The calendars that the band members sold have arrived. If you purchased one and have not yet received it, contact a band member and they will get it to you. Also, they still have a few extras for sale.

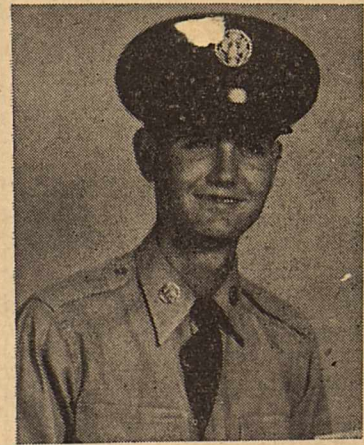

## Arthur Lee Warren Takes Training at Lackland AFB

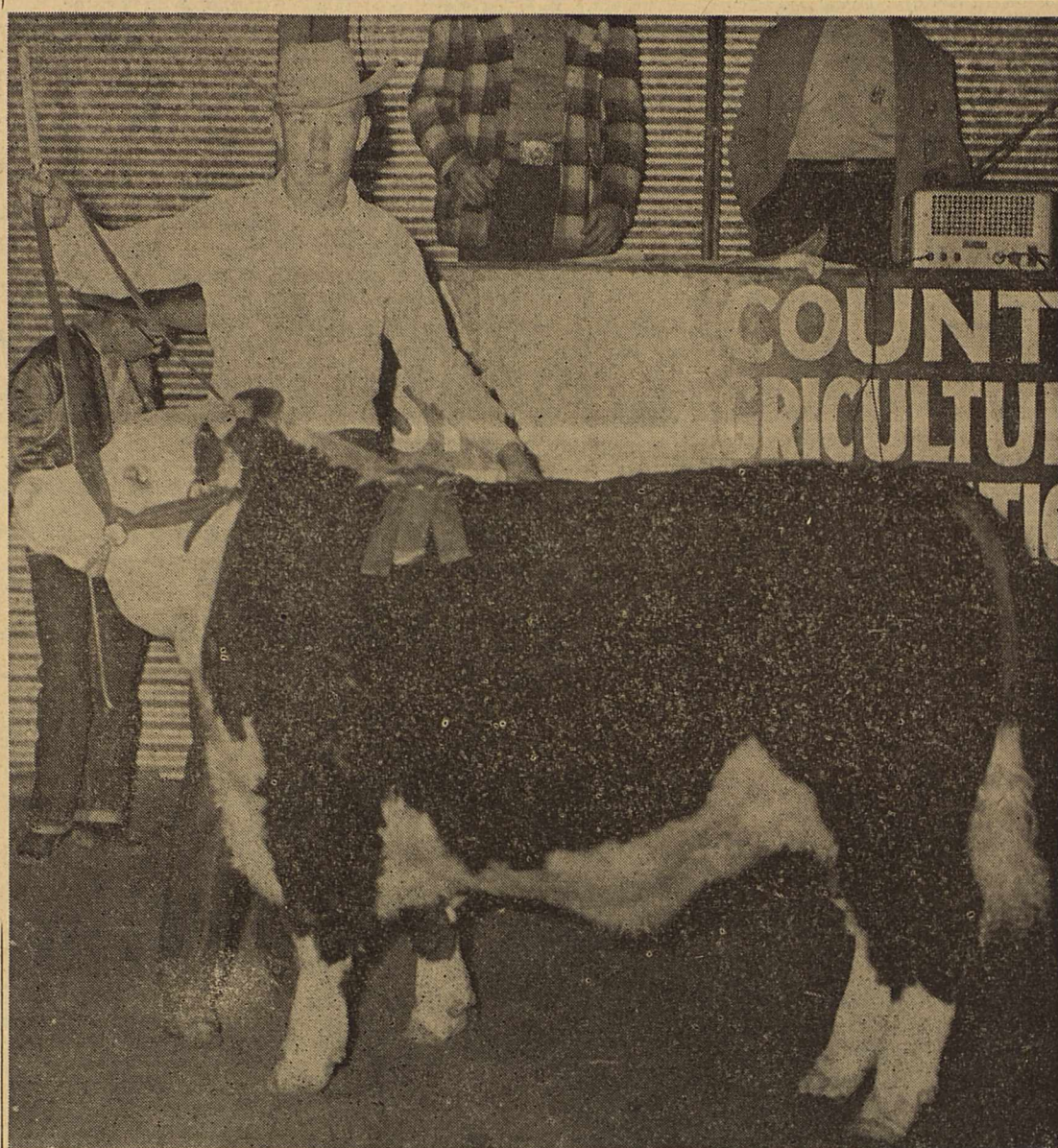

## New Oilers Finaled In Three County Fields

Warren Bradshaw No. 2 L. P. Bennett is a new oiler in the Wasson field of South Yoakum County.

