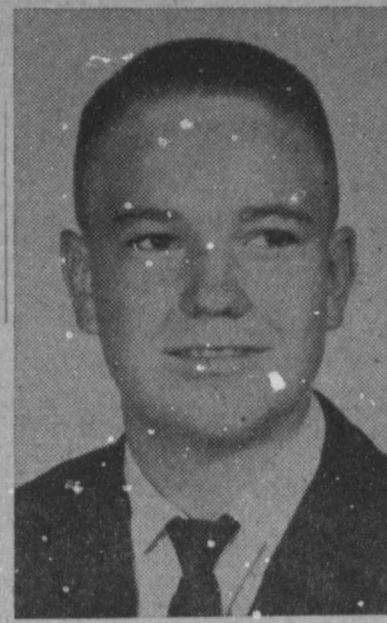

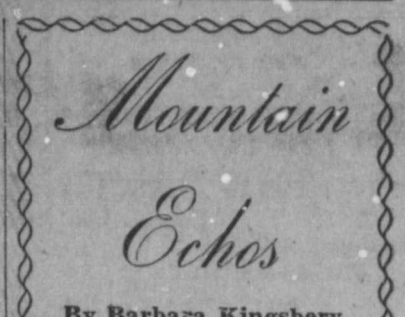

Walleye Survival Tells The Story

There is evidence to indicate limited success in the experimental stocking of walleye, a member of the perch family, in San Angelo Reservoir, said Larry Campbell of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Low Lewis, fisheries supervisor, said that three stockings of walleye, ranging in size from one-half inch to three inches were made from June to August of 1968. The recent recoveries have disclosed a rapid growth rate of the fish, all nine months of age now, with an average weight of over one-half lb. and about 11 inches in length. Biologist Bill Follis said that these sampling nets found the fish fairly evenly distributed over the lake.

Soil Stewardship Week May 11-18

In recognition of the importance of our natural resources of soil and water, Governor Preston Smith has designated the week of May 11-19 as Soil Stewardship Week in Texas.

In many of Texas' 187 Soil Conservation Districts, observations will be held in cooperation with local churches to recognize the duty man has toward preserving the life giving land.

Soil Stewardship Week gives each individual an opportunity to stop and evaluate his duty to the land, said Clarence Carter, Extension soil and water conservation specialists at Texas A & M University.

"The earth is the Lord's and all things therein. All people are dependent upon our soil and water for their livelihood," said Governor Smith.

"The conservation and development of Texas soil and water resources are essential in the maintenance of the economy of the State. We cannot afford the loss of land, waste and pollution of water and other abuses to our na-

tural resources. "Soil and Water Conservation Districts are committed to improving our State through the wise use and development of our soil and water resources and are sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week."

Carter said tours, special meetings and other events in addition to the local church observances would be held. Too, he noted that 4-H Clubs in some conservation districts would have a part in the local programs.

All citizens have a special invitation to attend the Stewardship Week event in their area, Carter said.

