Historical Marker Dedication Sunday at Flat Top Near Voss

The Official Texas Historical Marker for Site of Flat Top Settlement will be erected on Sunday, October 26, announced Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. This is a State Matching Fund" marker.

Mrs. C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna, chairman of the Coleman County Historical Survey Committee, said the marker has been placed 2 mi. SW of Voss, on FM 2143 by Howard Stephenson, Commissioner of Precinct 4.

The inscription on this 18 by 28 inch marker reads: **SITE OF FLAT TOP SETTLEMENT**

A frontier center of traffic and communications. First known settler, Richard Coffey, lived here in 1860's, except in weeks when pioneers banded together in Picketville Fort (NW of here) for protection against Indians.

This was on the "Wire Road"—so named because it followed telegraph line operated by U. S. Army Signal Corps between Fort Concho and Fort Belknap in the 1870's. Also in 1870's, Flat Top was a change station on Fort Concho - Brownwood Stage Route.

Name of settlement came from a flat-roof stone building standing here in early days.

This is the 10th Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Coleman County.

The marking of local historical sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5-year RAMPS Program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve, and Survey Texas history.

More than 3,300 Official Texas Markers have been awarded throughout Texas

Santa Anna Assigned To District 18-B For 1970

Back To Class A in 1972

Official word was received here last Thursday that Santa Anna is to be placed in the University Interscholastic League class 18-B for the next two school years. The change from class A to class B is a result of average enrollment during the past two years. The minimum class A enrollment is 115 high school scholastics.

The present high school enrollment and that of next year will cause the local school to go back into class A in the fall of 1972 unless the minimum figure is raised by the UIL.

School officials knew of the change in classification, but had not received word of the district assignment until last week. Santa Anna will be in the class B district with Rising Star, Richland Springs, Blanket and Eden.

At a Thursday night meeting at high school, the District 18-B officials elected Cullen Perry as a chairman of the district organization. R. C. Smith will serve as secretary for the coming year. The 1970 football schedule has already been made for the new district classification.

Santa Anna was in class B for two years, 1948-49 and 1949-50 but since that time has been in class A.

LOCAL WOMAN HOSPITALIZED AFTER AUTO-TRAIN MISHAP

Mrs. Leonard Davis is in Hendricks Hospital in Abilene recovering from injuries she received Thursday morning when the automobile she was driving was hit by a train at the South First Street crossing in Santa Anna. Mrs. Davis was first taken to the Santa Anna Hospital and then transferred to Abilene for further treatment. She has a broken jaw and other facial injuries and underwent surgery Tuesday morning.

According to Highway Pa-

trolman Al Chambers, the accident occurred about 10:50 a. m. last Thursday morning. Mrs. Davis, a daughter of Mrs. P. F. Schulle, did not see the approaching train or hear the signal bell at the crossing. The 1966 Chevrolet was hit near the right rear tire by the east-bound train. The car, which is considered almost a total loss, was knocked onto nearby switch tracks upon impact.

Mrs. Davis is expected to be in the Abilene hospital for several more days.

Cotton Harvest Delayed, To Increase This Week

The cotton harvest in our area is expected to increase this week if the weather continues to cooperate. About 32 bales of cotton had been ginned at the Santa Anna Coop Gin up until last week, with the peak of the ginning season expected in two to three weeks.

Many farmers have defoliated their crops and have been hampered in the harvest by the recent rains and heavy dew each morning.

Cullen Perry At TSTA Meet

Cullen Perry of Santa Anna, a member of the TSTA state executive committee will be an official voting delegate at the 91st annual state convention of the Texas State Teachers Association October 23-25 in San Antonio.

Perry is one of the 1,288 certified members of the 1969 House of Delegates, which will meet on the last day of the convention to discuss and act on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitutions, new policies, recommendations of standing committees and other business. He will also assist with registration preceding the opening session.

The official delegates are elected from the 419 TSTA local associations throughout the state and certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or fraction of 100. Every local association in the state is entitled to at least one official delegate.

With total membership in TSTA expected to hit a record 124,000 this year, attendance at the convention will probably total about 8,000.

Featured speakers include Gov. Preston Smith, Sam Lambert, executive secretary of the National Education Association; and Charles D. Holleyman, superintendent of schools at Mustang, Okla.

In Our Opinion

THE ARMY TIMES raked Senator Ralph Yarborough of Texas and Senator Alan Cranston of California over the coals for alleged "foot dragging" on the bill to raise educational allowances for veterans under the GI Bill.

Yarborough is chairman of the Senate Labor and Public Welfare committee while Cranston is chairman of the Labor Committee's sub-committee on veteran's affairs.

