



Pennsylvania Supreme Court hears Marcellus Shale case

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pennsylvania's Supreme Court heard arguments Tuesday in a natural gas case that could create chaos for major energy companies and thousands of leaseholders. But the questions from the justices suggested they may be reluctant to cause such disruptions by significantly modifying existing law.


The case concerns an 1881 property deed and established Pennsylvania law that defines minerals as only metallic substances such as gold, silver and iron. In the deed, a man named Charles Powers sold property in Susquehanna County but retained the rights to 50 percent of

the "minerals and petroleum oils."

The Powers estate claims that the reference to "minerals" in the old deed gives them part ownership of the natural gas locked in the Marcellus Shale under the property. The estate challenged the natural gas and mineral rights of the property's current owner. Lower courts disagreed about the issue.

The Marcellus is a formation that lies deep under much of Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New York and Ohio.

In 1881 the technology didn't exist to extract gas from the shale, but recent advances have made that possible.

Prosecutor: Breakup with boyfriend upset missing Arizona baby's mom

PHOENIX (AP) — An Arizona woman charged in the disappearance of her infant son more than two years ago was consumed with anger over the demise of her romantic ties with her father and used the boy as a pawn in their disputes, a prosecutor said Tuesday in closing arguments at the woman's trial.

Elizabeth Johnson ran off to another state with the child as a way to retaliate against his father, Logan McQueary, for ending their tumultuous relationship, prosecutor Angela Andrews said.

"She wants to get back at Logan, and she is upset, and she uses the one thing that would hurt Logan more than anything," Andrews said.

Johnson, 26, has plead-

ed not guilty to kidnaping, custodial interference and conspiracy to commit custodial interference in the December 2009 disappearance of her then-8-month-old son, Gabriel. She faces up to 27 years in prison if convicted on all counts.

Johnson sobbed as the prosecutor recounted McQueary calling her to say he loved her but had to spend time away from her so she could get her life back and get some peace.

Defense lawyers, who called no witnesses at Johnson's trial, were scheduled to make their closing arguments Tuesday afternoon.

Authorities say Johnson told the boy's father that she killed Gabriel and dumped him in a trash bin in San Antonio, Texas, the city where the child was last seen. But authorities say Johnson later recanted and told police she gave

the baby to a couple at a San Antonio park. She never provided the couple's names.

Gabriel's 3rd birthday was in April, but police don't know if he's alive. They searched a landfill and found no body.

Johnson initially was found mentally unfit to stand trial but was later deemed psychologically ready.

Investigators said Johnson brought the child from Tempe, Ariz., to Texas, stayed for a week and then book a bus to Florida without him.

She had been fighting with McQueary about whether to put Gabriel up for adoption.

She signed over temporary guardianship to a Scottsdale couple for about 10 days before she picked up the boy and left Arizona. McQueary opposed putting the baby up for adoption.

"Eventually what I want to do is to have a meeting at the shop where people can visit that's like a support a group," White said.

"It seems like everybody has a family member who has cancer. It creates a lot of problems with the whole family."

Hope Quinonez, a local home care giver, is helping White and Martinez by distributing the money as they raise it to Jaylon's family. So far they have raised about \$3,000.

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Who are the true patriots?

The third definition of "patriot" in the Oxford English Dictionary is "A person actively opposing enemy forces occupying his or her country; a member of a resistance movement, a freedom

fighter. Originally used of those who opposed and fought the British in the American War of Independence." The term first was used in the U.S. by Benjamin Franklin in a 1773 letter. It referred to people who stood in opposition of those pledged to the British Crown -- the Tories aka loyalists.

On Oct. 7, 1780, American patriots prevailed against loyalists in the Carolinas and won their first Southern battle. The Battle of Kings Mountain is a victory not often highlighted today but was a critical win nonetheless. It shows the importance of patriots everywhere persevering in every battle against adversarial forces -- even against those born on American soil.

The cable network History documented how a loyalist militia under Maj. Patrick Ferguson, largely made up of South Carolina frontiersmen, was defeated by a patriot militia under Col. William Campbell at the Battle of Kings Mountain in North Carolina near the South Carolina border.

Ferguson warned the patriots to lay down their arms or watch the loyalists "lay waste" to their country "with fire and sword." But 1,000 patriot militiamen, including Davy Crockett's father, John, courageously confronted Ferguson's loyalists, who were positioned on the rocky ridge of Kings Mountain.

