Asinine events scheduled in Del Rio

DEL RIO—The Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks may not feel so benevolent and protective when they and others face an asinine pack of stubborn mules October 15, 16 and 17 at Val Verde Downs Racetrack, Del Rio, Texas. The Del Rio Elks Club is sponsoring "Dias de las Mulas," an exciting three days of mule racing, country music and fun.

On Friday, October 15, events include "Heading and Heeling," "The Break-away," "The Barrel Race," "Pole Bending" and "Goat Tying." Muleracing, not for the weak-hearted, is serious business for mule lovers from around the Southwest as they compete for trophies and cash prizes up to \$750.

Saturday's events represent three-year-olds and older competing in eleven races, going distances up to 400 yards. Special events at the end of the day are the "Hee Haw" and "Long Ears" races that will test the mettle of all true mule racers. Saturday is also "Military Day." 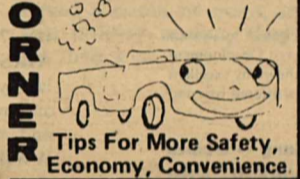
On Sunday, the asinine events start again with more three-year old and older races, and the day's events conclude with the "Bray and Run" and the "Stubborn Sprint." Also,

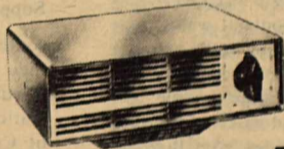

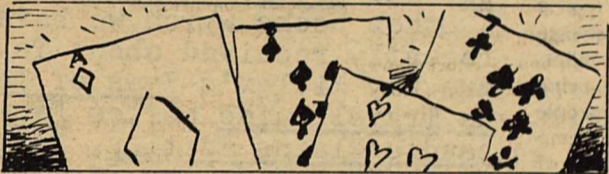


Two Houston-based restaurant owners will be giving the world a very special Christmas gift.

More Jobs And Less Inflation Coming From Nuclear Energy

While many Americans are aware of the energy benefits that can come from increased use of nuclear-generated electricity, not as many are familiar with all of the economic benefits.

For example, a doubling of nuclear-generated electricity—from 13 percent today to nearly 25 percent in 1991—will provide job opportunities for nearly 60,000 people in the next decade. That figure reflects nearly 16,600 newly-created positions, according to a new Atomic Industrial Forum booklet on careers in the nuclear energy field.

The Forum predicts that the greatest growth will be in jobs for skilled craft workers. Demand is already high for workers in the nuclear energy field, and the nuclear energy industry expects to employ 15,500 skilled workers alone—5,000 in new job slots, including many that pay well but don't require a college degree. Another 10,000 vacancies will result from the will retire or leave the industry. Many of these new jobs will be filled by minority workers.

MATCHING CENTER TO AID TOWNS SEEKING DOCTORS

Although some studies have indicated a surplus of medical doctors nationwide, some Texas towns might beg to differ. They still may need physicians.

To help alleviate the problem, the Texas Medical Association will set up a matching center in Houston on Saturday, October 30.

Begun in 1980, the center enables communities, hospitals, clinics and physicians with practice openings to recruit physicians from across the state. The program is aimed at resident physicians--new doctors in the latter stages of formal training.

The matching center will be open from 1 to 4 pm in the Holiday Inn Medical Center. This is about four blocks from the Texas Medical Center, site of major residency programs for the University of Texas Medical School at Houston and Baylor College of Medicine.

Tables will be available for those offering openings, and two representatives from each community facility or group will be allowed. Bulletin boards will list opportunities and physicians by specialty.

TMA representatives will be on hand also to register doctors and opportunities for the separate physician placement service.. It distributes monthly lists of doctors seeking positions and positions available for doctors.

The matching center fee is \$25 for non-TMA member groups with a practice opening. The deadline for registering practice opportunities is Friday, Oct. 15. To register, call Karen Nunn of TMA's resident physician section at 512/477-6704.

WOMEN AND ALCOHOLISM CAMPAIGN

Judge Ruby Kless Sondock of Houston, first woman justice of the Texas Supreme Court, will inaugurate a statewide alcohol abuse prevention campaign targeted at women at 10 am September 29 at the Speaker's Committee Room in the State Capitol.

The campaign by the Texas Commission on Alcoholism is part of a nationwide prevention effort by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism. Other components have included prevention

of youth alcohol abuse and of fetal alcohol syndrome. Psychologist Joyce Brothers chairs the national effort.

The kickoff September 29 will feature public service announcements to be broadcast as part of the cam-

paign.

"Women are estimated to be one-third of the nation's problem drinkers," said Ross Newby, TCA executive director. "a majority of emergency room patients abusing combinations of alcohol and other drugs are women. Yet, in proportion, women are less likely to enter alcoholism treatment programs. These facts compel us to make a special prevention effort for this group.

Tighter controls Established on Food stamp abuse

AUSTIN—Measures designed to tighten control over abuses in the food stamp program have been announced by Marlin W. Johnston, commissioner of the Department of Human Resources, which administers the program in Texas.

Johnston said food stamp recipients in Texas have been instructed to sign each book of food stamps as soon as it is received so that no one else can use the stamps, and to have their food stamp ID card with them and be prepared to show it to their grocer whenever buying food with food stamps.

In addition, the department has redesigned the food stamp ID cards using special serial numbers and a new code to verify that the authorized family representative or family member is the only user of the card. All food stamp recipients will have the new cards by Nov. 1.

In the past, Johnston said, the agency had limited controls over how many ID cards were issued to a family, since

a family member or its authorized representative could claim to have forgotten or lost an ID card, and obtain new cards. This facilitated some program abuse through duplicate participation, Johnston said.

The coding of the card is an innovation developed in Texas as an alternative to a more costly federal proposal that all food stamp ID cards carry the photograph of the participating family member or its authorized representative.

Johnston said 390,300 Texas households receive food stamps in a typical month with the average monthly food stamp allotment per household being \$135. There are three people in the average food stamp household, with 61 percent of the recipients being children.

Audits and investigations conducted routinely by the department indicate a 1.8 percent fraud rate in the program, Johnston said. Food stamp allotments per month in Texas total about \$53 million.

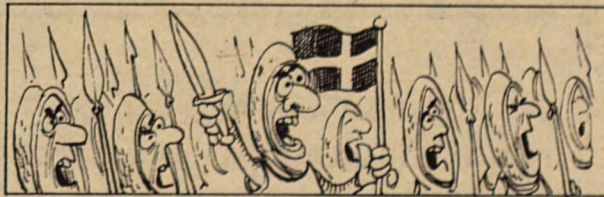

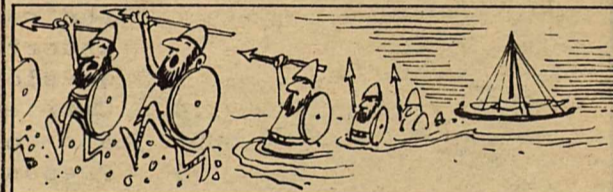
