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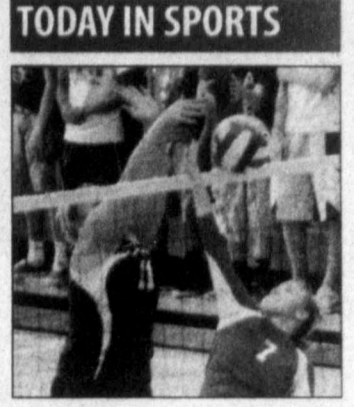

National Night Out a success

National Night Out, organized in 1984 by Matt A. Peskin, is an effort to raise awareness and develop drug and violence prevention in communities. During the event's first year, more than 400 communities and 23 states were participating, with a total of 2.5 million people involved.

National Night Out is observed in all states on Aug. 7, except in Texas which holds this event statewide on Oct. 2.

Pampa this year joined in the nationwide event, and now is one of 15,110 communities and 37 million citizens in all 50 states that support this crime and drug prevention program.

The owner of the Hampton living community, Ronnie Hodges, of Austin, has participated in the crime prevention event for many years in her hometown. Knowing that this event was not celebrated in Pampa, she decided to institute and organize the event for Pampa this year.

Hodges asked her community coordinator, Lindie Willey, to make this a signature event in Pampa. Willey immediately contacted Stormy McClure with the Pampa Police Department, and with help from the Pampa Chamber of

Commerce took charge, and organized the event.

"This is the first year, and while many organizations wanted to participate, with no previous event having occurred, many weren't prepared, but they have committed to participate next year. We are planning to make this an annual event,"

said Willey.

Salmonella started in Indiana

■ Authorities have traced origination to watermelons.

INDIANAPOLIS — A federal inspector found two strains of salmonella and unclean conditions at an Indiana cantaloupe farm's fruit-packing plant during visits following a deadly outbreak linked to its melons.

The Food and Drug Administration posted a report on its website on the inspector's findings during mid-August visits to Chamberlain Farm Produce Inc., in Owensville.

The inspector reported finding improperly cleaned equipment and algae growing in standing water beneath conveyer belts in the plant. One of the two salmonella strains was found on cantaloupes that had been processed and boxed.

The FDA says the farm is the source of at least some of the salmonella outbreak that sickened 270 people in 26 states this summer. Officials say 101 people were hospitalized, and three deaths were reported in Kentucky.

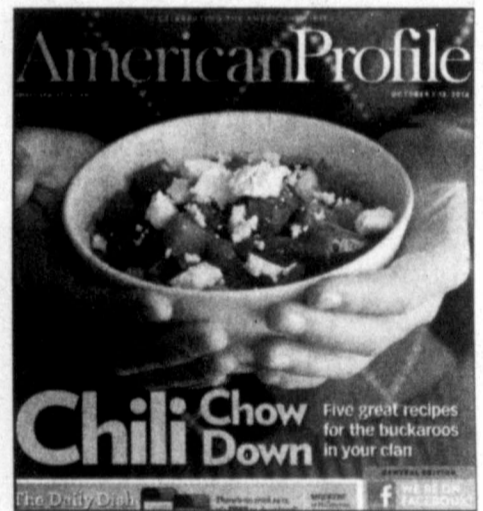

ALMENA TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — Authorities say they captured a runaway suspect trying to hide in a backyard hot tub in southwestern Michigan following a more than 100 mph chase.

The Van Buren County sheriff's department says one of its deputies stopped a pickup truck early Wednesday for a defective plate, but the driver took off. The department says the driver lost control and the pickup overturned in Alma Township, west of Kalamazoo. The driver fled on foot.

The department says a Kalamazoo police dog tracked the man and he was found hiding in a hot tub with a cover over it. The 28-year-old man was arrested on charges including fleeing police, resisting arrest, driving with a suspended license and operating a vehicle under the influence of drugs.

SF supervisor wants to crackdown on nudity

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A San Francisco supervisor, fed up with the

almost-daily displays of nudity in one city neighborhood, introduced legislation Tuesday that would make it illegal to walk around naked on San Francisco streets.

