lot of time and a lot of detail, stuff like that," she said.

Snapp's love for the Eiffel Tower inspired to painting, in part.

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Ex-officer says he didn't beat suspect

former Houston police officer accused of taking part in a videotaped beating of a 15-year-old burglary suspect told jurors Friday that he didn't mistreat the teen, insisting he never kicked or stomped on his head or neck as prosecutors have alleged.

Andrew Blomberg testified he only used his foot to move and secure Chad Holley's arm during the March 2010 arrest after the suspect tried to run away from police who were investigating a break-in.

"Did you intend to mistreat?" asked Blomberg's defense attorney, Dick DeGuerin.

"No sir, I did not," replied Blomberg, 29, who was fired after being accused in the alleged vio-

But prosecutors asserted

teen wasn't resisting arrest and that Blomberg unnecessarily kicked the boy, causing his body to involuntarily spasm. Prosecutors played the video as they questioned Blomberg, often advancing it frame by frame to illustrate their points.

The defense rested its case on Friday. Prosecutors are scheduled to present rebuttal witnesses on Monday.

Blomberg is charged with official oppression, a misdemeanor, and faces up to a year in jail if convicted. He is the first of four fired police officers to stand trial in the case.

A security camera recorded footage of Holley's daylight arrest, The boy, who is black, is seen falling to the ground after trying to hurdle a police rounded by at least five officers, some of whom appear to kick and hit his head, abdomen and legs.

A community activist released the video to the media, prompting fierce public criticism of the police department. Black community leaders said they believed Holley's treatment was another example of police brutality against minorities and that the misdemeanor charges were not serious enough.

The ex-officer told jurors that when Holley fell to the ground, he only used his right heel to yank the teenager's left arm back, never stepping on his hand

Blomberg said he tried again to secure Holley's arm with his foot before helping another officer arrest another suspect.

During questioning by prosecutor Clint Greenwood, Blomberg stepped down from the stand and demonstrated how he tried to put his right foot into the crook of Holley's left arm. Greenwood suggested the video showed Holley had his hands on the back of his head as a sign of surrender to police, but Blomberg said he couldn't tell that from the video.

His response elicited groans from some people. in the courtroom.

Greenwood asked Blomberg whether Holley was "resisting or threatening you or any other officers in BEAT cont. on page 7A

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Mexico nabs suspected killer

MEXICO CITY (AP) - The Mexican navy said Friday it has captured a member of the hyper-violent Zetas cartel who allegedly participated in the tortureslayings of four marines.

Suspect Marcos Jesus Hernandez Rodriguez allegedly served as a top hit-man for the Zetas in the Gulf coast state of Veracruz. He was caught with guns and drugs on Wednesday, said Navy spokesman Jose Luis Vergara.

The four marines were assigned to duty as drivers and were kidnapped and killed on April 18 as they returned from a training course in the state capital of Xalapa, Vergara said.

"These lamentable acts, far from frightening Mexican navy personnel, reinforce the need and desire to not let up in carrying out actions against organized crime," Vergara said.

Marines have largely taken over security duties in many parts of Veracruz because the Zetas intimidated or corrupted local police, and the zetas have frequently attacked or kidnapped and killed Navy personnel.

Vergara said another Zetas member detained earlier had implicated Hernandez Rodriguez in the crime and said he is suspected in at least seven other killings.

Tornado injuries in southeast Texas

WEIMAR (AP) — An apparent tornado touched down in a small Southeast Texas town, damaging a hospital, derailing 25 cars of a freight train and injuring eight people in a high school parking lot.

The storm touched down about 5:30 p.m. Thursday in Weimar, a town of about 2,200 residents 85 miles west of Houston. City Emergency Management Coordinator Charles Rogers says the eight injured were working in a trailer preparing food for a fundraiser at Weimar High School. He said their injuries didn't appear to be lifethreatening.

Rogers said the school and a hospital suffered roof damage, forcing 10 patients to be moved to other hos-

The storm winds also toppled 25 cars of a Union Pacific freight train. Union Pacific spokeswoman Raquel Espinoza says none of the crew was injured.