The sub-committee began hearings on increasing the veteran's educational allowances in June and as yet it hasn't been reported out. They have before them a bill already approved in the House that would increase veteran's educational allowances by about 27 per cent.

They said Senator Yarborough should put aside some of his "politically motivated" and unsoundly-based charges against the Veteran's Administration and the Department of Defense, and get some action on the bill.

OPPOSITION TO THE APPOINTMENT of Judge Clement F. Haynesworth, Jr., as an associate justice of the Supreme Court has been loud if not from a great number of people.

The opposition seems to come from the liberal civil rights block who do not think Judge Haynesworth is liberal enough for a Supreme Court justice.

During his tenure as a judge of the court of appeals, Judge Haynesworth has written quite a few opinions in the field of criminal law which reflect that he guarded against any clear violation of individual rights that he realized we cannot afford a permissive attitude in regard to criminals, one which would allow them to go free because of legal technicalities which have no pertinence to the case.

That attitude is not popular with those who cry the loudest for civil rights.

Of course we want and demand civil rights. But in a land of freedom such as ours, there is also a great danger of pushing civil rights to the point that it removes the rights of others.

We have a right to be protected from criminals who would do us harm—as well as the fact that the criminal has a right to a fair trial by a jury of his peers. We have a right to choose those with whom we will associate—just as they have a right to do the same.

We have a right to operate our businesses without the threat of violence from anyone—just as they have a right to spend their money in any place they see fit.

So, when it comes to who has a right to do what, we have to look at it hard and long. Too many times when we accord civil rights to one, we go to the extreme of violating the rights of others.

That is an unpopular view among many politicians today because many use the civil rights theme and the government dole as a means of staying in office.

But one of these days there will have to come a reckoning.

We, for one, hope the Senate will confirm Judge Haynesworth's nomination.

Some Left Their Names, Some Unremembered

Early Coleman County History

One pioneer who left his name on the Coleman County map was George Watts, one of three brothers who joined the United States army in the east and were stationed at the frontier post, Camp Colorado. George married a girl near there, Mary Barefoot, daughter of a settler on the creek, and their cabin was built nearby.

When the Civil War began, the soldiers at the post were given choice of going north to fight with the Union Army or of resigning to enter the rebel army if they wished. George Watts, his wife and their baby boy, John, who had been born in 1860, stayed on the frontier, later moving with several other families into the deserted fort buildings.

These people made their living as best they could, from time to time drawing a small pay from the state for services in defending the frontier against the Indian raiders, who came more and more often as the war went on. After the war, they farmed in the valleys, herded their horses, and found a constant food supply in the unbranded calves with which the open range swarmed. There were always deer, antelope, fish and wild fowl to eat, and great droves of buffalo migrated here now and then.

One day, a young brother of John Watts was herding

was paralyzed on the left side and could not talk. We have heard this morning they found the blood clot in his head and the only thing they can do is to try to dissolve it. He is very bad at this time.

the settlers' horses in sight of the post, in the grass to the south, when five or six mounted Indians came racing by, between the post and the herd. The boy, about 13 years old, was armed only with a pistol, but he rode toward them and shot one of them, then turned and rode back toward the post, and was shot in the back by an Indian on a fast horse. He reached the buildings before he fell, and fortunately the wound was not fatal.

The fallen Indian was lifted up behind another, and they got away with all the settlers' horses.

As luck would have it, the Indians were met a few miles west by a scout of Rangers, who attacked and drove them into a thicket, where a close watch was kept while the horses were driven back to Camp Colorado. The Indians slipped out in the night, but the next day the grove was searched and the grave of the one shot by the Watts boy was found, about two feet deep and containing besides the body a shield of buffalo hide, a good bow and several arrows.

George Watts took his family a few miles south to a small creek, where the sandy land raised fine corn and garden crops; here there was no school, but Mary Barefoot Watts taught her children as best she could, and they all sang often, to the music of her treasured organ; this organ is now owned by a family who live at Burnet, and is in beautiful condition. The creek where the Watts family lived became known as Watts Creek, later having a one-teacher school of that name.

John Watts joined the Rangers while very young, probably not more than 15, and in his first Indian fight he was wounded by an arrow in his hip. He went back to Watts Creek, was a long time in recovering from the wound, and later bought the land his father owned, married and lived on it until his death about 1937.