On 24-hour potential test, the well finaled for 206.25 barrels of oil, plus 26 per cent water, pumping from open hole section at 5,258-5,289 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 699, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Western Drilling Company, Inc., No. 1 Lee A. Brownfield, is a new well in the Prentice Field of Yoakum County. On 24-hour potential test, the well pumped 64 barrels of 30.3 gravity oil, plus 32 per cent water.

Location is 440 feet from south and east lines of section 20, block X, ps1 survey.

Drilling & Exploration Company, Inc., No. 4 Marshall Cheek is a new well in the Brahaney field of Central Yoakum County. On 24-hour potential test, the

new oiler pumped 108 barrels of 32.5 gravity oil, through perforations from 5,318 to 5,324 feet and from 5,334 to 5,338 feet.

Location is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 370, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

The Texas Company No. 1-A NCT-2 E. H. Jones is to be drilled as a 7,800-foot project in the Russell 7,000 (Clear Fork) area of Northwest Gaines County. Location is 663 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of the south half of section 416, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey.

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. 1 M. M. West, scheduled 12,000-foot wildcat in Southwest Yoakum County, logged shows in drillstem tests in the San Andrews.

The first test was for three hours at 5,180-5,325 feet. Recovery was 60 feet of oil-cut drill-

## Building Program At School Said Progressing Nicely

The school construction program is progressing very nicely. All exterior brick work on the woodshop has been completed. All underground electrical and plumbing work is practically complete. The construction is at a stage that a lot of visible evidence of progress will be seen during the next few weeks.

Present predictions are that all four of the new classrooms under construction will be occupied during the 1957-1958 school year. It is felt that three sections of the second and third grades will be needed. At present each of these grades has two sections. The two temporary classrooms housed in the activity room and the two new second and third grade sections will require the utilization of all available room.

The scholastic census for January of 1957 shows an increase of thirty-three above that of January 1956. The January 1957 census indicates a total of 574 in scholastic population.

## City Secretary To Roswell Hearing

In their meeting last Thursday night, the city council authorized Rod Duff, city secretary, to testify at a hearing in Roswell, N.M., in March, on a proposed overnight motor freight service from Dallas to Roswell with an authorized loading station in Plains. The testimony being sought is that more adequate service from motor freight is needed by the city of Plains.

All expense shall be paid by the company desiring to establish the over-night service.

## Plains Announces Instigation of New Policy on Sewer Charges

Beginning the first of March, sewer charges will be made on all houses and businesses on lots that are adjacent to the sewer in the street. The sewer service, it is pointed out by city officials, is not a revenue utility but a service that is desired by the citizens of any city because of the constant danger and hazards of pit privies from the standpoint of health.

The city of Plains has an ordinance, as does almost every other city, that all houses and businesses must be tied to the sewer where the service is available.

The service has been available for most houses and businesses for more than six months, but due to many circumstances, such as lack of plumbers, no concentrated effort has been made to stay within the regulations. Since the service has been provided there is an expense, part of which must be prorated by sewer charge until such time as the city revenue utilities shall be adequate to support the entire cost of service.

## Teachers to Attend Meet March 7-8

The 22nd annual convention of West Texas Teachers Association will meet in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium-Coliseum March 7-8, 1957.

Teachers of the Plains school will attend Friday and Saturday all day, with no school being held Friday in Plains.

All schools in district IV are represented by delegates and their alternates. Delegates and alternates from Plains are D. N. Taylor, Ella Zinn, Wallace Randolph and Fern Mikeska.

There will be different meetings all through the convention, concerning needs of the schools of this area. It should be beneficial to all those attending.

The traditional sale, which concluded the 5th annual Yoakum County Junior Fat Stock Show, returned a total sum of \$17,454.72 for the 111 head exhibited, it was revealed yesterday following the completion of the report.

According to Leo White, county agent, the sale was very much a success. Last year, the sale realized \$16,400 from a total of 95 animals entered.

Auctioneer Hank Matthews of Anton had a busy afternoon as he rolled 44 calves, 55 barrows, and 12 lambs over the block before a crowd of some 250 interested spectators and buyers.

