

But if you're a lineman for the electric company, "galloping" the up and down motion of power lines during strong winds — can be your worst nightmare.

That was what crews from Xcel Energy were faced with Tuesday as they tried to repair lines and get the power back on for customers in Pampa and surrounding areas.

The storm that began brewing weather was in full force by the wee hours Tuesday morning. The convergence of rapidly falling temperatures, a brisk north wind and moisture freezing on the lines caused the lines to flap up and down in a rolling motion, which in turn caused breakage in cross arms and conductors.

"It is unbelievable how violent it gets," said Al Ferguson, an Xcel service foreman at the Pampa Service Center on South Marie Street.

Ferguson added the violent winds also caused the lines to bump together, making them short and trip breakers.

"In the 35 years I've been work-

possession of a controlled substance — less than 1 According to the police report, Horton stole oil equipment from an oil field located near Pampa

with the intent to resell the

equipment for profit. GCSO Lt. Terry Cox said the mainstream market for steel is very high right now so there is a demand on the black market for used oil equipment like the kind Horton is accused of stealing. Black market buyers will then melt the equipment down to make the steel malleable again and able

Cox compared the situation to thieves who break into vacant homes and steal the copper wire out of the walls to be resold for

"All of the reported missing items have been recovered by the Gray County Sheriff's Office," Cox said. "In this case the items that were recovered could be identified by the owner, unlike so many other

Cox then shared a tip for owners on how

they can protect their oil equipment. "If at all practical, place some type of identifiers on tools, equipment and other

easily stolen or pawn-able items," Cox said. Horton is currently being held in the Gray County Jail on \$15,000 bond.

with those dreams, however, they need to know what Rick Perry, the governor of Texas, is going to do. He has said he will lay out his political plans in June.

He has made the noises you might make if you were

a governor who didn't want to become a lame duck while the Legislature is in town, saying he's thinking about another run for the job he has held since late 2000, and would be open to another run for the Republican nomination for president in 2016.

Most of the statewide officials in Texas have their hearts set on promotion, and most of those opportunities depend on the governor opening a spot and triggering a civic

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



Coast Guard: Spark from cleaning caused explosion MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Firefighters on emergency vehicles and then a second,

Thursday extinguished a huge blaze that erupted hours earlier when two fuel barges exploded, leaving three people with critical burns and forcing the evacuation of crew from a nearby cruise ship.

The cause of the explosions remained under investigation, but investigators believe it was likely from a spark caused by a crew cleaning the barges, Coast Guard Lt. Mike Clausen said.

Firefighters from Mobile and Coast Guard officials responded to the pair of Wednesday night explosions involving the gas barges in the Mobile River east of downtown. More explosions followed over the next few hours. Authorities say three people were brought

to the University of South Alabama Medical Center for burn-related injuries. The three remained in critical condition Thursday morning, hospital spokesman Bob Lowry Across the river, workers were evacuated

from the Carnival Triumph, the cruise ship that became disabled in the Gulf of Mexico in February before it was towed to Mobile's port for repairs.

Alan Waugh, who lives at the Fort Conde Inn across the river from the scene, saw the blasts and said throngs of Carnival employees and others were clustered on streets leading toward the river as authorities evacuated

"It literally sounded like bombs going off around. The sky just lit up in orange and red," he said, "We could smell something in the air, we didn't know if it was gas or smoke." Waugh said he could feel the heat from the explosion and when he came back inside, his partner noticed he had what appeared to be black soot on his face.

Carnival didn't immediately respond to an emailed request for comment late Wednes-

Video from WALA-TV showed flames engulfing a large section of the barge, and a video that a bystander sent to AL.com showed the fiery explosions and billowing smoke over the river.

Trevell Taylor was at work at Delta Bonds when he heard the blast.

"It was so loud, I just about jumped up under this desk," he said.

Trevell said he next heard sirens from

louder explosion. He turned on the local news and learned of the barge fire. "It is a scary think anytime you are talking

about gasoline and fuel fires. They are lucky more people weren't hurt." The initial blast took place in a ship chan-

nel near the George C. Wallace Tunnel which carries traffic from Interstate 10 under the Mobile River. The river runs south past Mobile and into

Mobile Bay, which in turn flows into the Gulf of Mexico. The tunnels were still open As daybreak approached, the Mobile Fire-Rescue Department's fireboat Phoenix was

moved toward the barges, checking to make sure their mooring lines were secured. Mobile Fire Chief Steve Dean told AL.com he was confident the fire wouldn't spread to nearby industrial properties, in-

cluding the shipyard where the Carnival cruise ship is docked. Huffman said the ship is directly across the river from the incident — about two

football fields in length. The barges are owned by Houston-based Kirby Inland Marine, company spokesman

Greg Beuerman said. They were empty and being cleaned at the Oil Recovery Co. facility.

The barges had been carrying a liquid called natural gasoline, meaning there were no additives in the fuel.