The city allows nudity except in parks, on port property and in restaurants, but under the ordinance by Supervisor Scott Wiener, nudity at city plazas, parklets, sidewalks, streets and public transit would be banned. The legislation would, however, allow nudity at parades and street festivals.

The legislation was spurred by an increase in nudity in the Castro neighborhood, where nudists gather almost every day at a plaza, Wiener said.

Wiener proposed a law last year that would have required nudists to put a cloth or other barrier under their bottoms if they take a seat in public, but he hoped that the situation in the Castro would resolve itself before he proposed a ban on nudity.

"Unfortunately the nudity situation in the Castro, rather than running its course, has gotten more extreme," Wiener said. "Many in the community have reached the end of their rope."

After introducing the legislation, Wiener said it would sit for 30 days before being heard.

The proposed ordinance would then go to a committee hearing in early November before going to the full Board of Supervisors later in the month, Wiener said.

Wounded border agent released from hospital

NACO, Ariz. — Investigators were scouring a rugged area near the U.S.-Mexico line looking for evidence in the fatal shooting of a Border Patrol agent.

Nicholas Ivie and a colleague were on patrol

in the desert near Naco, about 100 miles from Tucson, when gunfire broke out shortly before 2 a.m. Tuesday, according to the Border Patrol.

Ivie, 30, was killed. The other agent, whose name hasn't been released, was released from the hospital after being shot in the ankle and buttocks.

It was the first fatal shooting of an agent since

a deadly 2010 firefight with Mexican bandits that spawned congressional probes of a botched government gun-smuggling investigation.

No arrests have been made. No weapons have been found, according to a federal law enforcement official who spoke on the condition of anonymity. Agents and deputies were searching the area

on ATVs, horseback and on foot with up to four helicopters overhead in the southern foothills of the Mule Mountains that's considered a known smuggling area.

"It's been a long day for us but it's been longer for no one more than a wife whose husband is not coming home, it has strengthened our resolve," said Jeffrey Self.

In a separate competition, Hingley received three awards bestowed by the Virginia Press Women: first place for her personality profile called

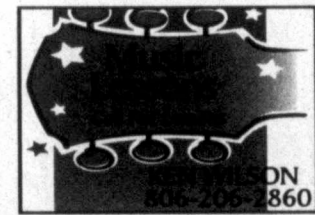

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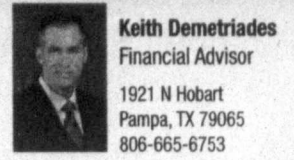

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Great to be back in the saddle

Three weeks ago to the day, after meeting a 5 p.m. deadline for a freelance story I was writing, I checked the two or three voice messages that had accumulated on my smartphone.

One message was from a woman who said she was from The Pampa News. The first named sounded like "Ray Dawn" but the last name was definitely Woods.

However, I thought she said was from the "Tampa News" because I used to live in the Tampa Bay area for five years and figured she had somehow gotten a hold of my old resumes, as I had moved from Tampa to Arizona in June 2011.

I returned calls to both her work and cell numbers and left messages. I knew there is a three-hour time difference between Arizona, which is on Mountain Standard Time, and Tampa, which is on Eastern Standard Time, so I probably wouldn't hear back until the next day.

The next morning, when I got back from running, there was another message from "Ray Dawn." It was time stamped 6:43 a.m. Arizona time, so I figured she must really want to talk to me, so I called her right back.

As it turned out, I had applied for the editor position at The Pampa News the morning the woman called, but hadn't made the connection in my mind yet because I had never been called for a job interview on the same day I emailed my application.

The job ad in the Internet post didn't state the name of the paper, only that it was in North Texas.

She clarified she was not from "Tampa" but from "Pampa," a city in the Texas Panhandle 60 miles from Amarillo.

Then she asked if it would be okay to put another person on the phone, Tay Smith. I agreed.

