

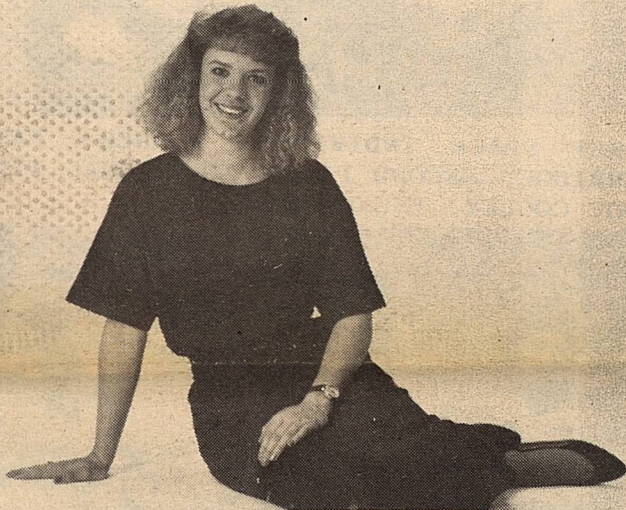

STUDENT RECEIVES 1990 SPRING LITERARY MEET SCHOLARSHIP

Kristi Adcock of Borden County has been selected the 1990 recipient of the \$1,000 Wal-Mart Foundation Community Scholarship, according to Mike Sherry, Wal-Mart store manager in Lamesa. The scholarship is awarded each spring by Wal-Mart to an area college or university bound high school student and is payable over a one year period.

Kristi, daughter of Randy and Verna Adcock, is a senior at Borden County High School in Gail. She plans to attend Angelo State University in San Angelo this fall.

In making the announcement, Sherry said, "It is with great pleasure that we announce Kristi Adcock as the winner of this year's scholarship. It was a difficult decision for our team of

well-qualified, local judges who had to select from many outstanding students."

Sherry said selection of the scholarship recipient is based primarily on academic performance, involvement in the school and community, and financial need. Kristi has been active in sports band, and club events at Borden County High School.

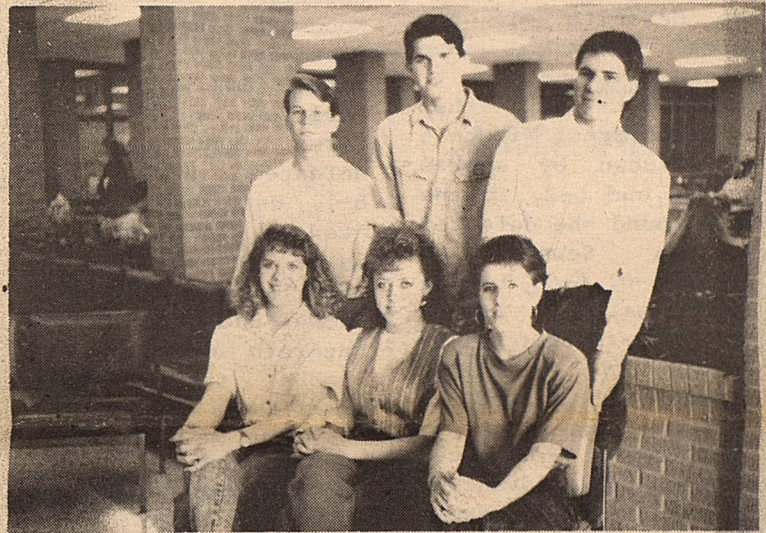
Scholarship alternates by the panel are: Amy Lewis of Borden County High School, first alternate; and Steve Teal of Lamesa High School, second alternate.

The Lamesa Wal-Mart Foundation Community Scholarship is one of over 1,300 scholarships totalling \$1.3 million being given throughout the retail chain's 17 state, 1,325 store trade territory.

With eight first place finishes, Borden High School literary students finished with a strong third place showing in U.I.L. competition March 26-30. Students competed in various events at O'Donnell, Gail, and Loop.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

We are a wildlife group promoting abundant useful wildlife over predators. The predator is to wildlife what the weed is to the garden and farmer, a predator that, if not controlled, takes over! We need wild game and predator facts from your readers who would write us about the wildlife situation in your area, especially farmers, ranchers and hunters and those who like to see wild game.

Questions are: has the hunting and wild game declined or increased over the last 25 years in your area? How about predators, skunks, crows,

fox, coyotes, coon, wolves, mountain lions, eagles, magpies, etc. Have they increased and has it effected your abundance of game? Example: South Dakota 20 years ago was estimated to have 32 million pheasants and called the Pheasant Capital of the World. Today they estimate one and one-half million. Monitoring of 82 pheasant nests by game officials, showed predators prevented pheasant production from the entire 82 nests!

