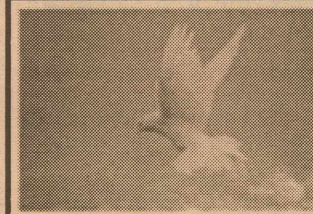

Coyotes Battle But Fall to Another Ranked Opponent

The Borden County Coyotes traveled to Rankin Friday to play their third straight top ten team of the Season, playing the 6th Ranked Rankin Red Devils. The Red Devils took the ball to start the game and marched methodically down the field for a score for the home team and a early 6-0 lead. The Coyotes seemed poised to answer driving inside the Red Devil 20 yard line only to have a sack and a penalty move the ball back before missing a wide open receiver in the end zone on 4th down. This forced the visitors to turn the ball over on downs. The Coyotes would lose Hunter Jones on the play to a sprained ankle and he would not return to the game. The home town Red devils extended their lead to 14-0 with 3:12 left in the 1st quarter. Corbin Sumners answered for the Coyotes racing 79 yards to pay dirt with 2:55 left in the opening frame. Riley Herridge added the extra point kick to make the score 14-8. The Red Devils quickly answered with 1:06 left in the first to push the lead back to 22-8. Sumners and the Coyotes answered as Corbin followed some nice blocks by Thomas Harrison, Herridge, Tristen Benavidez, Michael Deax and Frank Banman to reach pay dirt 54 yards out. Herridge added the extra point to cut the lead to 22 to 16 with :47 left in the first.

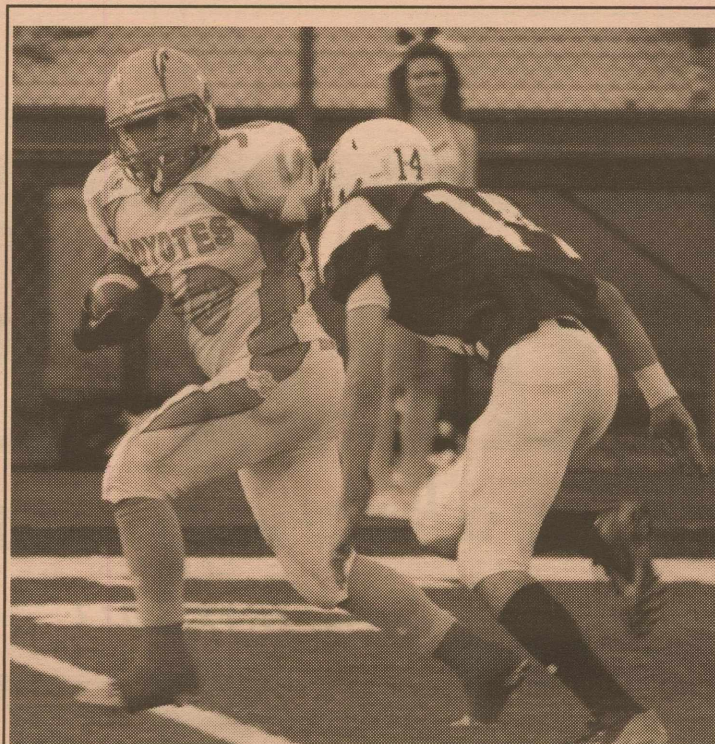
Rankin answered on their first drive of the second quarter, with another scoring run to extend the lead to 28 to 16. On the next Borden County drive, the visitors went to the air for their connection as Harrison hit Benavidez on a beautiful pass and great catch to cut the lead to 28 to 22 with 7:01 left in the 2nd quarter. The Coyote defense got their first turnover of the game with 5:30 left in the half, giving the visitors an opportunity to take their first lead, but an errant pass by the Coyotes was intercepted by the home team and moments later

the Red Devils pushed their lead back up to 36 to 22. Borden County again seemed poised to answer the Red Devils, driving inside the 15 yard line only to have a huge penalty slow the drive, followed by a pass that just missed the outstretched of Benavidez on what appeared to be a touchdown. Unfortunately for the Coyotes, the Red Devils answered and extended their lead to 33 to 22 with just over 3 minutes left.