The 44 steers sold for an average of \$35.25 per hundred pounds, while the average price

for pigs in the auction was \$36. Lambs brought an average of \$67 per hundred. Several animals were bought and donated to various organizations, then resold while the animals were still in the ring.

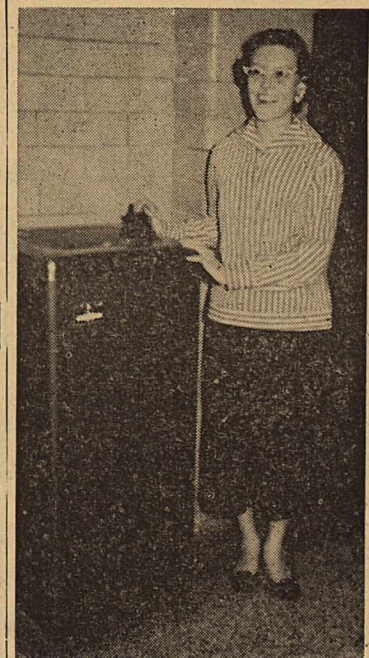
## Credit Union Has Successful Meet Here Monday Night



BENTON, COUNTY JUDGE, absent; VANCE W. BROWN, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1, Presiding; H. C. COTTON, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; GENE PAYNE, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; CLYDE TROUT, COMMISSIONER, Precinct 4; being present and participating; there came on to be considered the petition of Tom Lesh and 56 others, for an election to be held in said Yoakum County, Texas, to determine whether or not bonds to be issued by said Yoakum County to the amount of \$715,000 for the purpose of construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in Yoakum County, Texas, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property in said County, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity; and  
IT APPEARING to the said Court that said petition is signed by more than Fifty (50) qualified property taxpaying voters of said Yoakum County, Texas; and  
IT FURTHER APPEARING that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in said Yoakum County, Texas;  
IT IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED AND ORDERED by

the said Court that an election be held in said County on the 2nd day of April, 1957, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Yoakum County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$715,000) in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in Yoakum County, Texas; said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND THREE FOURTHS PER CENTUM (3-3/4%) per annum, and to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Ten (10) years from the date thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied annually upon the property in said Yoakum County, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the annual interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at maturity.

THE SAID ELECTION shall be held under the provisions of the Acts of the Thirty-ninth Legislature, First Called Session, Chapter 16, as amended.  
ALL PERSONS who are legally qualified voters of said Yoakum County, Texas, who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Peddlers' Ordinance

An ordinance defining and regulating itinerant merchants, itinerant vendors, peddlers, and persons taking orders for or offering for sale, goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines providing for a license and license fee; prohibiting selling or soliciting without then carrying such license while so engaged; requiring such person or persons to make application for license, therein making full disclosure of all matters pertinent to such activity; requiring a bond; exempting those engaged in interstate commerce from license fee and bond but requiring such persons to register with the city secretary and submit all information pertinent to such activity; providing penalties for the violation of this ordinance, including a fine not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense and defining what shall constitute separate offense; providing a savings clause and repealing conflicting ordinances or parts of ordinances.