NM white gang membership up

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Officials say that New Mexico's prisons are seeing a rise in white supremacist gang memberships as some white inmates seek protection against largely Hispanic gangs.

State officials say membership in white supremacist gangs has nearly doubled in state prisons over the last 10 years, and state officials worry the numbers may continue to rise.

Dwayne Santistevan, administrator of the state's Security Threat Intelligence Unit, says white supremacist gangs are involved in a number of criminal activities and often battle with Latino gangs.

Santistevan says white supremacist gangs like the Aryan Brotherhood and the Nazi Low Riders are affiliated with gangs in other states.

He says at least two Hispanic inmates are members of white supremacist gangs.

Last straw for smuggling woman

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — A New Mexico woman is facing contraband charges after authorities said she tried to smuggle drugs to her inmate husband by sticking a broom straw through a prison visitor's speaker

Mariana Montoya, who was with her young daughter, was arrested Thursday at the Central New Mexico Correctional Facility in Los Lunas, and charged with introduction of contraband into a prison and child endangerment.

Authorities believe that an orange-colored string connected to the piece of straw was laced with Suboxone, a narcotic used to treat heroin addicts.

Prison officials say her husband, 39-year-old Mario Montoya, swallowed the item and refused to take a urine test. He faces contraband and drug charges.

It was unclear if Mariana Montoya had an attorney.

Bus overturns; driver hurt

HUMBLE (AP) — Investigators say a school bus has overturned in a Houston-area wreck that left the driver

Officials with the Humble Independent School District say no children were on board during Friday morning's

District spokeswoman Karen Collier says the bus had dropped off children at one elementary school and was headed to another to pick up students for a field trip.

Investigators are trying to determine what caused the driver to lose control of the bus, which ended up on its side in a ditch.

The driver suffered injuries that are not believed to be life-threatening. He was transported to a hospital. His name and further details on his condition were not immediately released.

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MORNINGRUSH American agrees to study merger **Einema**

DALLAS (AP) — American Airlines says it is agreeing with creditors to consider potential mergers while it is still under bankruptcy protection.

American parent AMR Corp. says that the company and its bankruptcy creditors agreed to develop "potential consolidation scenarios," but that didn't mean it would pursue a deal with any particular party.

Still, Friday's announcement suggested that events could be moving faster than AMR had expected since US Airways turned up the pressure for merger talks.

AMR CEO Thomas Horton has said for months that he wanted American, the nation's third-biggest airline, to emerge from bankruptcy protection as an independent company. A bankruptcy judge granted AMR the exclusive right through late September to present a reorganization plan to the court. Politicians including Texas' senior U.S. senator appealed for everyone else to leave AMR alone.

I think she deserves a lot of credit, because she sparked the interest into us, and once we found where we stood, she's helped us bloom from there. She didn't say, 'You can't do that. You have to do it this way.' She just says, 'If you

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
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think it's going to be good, then you just keep going.' I think she's really wonderful, and she's helped a lot of us find our way into what we're really interested in."

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

Today in History

Today is Saturday, May 12, the 133rd day of 2012. There are 233 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 12, 1937, Britain's King George VI was crowned at Westminster Abbey; his wife, Elizabeth, was crowned as queen consort.

On this date:

In 1012, Pope Sergius IV died, ending a nearly three-year papacy; he was succeeded by Pope Benedict VIII.

In 1780, during the Revolutionary War, the besieged city of Charleston, S.C., surrendered to British forces.

In 1812, English poet Edward Lear, known for nonsensical verse like "The Owl and the Pussycat," was born.

In 1902, anthracite coal miners in Pennsylvania went on strike. (The strike effectively ended in October 1902 with the appointment of an Anthracite Coal Strike Commission by President Theodore Roosevelt.)

In 1922, a 20-ton meteor crashed near Blackstone, Va.

In 1930, Chicago's Adler Planetarium first opened to the public.

In 1932, the body of Charles Lindbergh Jr., the kidnapped son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh, was found in a wooded area near Hopewell, N.J.

In 1949, the Soviet Union lifted the Berlin Blockade, which the Western powers had succeeded in circumventing with their Berlin Airlift.