By mid-morning Thursday, a hazardous materials team sent to inspect the barges determined that no further hazards exist, the Mobile Fire-Rescue reported. The explosion comes two months after the

900-foot-long Carnival Triumph was towed to Mobile after becoming disabled on the Gulf during a cruise by an engine room fire, leaving thousands of passengers to endure cold food, unsanitary conditions and power outages for several days. The ship is still undergoing repairs there, with many workers living on board.

Earlier this month, the cruise ship was dislodged from its mooring by a windstorm that also caused, in a separate incident, two shipyard workers to fall into Mobile Bay. While one worker was rescued, the other's body was pulled from the water more than a week later.

ing here I've only seen this happen four or five other times," he said.

Steve Pirtle, supervisor at the Pampa office, said the galloping was occurring on the east-west lines, which were perpendicular to the gusting north wind. As moisture accumulated as ice on the power lines, it created "wings," and the effect of the wind blowing across ice-coated lines was much like when you hold your hand outside your car window while driving and tilt it back and forth.

Since the weather was windy and cold all day Tuesday, it was a challenge for the crews to power restoration. make much progress. Pirtle said sometimes after a crew repaired damage caused by galloping, they'd go back a half-hour the lines would be down

Though the power is always shut off when linemen are working on poles and lines, it was still pretty scary working in Tues- day. day's weather conditions, Ferguson said.

On Wednesday, as the warmed temperatures and winds calmed down, outage restoration was wrapped up in the eastern and northeastern Texas Panhandle around 6 p.m.

"Our goal was 5 p.m. Wednesday and we nearly met it except for a few stragglers," he said.

Pirtle said the first priority during an outage is to get power back to the main feeders out of the substations, then they move onto the tap lines, which are closer to individual customers.

That's not easy to do in the Panhandle, Pirtle said. "The logistics of getting

power back on here are difficult because we are so open and spread out," he The phones

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



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The baby-faced bomber

Sometimes a picture speaks volumes. Sometimes it's outright deceptive. The picture of "Bomb-

er No. 2" didn't look a bit like a mass murderer. A sweet-faced college kid, the former lifeguard, the nice young man described by classmates

and friends. It couldn't be. There must be some outside organization calling the shots. An international conspiracy, perhaps. Brainwashing.

Or maybe it was just a deceptive picture of a coldblooded murderer.

He and his brother put bombs next to children. One of those children was murdered.

In a court of law, innocence is presumed. That is a rule of law, not a finding of fact. For those of us who watched, watched over and over, the proof appears to be nothing less than overwhelming. Others may have been involved. Further investigation is absolutely required.

But I for one have no doubt that the defendant is not a baby-faced college student, that he is no one's victim, that he is responsible for heinous crimes. Responsibility is not an exacting standard in criminal law. Did he know what he was doing? Did he understand that there was a bomb in that backpack, and that bombs kill people and terrorize cities? Whatever other pressures may have been at work, however influenced he was by religion or his brother or anyone else, if he knew what he was doing, if he understood the nature of his conduct, that is enough to make him responsible. But that does not make him an enemy

The calls by politicians to treat him as one, led by Sen. Lindsey Graham, a lawyer who should know better, demonstrate the triumph of politics over law. According to Graham, speaking on the Senate floor, Dzhokhar Tsarnaev's "ties to radical Islamic thought" and his Chechen heritage should justify holding him as an "enemy combatant" subject to trial by a military tribunal.

combatant.

Ties to "radical Islamic

thought" do not make a person an enemy combatant. Ties to thought are, in fact, at the core of the protection afforded by the First Amendment. Actions are another matter. But there is absolutely no evidence that this man was a member of al-Oaida or the Taliban, or that his acts were directed by foreign enemies. He is an American citizen who (allegedly) killed innocent people and would have (absent the brilliance of the Boston hospital trauma system) killed many more -- on American soil using devices made in America.

Indeed, even Graham acknowledges this. He just wants him to be treated as an enemy combatant until proved otherwise. Nothing in the law or the Constitution supports this. It is totally unnecessary. The evidence against Tsarnaev is overwhelming. He wouldn't need to say a word to government authorities to be convicted in an American court. The only consequence off not giving him Miranda rights is that his statements might not be admissible in a criminal trial, which, frankly, won't matter. Anyone who thinks a Boston jury will be unduly sympathetic (unlike military officers) is just plain wrong. Indeed, for my money, military officers -- who are more accustomed to seeing death on the fields of battle than the rest of us are to seeing destruction and devastation in Copley Square -- might have an easier time focusing solely on the evidence admitted at trial.

In our ridiculously polarized media and political culture, we have a tendency to see everything in extremes, which means that more often than not we're wrong. Dzhokhar Tsarnaev is not a baby-faced innocent, even if that is how he looks in the pictures that flashed on the screen every minute. He placed a bomb in the middle of hundreds of innocent people, children included. He is also not an enemy combatant by any definition, nor do we need to treat him as one in order to ensure that justice is done.

glo, glitzy dance clubs or dark, concrete basements. Man, I miss those basement parties.



short-range nukes. Many conservatives were opposed. I elected to host a press conference to make that point publicly.