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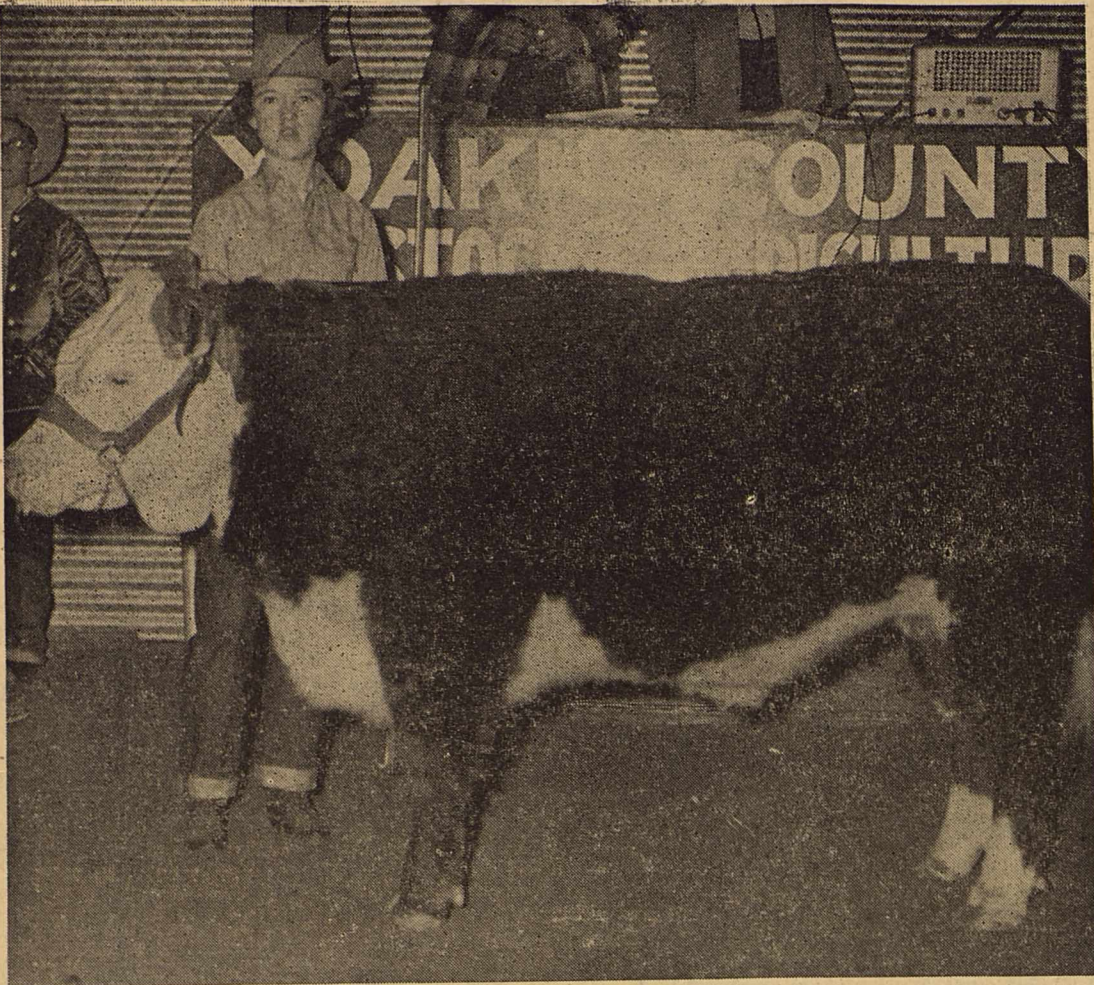