ReDonn Woods, of course, is the publisher of The Pampa News and the Smith is the publisher of a paper in Perryville, Mo., which is owned by the same company that owns The Pampa News.

When they explained the job to me, it sounded like a great opportunity for me to converge skills as a journalist — from writing lively features, to hard news and investigative reporting, to designing papers, to supervising a small staff.

Plus, I had driven through the Panhandle a few times and enjoyed the vast and stark beauty of rangelands and the friendliness of the people when I stopped to eat or buy gas.

Two days later, ReDonn called to offer me the job and I happily accepted.

I had to make plans quickly. I finished up the freelance projects I was working on and told three churches I play keyboard for that I had accepted a full-time job out-of-state. Though my church friends were sad to see me leave, they all wished a safe trip and success in my new job.

When I told some of my friends I was moving to the Panhandle, a few asked if I was moving to "Tornado Alley" and, when I said Pampa was near Amarillo, they said I needed to check out the Big Texan steak house.

On the Friday, two weeks after accepting the job, I picked up my U-Haul and hit the road that afternoon. I drove through the mountains of northern Arizona and crossed through several Indian reservations, including the Navajo and Zuni tribes.

I arrived in Pampa late Saturday afternoon and got some help unpacking from one of my coworkers.

I started first thing Monday morning and have been going nonstop since. It's great to be back in the saddle as a newspaper editor. And it's even better to be one in a community that takes pride in its newspaper.

I want the paper to be a reflection of the local community, while not pulling any punches if there are any controversies that need to be brought to light.

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'Critical mass' key to affirmative action cases

AUSTIN, Texas — Walking across the South Mall, or scanning the football stadium's 100,000 seats on game day, University of Texas admissions director Kedra Ishop sees how much has changed since the 1990s, when she was a black student at what was an inordinately white school.

This giant flagship campus — once so slow to integrate — is now awash in color, among the most diverse the country if not the world. The student body, like Texas, is majority-minority.

At the dining hall, minority students no longer cluster together. Actually, it's more a high-end food court now, and many tables are racial mosaics — white, black, Hispanic, Asian.

So is this the "critical mass" of minority students that U.S. Supreme Court narrowly endorsed in 2003 as an educational goal important enough to allow colleges to factor the race of applicants into admissions decisions?

That question will be front and center Wednesday when a more conservative Supreme Court revisits affirmative action for the first time since that landmark case nine years ago involving the University of Michigan.

This time, it's Texas defending the use of race in admissions, fighting a discrimination lawsuit from Abigail Fisher, a rejected white applicant. As it happens, the court's decision will affect relatively few students at Texas, which admits most

students through a system that doesn't factor in race. But a broad ruling rolling back affirmative action could be an earthquake at other campuses across the country that make more use of race, potentially changing the educational trajectories of millions of students.

For all the wrenching debates about opportunity and fairness the affirmative action debate evokes, the outcome will likely come down to how the current justices fill out the answer to questions they began to answer in 2003: What is critical mass, and how far can a university go to achieve it? Generally, it's the point where there's enough diversity on campus to provide a rich educational environment. But beyond that, it's a concept critics call maddeningly vague and supporters necessarily so. Is it enough for the student body to be diverse overall, or must all groups be well represented? What if there's diversity in the student body, but not in most individual classrooms?

Texas will swallow its pride and argue that for all its progress, it's still short of critical mass. Under state law, most UT students are admitted automatically based on their high school GPA, with race playing no role. But for the smaller remainder of its class where it enjoys more leeway, Texas argues it should be able to use race as a factor. The reason: Some groups, especially blacks, remain underrepresented compared to Texas' population. And minority students clump together

academically, leaving most classes with no more than a single black or Hispanic voice.

But the university won't give a target number, something the court would likely call an unconstitutional quota.

"There's never been a discussion of 'this is the target, this is what it looks like, this is where we're trying to go,'" Ishop said. "We know what it doesn't look like. And we know without the ability to examine students in their completeness that we can get back there very quickly."

Such arguments sound mushy to UT's opponents, who call the school's goals for critical mass a quota in disguise. They say the university has gone too far using race in admissions, abusing the discretion the court granted colleges to define critical mass for themselves.

