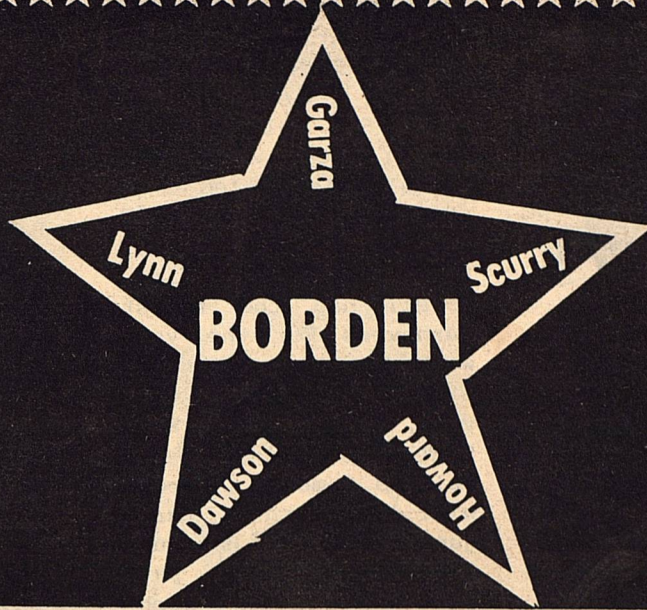

SHAW ANNOUNCES RE-ELECTION BID



Rep. Larry Don Shaw

BORDEN COUNTY--State Representative Larry Don Shaw (D-Big Spring) formally announced for re-election this week.

The 35 year old farmer is a graduate of Texas Tech. Shaw was the youngest member of the House when first elected in 1980. Today, he is one of the more powerful members of the House serving as Chairman of Budget and Oversight for the Agriculture Committee and holding an important seat on the powerful Budget Committee.

Shaw has been a fierce and effective fighter for the people of West Texas. When disaster struck our district in Saragosa, he started a private fund which raised over \$23,000.00 and then helped obtain 60 cars for the victims of the tornado. He blocked a plan to close the West Texas Children's Home in Monahans and helped stop Governor Clement's

plans to close the West Texas McDonald Observatory and his plan to cut the Agriculture Extension Service by 10 million dollars. When wealthy urban Republicans tried to balance the budget by cutting other funds vital to West Texas, Shaw again played a key role in blocking the plan.

Shaw is a strong supporter of public and higher education. He worked to stop a budget plan that would have forced an increase in local school taxes and made sure colleges in our area, UTPB, West Texas State and Howard College had adequate funding.

While Larry Don protected our share of State funds, he also helped bring down state spending to its' lowest growth rate in a decade. He has been a sponsor of legislation banning a state income tax and carried over 15 cost-cutting bills. One package of cuts will save taxpayers over 100 million dollars. Shaw also helped to reduce, consolidate or entirely eliminate 47 wasteful state agencies.

Just recently Shaw played a key role in blocking burdensome new trucking regulations coming out of Austin.

"This past budget session was a tough one," Shaw said. "Not

HOUSTON: Dale W. Steffes has announced his candidacy for the 6-year term on the Texas Railroad Commission as a Republican.

"The Texas Railroad Commission needs a macro energy professional, as well as a politician", he said. He has been a precinct chairman, active in precinct, district and state conventions. He was the Republican nominee for the commission in 1974.

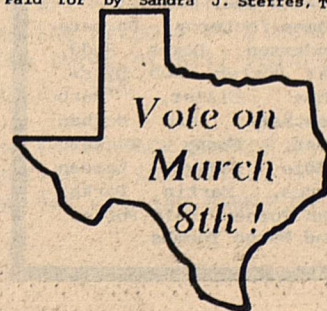
As for an energy professional, he formed Planning & Forecasting Consultants in 1973 and has been successfully providing forecasting and planning services to Independent and major oil companies, OPEC countries and others. He has correctly called and publicly documented all the major oil price trends of the last 15 years.

He entered the 1988

race primarily because he has conceived a national energy plan that would overcome the foreign oil cost advantage at no cost to the U.S. consumer. His plan is called the ENERGY STABILITY POLICY. He believes it should and would be implemented if he is elected. All plans of this nature need a leader and he promised to see that it is implemented. He claims that if his policy is implemented 1500 rigs will be working in 1990. If we stay with the present impasse policy, we can look for 800 rigs operating in 1990.

