

A NEGLECTED DUTY. Government requires those who erjoy its benefits, also to bear its burdens.

A citizen of any country is requirau to hear arms and if need be to give up life i self in its defence in case of foreign invasion. No one should consider himself entitled to all the advantages and blessings of his government and country unless he is willing to shoulder its obligations and bear the burdens it imposes. One of the most important, duties which every male citizen between the ages of 18 and 45 years is required to perfom, is that of working the public roads of his district for 5 days if necessary, each year. Road work is imposed as a personal tax, but it is treated by most people as a mere matter of form, and they seem to think it right to treat it as such, when in fact, honesty and fair dealing require that it should be as faithfully discharged as if it were a money tax. If from the organi-



zation of the county, our roads had been thuroughly and system. attically worked, they would now be a credit and a blessing to the people of Borden County.

Borden was organized 16 years ugo, a sufficient length of time for good smooth roads to have been made clear of stumps, mesquite brush, dog holes and rough places. The law defines a first class road to be 60 feet wide, smooth and clear of obstructions Has Borden County such a road? There is womething radically wrong in our road management and the sconer we find it out and correct it, the better it will be for the county.

Gail needs a combined cotton gin and flour and grist mill. Of course such a plant would cost a couple or three thousand dollars to build, but only think of the vast sums we send out of the county each year to buy cottonseed and breadstuffs beside the time lost in hauling cotton so far in the seed.
