

Clean Ideas: RX for Winter Wear

we have had the past month, you may find the area near your doorway starting to pile up with all that winter gear. Here are a few tips for cleaning and organizing coats, scarves, gloves and boots.

Take inventory: Do you really need all those scarves and gloves? Are there orphan mittens that need to be separated from the pack? Set them aside and if their mates don't show up by the end of the season, toss them away. Hint: if you have children, visit the lostand-found box at their school. You may be astounded at what you find! Be sure to write your child's name on tags to help them keep up with them.

Get a peg up: Getting kids to hang their coats in the closet can be a losing battle. Plus, you don't want wet coats crammed in next to dry ones. Pegs are easy for everyone to use and provide space for garments to air out and thoroughly dry. Be sure some of the pegs are installed at child-friendly heights.

Divide and conquer: Do everyone's winter accessories get all jumbled together? How about some canvas bags, one for each family member and clearly labeled with his/her name? Hang the bags on pegs. If they're wet, hats and scarves can hang on the peg until dry; then it's into their owner's bag. Mittens and gloves too!

Bin there: Bins and baskets are another way to store gloves, scarves and hats. People are more likely to use them if there's no lid to open and close. Clear plastic bins or wire baskets let you easily see what's inside, particularly useful when you have to grab

and go!

Clean up: Hats, mittens and scarves should be washed frequently during the season. and follow manufacturer's instructions on

With the cold weather snaps the care labels. If the care labels have disappeared (as frequently happens on mittens), machine wash in cold water on

the gentle cycle and line dry.

Coat check: For coats and jackets, a mid-season cleaning is a good idea, even if you can't see the dirt. Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions on the care labels. "Dry clean only" garments go to the drycleaners. For washable garments, check the pockets, zip the zippers and close the hookand-loop fasteners so they don't catch bits of lint and thread during laundering, or snag other fabrica.

Boot camp: A boot scraper by the door prevents dirt and grime from being tracked inside. A boot tray (or new cat litter box) is a good way to give wet boots a place to dry without having water puddle up the

Southern Mesa Ag Conference Set for January 19



Bi-Centennial Memorial Park Meeting

consisting of Kent Holmes, Kenny Hensley, Pat Murphy, Wanda Smith and Dennis Poole met on December 21, 2009 at the county courthouse.

The primary purpose of the meeting was to discuss the special warranty deed concerning the land that the current Bi-Centennial Park and 4-H Trap and Skeet shooting range are located on at the present time.

The school had requested that the committee consider allowing the school to re-lo-cate the Bi-Centennial Park to the south side of existing school where (older) tennis courts are located and practice field adjoins. This would facilitate the school with the new construction of our future school to be built in a manner to more efficient place new buildings, work area, and ac-

Clayton family awarded the park committee with this land for construction of the park to assist in providing a place for families and friend to meet and also an area for 4-H Trap and Skeet members to learn safe and acceptable gun safety for recreation and competitive junior events.

In consideration of this request the park committee would return the warranty deed back to its original owners or heirs and the school would revisit these original owners/ heirs to secure the land for a site to assist with the new school construction.

After much discussion and concern for the request and relocation of the park and shooting range the following stipulations and agreement were drawn up and agreed upon by the committee:

The BCISD agrees to the following stipulations pertaining to the re-construction and re-location of the BCBCMP

and the shooting sports range.

1. The Borden County BC Memorial Park will be relocated to the practice field owned by the BCISD located immediately south of the existing school building.

BCISD agrees to remove the (old) tennis courts which are not in use at the present time and to restore this

rounding area.
3. BCISD agrees, at its sole cost and expense, to relocate the pavilion and to reloof four (4) covered picnic areas with picnic tables and seating; to install water fountains, to re-locate the Bi-Centennial Monument and to re-locate, construct or make suitable restrooms available.

All park facilities will be painted and constructed in at least the same condition (if not better) than when originally constructed.

The BCISD will maintain the park and park facili-

The Bi-Centennial 2010. Park committee will remain intact and will be included in or consulted on any and all changes, additions or deletions to any present or future stipulations pertaining to the Bi-

Centennial Park.
7. The 4-H Trap and Skeet range will be relocated to property recently purchased by BCISD form Kayla Key Moreland just off of Willow Valley Road, East of Gail, Tx.

8. The range shall be constructed in strict compliance with ATA and NSSA Range guidelines and rules.

The high and low house skeet machines and two trap machines shall be housed in all metal (interior and exterior) construction.

Sieb's Flatwood Sorghum

Mike Siebert makes syrup to get the old mill in running on the family farm near order. That was the start of our Flatwood, just out of Eastland. "My grandfather made a living here with two mules and a walking plow," says Mike. He farmed cotton in the early

Mike was the district attor-ney in Eastland before taking up syrup making. "It's just something I enjoy doing. I'll have to admit making syrup is kind of an unusual hobby.

It's something he tried years ago. "I bought a syrup mill from a gentleman in Carbon probably thirty years ago and tried to make syrup then, but we ended up with what I call green glue. The mill sat un-used because I was busy raising a family and trying to make a living like most people. After I retired I got to thinking about it and decided to try it

Mike says syrup making in the past was a big part of coun-

try living. "Somebody in all these little communities scattered around had a sorghum mill. Families would harvest cane in the fall, then gather at the home of the person who had the mill. They'd make syrup for the next year. It was a social gathering, a social event and at the same time allowed them to have some sweetening for their families for the coming year. Sugar was expensive and some people couldn't afford it."

He makes syrup from sweet sorghum cane. He planted his first batch in 2007. "That year we had 55 inches of rain, which was unheard of. It took off and it was unbelievable. We had

Mike strips the cane and runs it through a press that squeezes out the juice. He strains the juice then cooks it in a 60-gallon vat over propane burners. The cooking evaporates the water that's contained in the juice. "The total time that it's boiling, you have to constantly skim the impurities off of the top. It's nice to have some friends and neighbors over to help with the skim-

One of Mike's friends made a video of the syrup making process and put it on utube (search for Flatwood sorghum syrup making). Mike labels his product Sieb's Flatwood Sorghum. He gives most of his syrup to friends.

Mike not only grows cane. He also grows a corn patch every year. He picks it the old fashioned way, by hand. He also cleans it by hand, sitting under a shade tree with his pocketknife. Once he gets all the bad kernels out, he shells it in an old John Deere corn sheller. He makes corn meal and gives it to his friends and family. "It makes outstanding cornbread. And being a country boy, cornbread and syrup or cornbread and gravy with blackeyed peas is pretty hard to beat.

The rural life appeals to Mike. He has a barn full of horse buggies and wagons. He's thinking about getting them in shape to be in parades. He hasn't had time to miss the