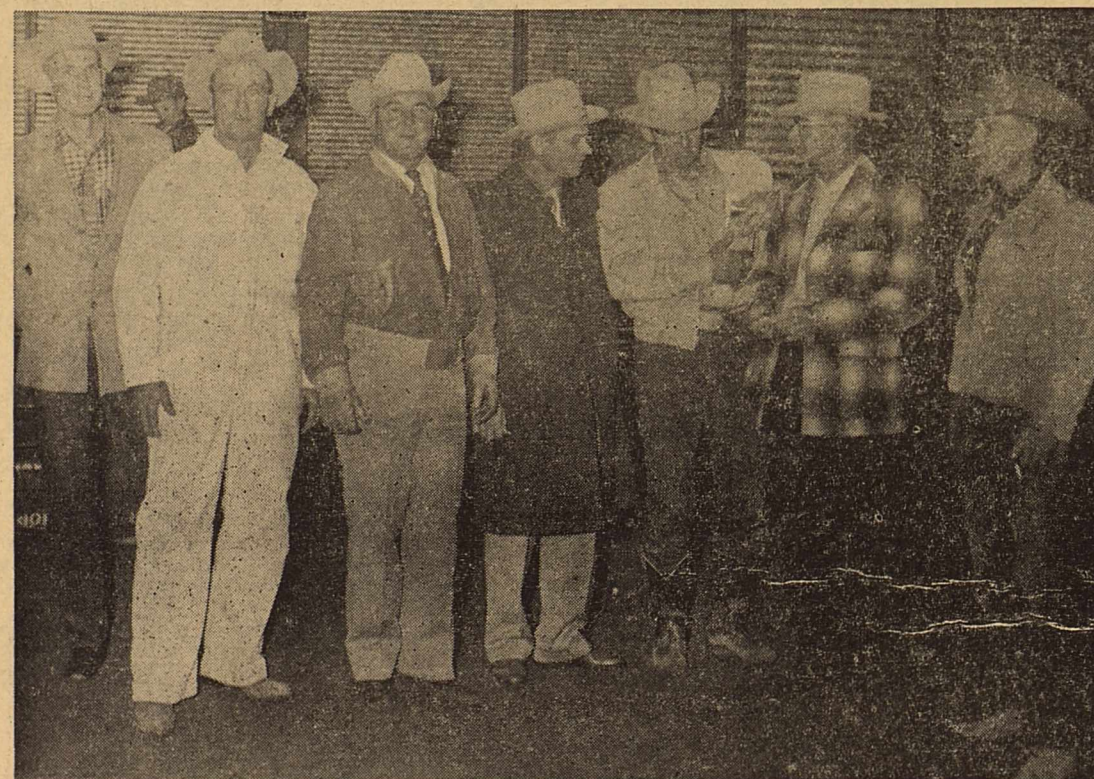

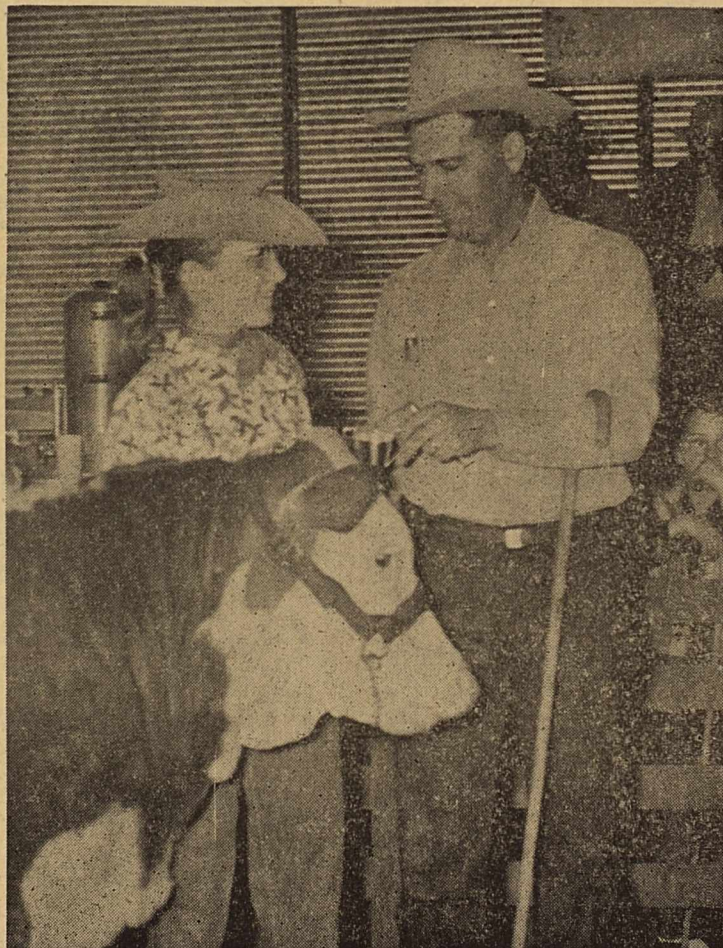