Steffes and his family moved to Houston 20 years ago. He is a registered engineer and worked in the natural gas industry for 15 years. He is very active in his church. Two of his children have graduated from Southwestern Conference schools and are employed in Texas. The other three are in college. His wife, Sandy, is also active in Republican politics. They have been married 25 years.

LADY COYOTES COMPLETE ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON

It didn't take long for opponents to realize that the 1987-88 edition of the Borden County Lady Coyote Basketball team was not worrying about the loss of last year's five graduating seniors, for they were too busy making a name for themselves! After a relatively slow beginning, in which they lost two of their first five games, the Gail girls put their game in high gear by winning 19 of the next 21.

Included in the wins was 8-0 district win steak that won them the 1987-88 District Championship over Fort Hancock. They were winners of the Garden City Tournament for the second straight year, won consolation in the Sands Tournament, and placed third in the Borden Tournament. Ten of their wins came against teams that were in the play-offs. This year's team compiled a record of 22 wins and 5 losses. They averaged 54.5 points per game to their opponents 35.1 point average. Their high scoring game of the year was November 13, holding their opponent to 13 points. Leading scorer on this year's team was Elana Himes who scored 415 points for a 15.4 scoring average per game. Lisha Sternadel was the second leading scorer with 330 points for a 12.2 per game average. Kate Phinizy was third in scoring with 219 points for an average of 8.1. Elana also led in rebounds during the 27 games with 189 for a 7.0 average. Lisha was also seconde in this category with 141 rebounds for an average of 5.2. Elana led in field goal percentage with 44% on the year followed by Lisha and Kristi Adcock with 43% each. Free throw percentage was led by Shelly Lewis with 68% hitting 13 of

19. Following Shelly was Kristi with 63% making 35 of 56. Lisha led in assist category with 89 followed by Ralynn Key with 84. Lisha also led in steals with 112 followed by Elana with 105. Of the starting five, Kristi had the fewest turnovers for the year with 29. Three seniors will graduate this year, Ralynn Key, Shelly Lewis, and Felicia Romero. Borden will return three juniors, Elvira Balague, Elana Himes, and Kate Phinizy. Seven sophomores will return off the varsity in Kristi Adcock, Kandy Belew, Julie Harris, Amy Lewis, Rachel Romero, Lisha Sternadel, and Randi Woodward. Two more players who not eligible for varsity competition, due to the transfer rule, will be eligible for next year, Mary Ann Garcia, a junior, and Elizabeth Garcia, a sophomore.

Four players received special recognition this year by way of being named to the all-district team. On the first team all-district were Elana Himes, Kate Phinizy, and Lisha Sternadel. Elvira Balaque was named to the honorable mention unit. Below is a list of the girls on the all district team and the season scores.

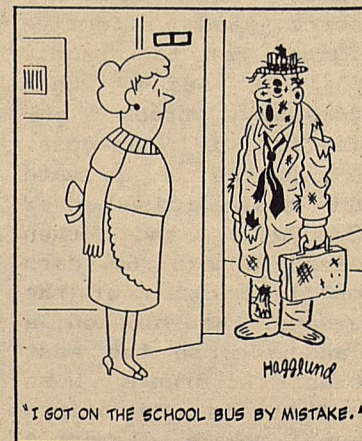

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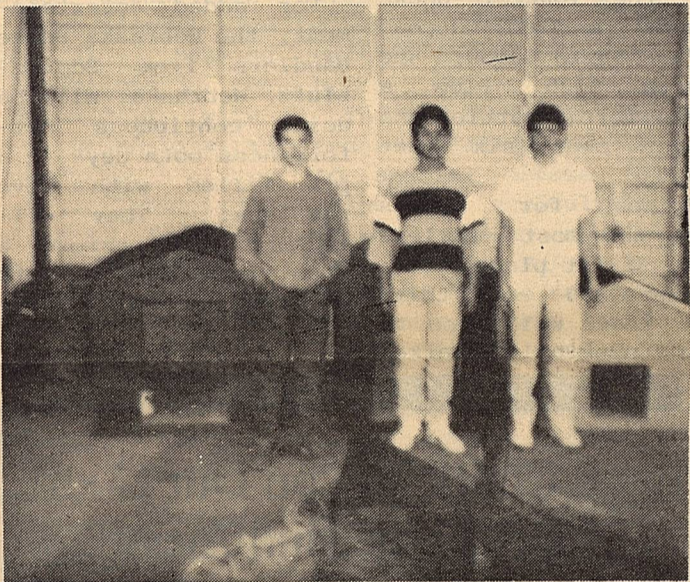