One pioneer who did not

leave his name was John Daniel, who brought his cattle herd and his young wife to lower Home Creek about 1861. Their cabin was near the creek, west of where Farm Road 2633 now goes to Whon. A baby boy, C. O., was born on December 19, 1862 and died in February at two months of age. A few other settlers came, among them Jake and Jim Dofflemeyer and the Bartons, and in 1864 a girl was born, whom they called Jenny, but her land records used the name Virginia.

On December 12, 1865, John Daniel died and was buried beside the boy; what was a rich young widow with a baby daughter an hundreds of cattle to do, what with cattle-thieves, Indian raids, accidents and the other rigors of the time and place? The next year she was married to James H. Dofflemeyer, one of the handsome and successful brothers who were running their cattle up on Camp Creek. In 1871 they were still in the area, and he was hide and cattle inspector for the county. The other Dofflemeyer, Jake, never married, and was killed by Indians about 1872 near Trickham and said to have been buried in the street there.

James and Mary Dofflemeyer later moved to San Saba County, continuing their ranching but also founding a bank there and amassing a considerable fortune. The little girl, Jenny Daniel, was married about 1882 to Will Banister, and before many years she erected granite monuments at the graves of her father and baby brother on Home Creek, replacing the sandstones.

There is no creek, no hill,

not even a crossing, named for Daniel or Dofflemeyer, or for that matter, Upton or Barton or Jordan; only the grave markers, C. O. Daniel, born December 19, 1862, died February 13, 1863, and John Daniel, born February 17, 1833 and died December 12, 1865.

Torture, Acts of Terror Are VC Trademarks

by Charles M. Henner

To most I Corps the VC has become an ogre, frequently felt to be a sort of criminal, deserving to be shot on sight. Perhaps, rightly so, he has acquired this reputation and stance because of his activities previously mentioned and others.

Another favorite trick is to bribe or scare little boys 10-15 years of age into doing acts of terrorism. During the height of all the field fighting, a group of several hundred villagers and revolutionary development workers which are young people who help to build up towns, villages, streets and local works, were meeting about 8:00 one morning when without warning there were four tremendous and shattering explosions in the middle of the crowd.

In a matter of moments the emergency cry went out and big red crossed choppers roared in to pick up the aftermath of perhaps the worst single terroristic act of the year, and according to the Viet Nam Stars and Stripes Bureau "one of the worst recorded in the war." Since this is the Provincial Hospital Headquarters most of these patients wound up dumped on us, as many as 44 at one time. Only 7 of these were able to be treated in the emergency room and discharged, the rest requiring hospitalization. Of course, nothing could be done for the 27 that were killed. Investigation by the National Police has recorded that four young Vietnamese boys, ranging in ages from 11 to 13,

told the police that they threw the grenades, one each, into the meeting at Phu Cat. The children were three little cowherders and a bamboo cutter who had been threatened by the VC, had been held under water and beaten until they promised to obey the VC and do whatever they were told. Thereafter the children were given grenades with instructions to hide them until they were told what to do with them. The children were terrified and did not report the incident to anyone. Frequently, these terrorists dress as South Vietnamese soldiers and move in on a village and do acts of terrorism such as wiping out the village entirely, burning some people alive, hanging others up by their fingers or toes and then publicly abusing them or leaving them there to die from thirst and beating, chopping off arms and legs to terrify the rest of the people and other numerous macabre acts.

Frequently, these gory exhibitions by one human to another turn avowed Communist to Chieu Hoi—defect. A recent example to come out of this was one described by UPI out of Saigon in which a VC defected, moved on to tell how he and several others in his unit were ordered to bury alive four of their wounded comrades.

This particular incident took place up near Ban Me Thuot in the central highlands where the 27 year old former VC deputy company commander told how a number of his men of the unit had been killed and 19 of them wounded in fighting with South Vietnamese forces. As the group pulled back this officer and three other trusted Communists were called in by the company commander and were told they did not have the ability to move all 19 of the wounded, that there was much fighting ahead of them and all the troops moving out would have to get out, or would die or be taken prisoner on the way. The VC military commander for Darlac Province ordered the four trustees to take four of the worst wounded, and to bury them alive without any trace so that no one would know that there had been any casualties suffered. The VC and NVA are very desirous that South Vietnamese or Americans do not know of any of their casualties and they make very strenuous efforts to either take out their dead and wounded or bury their dead. This makes their public image one of invincibility. According to the record the wounded were placed in sitting up positions in combat trenches, still alive, watching their own burial shovel by shovel of dirt. This man had joined the VC at the age of 18 from his native Province, later became a member of the Communist party and after nine years with the VC defected to the allies recently. His statement was that this was only one of several incidents that made him seriously question the Communist belief and their goals. He said, "I will never forget the eyes of one as he stared up at me with every shovel full of dirt. I kept thinking: 'here were brave men I had fought with, now I must bury them alive.'" This was supposed to be in the best interest of the party and had to be done. Later when he was reprimanded when he refused to attack under conditions which would have cost him many casualties he made his decision to change.