"It is a squishy concept that's being manipulated," said Terence Pell, president of the Center for Individual Rights, which argued against affirmative action in the Michigan case and has filed a brief against Texas in the current one. "It's just sort of diversity for its own sake," he added, "with no end and no limit."

History isn't central to the legal issues in the affirmative action debate, but it's an issue at UT-Austin. The football team didn't integrate until 1970, and even as minority enrollment expanded, UT little resembled increasingly diverse Texas, leaving minority students feeling isolated.

"It was very seldom

three or more were gathered," said Machree Gibson, who arrived on campus in 1978, earned two degrees and later became the first black female president of the Texas Exes, the university's powerful alumni group. "We used to joke, 'Three in a room, we're a gang.'"

Today, even a short drive through campus leaves Gibson amazed how things have changed.

But UT still doesn't look like Texas. Of its 52,000 students, 5 percent are black (compared to 12 percent of the state population). Hispanics are 18 percent at UT (38 percent statewide) and Asians 15 percent (4 percent statewide).

Greek life and off-campus housing for upperclassmen remain mostly segregated — the West Campus neighborhood is mostly white, Riverside more black and Hispanic, and the Far West neighborhood Asian, limiting interactions. Academically, many departments have few non-white faces. Senior Kristin Thompson says she's one of just two black female civil engineers in her class, despite aggressive recruiting. She's found her community outside class, but her academic experience has been lonely.

"At UT we talk about what starts here changes the world, but I think we're doing a disservice to students by not preparing them for a world that doesn't have these demographics," she said.

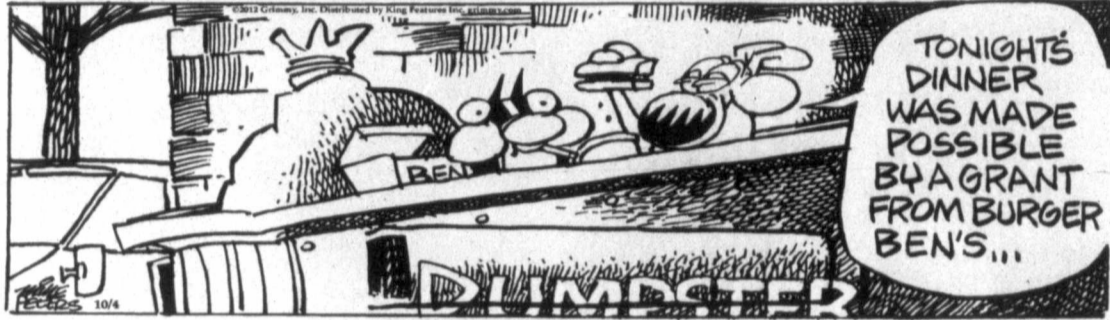

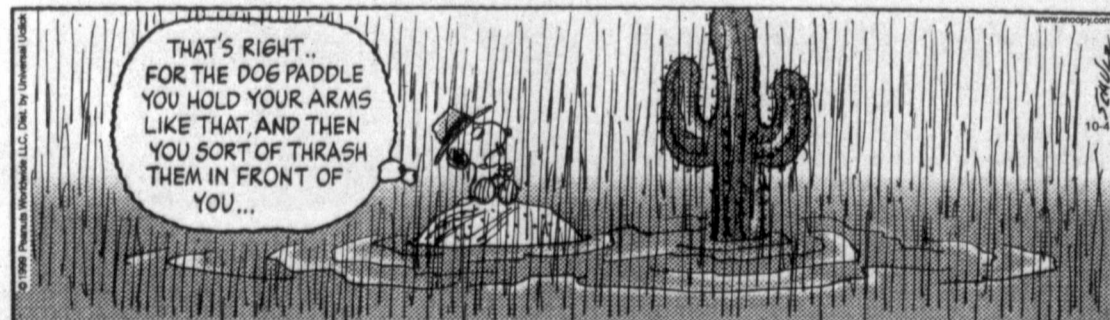
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Texas judge could have suspension lifted

ROCKPORT, Texas (AP) — A Texas family law judge suspended since his daughter released a video of him beating her with a belt several years ago when she was a teenager has waived his right to appeal a sanction from the state.