In 1958, the United States and Canada signed an agreement to create the North American Air Defense Command (later the North American Aerospace Defense Command, or NORAD for short).

In 1970, the Senate voted unanimously to confirm Harry A. Blackmun as a Supreme Court justice.

In 1982, in Fatima, Portugal, security guards overpowered a Spanish priest armed with a bayonet who attacked Pope John Paul II. (In 2008, the pope's longtime private secretary revealed that the pontiff was slightly wounded in the assault.)

In 1992, actor Robert Reed of TV's "The Brady Bunch" died in Pasadena, Calif., at age 59.

Ten years ago: Jimmy Carter arrived in Cuba, becoming the first U.S. president — in or out of office — to visit since the 1959 revolution that put Fidel Castro in power.

Five years ago: Virginia Tech held its first commencement ceremonies since the April 16 shooting rampage that claimed 32 victims and the shooter. Voters in the Dallas suburb of Farmers Branch became the first in the nation to back an ordinance prohibiting landlords from renting to most illegal immigrants. (Court challenges have kept the law from taking effect.) A U.S. patrol was attacked south of Baghdad; four Americans and an Iraqi interpreter were killed, three soldiers were kidnapped and later found dead. A U.S.-led coalition operation supported by NATO troops killed the Taliban's most prominent military commander, Mullah Dadullah.

One year ago: CEOs of the five largest oil companies went before the Senate Finance Committee, where Democrats challenged the executives to justify tax breaks at a time when people were paying \$4 a gallon for gas. A German court convicted retired U.S. autoworker John Demjanjuk of being an accessory to the murder of tens of thousands of Jews as a Nazi death camp guard. (Demjanjuk, who maintained his innocence, died in March 2012 at age 91.)

While others bail, young Texas cattle rancher rare breed

ERA (AP) — Daniel Bowles is bucking a trend.

He's a young rancher trying to grow a cattle operation while many producers are hanging up their spurs or Craigslisting their all-terrain vehicles.

It seems that many Texas mamas listened intently to Willie Nelson and didn't let their babies grow up to be cowboys

But in Éra, an unincorporated community in Cooke County just south of Gainesville, Bowles is following a dream he's had so long he can't remember ever not having it. A self-assured, snuff-dipping 28-year-old, Bowles believes he's the right kind of cattle producer at the right time.

"He may never own 10,000 acres but Bowles finds every opportunity he can to build his empire," said Stan Bevers, an agricultural economist with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Vernon.

Bowles is not unique, but there just aren't that many young producers like him replacing older retiring ranchers, Bevers said.

Texas cattle country is in crisis.

Prolonged drought, expensive feed and other factors reduced the state's beef cow herd by 13 percent last year, leaving the nation's biggest beef cattle state with the fewest breeding animals in more than half a century.

It's been a two-decade slide, with the decline sharply accelerating last year, said Ron Gill, an extension service cattle expert. That's when 660,000 head disappeared from Texas, according to the U.S. Agriculture Department. They included carefully bred seed stock shipped as far north as Montana in search of literally greener pastures. Many more were sold to out-of-state producers or sent to slaughter, their owners no longer able to provide water or forage.

Spring rains have helped some pastures, but not all. And ranchers like Bowles, whose fields are full of fresh-baled hay, say seasonal grasses that should be appearing now may be failing.

As a result, some producers are no longer willing, or able, to restock. Some fields might take two years to recover.

About 15 percent of ranchers surveyed last summer by the Fort Worth-based Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association said they were closing their operations despite high prices paid by feedlots and packinghouses. Another estimate put the figure at 25 percent.

"Some of the smaller guys sold completely out," said Rocky Vinson, an extension agent based in the West Texas town of Albany.

The lucky ones convert their acreage to leased hunting operations or, if their land is accessible to a city, sell to a housing developer.

Ranchers retiring

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Kevin Good, senior market analyst with Denverbased CattleFax, which collects and interprets industry data, believes that continued good cattle prices will eventually provide enough incentive to restock in Texas. Asked whether there could be a recovery in two years, he said, "Probably not."

"Will it ever be as big as it once was, say, in five or 10 years? No, but not anywhere," he added.