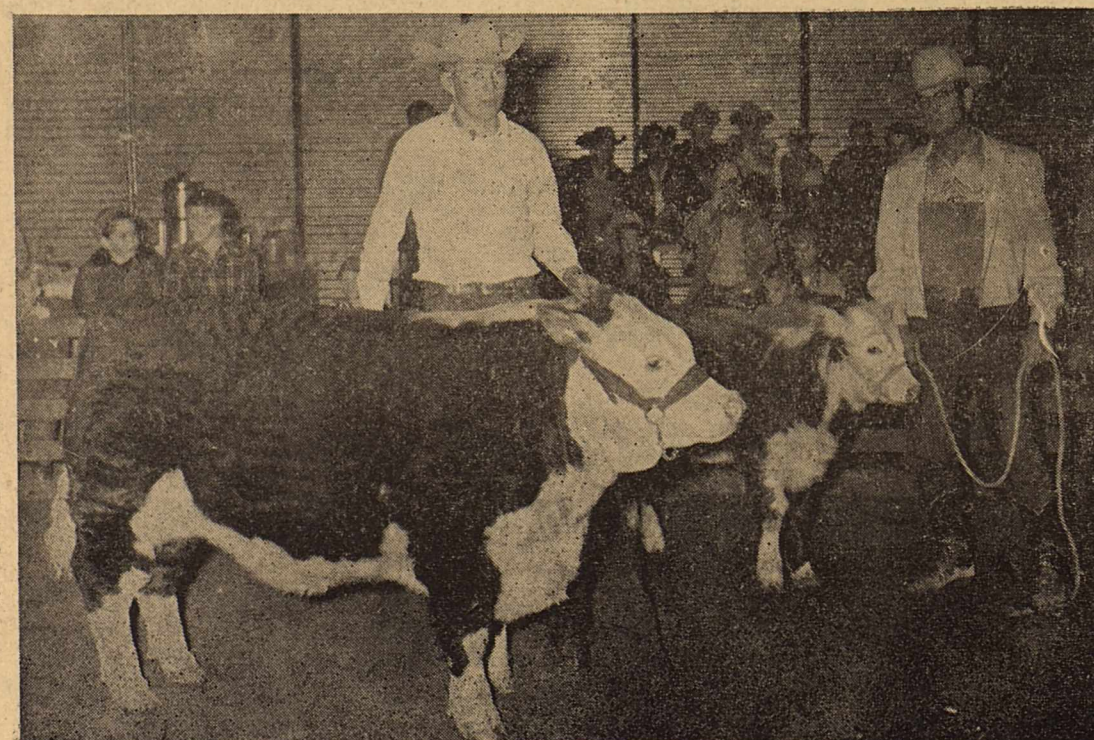

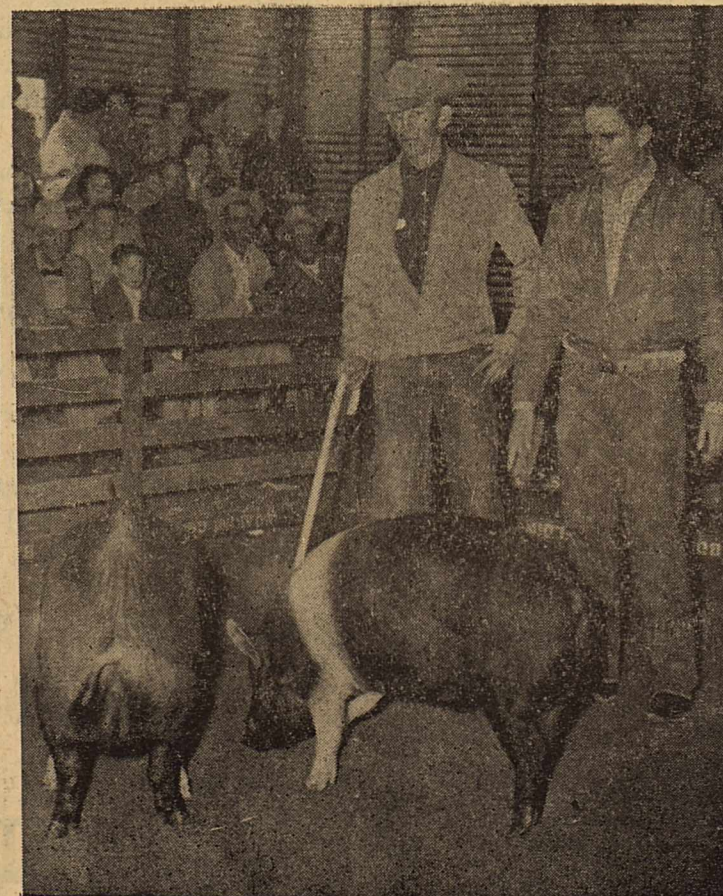