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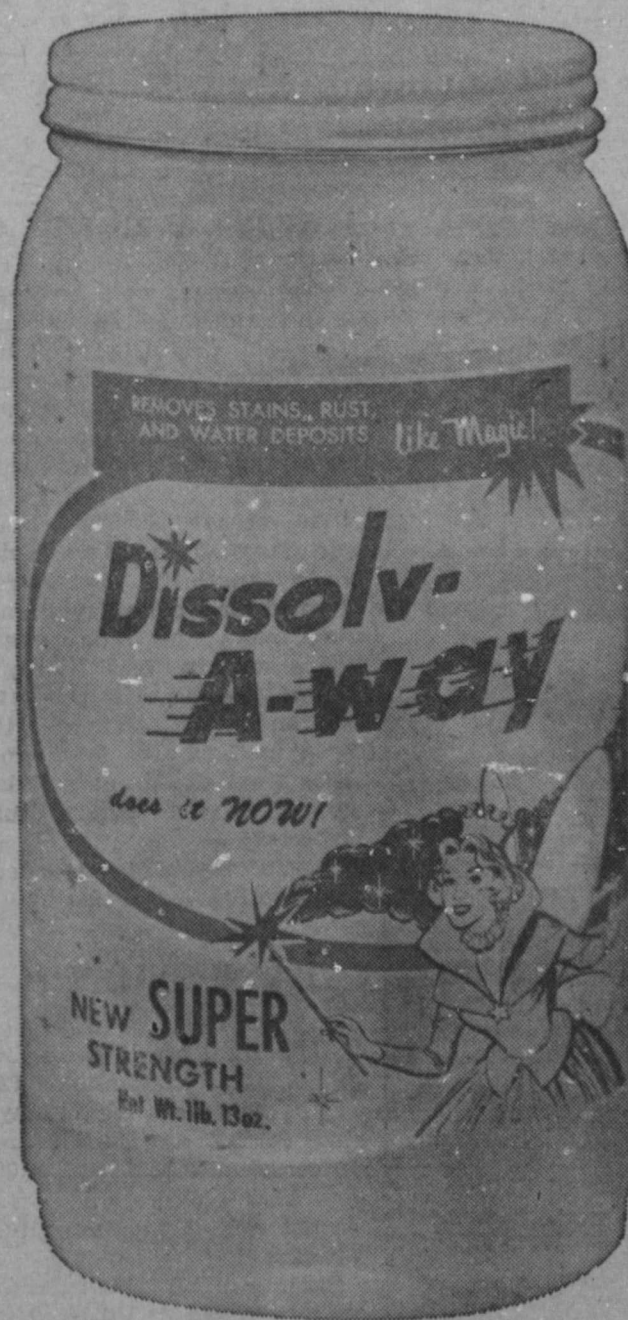

County Agent News Column

Several people have brought some deformed peach leaves by the office wanting to know what was causing it. This is a disease known as leaf curl and can be cured with a couple of sprays of bordeaux mixture at the recommended rate. There are a couple of other chemicals and full information is available at our office.

When you spray your pecan trees for the pecan nut casebearer in May, it is generally a good idea to include

zinc sulfate at the rate of 2 lbs. per 100 gals. of water. This will either clear up or prevent a condition known as rosette which occurs in many pecan trees in this county. Rosette is a slow developing condition that is apparent in the reduced vigor of the tree, small, light colored leaves, that grow in clusters or rosettes with long bare spots between these clusters and a general lack of good big, green leaves. This condition can eventually kill a tree or make it easy prey to other diseases or insects.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposals Made To Raise Postage

A postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Santa Anna, Postmaster John Gregg said today.

Mr. Gregg said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D. C. that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added public tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third - class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by taxpayers, the

postmaster said. For bulk third - class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.

The postmaster listed these other details on the proposed increases:

First - Class mail: Letters and post cards would be increased one cent, to 7 cents an ounce and 6 cents a piece, respectively, on July 1, 1969. Airmail postage would remain at 10 cents. This will yield \$557.2 million in new revenues.

Second - Class mail: A handling charge of three tenths of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This would yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 percent increase in addition to the 8 percent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970.

Third - Class mail: For single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to a uniform rate of 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6 cents. The 1970 increase would lift revenues by \$46.8 million annually.

a terrified widow? Which bank employee, questioned by telephone, okay'd a check that was no good?

Generally speaking, the law puts considerable faith in a listener's ability to recognize the voice he hears on the telephone. The modern instrument works well enough to reveal distinctive vocal characteristics.

Thus, a blackmail victim was allowed to testify that he recognized, from prior acquaintance, the voice that had threatened him on the telephone. As one judge commented:

"The recognition of persons by their voices is a common occurrence, and is often the only means of identification."

Suppose you don't recognize the voice at the time of the call. May you still identify it later on? Consider this situation:

The father of a kidnapped child received several ransom calls from someone whose voice was not familiar. Later, when a suspect was arrested, the father talked with him face to face — and decided the man had the same voice he had heard on the telephone. Here, too, the court held the identification was sufficiently reliable to be accepted into evidence.

What if you don't remember what the voice sounded like but do remember what it said? A case like that arose when a lumber dealer tried to collect for merchandise which a customer said he had never ordered.

"I can't remember what the caller sounded like," said the dealer in a court hearing, "but I do recall that he used this customer's name. I had no reason at all to suspect that he wasn't telling the truth."

But the court ruled that this kind of identification of a caller was not adequate as

legal evidence. The judge felt that, with no voice recognition or other corroborating circumstances, it was all too possible that the call was indeed a hoax.