Losing the upper hand to what he called the "band of banditti," Ferguson tried to intimidate the patriots by sending a wall of loyalists blitzing down the moun-

tain, but they were cut down in a hail of patriot bullets.

Ferguson soon followed a similar fate.

As History explained, "the patriot success was the first against the British in the South and convinced Gen. (Charles) Cornwallis to stop his march through the territory."

The toll on the loyalist militia at Kings Mountain was 157 killed, 163 wounded and 698 captured, while the patriot militia only suffered 28 killed and 60 wounded. Of the 2,000 total militiamen in battle for both sides, 1,900 were born on American soil. Only Ferguson and 100 of his redcoats, whom he had trained personally, were Britons.

Feels a lot like how we patriots are often outnumbered in modern cultural and political wars and elections, doesn't it? Surrounded by bands of adversaries born on American soil?

Nevertheless, like the patriots who fought at Kings Mountain in that distant October, more than 230 years ago, we must not shrink back by the intimidation of others.

Gone are the days when patriots such as Isaac Shelby, Charles McDowell and Elijah Clark led attacks against loyalist posts during the Revolutionary War. But present today are many other great patriots, aside from the one in the presidential race -- such as Rep. Michele Bachmann, R-Minn.; Rep. Allen West, R-Fla.; Rafael Edward "Ted" Cruz, R-Texas; Rep. Todd Akin, R-Mo.; Samuel Joseph Wurzelbacher, "Joe the Plumber," R-Ohio; and Judge Roy Moore, R-Ala. -- who are fighting worthy battles in state election arenas at this very moment.

What's critical for victory in each of these political rings is that every one of us patriots gets out of the bleachers and onto the battlefield, too.

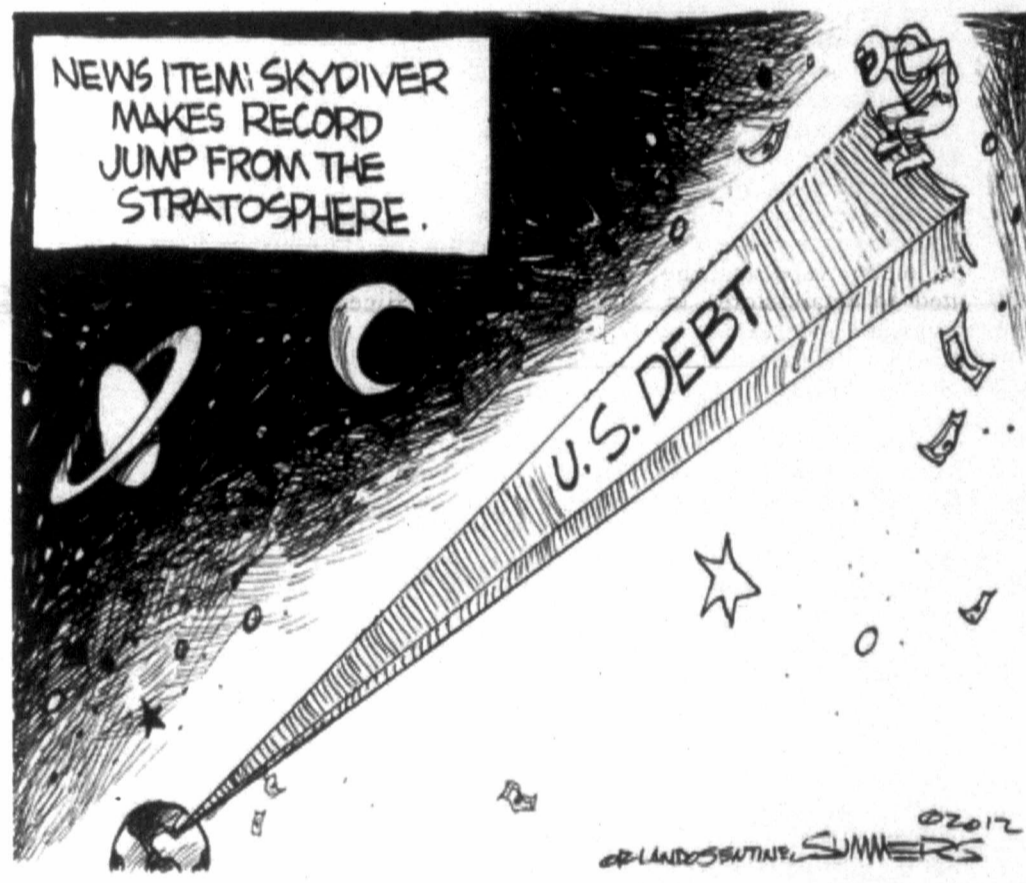
The program includes interviews with Virginia Frantz, as well as other residents of the region.