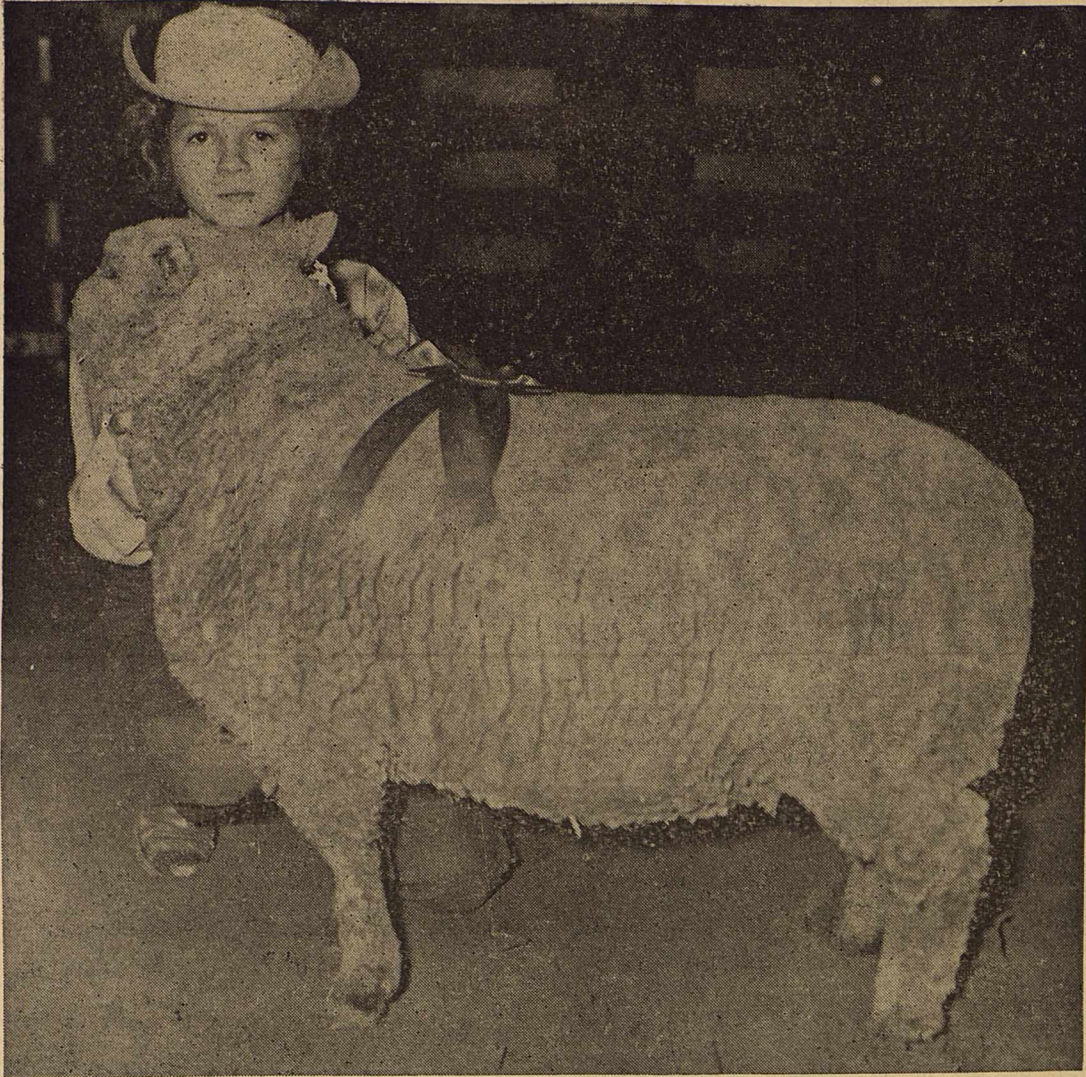