The 2007 Census of Agriculture put the average age of Texas ranchers and farmers at 59, while 6 percent were under 35. And many of the older cattlemen no longer want to weather the risky environment.

"It was so devastating that a lot indicated that they are not going to fight it again," Gill said.

The latest census, state Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said, "shows young farmers are becoming an endangered species. As today's farmers and ranchers near retirement, we must find ways to support a younger generation that will be tasked with feeding a growing population."

Meanwhile, the high cost of land, cattle and feed, compounded by tight credit, create a formidable barrier to younger would-be ranchers building their first herds — if they don't have family land or hadn't already left for urban careers like their siblings and classmates. The Texas Agriculture Department offers matching grants to young farmers and ranchers, which Staples said can help them get started or become more firmly established, but the grants are capped at \$10,000,

"With the cow herd at such a critically low level, Texas will start to lose infrastructure if cow numbers do not increase soon," said Gill, who organized a series of daylong seminars around the state to attract new people to the industry as a way to reverse the trend. He was hoping to encourage innovative partnerships between retiring ranchers or landowners and a young generation of producers starting out.

But the event planned for Graham was canceled for lack of interest and another in Abilene attracted people already in the industry, eager to hear how to safeguard their investment and livelihood.

Bevers said the extension service had hoped to attract young Texans starting out with similar ambitions to Bowles'.

Starting small

A graduate of Texas Christian University's ranch management program, Bowles in a few years has built a herd of 1,000 yearlings — mainly heifers, or young females, kept for six months, then sold — and a smaller cow-calf operation with 50 breeding cows of unknown bloodlines — "Heinz 57 kinds" — and a spotted Charolais bull. The French breed is known to produce good crosses. His calving rate is an enviable 90 percent, meaning 9 in 10 cows produce an offspring yearly. "If not, they're out."

He also works auction barns three days a week, both as an hourly ring hand and as an independent livestock buyer for other producers. His ability to spot less-than-fit cattle earned him the nickname "the ring doctor." And he hires out to do a range of cattle chores for other producers.

The various revenue streams translated last year into a six-figure income, with about 40 percent coming from his own cattle, said Bowles, dressed one day last week in plaid shirt and black Stetson, with a pie-plate-size TCU ranch program belt buckle glowing off his Cinch jeans as he "doctored" six freshly bought calves with various medications.

"Hey little lady," Bowles coaxed as a heifer squirmed with violent head twists when he aimed his oversize syringe, then fastened a bright green ear tag declaring her brucellosis protected. "Wish all of them were black. Black is beautiful."

Bowles is not a scion of a Texas cattle baron dynasty. His mother was a nurse, and his father worked at the Peterbilt truck plant in Denton, taking needed parts to the assembly line. The family rarely had more than

30 cows.

But he learned cattle raising from his father and a local farmer, Jack House, for whom he worked as a

His operation is called Three Cattle Co. because, he explained, "I started with three."

That refers to a trio of registered Hereford heifers he bought in Wolfe City with \$1,000 he got by winning a Houston rodeo calf scramble. He remembers the day. "Feb. 16, 2001."

"I had the 'want to' and the 'will,' but I didn't have all the knowledge," he said. He took ag courses for three years at North Central Texas College in Gainesville and hoped to attend the TCU program but didn't have the money. A wealthy Dallasite, whose horses Bowles exercised and cared for, offered him a zero-interest loan of \$10,000 toward tuition and expenses, to be repaid in five years.

"I paid him back in three years."
'A big step'

The management course, he said, "reprogrammed my mind," allowing him to delete outdated theories while adding record-keeping skills on spreadsheets, and tips that abetted his native market savvy.

Afterward, he lived in what he described as a shanty, which broiled in summer and froze in winter. A gap below the door was big enough to allow a snowdrift to form inside one day. He lived there five years.

While he was working at a cattle auction, two exdairy farmers recognized Bowles' ability to judge livestock and asked him to buy 400 as a custom-order buyer. "I must have thrown enough gab at them," he said with a laugh. It was his first custom-buying assignment. (Such work pays about \$3 a head, and he can earn \$200 or more a day.)