The State Commission on Judicial Conduct issued a public warning to Aransas County Court-at-Law Judge William Adams last month, but the Corpus Christi Caller-Times reports that the commission's director says she was in the process Tuesday of filing a motion with the Texas Supreme Court to lift Adams' suspension.

Director Seana Willing says Adams could have faced a more severe sanction if he appealed. She says the court could act within a week or two. Adams could not be reached for comment, but has been on paid suspension since November.

Prosecution rests in missing Ariz. baby case

PHOENIX (AP) — Prosecutors have finished presenting their case in the trial of an Arizona woman whose baby went missing after she fled to Texas in 2009.

Jurors hearing Elizabeth Johnson's case now have two weeks off before the defense begins on Oct. 16. KTVK-TV reports defense attorney Marc Victor has said he may call Johnson to the stand.

Prosecutors wrapped up their case Tuesday by playing a recording of Johnson telling baby Gabriel Johnson's father that she had killed the boy and put him in a trash bin in San Antonio.

Johnson asked the judge to leave the courtroom before that tape was played.

Johnson has pleaded not guilty to charges of kidnapping, custodial interference and conspiracy to commit custodial interference in the disappearance of her then-8-month-old son.

Court to hear Hasan's shaving appeal

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — A military appeals court wants to hear oral arguments before deciding if the Army psychiatrist charged in the Fort Hood shooting rampage can be forcibly shaved before his murder trial.

BRIEFLY

Fort Hood released the decision late Tuesday from the Army Court of Criminal Appeals.

Maj. Nidal Hasan says he grew a beard because his Muslim faith requires it, despite the Army's ban on beards.

He is appealing the trial judge's order that he be forcibly shaved, which his attorneys say violates his right to practice his religion without substantial government intrusion.

The appeals court, which is on Fort Belvoir in northern Virginia, will hear from prosecutors and defense attorneys Oct. 11. Hasan faces the death penalty if convicted in the 2009 shootings that killed 13 people at the Texas post.

Man records ordeal after plane crash

PORT KENT, N.Y. (AP) — An upstate New York native who survived his airplane's crash landing in the Gulf of Mexico last month used his iPad to video their time in the water while awaiting rescue.

Ted Wright and Raymond Fosdick, both of Baytown, Texas, appeared on NBC's "Today" show Wednesday. They were headed from Texas to Florida on Sept. 20 when Wright's twin-engine plane caught fire.

He managed to send a distress signal before crash-landing about 30 miles off the Louisiana coast.

While floating in the water, Wright used his iPad to video their ordeal. They were eventually rescued by a Coast Guard helicopter.

Kathleen Wright tells the Press-Republican of Plattsburgh that her 37-year-old son was 15 when he started flying lessons in Plattsburgh, just north of the family's home in Port Kent.

Book: Obama hoped to try bin Laden, if captured

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new book says President Barack Obama hoped to put Osama bin Laden on trial if he had surrendered during a U.S. raid.

In a book on the raid that killed bin Laden, author Mark Bowden quotes Obama as saying he thought he could make a

strong political argument for giving bin Laden the full rights of a criminal defendant, to show U.S. justice applies even to him. In the book, purchased by The Associated Press, Bowden says Obama said he expected the terror leader to go down fighting. "The Finish" is due Oct. 16.

Obama's remarks are the first time the president has discussed putting the terrorist on trial.

U.S. officials have said the raiders were ordered to capture bin Laden if he surrendered, or kill if he threatened them.

Grandfather of Aurora victim begs for photos

DENVER (AP) — The grandfather of a 6-year-old girl killed during the Aurora theater shootings wants a thief to return pictures of the child that were stolen from his home in a burglary this week.