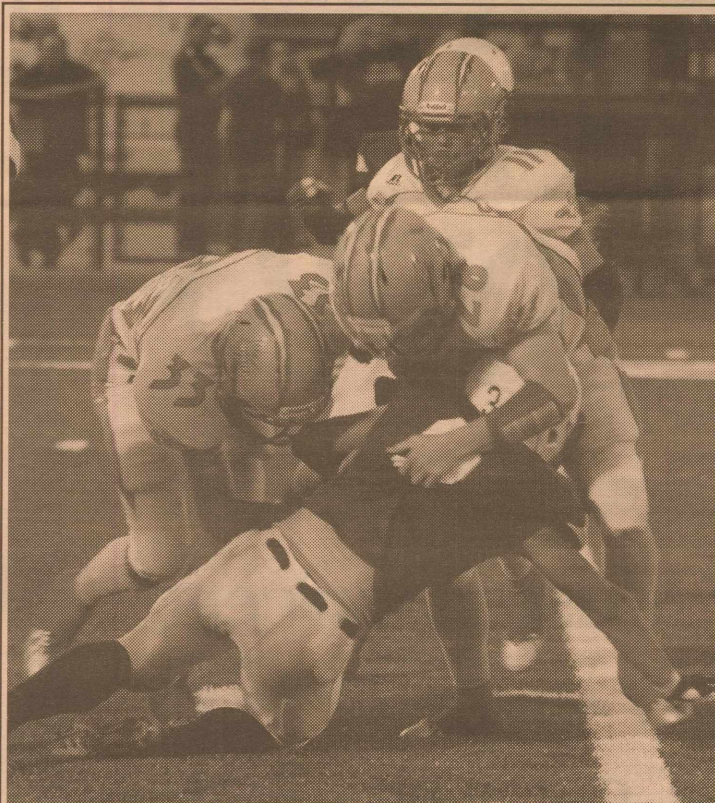
On the Coyotes next offensive series, another penalty pushed them deep into their territory and then the Coyotes lost Thomas Harrison to an apparent concussion on a sack by the Red Devils. Borden County just missed again on a huge pass play only to give the Red Devils another scoring opportunity before half and that is just what the home team did, pushing the lead to 50 to 22. As a result, just when it looked as though the Coyotes were going to give the #6 ranked team all they could handle, a couple of miscues and missed opportunities coupled with two key injuries, the Coyotes found themselves down 28 points at half.

On the first drive of the 2nd half, it again appeared that the Coyotes were about to add to their point total when a fumble gave the Red Devils the ball again and they wasted little time extending the lead to 58 to 22. The Coyotes still were not phased and they drove down the field and yet again seemed poised to answer, but as was the case most of the night, a huge penalty wiped out a long run and then on back to back plays Borden County just missed on pass plays, one of which would have been a touchdown that was just out of the reach of Sumners. The Borden County defense got their first defensive stop of the day inside their 2 yard line, but a Coyote fumble would give

Pups Pound the Red Devils in Season Opener

The Borden County Pups opened the 2013 football season with a convincing victory over the visiting Rankin Red Devils. The Pups started out slowly getting stopped on their first offensive possession, but things began to roll after that as the Pups managed 57 points on the day.

Nick Proulx followed some nice blocks from center Braxton Barnes, ends Ryan Wilborn and Clayton Addison and Fullback Brian Torres and Quarterback Morgan Wilson en route to a 61 scoring sprint. Wilson hit Wilborn with a pass for the extra point to give the Pups a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the defensive group of Barnes, Wilson, Wilborn, Torres, and Proulx were joined by several players, Kable Kleck, Thomas Nix and JW Nix, Peyton Merket and Addison who continued to dominate the Red Devils, not allowing a touchdown the entire first half. I did

take a nice defensive play by Thomas Nix to stop a Red Devil drive, but that was the only real threat the visitors had in the first half. Offensively in the quarter, Proulx hit Wilborn with a 36 yard scoring strike to take a 13-0 lead. After a fumble recovery by the Borden County defense following a crushing hit by Barnes, the Pups extended their lead as Wilson hit Barnes on a 11 yard scoring strike and a halftime lead of 19-0.

The second offensive group had the opportunity for the extra point but they had no success in their two tries in the half. This group consisted of Addison, both Nix boys, Kleck, Merket, Lukas Grantham, Tanner Harrison, Jeremy Souder, and Riley Lewis. This group also played at halftime and shutout the Red devils, while getting two touchdown runs by Merket, two by JW Nix and one by Thomas Nix. Giving the Pups a 5 touchdowns to 0 halftime victory.

In the 2nd half, Wilson connected with Wilborn again for a Pup score, this time from 33 yards out. Again the 2nd group came up short so the score remained 25 to 0. The visitors got on the board for their initial score of the game and got the extra point conversion against Borden County's second defense to cut the Pups lead to 25 to 7 in the 3rd. Proulx quickly answered, rumbling 46 yards untouched to push the lead to 31 - 7 with 4:36 left in the 3rd.

The Pups scooped up a fumble on their next defensive series as Wilborn and Barnes sacked the Red Devil quarterback forcing a fumble, but the Pups would come up short as they mixed in some plays with their 2nd team offense. In the 4th quarter, the Pups got a goal line stand and two plays later, Ryan Wilborn took to the ground Pups second defense to cut their lead to 37 to 14.

