

Tommie J. Mills, 54, who was DA in Snyder in the early 1970's and who currently serves as Snyder municipal judge, has announced his candidacy for the office of district judge, of the 123rd District, which includes Scurry and Borden County.

Mills has been a resident of Snyder for 23 years, opening a legal practice there in 1964.

His first venture into public office was his appointment as DA in 1970. He ran unopposed for a full four-year term, then resigned the post in 1971.

In May of 1986, he was appointed city municipal judge, a post he still holds. He is also a past Democratic party chairman and director for the Snyder Chamber of Commerce.

He graduated from the

March 8 should be one of the most exciting days in the 1988 elections, with 20 states including Texas holding presidential primaries on that date.

Voters not registered to vote in the big "Super Tuesday" primary election have only until Friday, February 5, to do so.

Registered voters should have a white registration card; otherwise they may not be allowed to vote.

J.V. ENDS SEASON UNDEFEATED

The J.V. handed Sands a 37-30 loss Friday night, and with the win, ended their season with a perfect 7-0 record. The game was their toughest of the year as the score was tied at the end of the first quarter. Borden held only a brief two point lead, 13-11, but outscored Sands 15-6 the third quarter for a 28-17 lead. Sands fought back in the final quarter but it was not enough.

Amy Lewis led in scoring with 13 points followed by Elizabeth Garcia with 9. Randi Woodward followed with 7 points, Rachel Romero had 4, and Mary Ann Garcia and Julie Harris each had 2. Also playing was Kandy Belew.

In the undefeated

season, Borden had a 2-0 record against other district teams as two schools were unable to field teams due to a lack of numbers. This year's team was made up of six players until the last game, when Borden suited up 7. They had a high game of 55 against Ira on December 15, and a best defensive effort of holding their opponent to 7, twice, against Ira on November 11 and Loraine on November 24. Their largest margin of victory was 47 points, both times against Ira on November 17 and December 15. Borden averaged 46.9 points per game to their opponents 13. Leading scorers on this year's team were Amy Lewis with a 17 point average

and Randi Woodward with a 10 point average. The team had one Junior and six sophomores.


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**LADY COYOTES CLINCH
 FIRST HALF DISTRICT
 TITLE WITH RECORD
 SETTING PERFORMANCE**

With Friday night's win over the Sands Lady Mustangs, the Borden County Lady Coyotes won the first half district title, and with it a playoff berth for the fourth time in five years. The 58-45 win at Sands marked another exciting record as Borden shot their highest percentage from the field that has been shot in eight years. Hitting nearly 70% from the floor in the first half, Borden didn't cool off much in the second as they hit 26 of 42 from the field for 62% for the game. All five starters, and one substitute hit better than 50% each.

Borden opened up the game by scoring the first 10 points of the game and held a 16-9 first quarter advantage. The second quarter really opened up the margin as the Lady Coyotes outscored Sands 20-9. Holding a 36-18 half-time lead, Sands then came out in an aggressive pressing defense that forced

many turnovers and allowed the Lady Mustangs to close the gap. But then Borden reeled off 6 of 9 from the floor in the final quarter to seal the victory. Elana led in scoring with 24 points followed by Lisha Sternadel with 13 and Kate Phinizy with 10. Elvira Balaque scored 5 followed by Ralynn Key with 4 and Kristi Adcock with 2. Kristi led in field goal percentage with 100%, hitting her only attempt. She was followed by Elana with 73% (11 of 15), Ralynn and Elvira with 67% each (each 2 of 3), and Kate with 56% (5 of 9). Lisha led in free throw percentage with 60% making 3 of 5. Kristi and Elvira led in steals with 4 each followed by Ralynn, Elana, and Kate with 3 each. Elana led in rebounds with 7 followed by Kate with 6 and Kristi with 5. Ralynn and Lisha tied in assists with 4 each and Kristi had 3.

The win raises the Lady Coyotes season record to 15-4 and the district record to 4-0. This concludes the first half of play for Borden as it clinches a playoff berth and bi-district opponent for mid February. To win the district title, Borden need only to tie for the second half round. The second half begins Friday night with a tough game at Klondike. Klondike finished as the runner-up in the first half as their only loss was a two point setback to the Lady Coyotes in Borden. Game time will be at 6:30.

**COYOTES LOSE
 HEARTBREAKER
 TO SANDS 49-48**

The Borden County Coyotes visited the Sands Mustangs and almost pulled off a big upset. An overtime period had to be played to establish the winner. The Coyotes stunned the Mustangs by jumping out to a 22-15 first quarter lead. The Mustangs fought back to tie the score in the second quarter as the Coyotes only made 2 out of 10 attempted field goals. The Coyotes regained the lead in the third quarter by outscoring the Mustangs 8-6. In the fourth quarter the Mustangs fought back and outscored the Coyotes 11-9 to even the score at 47.

To start the overtime period, the Mustangs gained possession on the jump ball thanks to their 6'5" center, but they were unable to score. The Coyotes' Jimmy Rios, grabbed a loose ball and worked the ball around the

court waiting for a good shot. The Coyotes shot was short and the Mustangs grabbed the rebound. Before the Mustangs could score Shannon Bond came up with a steal for the Coyotes. As the Coyotes brought the ball up the floor, they fouled Freshman Jimmy Rios. Jimmy made the first of the free throws to give the Coyotes a 1 point lead. The Mustangs took the ball down the court and got off a shot and Will Phinizy came up with a big rebound for the Coyotes. The Coyotes brought the ball down and used up most of the clock before shooting the ball. The shot was missed and the Mustangs got the rebound. With only 22 seconds on the clock, the Mustangs got their chance to score. The Coyotes defense almost prevented them from getting off a shot, but with only 1 second on the clock

they got off a shot that was true for a 1 point victory.