"They're the last photos I have of her," said Robert Sullivan, grandfather of Veronica Moser-Sullivan, the youngest person slain in the July 20 attack that left 12 dead and dozens wounded.

Sullivan said Wednesday that four cameras were stolen, including one that had a memory card with more than 40 photos of Veronica at a school celebration. Other images show her at a playground.

Sullivan said he still has a well-known photo of the girl licking an ice cream cone, but the rest of the shots are gone. Sullivan said he hopes whoever has the pictures will recognize the girl and return the memory cards to him or police, even if they keep the cameras.

Denver police said Wednesday they are investigating the reported thefts, which also included a coin collection and cash.

Sullivan said the cameras were stolen early Tuesday when he and his wife were out of the house.

He was on his way home from work, and his wife was out walking the dog. Sullivan said someone jimmied a window and broke in.

Former University of Colorado-Denver graduate student James Holmes is accused in the shooting spree that killed 12 people and wounded 58 others during a late-night showing of the summer's Batman movie.

Boys may tend to play too rough

Dogs bite boys twice as often as they do girls.

Why? Boys play rough.

It's true. Boys pour salt on slugs, throw rocks at cars, light things on fire and shoot each other with BB guns. Girls? Yeah, they can be mean, bossy and loud, but they aren't typically roughhousers, and statistically that pays off. Check out the stats at cdc.gov.

Last week I got a call from a distraught mom. Her 3-year-old boy kicked the dog, and the dog bit him on the head.

From a humanistic point of view, that dog shouldn't live with children. He bites. End of discussion ... from that standpoint.

An important question remains, though: Why did the kid kick the dog in the first place?

All children, and especially boys, have to be taught how to handle and care for a dog if they're going to live in the same house with one -- for the dog's sake and their own.

A mother of 9-year-old and 12-year-old boys e-mailed me a few months ago regarding the family dog, who had been aggressive toward strangers and other dogs but not her kids. In fact, her kids "can pull his ears and tail, take his food, sit on him, etc. with no problems." She later signed off with, "We love this dog, but know we can't risk the safety of others."

Boy, oh, boy... That's some kind of love.

This week I got an e-mail from another mom, proud of the fact that her dog doesn't bite. "Charlie is never aggressive, even when my 30-month-old son hits him in the head with the remote control or a plastic golf club." Not ag-

gressive? Not yet.

Little boys playing rough is part of boys being boys. But when little boys play rough with dogs, there's a good chance someone's going to get hurt. The behaviors these women describe go beyond playing rough. It's animal abuse. And it's only a matter of time before the family dog -- "that's

only been aggressive toward strangers" or "has never been aggressive at all" -- turns on his own family.

It's the parent's job to keep their kids safe. It's the parent's responsibility to know better, to teach the child, to train the dog.

Boys will be boys. They're curious. They play rough. They wrestle; they tackle; they throw punches. And sometimes, if they never learn better, they grow up to be men who play rough.

All of the players in the Michael Vick dogfighting debacle were boys in men's bodies who like to play rough. What does a little boy who's allowed to hit his dog, sit on him and pull his tail and ears become when he grows up? A dog lover? A humanitarian? Or a man with so little respect for life that he would slam a dog's body to the ground because it didn't show enough fight?

Five years ago, as Vick read his statement declaring his innocence of all charges against him, his mother, Brenda Boddie, stood by his side. "I would like to say to my mom I'm sorry for what she has had to go through in this most trying of times." A month later, he changed his tune -- and his plea.

For all of Vick's accomplishments, I doubt his mom is proud. None of those moms are proud. Their sons were convicted of heinous crimes against animals.

Boys will be boys? Only if no one teaches them better.

Woof!

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Coke, Samsung pull ads from Vietnam website

HANOI, Vietnam — Coca-Cola and Samsung have pulled their advertising from a popular Vietnamese website notorious for providing unlicensed downloads of Western and local songs, in a rare victory against online piracy in a country where it has grown unchecked.