How would candidates tax plans affect investors?

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the outcome of next month's presidential election increasingly hazy, here's a shred of clarity that investors can cling to: The tax rates they pay on investment income like stock profits and dividends are almost certain to change.

Whether rates rise or fall could affect the prices of some dividend-paying stocks, experts say. Some, mainly Republicans, believe that lower rates would boost the economy and lift markets.

Under the current system, people pay the government 15 percent on most dividends and capital gains, the profits from selling investments. Both candidates' proposals would divide taxpayers into two categories: Those who earn more than \$200,000 per year — \$250,000 for families filing joint tax returns — and those who earn less.

President Barack Obama would boost the rate on capital gains to 20 percent for higher earners and leave it at 15 percent for everyone else. Mitt

Romney would maintain the 15 percent rate for wealthier people and eliminate the tax entirely for everyone else.

The differences are more dramatic when it comes to dividends. Obama would tax high earners' dividends as ordinary income, up to 39.6 percent for the wealthiest Americans. As with capital gains, Romney would maintain the 15 percent rate for richer people and eliminate the tax for people who make less.

The proposals reflect philosophical differences between the parties. Republicans think lower rates will encourage more people to invest, juicing the listless economy.

"It would encourage you to take more risks, put more capital into the economy and hopefully spur economic growth," says Taylor Griffin, who advises Republican campaigns and served in the Treasury Department under President George W. Bush.

Democrats say it's only fair that people who have succeeded in amassing wealth should pay a larger share of the nation's expenses. Higher rates did

little to discourage investment during the 1990s, when Bill Clinton was in office and the economy boomed. During that period, Obama said last month while explaining his tax plan, "we created 23 million new jobs, the biggest surplus in history, and a whole lot of millionaires, to boot."

The election is not the final word on next year's tax rates. Both houses of Congress would have to approve any changes. Lawmakers have been deadlocked for years on taxes and spending, so any changes would likely be part of a broader bargain to postpone or avoid the so-called fiscal cliff at the end of 2012.

That's when automatic government spending cuts would take effect if lawmakers can't agree. In another blow, if no deal is reached, tax rates for everybody would return to the higher levels in effect before a series of cuts first passed during the Bush years.

Dividend rates for the highest earners would be almost three times as high, "a huge increase," says Raymond Radigan, managing director with

U.S. Bank's wealth management division.

Retirees and others who rely on investment income, even if they're in lower tax brackets, could find dividend-paying stocks less attractive, says Adrian Day, whose Adrian Day Asset Management invests about \$180 million for wealthy clients. To replace the lost income, they might buy riskier assets like junk bonds, Day says.

Yet raising the tax rate on dividends wouldn't necessarily hurt dividend stocks. Some companies might simply eliminate their dividends, says Cliff Caplan, a financial planner with Neponset Valley Financial Partners in Norwood, Mass.

If the universe of dividend stocks shrinks, people who need reliable income would rush into the remaining options. Those would include stocks like utilities, whose regulators sometimes require dividend payouts; and those that must pay out their profits to enjoy lower tax rates, like real estate investment trusts and some energy partnerships.

health care and continued economic uncertainty, the COLA helps millions of older Americans maintain their standard of living, keeping many out of poverty."

The amount of wages subjected to Social Security taxes is going up, too. Social Security is supported by a 12.4 percent tax on wages up to \$110,100. That threshold will increase to \$113,700 next year, resulting in higher taxes for nearly 10 million workers and their employers, accord-

ing to the Social Security Administration.

Half the tax is paid by workers and the other half is paid by employers. Congress and President Barack Obama reduced the share paid by workers from 6.2 percent to 4.2 percent for 2011 and 2012. The temporary cut, however, is due to expire at the end of the year.

Some of next year's COLA could be wiped out by higher Medicare premiums, which are deducted from Social Security payments. The Medicare Part B premium, which covers doctor visits, is expected to rise by about \$7 per month for 2013, according to government projec-

tions.

The premium is currently \$99.90 a month for most seniors. Medicare is expected to announce the premium for 2013 in the coming weeks.