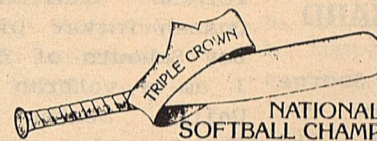

NATIONAL SOFTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

AUGUST 12-13-14-15, 1988
STEAMBOAT SPRINGS, COLORADO

The members of the National Triple Crown Softball Selection Committee announced today January 1, 1988, their selection of Big Spring, Texas as the site for the first leg of the W. Texas Triple Crown to be held on May 28, 29, 30, 1988. The tournament is part of the acclaimed National Triple Crown Sowpitch Softball Series.

Triple Crown President Dave King, stated the selection of Big Spring as a site for the 80 - 140 team tournament was due to the efforts of the local Chamber, Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Recreation Department, plus the desirable location of the community for teams around the state, region and nation.

The National Triple Crown Softball Series is designed for three separate tournaments to be held in each of 12 states from Florida to Washington. Each tournament is comprised

of six separate divisions: three mens', two womens' and one coed division. Leg one will be run in each of the 12 Triple Crowns on Memorial Weekend, May 28-30 with legs two and three to follow in June and July. The three separate tournaments in each Triple Crown state are combined in one scoring system. The top point-getters in each division (six in each Triple Crown state equalling 72 total teams) will advance to the National Triple Crown Finals to be played in Steamboat Springs, Colorado August 12, 13, 14, and 15, 1988. The trip includes a travel package valued at \$3,500 for each winning team.

Big Spring will be marketed state, region and nationwide to bring in 80 - 140 teams and 3,000 - 5,000 people to compete for the W. Texas Triple Crown title and a berth to the Finals.

I am presently serving as Judge of the 106th Judicial District which is composed of Dawson, Gaines, Garza and Lynn counties and have served as judge for 17 years. I have also served as district attorney and county attorney in addition to private practice of

Active in both civic and legal fields, I am presently serving on the Board of Directors of the Texas Center for the Judiciary a member of the College of the State Bar of Texas, a Fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation, a member of Lamesa Noon Lions, a former Director of the Lamesa Boys Club and former Chairman of Quanah Parker District, Boy Schouts of America. I am a veteran of the United States Marine Corps, and a deacon in the First Baptist Church of Lamesa. I was born in Gorman, Eastland County, Texas, and my wife, Melba, and I reside in Lamesa, and have four sons and two grandchildren.

Since 60% of the cases being considered on appeal by the 11th Court of Appeals are criminal cases, I believe my extensive experience trying criminal cases as well as 17 years as District Judge presiding over the trial of hundreds of both criminal and civil cases uniquely qualifies me for promotion to the 11th Court of Appeals.

WE'RE FIGHTING FOR YOUR LIFE

The 27th Annual Waurika "Fang-tastic" Rattlesnake Hunt sponsored by Waurika Volunteer Fire Dept. and Jaycees is scheduled for March 26-27 with activities begin both days at 8:00 a.m.

The popular event annually draws thousands of hunters and spectators from all over the United States.

One of the most popular events, besides catching a live rattlesnake, is the snake sacking contest. Professionals and amateurs can enter the event. In the contest, three rattlesnakes are released and the contestant, using a hook to capture them, puts them one by one into a sack. Once pinned with the hook, the snake is placed in the sack by hand. The contestant with the fastest time wins. The event is held both days. Professional sackers win \$50 each day for best time and an added \$50 for best two day time. The

amateur receives a plaque for the best two day time.

A registration fee of \$2 per hunter is required to hunt the fanged rattlers. This fee is good for both days. Registration opens at 8 a.m. each day. Catchers and sacks are available to rent or sell while supplies last. The longest snake captured will be auctioned and trophies will be awarded Sunday evening.