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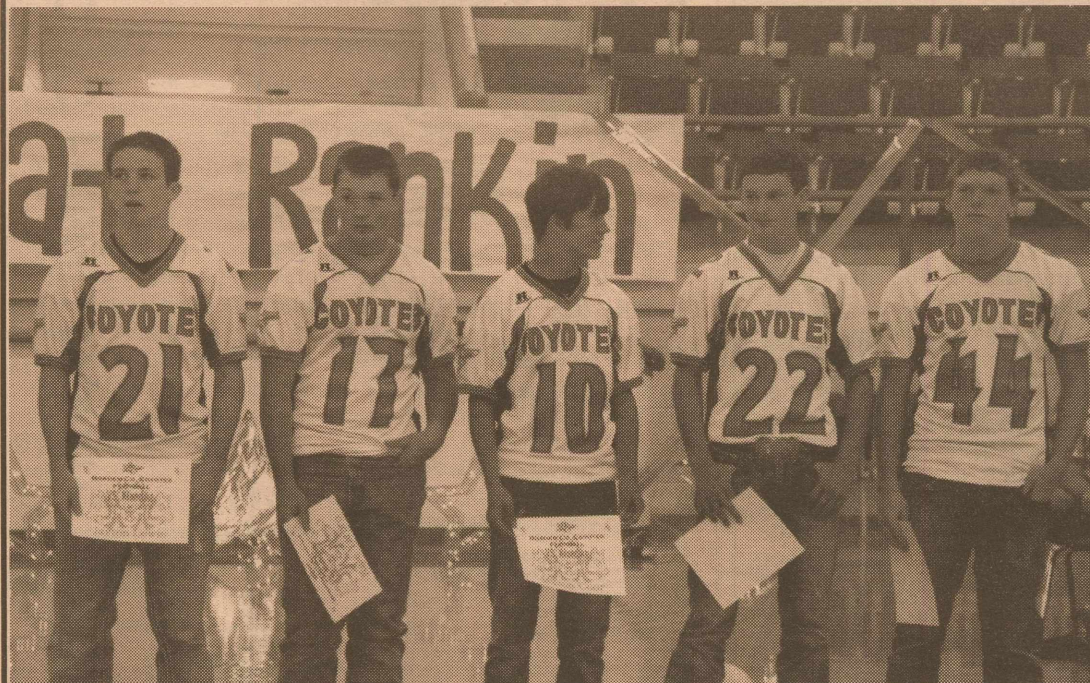


7th grader, J.W. Nix tackles a Red Devil in last weeks home game against Rankin. The Pups defeated the Red Devils 57 to 14.



Nick Proulx runs the ball for a total of 61 yards into the endzone and scores for the Pups.

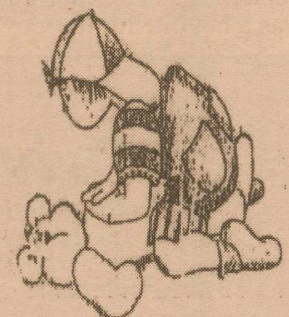

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Borden County JV Splits Two Games

The Borden County JV football squad had two games against Garden City and Klondike on September 5th and 12th respectively. The young Coyotes were able to split these two games coming away with a loss and a win.

The first game was played at Garden City against a very talent-laden Bearkat squad. The Coyotes were the first to draw blood as Jayton Lewis was able to follow some great blocks by his teammates and take off on a 43 yard run. The PAT was unsuccessful. Two minutes later, the Bearkats were able to punch the ball in from 31 yards out with the PAT. In two of the Coyotes next outings on defense, they were able to stop Garden City on downs. However due to the inexperience of the young Coyote team is partly to blame for the following fact which is that on the Coyotes next five possessions, the team turned the ball over 5 consecutive times after a few plays on each drive. These drive killers definitely aided Garden City as they had a 39-6 advantage with 1:37 left in the 4th quarter.

The Coyotes did score one final time on a 55 yard run by Nathan Souder. The PAT failed making the final score 12-39 in favor of the Bearkats. Diego Bernal led all tacklers on defense with 9, Jayton Lewis was next with 8, Robert Jordan 7, Dylan Murphy, Mason Coor, Steven Carrillo, Kale Yarbrow and Nathan Souder each had 5, Braxton Coor and Jaden Huse 2 each.

The next game for the Coyote JV squad was the Klondike Cougars. Borden County traveled to Klondike on the 12th of September. The first quarter was a hot one for the Coyotes

as they scored on 3 different runs by freshman running back Jayton Lewis. The Coyote defense did well holding the Cougars to only one score in the first quarter. The score at the end of the 1st was Borden County 20 Klondike 6.