Bowles agreed — with one condition: They had to allow him to graze his own animals on their land. He

bought 74 calves, weighing an average 522 pounds. He sold them at 750 pounds, at no cost to him for the weight gain — in return for minding the landowners' herd for six months. The deal netted him nearly \$16,000 on a \$39,400 original investment for the cattle, aside from nis buying commission.

"That was a big step for me," he said.

Generally, Bowles uses his ring job to keep an eye out for good value. Often it can come from market mistiming by city folks who might keep cattle as ranchette ornaments. "I make a lot of money out of the weekend warriors."

After shots and tagging, he keeps the calves a month, then places them with a cutting horse operation, which prefers heifers for training or competition. The operation pays Bowles nothing but takes good care of the cattle, which put on about 80 pounds apiece.

Afterward, he hands the calves over to cattle people with proven abilities and ample pasture. They receive 65 cents for every pound of weight gained. That way Bowles doesn't have to invest in more land — he owns 40 acres and leases 850. And the people who take in the calves don't have to invest savings or borrow money to acquire their own livestock, or gamble on market gyrations.

Among his mentors, Bowles cites Van Baize of Wellington State Bank, who saw early promise in the young rancher and occasionally second-guesses some of his cattle-buying strategies.

Not all work out.

"I got greedy," Bowles said of a recent decision to hold onto a load of calves even though prices were historically very high. He thought they'd go even higher. They didn't. In fact, prices dropped \$15 a hundredweight.

Things are looking up. He weathered the drought thanks to his varied jobs in the cattle industry and an ability to stock a pasture conservatively. He moved into a new home with air conditioning. And he plans to marry a nursing student in June.

What's more, Daniel Bowles is waiting to buy a good number of cattle at the right price — say, \$1.60 a pound for an animal 300 pounds or more. Healthy ones are fetching \$1.90 now.

"Right now," he said, "I think we're fixing to buy a whole lot of fat, bawling, sucking calves."

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\$13M restitution ordered in oil scam

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Six men convicted in an oil and gas drilling scheme must pay a total of \$13 mil
that investors knew oil and gas was a high-risk field and gas was a high-

oil and gas drilling scheme must pay a total of \$13 million in restitution to victims in a case where a federal judge found that all aspects of the business were intertwined with acts of fraud.

Senior U.S. District Judge Joseph M. Hood on Friday found that the men deliberately misled investors about the risks and possible rewards of investing in a company called Target Oil & Gas.

Hood determined that the company "operated in such a way as to obscure the true nature of the risk on which investors were placing their bets.

"Fraud is fraud, regardless of the risk involved," Hood wrote in a 22-page opinion.

The case centered on how the men raised money for

Target Oil. Prosecutors contend the company raised \$15 million from investors between 2003 and 2008, but only paid out about \$1.19 million in royalties. Prosecutors say the company asked investors to fund drilling projects in Kentucky, Texas, West Virginia and Tennessee but used fraudulent marketing materials and false geological surveys to persuade them.

Hood divided up the restitution proportionally. The judge ordered 56-year-old Michael D. Smith of Lancaster to pay \$5.4 million, about 30 percent of the loss to investors. He ordered Christopher Cello Smith of Prestonsburg, Shaun Michael Smith of Cookeville, Tenn., Joshua Scott Harris, Ray Garton of Barrackville, W.Va., and Mark Irwin of Cookeville, Tenn., each to pay \$1.6 million in restitution — about 12 percent each of the total.


The men were sentenced to federal prison in 2011, with Irwin and Shaun Michael Smith each ordered to serve 30 months, Michael D. Smith sentenced to 10 years, Garton to five years of probation, Christopher Cello Smith to five years in prison, and Harris to a year in prison.

Michael Smith was president of Target Oil and Gas in Albany and controlling interest holder of Kentucky Indiana Oil and Gas in Danville. His brother, Christopher Smith, was the company's vice president.

Michael and Christopher Smith contested the amount

of restitution sought by prosecutors. The men argued that investors knew oil and gas was a high-risk field and therefore forfeited the right to complain about losing money.

