LAW TO AFFECT **YOUNG HUNTERS** Texas hunters born between Sept.

2, 1972, and Aug. 31, 1973, must carry a hunter safety certificate when hunting or be accompanied by an adult, beginning Sept. 1. The mandatory hunter education law was passed by the 1987 legislature. Texas Parks and Wildlife expects the new law's phase-in schedule will affect about 20,000 young hunters this year.

Clean celery and fill with peanut butter (try adding coconut flakes, raisins or nuts to the peanut butter) or cream cheese mixed with raisins. To keep unfilled celery at its crispiest, store in refridgerator in a jar or plastic container with a few inches of water in the bottom.

For trees that look to be in poor health, two cups should be added.

Higher rates than suggested could those cause freeze damages but the correct amount time at the right wi11 the trees make look healthier and bloom better next spring.

The federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) already is showing both benefits. on and off the farm. By reducing erosion it also cropland, on sedimenis reducing tation in waterways.

nation. Across the 30.6 million acres of already cropland been contracted have into the program. This will reduce erosion by nearly 610 million tons of soil a year.

In Texas, erosion has been reduced by about 132 million tons on 3.7 million acres contracted into CRP.

When conservation practices are installed 30.6 million on the CRP, it is acres in estimated that total cropland erosion on wi11 be reduced by about a fifth. Nationaverage wide, the soil loss on land in the program wi11 drop from 21.5 tons an acre to an estimated 1.6 tons an acre after permanent vegetation is established.

Chevron U.S.A. Inc., P. O. Box 1150, Midland, Texas 79702, has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to inject fluid into a formation which is productive of oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to inject fluid into the Pennsylvanian formation, T. L. Griffin 6B Lease, Well Number 15. The proposed injection well is located 5 miles northwest of Vincent in the Hobo (Penn) Field, Borden County. Fluid will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from \pm 7120 to \pm 7350 feet.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Chapter 27 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, Title 3 of the Natural Resources Code, as amended, and the Statewide Rules of the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Inal district attorneys." **PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT** House Joint Resolution 32 pro-poses a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature, by general law, to permit charitable raffles conducted by qualified non-profit organizations. The amend-ment would require that the raffles be conducted, promoted, and admin-istered only by members of the quali-fied nonprofit organizations and that the proceeds from the sale of raffle tickets must be spent for the charitable purposes of the organiza-tions.

tions. The proposed amendment will ap-near on the ballot as follows: ear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to per-mit and regulate raffles conducted by certain nenprofit organizations for charitable purposes."

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PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 44 pro-poses a constitutional amendment that would repeal subsection (e) of Article III, Section 50-d of the con-stitution, Article III, Section 50-d currently allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conserva-Texas agricultural water conserva

tion bonds in an amount not to ex-ceed \$200 million, if two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature approve. Under subsec-tion (e), this authority will expire in November, 1989. Repeal of sub-section (c) by passage of this amendment would continue in effect the authority to issue and sell the bonds.

bonds. The proposed amendment will ap-pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate certain time limitations relating to the issuance of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

bonds." **PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT** Senate Joint Resolution 59 pro-poses a constitutional amendment that would allow local governments to invest their funds as authorized by the legislature. Currently, the constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individ-ual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company prevents local governments from making some kinds of investments. This preposed amendment would al-low local governments to make any investments authorized by the legis-lature. lature

lature. The proposed amendment will ap-pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize local governments to in-vest their funds as provided by law."