"If seniors are getting a low COLA, much of their increase will go to pay off their Medicare Part B premium," said Mary Johnson, a policy analyst at The Senior Citizens League.

By law, the increase in benefits is based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, or CPI-W, a broad measure of consumer prices generated by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. It measures

price changes for food, housing, clothing, transportation, energy, medical care, recreation and education.

Over the past year, housing costs have gone up 1.4 percent but home energy costs have dropped by 3.8 percent, according to the CPI-W. Medical costs, which tend to hit seniors harder than younger adults, have increased by 4.4 percent.

Gasoline prices have climbed by 6.8 percent, but much of that increase happened in the past month, so it is not fully reflected in the COLA for Social Security.

To calculate the COLA, the Social Security

Administration compares the average price index for July, August and September with the price index for the same three months in the previous year. The price index for September — the final piece of the puzzle — was released Tuesday.

If consumer prices increase from year to year, Social Security recipients automatically get higher payments, starting the following January. If prices drop, the payments stay the same, as they did in 2010 and 2011.

Since 1975, the annual COLA has averaged 4.2 percent. Only five times has it been below 2 percent, including the two

times it was zero. Before 1975, it took an act of Congress to increase Social Security payments.

Most older Americans rely on Social Security for a majority of their incomes, according to the Social Security Administration. Over the past decade, the COLA has helped increase incomes for seniors, even as incomes have dropped for younger workers.

From 2001 to 2011, the median income for all U.S. households fell by 6.6 percent, when inflation was taken into account, according to census data. But the median income for households headed by someone 65 or older rose by 13 percent.

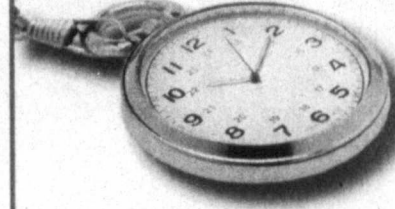

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Texas meat company recalling beef, pork products

DALLAS (AP) — Federal health officials say a Dallas-based meat distributor is recalling about 8,200 pounds of beef and pork products because they weren't inspected and were improperly labeled.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Food

Safety and Inspection Service said Monday one product from Lao Chareune Foods could not be labeled as a pork snack stick because it was raw.

The agency said the products were distributed to retail stores in Louisiana and Texas.

The products recalled were 3-ounce and 8-ounce packages containing "Pork Snack Stick;" 3.2-ounce packages of "Seasoned Fried Beef;" 1.76-ounce packages of "Fried Pork Skins;" and 1.2-ounce packages of "Sliced Fried Pork Ears."

Federal officials said they hadn't received any reports of illness from consumption of the products.

There was no answer at a phone listing for the company.

Wal-Mart, American Express offer non-bank option

It's the odd couple of personal finance. Wal-Mart and American Express are teaming up to circumvent the traditional banking system by offering a new, mostly free product to consumers.

The new Bluebird account is being billed as an alternative to debit and checking accounts, while offering most of the same features. But its biggest attraction is that there is no minimum account balance, no fees (either monthly or annual), a free debit card and no credit inquiry required to open the account.

The account offers a Bluebird card, which you carry in your wallet. But you can access your money or deposit cash at any Wal-Mart cash register. You can download a free app for your smartphone, letting you deposit a check by taking a photo, similar to apps now available at the largest banks. And you can pay bills online from this account at Bluebird.com.

Friends or relatives with Bluebird accounts can transfer money directly to you -- or you can set up sub-accounts for your teens or college students, allowing quick money transfers.

If you sign up for direct deposit of your paycheck, the card can be used with no fee to withdraw cash at MoneyPass network ATMs, more than 22,000 locations. Withdrawals through another ATM network are charged a \$2 fee -- and local network fees may apply.

The Bluebird card itself

is an American Express product, so it can be used to charge purchases at any merchant or online site that accepts American Express. Those purchases benefit from Amex guarantees such as purchase protection. And holders also get Amex roadside assistance, Global Assist services and fraud protection.

This card is designed to appeal to consumers who recognize that banking fees and charges have soared dramatically in the past two years. Wal-Mart and Amex point out that last year banks received more than \$31 billion in overdraft fees. And studies show that consumers pay an average of \$259 per year in basic checking fees.

The Bluebird account has a fee schedule that is all zeros, including no charges for inactivity, for a replacement card, for any electronic bill payment, for customer service calls or for foreign currency transactions. There are no overdraft charges because you can't withdraw or charge more than your account balance.