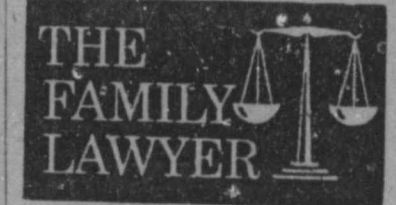

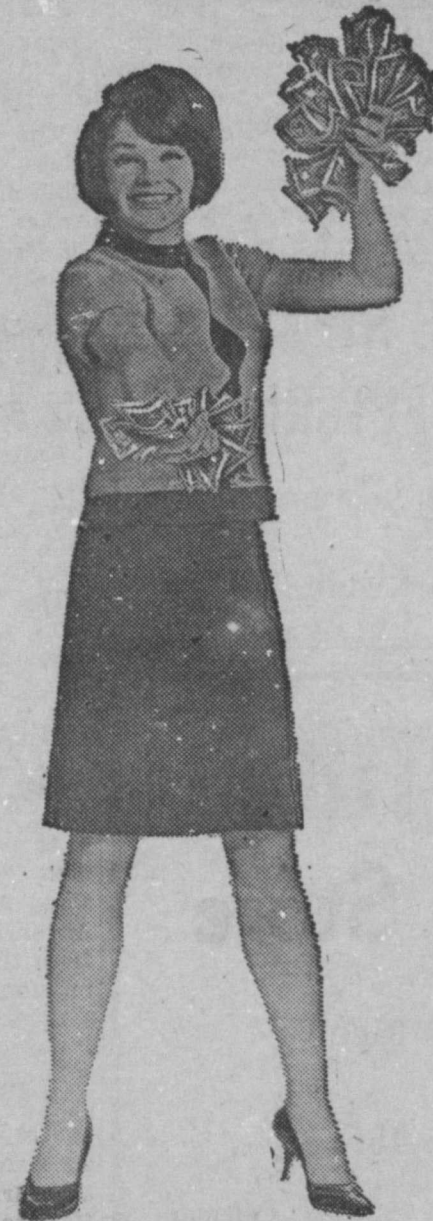

Chamber of Commerce REPORT

Attorney General Crawford Martin's office issued a letter this week which enclosed a booklet entitled "Deceptive Trade Practices Under the Texas Business and Commerce Code and Under the Texas Consumer Credit Code". Part I of the booklet contains the Business and Commerce Code laws which are enforced by the various county and district attorneys throughout the state. In Part II is found the Credit Code law which is enforced by this office. These laws do not cover crimes involving business property, such as embezzling, swindling, forgery and theft. However, these offenses are codified in the Texas Penal Code.

This booklet is on file here at the office should anyone desire to read it in its entirety or you may order one from the Attorney General's office.

Briefly the booklet contains laws on definitions of a "container" and its "proprietary mark"; packing, selling, or exporting tangible personal property of inferior quality or value; deceptive sale of rebuilt automobile storage battery; deceptive wholesale and going-out-of-business advertising; deceptive advertising; regulating the sale or transfer of secondhand watches; counterfeiting or changing a required mark and the misuse of container bearing mark.

The Texas Consumer Credit Code is enforced and includes such deceptive practices as "passing off goods or services as those of another; causing confusion or misunderstanding as to the source, sponsorship, approval or certification of goods or services; their geographic origin and misrepresenting whether the goods are new or used and many others.

The booklet makes interesting reading and my point this week is to trade at home, you

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

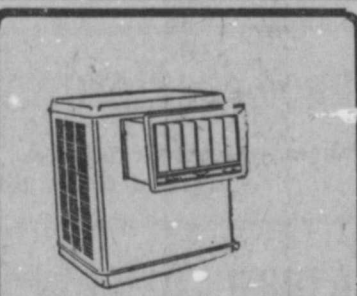

A employee of Coleman Co. Telephone Company, Daniel is enrolled in the Stromberg-Carlson Central Office Maintenance, Switch and Relay Adjusting, Blueprint Reading and Circuit Analysis School.

The program is being conducted at A&M's Electrical and Telephone Training Center located at its Research Annex.

The course, continuing through May 16, is sponsored by A&M's Engineering Extension Service's Telephone Technicians Training Division. Darrell Witt is instructor.

The four-week program includes basic fundamentals of the switching system, circuit reading and interpretation, Witt said.

"The course will progress into switch and relay," he added, "and students will be taught and required to identify and know the functions of all parts of a relay and the spring combinations."