Both teams continued to get hotter and hotter offensively in the second quarter as Klondike added to its score twice more on runs to make their side of the score board light up to 18. However, the Coyotes would not be outdone as they were able to score three more times themselves on a run from Jayton Lewis.

Special teams also got in on the scoring mix with a 50 yard kickoff return for a score by Mason Coor. Coor from his quarterback position then turned around and hit freshman Kale Yarbrow on a 17 yard strike in the endzone making the score at halftime 18-38 Borden County.

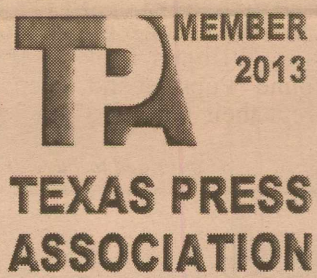

Climbing A Waterfall is a Unique Experience

Jamaica is 150 miles long and 50 miles wide. It is just 90 miles south of Cuba. Early people in Jamaica lived in what was called "the Land of Springs." It was once owned by Spain and called Santiago. In the mid-1600's it became under the rule of England and was named Jamaica. In 1962 it achieved full independence from England. With a population of 2.8 million, it is the third largest English-speaking country in the Americas, after the United States and Canada. The musical genre reggae originated on the island. Bob Marley was Jamaican. Ian Fleming, who wrote the James Bond novels, lived in Jamaica and used the island as the setting for many of his stories. His 1962 movie *Dr. No* was filmed in Jamaica. So was the 1988 film *Cocktail* starring Tom Cruise. The 1993 comedy *Cool Runnings* depicted Jamaica's Olympic bobsled team.

Tourism is one of Jamaica's main sources of income with nearly 2 million foreign visitors a year. The island's premier tourist destination is a place called Dunn's River Falls. Water from a natural spring in an underground limestone cave cascades for 600 feet down wide terraced natural stairs into the Caribbean Sea. Geologists call the falls a living phenomenon because they are continuously rebuilt by sediments in the spring water. Visitors go to the falls and climb the slippery slopes while facing rushing water. Along the way are lagoons and pools where visitors relax or catch their breath. Walkways and balconies alongside the falls allow people to get photos of their family members in the water.

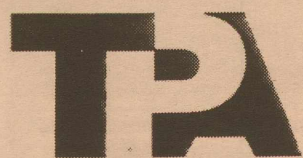
The falls were in private

hands for a while, then in 1972 the government attained the property to expand its booming tourist industry. Spaniards called the area "Las Chorreras" (a place where liquid drops) which later became Ocho Rios (eight rivers), even though there are only four rivers in the area. Ocho Rios is the name of a nearby resort city.

When you get to Dunn's River Falls you walk through a tropical forest of shade trees, some of which have bright red blooms. When we were there in mid-July with our party of ten, every cruise ship and resort in Jamaica must have told their guests to go to the falls. It was extremely crowded.

Climbers start at the beach. The falls are rare because they empty directly into the Caribbean Sea. Smart climbers wear water shoes, which adhere to the slippery boulders. You can rent these at the beginning of the climb. The climbers begin the ascent slowly, some forming a human chain led by a guide. The water is cool and most of the climb is in the shade. It takes about an hour and a half to make the uphill trek, more if thousands of people are there.

When visitors first hear about the falls, climbing them looks interesting and fun. But once they start climbing, it becomes a bigger challenge than they anticipated. At the end, there is a good feeling of accomplishment. - Gives your child someone to play with.

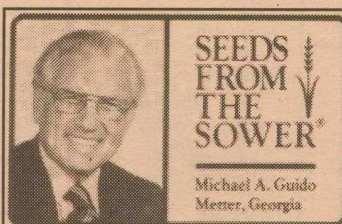
- Provides your child with someone to talk to when he/she has questions.

PHOTO ID REQUIRED FOR VOTING IN TEXAS

Photo identification will be required for voting in the Constitutional Election on November 5, 2013.

A voter will be required to show one of the following forms of photo identification at the polling location before the voter will be permitted to cast a vote:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. Citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days before being presented at the polling place.

Election identification certificates are now available only for voters who do not already have a required form of photo identification.

 Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed
Constitutional Amendments
 Special Election November 5, 2013

**Proposition Number 1
 (HJR 62)**

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

**Proposition Number 2
 (HJR 79)**

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational."

**Proposition Number 3
 (HJR 133)**

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption."

**Proposition Number 4
 (HJR 24)**

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

**Proposition Number 5
 (SJR 18)**

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property in addition to the current

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

**Proposition Number 6
 (SJR 1)**

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

**Proposition Number 7
 (HJR 87)**

HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option

for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appointment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less."

**Proposition Number 8
 (HJR 147 and SJR 54)**

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas counties.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

**Proposition Number 9
 (SJR 42)**

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

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