Bluebird is designed to be a "bank account in a box," says Wal-Mart's VP of Financial Services Daniel Eckert. You will be able to pick up this starter kit box at Wal-Mart check-out aisles for \$5. Or you can sign up free online at www.Bluebird.com. Start by depositing from \$1 to \$500 to open the account. That can be done right away at the Wal-Mart reg-

ister. You can add as much as \$10,000 per month to the account, with a limit of

\$1,000 in deposits in any one day. The Bluebird account is not an FDIC insured bank account. It is backed by the resources of American Express. So it is designed to be transactional, not serve as a savings reservoir. You cannot write paper checks on this account -- yet. The partners hint that service is coming in 2013. And you won't build up your credit record using this account, since it is solely a debit card.

What this new Bluebird account does do is force traditional banks and credit unions to compete to serve their customers at lower costs. The Wal-Mart and American Express partnership doesn't have the huge overhead and physical infrastructure of traditional banks -- so their costs are lower. And the ordinary consumer is getting the benefit of that advantage. That's the Savage Truth.

If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the state-ment "[I/we] request a contested case hearing"; (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the applications/permit which would satisfy your concerns.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the applications and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to the disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

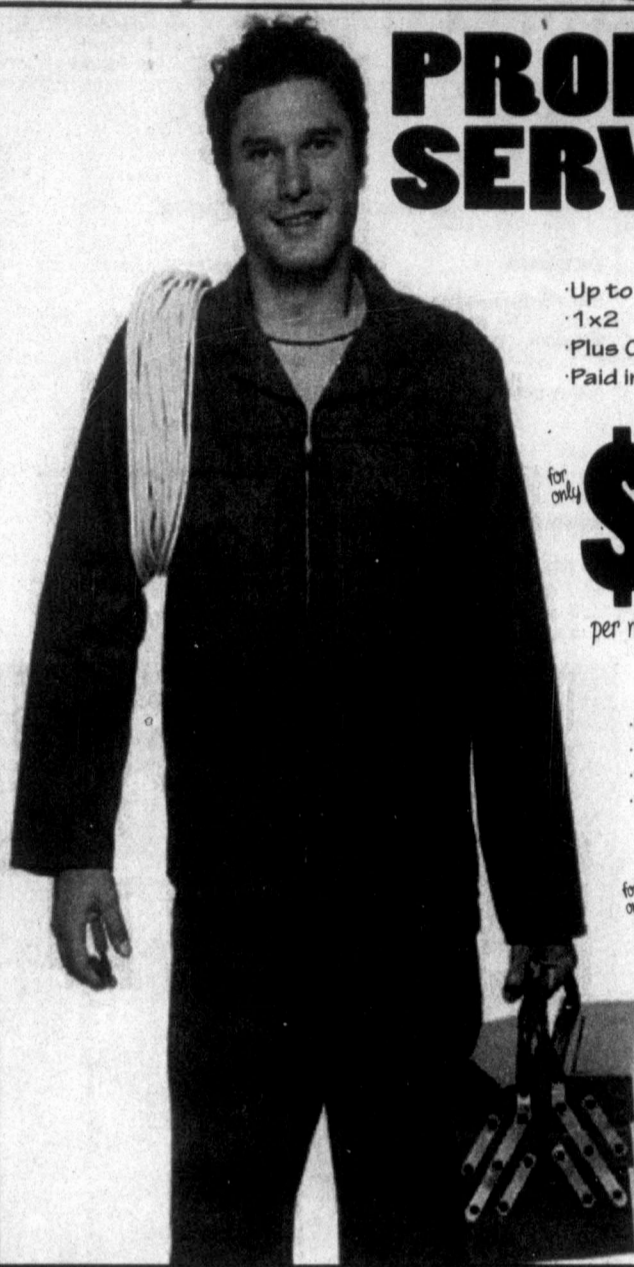

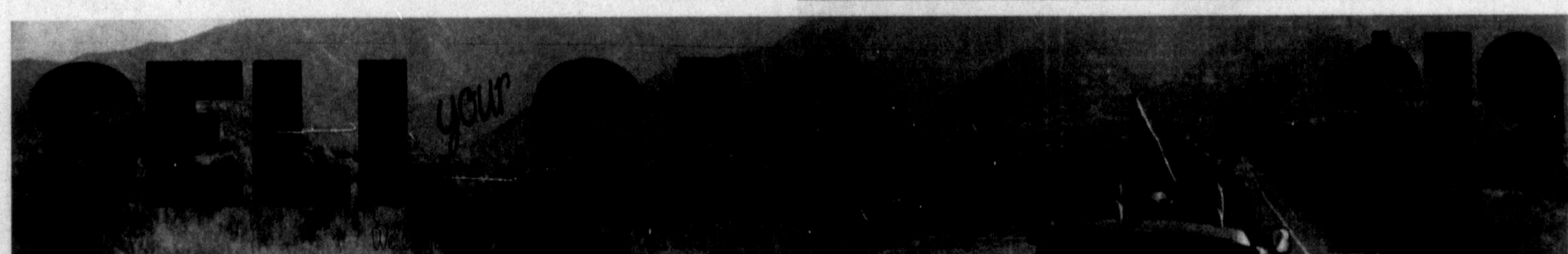

LSU needs TDs, not field goals vs. Texas A&M

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Les Miles knows that LSU might not get away with settling for field goals against a Texas A&M team coming off a 59-point performance.

After grinding out a high-stakes, 23-21 victory at home against previously unbeaten South Carolina last Saturday night, the sixth-ranked Tigers began preparations on Monday for a trip to College Station, Texas.

The 11 a.m. kickoff could be the start of a long day if LSU's defense isn't sharp against freshman quarterback Johnny Manziel and the Aggies prolific offense.

"I hope we can contain" Manziel, Miles said. "The good thing is that our defense will be one of the fastest he will have seen. Hopefully we will use a style of pressure that's most effective. At times it's going to be coverage and keeping him in the pocket, and other times, hopefully we can get to him."

The 20th-ranked Aggies have won five consecutive games since losing at home to No. 3 Florida in their season opener. In four of the five victories, Texas A&M scored at least 48 points. Last weekend, the Aggies won a 59-57 shootout against Louisiana Tech.

Manziel accounted for an SEC-record 576 yards against the Bulldogs. He ran for 181 yards and three touchdowns and