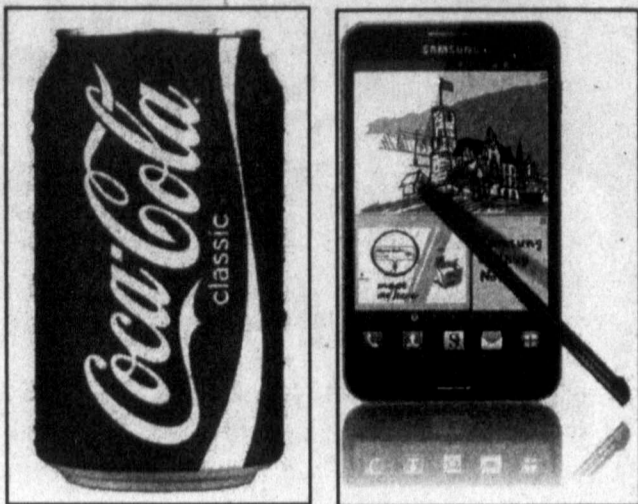
The companies abandoned Zing.vn after The Associated Press alerted them to local and international concerns about the website, which is the sixth-most visited in the nation of 87 million people.

Zing's audience of young, tech-savvy web users has made it attractive to companies wanting to promote their products in a fast-growing Asian market where some 30 million people are online. It was unclear if the companies were ignorant of the content of the site or chose to ignore it.

Besides Coca-Cola Co. and South Korea's Samsung, other multinationals that have advertised on Zing include Canon, Yamaha, Intel and Colgate Palmolive. Zing said in a statement it couldn't comment.

The presence of international advertising added to the legitimacy of Zing, causing particular anger among Vietnamese artists who felt the site was profiting from their work without compensating them. After being contacted by The AP, Samsung and Coca-Cola said in separate statements they had withdrawn their ads.

"We highly respect and value intellectual property rights, and stand against acts of infringement,

such as the unauthorized copying and distribution of copyrighted material," Samsung, which was advertising its Galaxy tablet on Zing, said in a statement. "Accordingly, our advertisements on Zing.vn have been withdrawn."

Coca-Cola said it had stopped advertising on the site and would "investigate their practices before making further decisions."

The drinks company had an especially close association with site, which also features games, instant messaging and a social media network. In 2011, it collaborated with Zing on a music awards ceremony, according to Zing's website. A special site created for the campaign attracted close to 6 million people who visited 10 million times, according to the website.

The music industry in the United States has complained about well-known companies whose ads appear on illegal downloading sites and is trying to get them to stop such advertising. Those commercials are mostly placed by ad networks contracted by agencies working for

the companies. In May, the Association of National Advertisers issued guidelines to its members urging them to try and prevent such placements.

The decision by Coca-Cola and Samsung could add impetus to efforts by Vietnamese web companies to clean up their act.

Vietnamese company MV Corp, which represents around half of the local music industry, says some of the biggest sites, including Zing, plan to begin charging for music on Nov. 1. But it is unclear whether the deal means they will take down their infringing material, or whether Western recording companies will take part.

Stopping rampant illegal downloading of songs is a priority for the music industry worldwide, but progress has been patchy as consumers get used to free music. As broadband internet connections have grown in Asia, the problem has gotten worse. Vietnam has passed laws against piracy, but has failed to enforce them, enabling sites like Zing to grow into respectable businesses.

Report: Some supplements illegally labeled

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Dozens of weight loss and immune system supplements on the market are illegally labeled and lack the recommended scientific evidence to back up their purported health claims, government investigators warn in a new review of the \$20 billion supplement industry.

The report, being released Wednesday by the Department of Health and Human Services' inspector general, found that 20 percent of the 127 weight loss and immune-boosting supplements investigators purchased online and in retail stores across the country carried labels that made illegal claims to cure or treat disease.

Some products went so far as to state that the supplements could cure or prevent diabetes or cancer, or that they could help people with HIV or AIDS, which is strictly prohibited under federal law.

Consumers may not just be wasting their money on pills or tablets, but they could be endangering their health if they take a supplement in place of a drug thinking it will have the same effect, the report concluded.