The night before, we met privately. As ringleader, I issued a directive: No attacks on Ronald Reagan. Our beef was with the treaty, not with the Gipper. My co-conspirators agreed unanimously. But while we were meeting President Reagan was sitting down for an interview with Tom Brokaw and said about conservative opposition, "Some conservatives just believe in the inevitability of

nuclear war."

Bad choice of words. The next morning conservatives were furious, none than than the late Senator Malcolm Wallop, who broadsided the president from the Senate

As we assembled for our press conference, I withdrew my edict. Anyone who felt the need to respond to Reagan had the right to do so. It was decided that three of us would speak on behalf of everyone.

Now here's a little bit of inside baseball about press conferences. It matters not a whit what you say. Reporters cover events but transcribe only soundbites. For speakers vying for coverage, the rule is pretty solid as well: He with the best one-liner wins.

I led off, and my statement contained the sentence that I delivered with brio and knew was sure to stick. Very satisfied, I sat down, but not before introducing Richard Viguerie, the patriarch of

the "New Right" re-birth of the conservative movement. He didn't have a statement, iust a little card containing one sentence. His attentiongrabber line was twice as good as mine, which he delivered with double the brio. Advantage: Viguerie. We turned the podium over to Howie Phillips.

Authorities: Pickens' grandson died of heroin use

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Authorities say the grandson of billionaire T. Boone Pickens died of heroin intoxication after an evening of drug use at a friend's apartment.

The Tarrant County medical examiner's office announced Wednesday that the Jan. 29 death of Thomas "Ty" Boone Pickens IV was accidental.

Medical officials had to wait weeks to receive toxicology and other test results before announcing the cause of death for the 21-yearold, who was a junior at Texas Christian University.

The younger Pickens died at a hospital after being taken there by private vehicle.

Another TCU student was charged with tampering with evidence after police said he removed items from the apartment and hid them from authorities. Police say the evidence included heroin, drug paraphernalia and marijuana.

DALLAS (AP) — Police have arrested at least three people during a protest march in Dallas near the dedication site of the George W. Bush Presidential Center.

Williams says the three were charged with being a pedestrian in a roadway, a misdemeanor. They were taken to the Dallas County jail.

Charter school pledge bill clears House hurdle

AUSTIN (AP) — Charter schools in Texas would have to offer the pledge of allegiance or a moment of silence each day under a bill given preliminary approval by the House.

The measure overwhelming passed Thursday but not without friction. Republican state Rep. David Simpson wanted to soften the language from asking students to "recite" the pledge to doing so 'freely without coercion.'

Simpson is among the most prominent tea party members in the Legislature.

He told the House that although he supports students saying the pledge, the U.S. Constitution "requires that we not compel people."

Lawmakers quickly lined up to block Simpson's amendment. Republican Marsha Farney said her bill doesn't compel charter-school students to say the pledge but mere-

Senate wants new limits on Major Events Fund

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Senate has voted to place new restrictions on spending from the state's Major Events Trust Fund, which is typically used to help stage large sports events such as car races or Super Bowls.

It also limits how much could be spent on structural improvements to stadiums, such as a new roof or scoreboard.

Singer found shot dead in South Texas

MISSION, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a South Texas singer well known for his ballads, including some about the exploits of Mexican drug cartels, has been found dead.

Hidalgo County Sheriff Lupe Trevino says irrigation workers found the body of Jesus "Chuy" Quintanilla early Thursday in a rural road north of Mission surrounded by citrus groves.

Trevino said Quintanilla appeared to have been shot at least twice in the head. His vehicle was left beside him. Quintanilla's family filed a missing person report Thursday morning after investigators were already on the scene. Quintanilla's family last had contact with him the previous night.

A man who would only give his name as Ramiro said he was friends with Quintanilla and said the singer was noted for his nortena music and ballads, known as corridos.

The Senate bill would bar the state Mississippi courthouse has sneaky snake invasion

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Nonvenomous snakes are slithering into a Mississippi courthouse this spring, posing no threat but giving workers the creeps.

Five of the brown DeKay's snakes — sometimes called earth snakes — have been found in the Hinds County circuit clerk's basement office since April 8.

A deputy clerk, Kelly Phillips, said Thursday that the largest was a big around as her finger and a few inches long. She didn't stop to measure it. She said the smallest looked like an overgrown earthworm.

Former zookeeper Percy King, who does reptile shows at local schools, went to the courthouse to identify the serpents. He said DeKay's snakes, which eat lizards, worms, crickets and other small bugs, have soft teeth that probably couldn't even break a human's skin.


It's not unusual for DeKay's snakes to sneak into buildings during the springtime as they wake up from hibernation, he said: "A snake that size could squeeze through any little hole." The Art Deco-style courthouse

in downtown Jackson was built in 1930 and is topped by a statue of Moses with the Ten Commandments. The basement has windows, but Phillips said they're tightly

Phillips said the first time she saw a snake in the office, her brain didn't immediately register what it was.

She said she screamed "Snake!" and several co-workers scattered.



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
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

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