The judge noted that some oil and gas drilling did take place with investor funds and wells produced some natural gas, but the sales to investors were tainted by misrepresentations.

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

EPA: Well water in Pennsylvania drilling town safe to drink

ALLENTOWN, Pa. (AP) — Federal environmental regulators say testing of scores of drinking-water wells in a northeastern Pennsylvania village has failed to turn up unsafe levels of contamination, providing ammunition to a gas driller that denies it polluted the aquifer with hazardous chemicals while prompting accusations the government is distorting the data.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency released test results for an additional 12 homes on Friday and said they "did not show levels of contaminants that would give EPA reason to take further action." It was the fourth and final release of data for homes in Dimock, a rural Susquehanna County community that's found itself in the middle of a passionate debate over the safety of drilling and hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, in deep rock formations like the Marcellus Shale.

The EPA testing is only a snapshot of the highly changeable aquifer and will not be the final word on the health of the water supply. But pro-industry groups and Cabot Oil & Gas Corp., the Houston-based driller whose faulty gas wells were previously found to have leaked methane into the aquifer, assert the test results justify their position that Dimock's water is safe.

"Cabot is pleased that EPA has now reached the same conclusion of Cabot and state and local authorities resulting from the collection of more than 10,000 pages of hard data — that the water in Dimock meets all regulatory standards," spokesman George Stark said Friday.

But residents who are suing Cabot and anti-drilling activists say the EPA has issued a series of misleading statements on what the tests show. They say some of the wells had a combination of chemicals, metals, gases and salts that suggest the influence of drilling and fracking; that drinking-water standards have not been established for some of the toxic substances that turned up in the wells; and that testing also revealed high and sometimes explosive levels of methane in about a third of the wells. Opponents also raised technical concerns about the data.

'The fact remains, EPA's own tests have already vindicated the long-standing allegations of water contamination and clearly shows that the water of the affected residents is unfit for human consumption," said Claire Sandberg, executive director of Water Defense, an antidrilling organization.

The group distributed a statement from Ron Bishop, a drilling opponent and chemist at the State University of New York at Oneonta, that said many of the wells are "significantly contaminated" with pollutants that threaten human health.

EPA spokesman Roy Seneca defended the quality of the testing, saying "the agency has used the best available scientific data to provide clarity to Dimock residents and address their concerns about the safety of their drinking water."

The EPA sampled the well water of a total of 61 homes, though it released data on only 59 because regulators were unable to contact two of the homeowners. The agency said it will resample four wells where earlier testing by Cabot and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection showed unsafe levels of contaminants. The EPA is also planning to follow up with an additional three homeowners who want their wells tested.

"Once all of the sample results are complete, we will conduct a comprehensive review to determine if there are any trends or patterns in the data as it relates to home well water quality," Seneca said.

State environmental regulators previously determined that Cabot contaminated the aquifer underneath homes along Carter Road in Dimock with explosive levels of methane gas, although they later determined the company had met its obligations under a consent agreement and allowed Cabot to stop delivering bulk and bottled water last fall.

The EPA said Friday one of the 12 water wells was found to have an elevated level of methane. The agency notified the homeowner, state officials and the

Susquehanna County Emergency Management Agency. Amid the squabble over test results, the Dimock plaintiffs, who sued Cabot in 2009, appear to have quietly entered into settlement talks with the company. One of their lawyers, Tate Kunkle, mentioned "progressing settlement negotiations" in a court filing late last month.

Judge reverses ruling on Perry records

AUSTIN (AP) - A judge has reluctantly reversed his own ruling and found that the Texas Department of Public Safety doesn't have to release travel records of Gov. Rick Perry's security detail.

The Austin American Statesman reported Friday that District Judge Scott Jenkins decided a day earlier that releasing officers' travel vouchers and receipts could compromise the governor's safety. Jenkins had ruled in 2008 that the information should be released under Texas Public Information Act

requests by the Statesman, Houston Chronicle and San Antonio Express-News.

"It's a sad, sad world where we have to do this ... and it leads to less transparency," the judge concluded this week.