Trophies or cash will be given for rattlesnakes entered for the contest divisions. First place prize money for the longest snake caught is \$200; second \$175; third \$150; and fourth \$125. Plus a bonus for a rattlesnake caught over six feet long.

Prizes for snakes with the most rattlers are first place \$75; second \$50 and third \$25. There will also be four specially marked

snakes released in the hunt area and will bring \$25 each if captured.

First, second, and third place trophies will be awarded for the shortest snake caught. The longest snake entered by a first time hunter will receive a trophy each day. All rattlesnakes entered for prizes must be live at time of contest and all snakes entered become the property of Waurika Rattlesnake Hunt. All live rattlesnakes turned in will be purchased for top market prices.

No gas or firearms are allowed in the hunt areas, and hunting will be done in the specified areas.

For added entertainment, the Nebraska Snake Handlers from Scottsbluff, Nebraska, will be doing continuous performances both days in a pit filled with live rattlers. They will lecture and perform a stunt show that is both exciting and cour-

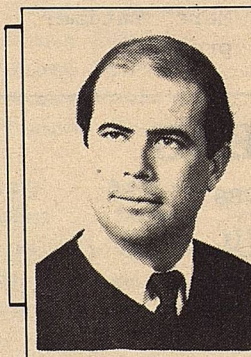

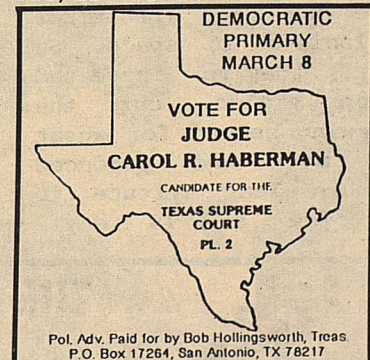

PROGRAM SET ON LOWERING ESTATE TAXES

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of their high estate taxes, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning several educational programs.

A two-day seminar is planned for Amarillo, March 28-29, 1988, which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension Economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law."

The seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions, expenses and tax rates.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be of even greater benefit than just thinking about an estate plan. In fact, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial

farm and ranch businesses.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly. This is a most important subject when there is a farm or ranch in the family and only part of the heirs want to run it.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

The second day of the program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

"Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes," points out Hayenga. "This process should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-saving actions, when you have minor children, and when your children marry or divorce."

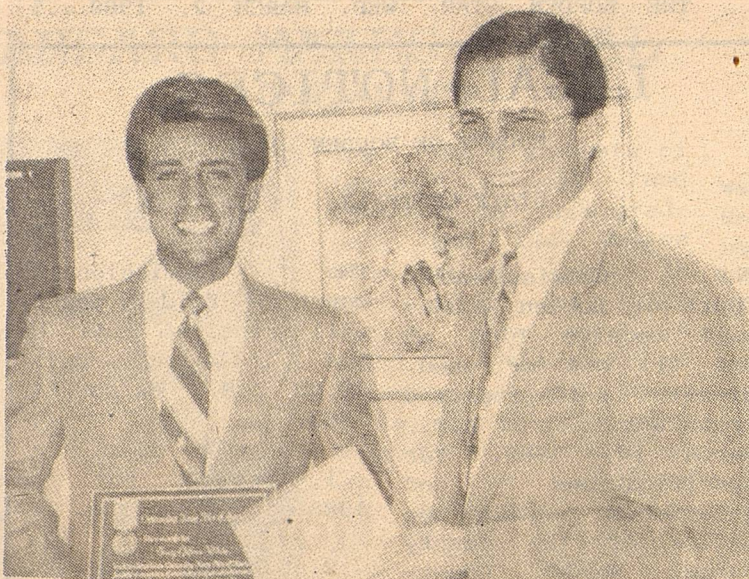

HEART HELPER RECIPES Cheese Twists

2 TBL. sodium free, reduced calorie (Weight Watchers) margarine, softened
1 cup shredded Weight Watchers mozzarella cheese or cheddar cheese
1 1/2 cups unbleached or whole wheat flour
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/8 tsp. ground red pepper
1/2 cup skim milk
Vegetable cooking spray

Combine margarine and cheese in a large bowl; add flour, salt, pepper, and red pepper, mixing well. Gradually add milk, stirring with a fork to form a soft dough.