"Consumers rely on a supplement's claims to determine whether the product will provide a desired effect, such as weight loss or immune support," the report said. "Supplements that make disease claims could mislead consumers into using them as replacements for prescription drugs or other treatments for medical conditions, with potential-

ly dangerous results."

The market for dietary supplements — which can include anything from Vitamin C tablets to capsules of Echinacea — is a huge one with hundreds of products. The inspector general's investigation focused on one segment that officials said is booming.

Federal regulations do not require the Food & Drug Administration to review supplement companies' scientific evidence for most of their products' purported health benefits before they hit the market.

The Office of Inspector General found that in numerous cases, when companies did submit evidence to back up their health claims, it fell far short of government recommendations.

One company submitted a 30-year-old handwritten college term paper to substantiate its claim, while others included news releases, advertisements and links to Wikipedia or an online dictionary, according to the report.

Overall, the review raises questions about whether the system is allowing companies to mislead consumers, investigators said, and recommended that FDA ramp up its oversight. The report did not name individual brands or products, and also did not estimate the total number of dietary supplements on the market.

In response, the food safety agency said it would consider asking Congress for more oversight powers to review supplement companies' evidence proving their products' purported health benefits. FDA agreed that the agency should expand surveillance of the market to detect spurious claims that supplements can cure or treat specific diseases.

Investigators also found that 7 percent of the weight loss and immune support supplements they surveyed lacked the required disclaimer stating that FDA had not reviewed whether they were safe or effective on the label.

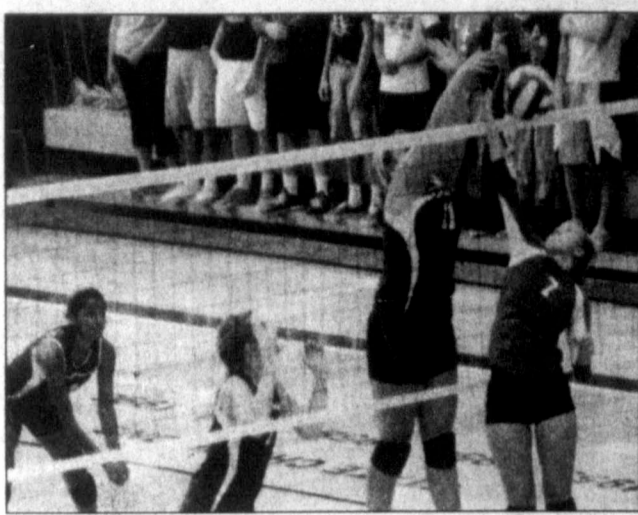

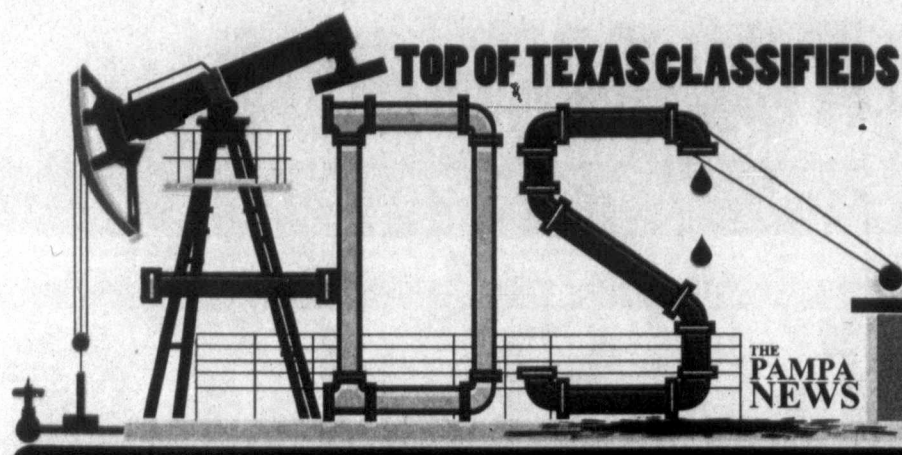