The paper sued after their open records requests were denied in 2007. They sought travel vouchers for a detailed accounting of how public money was spent protecting Perry when he or his wife, Anita, traveled to Europe, Mexico, Japan, Turkey and other places from 2001 to 2007.

The 3rd Court of Appeals agreed with Jenkins' initial decision, but the Texas Supreme Court reversed those lower court rulings in July. It found that "the public's right to 'complete information' must yield when disclosure of that information would substantially threaten physical harm."

Jenkins said Thursday that the Supreme Court's direction that he must consider "prospective" harm left him little choice but to issue the new ruling this week, the Statesman reported.

The judge rejected a

request by the newspapers to require the Public Safety Department to release at least one travel voucher per trip as a way of ensuring the public that taxpayer money wasn't spent inappropriately. Jenkins said he had reviewed enough of the 8,000 pages of travel records at issue to see patterns in the security detail's actions and discover if someone could exploit them to do harm.

As a result of the newspapers' case, the Texas Legislature last year approved language that going forward will make security details' travel vouchers public after 18 months. Those documents also will be subject to the state Supreme Court's prospective harm standard.



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

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'Average' defense getting it done for top-ranked San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Gregg Popovich doesn't remember calling these San Antonio Spurs the worst defensive bunch in his 16 seasons.

"But you might be right," said Popovich, laughing. In other words, it's not that far-fetched considering the defense Tim Duncan anchored in his heyday.

Yet while the NBA coach of the year really did lambast this defense as his worst following a loss to Milwaukee in January — "We have a long way to go," Popovich scowled — the Spurs have become at least good enough since then to carry the No. 1 seed with a 14-game winning streak into the Western Conference semifinals.

The start of that series remained unknown Friday, even though it's been five days since the Spurs finished sweeping Utah in the first round. San Antonio was awaiting the winner of the Clippers-Grizzlies series.

The layoff has given the Spurs unparalleled practice time in this lockout-shortened season. They returned to the gym Friday for a session that players described as feeling more like training camp than an in-season practice. Tim Duncan slowly shuffled barefoot to reporters afterward. his 36-year-old knees wrapped in bags of ice.

Duncan said the Spurs are just trying to keep conditioned. Stay in rhythm, scrimmage 5-on-5 and fine-tune

And, of course, keep improving defensively

"We're not as good a defensive team as we have been in the past, four or five years ago," Popovich said. "We all know that. Because we know that, it seems wise to try and do something to improve your team, if it's not going to be defense. We're going to try to get better at it. What we are is pretty good in spurts."

What now passes for passable defense in San Antonio is a level that half the coaches in league would likely embrace. The Spurs ranked squarely in the middle of the pack in team defense, allowing 96.4 points per game while letting opponents make 45 percent of their field goals, a category that Popovich has long valued above most.

It's hardly the vaunted, lockdown defense the Spurs were famous for while winning three titles in five years. From 2003-04 until their last championship in 2007, the Spurs gave up fewer points than any team in the league except for 2006, when they finished a close second to Memphis.

But in 2009, when the Spurs were knocked out in the first round for the first time in nine seasons, Popovich began accepting the Spurs no longer had the age or personnel to keep dominating defensively. That's when the shift began: Acquire more offensive firepower, increase the tempo and get easier baskets.

The last two seasons, San Antonio has averaged 103.7 points a game — the most since Popovich took over the Spurs in 1996.

Ginobili said the Spurs this season began picking up the slack defensively in March, when they finished by winning 23 of their last 27.

"I think we're doing a pretty good job," Ginobili said. "Of course we're not the best team in the yet, but we can still improve."

Popovich's scathing rip on the defense came after forward Stephen Jackson, then with the Bucks, lit up the Spurs for 34 points. Jackson brushed off those remarks

as likely a motivating ploy by the coach he refers to as "Obi Wan," even though Jackson, like center Boris Diaw, hadn't joined the Spurs yet.

Diaw hardly had a reputation for defense while playing for Phoenix and its oft-called "Seven Seconds or Less" offense under then-coach Mike D'Antoni. Duncan said Friday that Diaw has become a better defensive player than he remembered facing, and Popovich has acknowledged Diaw's contributions to San Antonio's defense as a pleasant and unexpected surprise.