The Coyotes played very well against the district leader. We'll remember that 1 point loss when the Mustangs come to visit us next month.

Shannon Bond led all scorers with 26 points, had 3 steals, and 9 rebounds. Brian Bond scored 9 points, had 1 steal, 2 rebounds, and 2 assists. Will Phinizy scored 6 points, had 1 steal, and 8 rebounds. Kerry Fryar scored 4 points, had 2 steals, 4 rebounds and 3 assists. Jimmy Rios scored 3 points, made 4 steals, 3 rebounds, and 4 assists. Wayne Wilson had 1 rebound and 1 assist. Chris Kilmer replaced Jimmy Rios in the first half after he picked up his third foul, but Chris didn't score.

TRAVELING IN TEXAS

NEW BRAUNFELS—LAND OF BEAUTIFUL RIVERS

New Braunfels, located on I-35 between Austin and San Antonio, is a picturesque community with beautiful scenery, fun things to do and a quaint German village atmosphere. Established in 1845 on the Comal River by Prince Carl of Solms-Braunfels, the city was settled by predominantly German settlers. Much of the German influence in language, culture and tradition are still strong today. This tradition makes the city a delight-place to visit.

The city's historical significance can be seen by the abundance of quaint homes built of the old German fachwerk (gingerbread) construction. Several homes and buildings have been designated as Texas Historical Landmarks. Included are old mills, churches and private residences (a few are open to visitors). The history of the area can also be seen by the abundance of antique shops, making New Braunfels the "Antique Capital of Texas".

You may want to plan your visit here to coincide with some of the major events. The largest annual event is the world renowned Wurstfest held each November to honor the art of sausage making and the German heritage. The ten day event features music, food, dancing and numerous special programs.

Then there is the Texas Jr. Miss Program, Central Texas Golf Fest, Folkfest, Spring and Fall Antique Sales and Antique and Classic Car Sales. The Fiesta Mexicana and the Maskenball and Parade are held annually in early May.

Two lovely rivers wind through this enjoyable city. The Comal River, often referred to as the shortest, largest river in the world, springs up, clear and sparkling, from natural rock formations in Landa Park. It meanders through the park before merging with Texas' famous Guadalupe River near the heart of town. The Comal is popular for tubing and swimming while the white water rapids of the Guadalupe appeal to the canoeist, rafter and kayaker.

Nestled in the hills just a few miles from New Braunfels is Canyon Lake, a water resort area used year around for sailing, boating, water skiing, fishing and swimming.

One of the most appealing aspects of New Braunfels is its natural scenic beauty. Heavily wooded hillsides create an impressive backdrop for the lush setting of this area.

You will want to visit Landa Park which offers picnic facilities under the shade of giant, ancient oak trees. Walk, run or jog on the park's trails or take a leisurely tour on the miniature train that chugs around the 300 acre park.

Other attractions include the Schlitterbahn Water Amusement Park and the nearby Natural Bridge Caverns, Texas' largest cavern with many unusual formations.

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ASCS NEWS

1988 FARM PROGRAM PROVISIONS

Paid diversion of 10% for corn, grain sorghum and barley.

There will be an Additional Yield Payment for 1988 crops if the farm program yield for a farm is reduced more than 19% below the farm program yield for the 1985 crop.

Advance Payments for Wheat and Feed Grains, may not be less than 40% or the projected payment rate. For Upland Cotton may not be less than 30% of the projected payment rate.

There will be a 0/92 Program for wheat and feed grains. We won't know the details until sign-up starts.

Barley and Oats bases for 1988 will not be combined.

There will be no baling of ACR acreage or CU acreage for payment.

Cross Compliance will be applied.

The sign-up dates for program crops, Upland Cotton, Wheat, Feed Grains will begin February 16, 1988 and end April 15, 1988.

PLANTING DATES

Final planting dates for Wheat, and Barley was November 30, 1987. Date for Oats was December 15, 1987. Date for Upland Cotton is June 20, 1988 and for Sorghum is June 30, 1988. Any plantings after this final date, will be considered for yield reduction.

6TH CRP SIGN-UP

Sign-up will begin February 1 thru February 19, 1988. Producers wishing to enroll highly erodible land into the 10 year program may do so by coming by the county office

during this time to have ASCS and SCS check and determine eligibility of the acreage.

COTTON LOANS

Cotton loans for 1987 crop are available through May 31, 1988. Don't forget if you have a lien on your crop, you will have to get a lien waiver signed before the loan can be made. We are required to make lien searches from the Secretary of States' Office in Austin and also from the County Courthouse.

The loan, as always, can not be disbursed until all signatures are received from everyone receiving a share on the crop. So you will need to make some kind of arrangements with your landlords.

WOOL AND MOHAIR

Reminder that February 1, 1988 is the deadline for filing 1987 wool, unshorn lambs, and mohair sales documents. Please remember that the following is necessary to make an application for an incentive payment:

Number of head shorn
Date of shearing
Amount of any freight paid
Purchase of unshorn lambs
CCC-182's

Report of Payments to Producer, KCMO will send these forms to producers in February. CCC-182's will show payments made to producers during the calendar year 1987. It will not include payments earned but not paid.



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PECAN HEADING TO STATE SHOW

A Pawnee variety grown by Herman Ledbetter will be the only entry from Dawson County in the state pecan show to be held at El Paso in July in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Texas Pecan Growers Association, according to Extension Agent John Farris.

Ledbetter's entry qualified for the state contest by placing second in the Pawnee division at the West Texas Regional Pecan Show held last month in Odessa. Ledbetter's entry had placed first in its division at the Dawson County Pecan Show and was one of ten local entries to advance to the regional competition.

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





According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt. Appointments may be made by calling 856-4386.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Gail on Saturday, February 6.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.