Over Wyoming ranch deer hunting is down 90% due to coyote predation on deer fawn. We're seeking a picture of game and

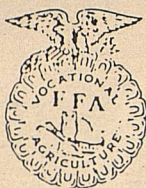
predator abundance or disappearance in North America.

You may ask why not go just to the wild game experts, biologists and game wardens? We would but many are silenced by their superiors and all that can be obtained is a formal statement, saying virtually nothing. We can give many examples of this.

In cooperation with Common Man Institute which has spent over 3 years extensively researching wolf history, we discovered a tremendous game and bird predator problem in many areas. Hunting is down as much as 90%.

GIRLS DOMINATE LEVELLAND TOURNAMENT

It took two weekends and two different sites, but Borden County captured top honors in the Levelland South Plains Tennis Association Tournament. Schools in the South Plains met last weekend in Levelland to start the large field tournament. Due to cold wind and snow, the tourney was postponed to this past weekend and moved to Hart.

Amanda Anderson won the singles division by way of two wins and two defaults. In the First Round, she received a bye due to seeding. She then defeated Mysti Mitchell of Sundown by scores of 6-0 and 6-2. In the next round she defeated Melissa Sewell of Spade 6-0, 6-0. SIGN-UP DEAD LINES

1990 Farm Program (04-13-90)

April 13, 1990 is the final date to sign into the 1990 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP). A farm not signed into the 1990 ARP by April 13th will be rendered ineligible for Deficiency and Price Support Programs.

1990 PERSON DETERMINATION (4-13-90)

April 13, 1990 is also the date used to determine if an individual or entity qualifies as a 'person' for payment purposes. For instance if some individual(s) were interested in forming a Corporation the final date to have everything in order, (charter, tax number, etc.), is April 13, 1990. If a Corporation, Limited partnership, Trust or any other entity is not organized and functional by April 13, 1990, ASCS will not recognize that entity for 1990 crop year payments. Another instance would be a minor who's birthday falls after April 13th, that individual would be considered a minor for 1990 crop year payments.

LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAM (4-19-90)

The Livestock Feed Program ends April 14

1990. Any 'Feed on Hand' after April 25th is ineligible for cost share, consequently any cost share received for feed that is 'on hand' after April 25, 1990 would need to be refunded.

All feed tickets must be submitted no later than 30 days after the end of the feeding period. that means to be eligible for cost shares feed tickets must be submitted by May 15, 1990.

SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATION DATE (5-1-90)

The final date to certify all small grain, whether it be for grain or cover, is May 1, 1990. This includes all small grain, ACR, CU etc.

HAYING AND GRAZING OF ACR AND CU FOR PAY

The 5 month non grazing period for ACR and CU for pay begins April 1, 1990 and ends August 30, 1990.

If you have small grain you are grazing you should be prepared to pull off by April.

PROVISIONS OF THE 1990 ARP PROGRAM

Just a reminder the 0/92 program is available for grain sorghum and wheat.

If you choose to go into the 0/92 program on grain sorghum you

would be guaranteed a 91¢/bushel deficiency payment on the acres designated as CU for pay. If you chose to go the 0792 route on your wheat you would be guaranteed 90¢/bushel deficiency payment on the acres designated as CU for pay. For more details please contact this office. Please look at this program closely.

There is a 50/92 program available for cotton

This program works similar to the 0/92 program however their is no guaranteed deficiency rate. To be eligible for the 50/92 program you would have to plant at least 50% of your maximum permitted. Again for further details please contact this office.

ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE

A. Maintenance

Program provisions require ACR be adequately protected from wind, and water erosion. ACR must also be kept free of noxious weeds, insect infestation, and rodent infestation.

B. Size and Width Requirements

ACR must:

1. be at least a chain wide at its narrowest point.

2. be at least 5.0 acres.

Exceptions to size and width requirements

are:
1. an acceptable skip row pattern with a consistent skip of 4 normal row widths, each skip at least 160' wide.
2. a whole field
3. the last designated field of ACR (you may have one field less than 5.0 acres).
4. wind strips at least 160" in width and/or blocks required as a result of conservation Compliance (FSA Plan).

C. Land Eligibility

ACR must have been planted to small grains, row crops, or other crops, or other crops planted annually, in two of the last three-years. Almost without exception land designated as ACR will be considered planted in the year designated.

D. Eligibility

1. small grains (wheat, oats, barley, rye,

etc.).

Small grains to be considered as cover must be destroyed or clipped by May 1, 1990, UNLESS you apply to let the small grain stand and pay a \$10 reseed fee. You will need to make application to let your small grain reseed prior to May 1, 1990 otherwise we will consider the small grain as grain for harvest and it could knock you out of the program on your other crops.

2. sudan/haygrazers

Most all types of haygrazers are an approved cover for ACR. As mentioned earlier these acres would be ineligible to hay or graze during the 5 month non grazing period April 1-August 30.