completed 24 of 40 passes for 395 yards and three touchdowns. In six games, Manziel has nearly 2,400 yards of total offense.

One area in which Miles said he must see improvement is red-zone offense. LSU had four drives that reached at least the South Carolina 15 yard-line but did not produce touchdowns. Drew Alleman attempted four field goals, making three and missing one.

"We have to take care of our responsibilities" in the red zone, Miles said. "We can't turn the ball over. We have to execute well. Our guys are more understanding that we're getting down there so often and not coming away with 7s. We are normally getting 3s. That has to change."

Against the Gamecocks, the field goals were enough to avoid back-to-back losses for the first time in four years and keep LSU in the hunt for a national title.

In that game, however, the Tigers rode the energy of a pumped-up home crowd in Death Valley, where they've now won a school record 22 straight.

"The memory of Tiger Stadium is always renewed when you bring in a quality opponent," Miles said. "The crowd started on the first play and our team played to that. I can't tell you how much we enjoy playing there."

Other than whipping Washington, LSU had few thoroughly impres-

sive performances during the first half of its schedule. A loss against South Carolina would have put the Tigers in dire straits in the Southeastern Conference Western Division standings.

Instead, LSU overcame the absence of three starters on the offensive line for its best rushing performance of the season. True freshman Jeremy Hill had 124 yards, 50 of which came on a victory-clinching touchdown in the fourth quarter. The right side of the line consisted of redshirt freshman Trai Turner and true freshman Vadal Alexander.

Hill "has a very quality football IQ and just a natural sense for what should be and what shouldn't be," Miles said. "He has great ball skills, and of course his size and speed combination lets you know that he was going to have that opportunity to play."

The thing that you wonder about a freshman is how he will respond when the lights turn on in a game like last Saturday night. ... Jeremy responded very strong."

By edging the Gamecocks, LSU remained one game behind Alabama and Mississippi State in the SEC West standings.

After playing Texas A&M, LSU will have a week off, giving the Tigers two weeks to prepare for a highly anticipated matchup with No.1 Alabama. The Tigers also will host

Mississippi State on Nov. 10.

Of course, the stakes won't be quite as high for LSU if it can't slow down the Aggies, who are in their first season of SEC play after coming over from the Big 12.

"We'll look very forward to playing Texas A&M at Kyle Field," said Miles, who had success in the Big 12 as Oklahoma State's coach before taking the LSU job. "The early morning game, I think we'll also look forward to that, get in and get it going."