At least on what he used to regard as his worst defensive

"They must think I really wasn't good at all," Diaw said.

Q&A with 31st District Attorney Candidate Jason Ferguson

Q: What made you decide to run for District Attorney?

A: As some people know by now, I got into this race late. For a couple of months, there was only one candidate. However, I kept hearing dissatisfaction from both the community and from law enforcement.

I decided to join the race because I believe the community wants and deserves an option who will maintain an aggressive stance against crime and who is willing to stand up and say "I will fight for the safety of our community. I will be tough on crime."

Q: Why are you qualified to be the District

A: I have handled every level of felony case, up to first degree murder and first degree drug cases. I have taken advanced legal education classes in prosecuting homicide cases and prosecuting drug cases. I have gone up against defense attorneys from here, from Amarillo, from San Antonio and Dallas/Fort Worth, and I have come out on top. I have the knowledge and dedication required to do this job well. Perhaps most importantly, I have the respect for justice and am not afraid to do what it takes to make sure justice is done for our community.

Q: Why is it important for the people of the District to vote for someone who is already in this District?

A: I have been working as an Assistant District Attorney here since 2010. My opponent hasn't prosecuted a case here since he left over 4 years ago. That is extremely important. Each of our 5 counties is a little different. They have different approaches to crime and they expect different things out of our office and law enforcement. Only someone who is in touch with those needs and expectations can be an effective District Attorney.

Q: What kind of support have you received

A: The support has been great. I have spent the past couple of months out in our communities, knocking on doors in Pampa, Wheeler, Canadian, Shamrock, and more to give people the opportunity to meet me and to ask questions. We have even found support in local businesses.

The support I have received from law enforcement has been equally impressive. Guys from Pampa Police Department, Gray County Sheriff's Office, Wheeler County Sheriff's Office, and the Shamrock Police Department have my signs in their yards and are out spreading the word for me. The Hemphill County Sheriff was kind enough to write a letter on my behalf.

Q: There has been a lot of talk about a case backlog in Gray County. What are your thoughts on that?

A: The simple truth is that isn't true. Look, my opponent is the ADA in Hutchinson County. I am the ADA in Gray County. Those two counties are almost identical in population, yet over the past 5 year reporting period, Gray county had over 2,000 more arrests.

Over that time, however, our office has disposed of a **higher percentage** of cases than his. That means that despite the fact that we have more arrests and more cases, we still are able to work more efficiently.

In fact, **none** of our 5 counties have a percentage as low as Hutchinson over that period.

I want to continue to improve our ability to handle cases in an appropriate and timely manner. I am our office's representative to DPS and the Crime Reporting group. I believe in handling cases both quickly and fairly and will seek continued improvement.

Q: What would be your main goals as the next District Attorney?

A: First, I want to provide training and equipment for our law enforcement at little or no cost to the taxpayers. As District Attorney, I believe one of my primary duties is to provide law enforcement with the tools they need to better serve the community. I want to continue to provide training to our officers, because they are the ones who work so hard to keep our community safe.

Second, I want to target manufacturing and distribution of narcotics. Look, anyone who says they can stop drugs is foolish. However, we are seeing more and more drugs creeping into our schools and our neighborhoods. Drugs lead to burglaries and violent crimes.

We have to stand strong and attack the source. By targeting the manufacturers and the distributors, we can tell those criminals that their drugs will not be tolerated here.

Q: Why are you the best candidate?

A: Just look at my campaign. Remember, this election is about who will do the best job as District Attorney. I have focused my campaign on the job, not on my personal life or my family.

I believe in taking a strong stance against crime. I believe in protecting our community.

I believe that it is my job to seek justice for victims and their families.

I got into this race because I believe the people of this District want someone who will not tolerate crime and who will make the safety of our community his top focus.

I am and will continue to be that person.

Right now, we've been having to farm out prisoners down to Childress, and that's been costing Gray County tax dollars to have them down there. What we need to do is work with the prosecutors and work with the judges, and the cases they feel would be better served justice-wise by doing plea bargains, we need to do that and get those cases taken care of and get those individuals out of jail."