Hueco Tanks Unique Area in West Texas

Pictographs, massacres, legends, and tall tales—they all go with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's newest part acquisition—Hueco Tanks, a 738-acre tract 22 miles northeast of El Paso.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission recently accepted title to the site culminating several years of effort by El Paso citizens to preserve the unique area.

Hueco Tanks had an attraction which could not help but destine it to a colorful history—water. Depressions in the limestone make natural "cisterns" which store a great amount of water during the wet season. In this parched country any quantity of water at all draws men and beasts like a magnet, and Hueco Tanks is the only water site for many miles.

Apaches, Kiowas, and Comanches camped here and left behind cave drawings telling of their adventures and sorrows, their triumphs and their superstitions. For not only is water there, but the giant igneous monoliths, with labyrinthine of caves and tunnels, form an excellent fortress.

Sandals and basketware found in the caves furnish evidence that an early Pueblo tribe called the "basket makers" inhabited the area about 300 to 500 A. D.

It was here the last great Indian battle in El Paso County was fought when some early settlers tracked marauding Apaches across the desert to the tanks, besetted them in their caves, and slaughtered them.

The tanks served as a watering place for the Butterfield Overland Mail.

With its stony jumbles jutting upward 200 to 400 feet from the desert floor. Hueco Tanks is a distinctive landmark in the area. Geologists say the rocks which form the tanks were once a seething puddle which boiled and bubbled up through a weak spot in the earth's changing crust, much as toothpaste is squeezed from a tube.

The glowing mass did not reach the surface, but after it cooled and hardened, erosion formed depressions that filled during rain. These made the Hueco Tanks a good source of water in a hot, bone dry country.

DOZING DRIVERS BECOME A SPECIAL HIGHWAY MENACE

"The trouble with falling asleep at the wheel is that you may not wake up," Paul Graham, President of Texas Motor Transportation Association, warned today as he cited drowsiness as a special menace to highway safety.

"Since the development of the Interstate Highway System and other freeways, drowsiness has become a special problem," Graham said. "With few intersections, little oncoming traffic and no billboards to distract him, it is easy for the driver to become bored—and then sleepy. And that is very dangerous!"

Anyone who expects to be behind the wheel for any length of time should, above all, be well-rested before starting out, Graham said. "The tired driver is a dangerous driver."

Mr. Graham listed these effects of driving while overtired as shown by extensive psychological research:

- 1. Drivers require stronger stimuli before taking action.
2. Their ability to anticipate trouble is reduced.
3. Their control movements are inaccurately timed.
4. They develop an aggressive attitude toward people and the machine they are operating.
5. They lose insight—and fail to recognize these shortcomings as being present.

What should you do when you feel the first signs of drowsiness?

ASC NEWS . . .

Farmers have been notified of the 1970 wheat acreage allotment.

The 1970 provisions of the wheat diversion program have been announced. Briefly these provisions are as follows. An acreage equal to thirty and three tenths per cent of the allotment must be set aside and treated as diverted acreage. An entire allotment may be planted and earn certificate payment. 48 per cent of the allotment must be planted to earn the certificate payment. The producer may plant 48 per cent and divert 50 per cent, draw certificate payment and diversion payment on 50 per cent of the allotment provided a diverted acreage equal to 50 per cent of the allotment plus 30.3 per cent of the allotment is set aside.

Grain farmers may substitute wheat for feed grain and feed grain for wheat provided the farm has both a wheat allotment and a feed grain base. For the crop being substituted there would likely be no diversion payment.

The feed grain bases for 1970 will be same as for 1969. Barley will be considered part

of the feed grain base. If it is planted, it will count against the base.

It is expected the cotton acreage allotment will be in the hands of the producers some time in November. A cotton marketing quota referendum will be held in December during the week of the first through the fifth. This referendum will be held by mail and each cotton producer will receive a ballot.

The cotton diversion program for 1970 will not be available in its present form if the marketing quota on cotton is voted down.

Funds available for the agriculture conservation program for 1970 will be exactly the same as funds that were allocated to Coleman County for this year.

The special project funds will be cut drastically for 1970.

If any farm operator or owner is located in the Loss Creek watershed, it is suggested that he review his conservation needs and discuss with the ASCS office any practice that should be carried out on his farm or ranch land. These practices should be carried out this calendar year since funds are available for carrying out approved conservation practices.
