



state of Texas must re-register their brands before Feb. 29, 1972, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature.

The law states that all brands and marks on Texas livestock should be re-recorded with county clerks and this to include the location of these marks on the animal. After the end of the six-month period, any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a first-come basis.

The law also states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each county clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their iperations are extensive.

The owner currently using the mark and brand shall have the right to file it between the date of Ausugt 30th, 1971 and the date of Feb. 29, 1972. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to bave the brand and mark recorded in his name.

The law states further that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the

Brands Must Be Recorded All livestock producers in the brand with the county clerk in

the county in which the livestock are held. Also, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands aremet. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, but hey must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law

The county clerk is to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each pounty. Therefore, no two people n a county may record the same orand in the same location.

The law as outlined above applies to all counties in the tate of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording of brands.








SHERIFF POSSE HOLDS MEETING

An automobile trip across this than look at bra-less females wonders in restoring one's proper perspective. My husband and I have recently returned from a 3600 mile trip. We made a loop from Texas to Chicago, to western Pennsylvania, down to Kentucky, across to Arkansas and home to Texas.

Such a lovely time of year to drive through the bread basket of the world. And truly the corn is "as high as an elephant's eye." I believe the corn blight fright of a year ago was exaggerated or has since been brought under control. The harvest season was just beginning as we went along. The fields of pumpkins put us in the mood for football games and fires in the fireplace. In Pennsylvania, the tomatoes were at their peak - and the sweet corn, was still available. I tell you one thing, those Yankees eat good. We bought blueberries in Indiana at the largest blueberry plantation in America. I had always thought all blueberries grew on small, low bushes as they do in Maine. Not so - the cultivated blueberry grows on a "tree - a quite large bush about eight feet high which has been pruned up to tree shape.

While on the subject of food, let me tell you about the Marko Sandwich I had in Shelbyville, Kentucky. Talk about soul food, this was the best. The sandwich was several pieces of thinly sliced roast beef (well done in this case) placed on top of hot water cornbread patties and covered with good brown gravy. This was served with cole slaw. Try it.

Ecology seems to be on everyone's mind these days. At least the mass media is swamping us with ecological data. I was struck by several observations while on this trip which were ecologically related. You remember a few years back we were asked to "keep America beautiful"? There was a big campaign to clean up the highways and byways. All in all I think the campaign was a success. The Interstates and Expressways are truly beautiful roadways. Even the side roads have improved. You don't see litter, dump grounds, seas of billboards, as you used to. But unfortunately these blights have been replaced with living, breathing blights in the form of hippie hitch hikers. Route 66 the length of Illinois was dotted with them. They travel in pairs boy-girl pairs, mind you. I would much rather read the billboards

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lovely country of ours does and their long haired creature companions who adorn the highways.

And I was struck with the incongruity of the young. I have been told we don't have any air to breath if we don't give up our automobiles and take to bicycles or at least small cars. We are all surely going to choke to death from the fumes of our luxury cars. Well what do we see sputtering past on the highways? Vans, worn out city buses, old school buses, pickups. Those hippies who aren't thumbing it are driving the most offensive polluters on the roads. They rattle by surrounded by a haze of black fumes - some ecology.

And haven't you been told that we won't have but three square feet per person in a matter of say fifty years. That if we don't stop the population explosion that we will all starve to death. Well, one thing struck me, there is still a lot of uninhabited land in this great country. We drove the entire width of Kentucky and scarcely came upon a set-tlement. What a beautiful state to drive through. I wondered if maybe one reason that state and parts of our own West Texas are still comparatively unsettled is that it requires a good deal of hard work to live off the land. And there are few welfare offices close by.

"But mother, you know Lake Erie is dead!" Well, I'm here to tell you it "ain't." We swam in Lake Erie twice a day for a week. Some days it was crystal clear. When it wasn't clear, it was just sandy from the undertow pulling up sand from the beach. There were no dead fish, the fishing boats are again on the lake every day by the score. There was no gooky stuff that had truly plagued the area.

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Grant you, eight years ago I wouldn't have washed my feet in the lake. But industry in that area has pitched in and really done a masterful job in halting a serious situation. You don't hear much about it. Maybe because it was done with private funds and the government didn't "have" to go in and spend your money in an attempt to save the lake.

No, I'm not so worried about our country now. I am breathing more freely, eating more heartily and driving a big car that is in good repair with less guilt. We can still build the better mouse trap in this country and I believe we have enough food produced to go around. There is less since I made this trip but there is still a bounty.

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The Pep Squad had a bake sale Saturday. Girls sold at Big Spring, Lamesa, and Ackerly. Pies, cakes, and brownies were sold.


Booster Club

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Lunch **Policy Set**

BORDEN Co. I.S.D. today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for Borden County school children unable to pay the full price.

Local School Officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from

unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income andnumber of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school Lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the Authorized Lunchroom Representative will applications and review determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. James McLeroy, Supt., whose address is Box 95, Gail, Texas 79738 has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of our discrimination against any unable to pay the rull cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

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