Turn dough out into a lightly floured surface, and roll into a 16x17 inch rectangle (about 1/4 inch thick). Cut into 7x1/2-inch strips; twist strips several times, and arrange on baking sheets coated with cooking spray. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 300° and continue baking 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove to wire racks to cool. Yield 32 appetizers. Serving size: 1 straw (41 calories each).

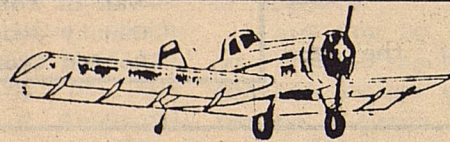

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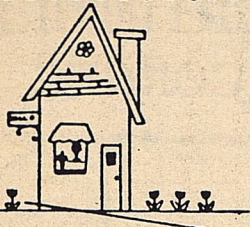

WORKSHOP TO TRAIN CHILD CARE PROVIDERS

Current trends in employment and family lifestyles are placing new emphasis on the need for reliable responsible and well-trained persons to provide child care outside the home in rural as well as urban communities.

When the Texas Agricultural Extension Service conducted an intensive survey of each county in 1986 to determine what the citizens consider critical issues facing the people, adequate child care was a common concern across the state.

"Not only single-parent households, but families in which both parents are employed have to rely more and more on child care provided

outside the home." Licensed child care facilities are requested by the Texas Department of Human Services and visited on a regular basis to insure that standards are met. Annual training is required for the directors and staff members of licensed facilities.

Persons who care for a few children in their home may be registered with TDHS. They provide self-certification that certain standards are met, but are visited by TDHS only if there is a complaint about the child care.

To help operators of both licensed and registered child care facilities across the South Plains

provide the best possible care and strengthen their businesses, District 2 Extension home economists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will provide a one-day workshop in Lubbock on March 26.

Training will include questions and answers on licensing and practical sessions on marketing your business, scheduling a child's day, arts and crafts for children, resources to make the job easier, record keeping, discipline, communication and conflict management, cooking with kids, looking great and feeling terrific, and the balance of keeping kids in your home. A refresher course on cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) also will be offered.

Instruction will be provided by Extension home economists, staff members of TDHS, Texas Tech University health Sciences Center, South Plains Association for the Education of Young Children and several experienced child care providers.

The training will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center just north of Lubbock International Airport. The center is on FM 1294 just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit. The program will be from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m.

Early registration, costing \$7.50, must be made by March 10. The registration fee includes lunch. If you are interested in attending this workshop, contact Debra Pollard at (915)856-4336 or come by the Borden County Extension Office located in the Museum Building.

TAPS Offers \$1,270,000 in Scholarships to Graduating High School Seniors

The 1988 Texas Association of Private Schools (TAPS) Scholarship Program is officially underway. Over \$1,270,000 in scholarships will be awarded to 1988 graduating high school seniors in Texas.

Scholarships are offered in 46 vocational/technical career fields, including computer programming, cosmetology, accounting, drafting, medical and dental assisting, radio announcing, welding, court reporting, and many others. 294 scholarships are available, with values ranging from \$495 to \$12,450. Scholarship program information has been mailed to counselors at all Texas high schools. To apply for a TAPS scholarship, students should submit 1) two letters of recommendation, 2) their academic record to date and 3) an original 250-word essay detailing their career objectives and goals in the career field they have chosen. Applicants may request information from their high school counselor or they may contact the TAPS Office at: P. O. Box 13481, Austin, Texas 78711, (512) 444-8463. Application deadline is March 15, 1988.

able to provide those skills in a relatively short time so that a student who cannot afford or who does not choose to pursue a four-year degree may obtain a challenging position and be a productive member of society.

The Texas Association of Private Schools, a non-profit organization representing proprietary vocational/technical schools, is dedicated to assisting people to attain education and marketable skills in their community.

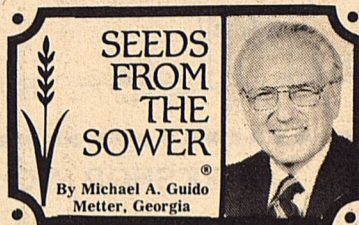
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SCRIPTURE CORNER