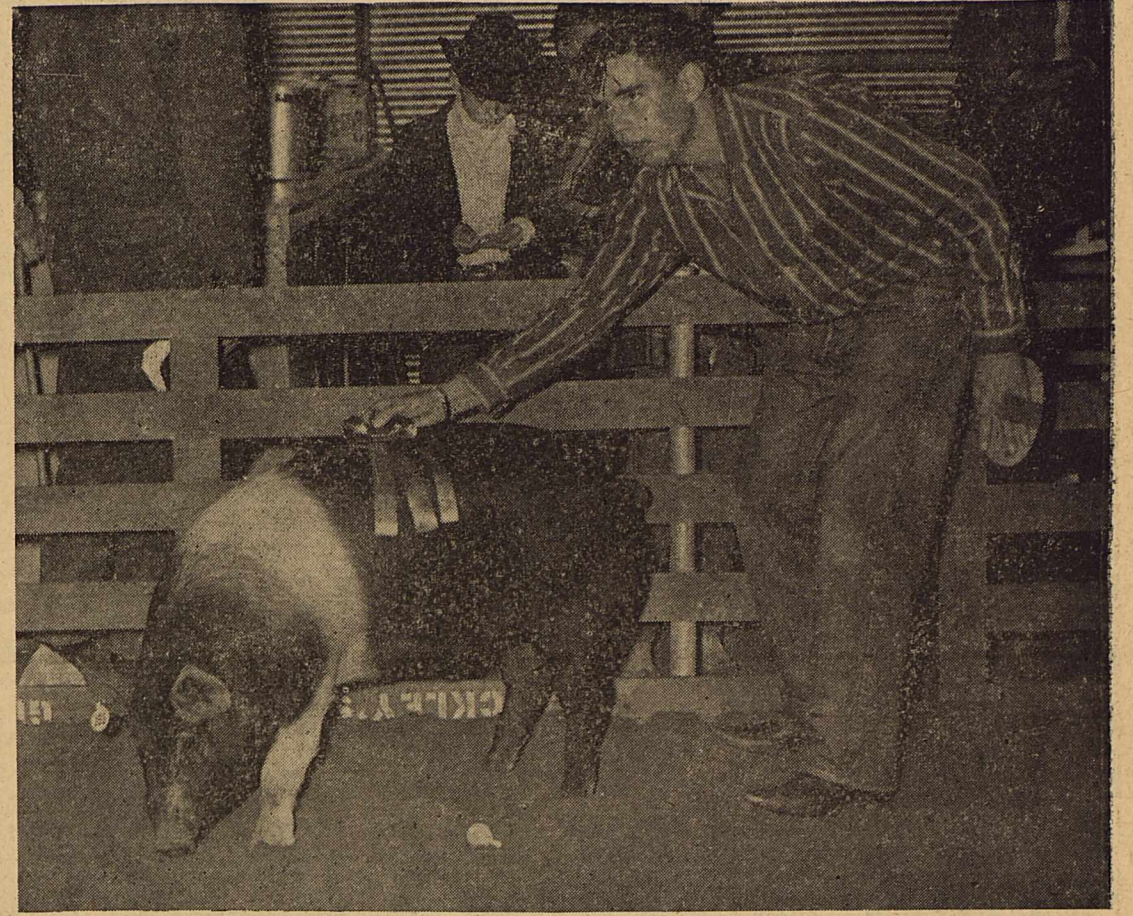

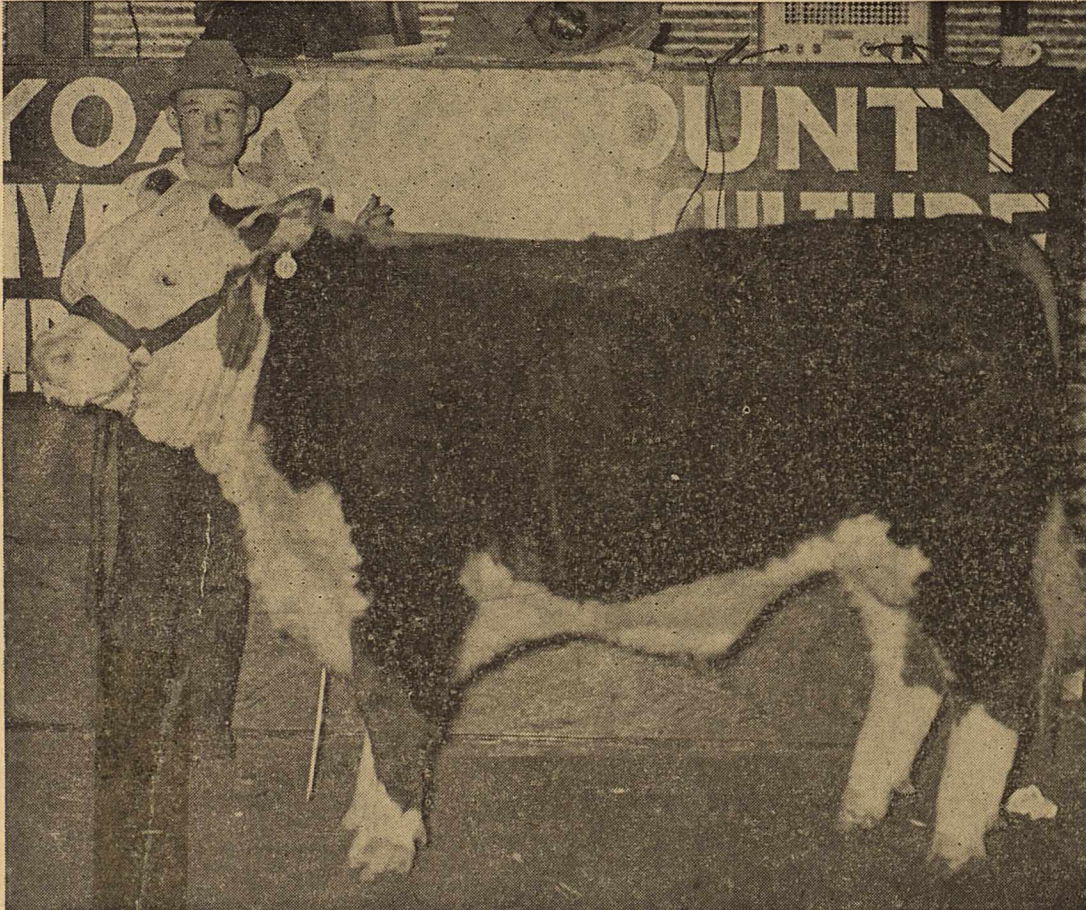

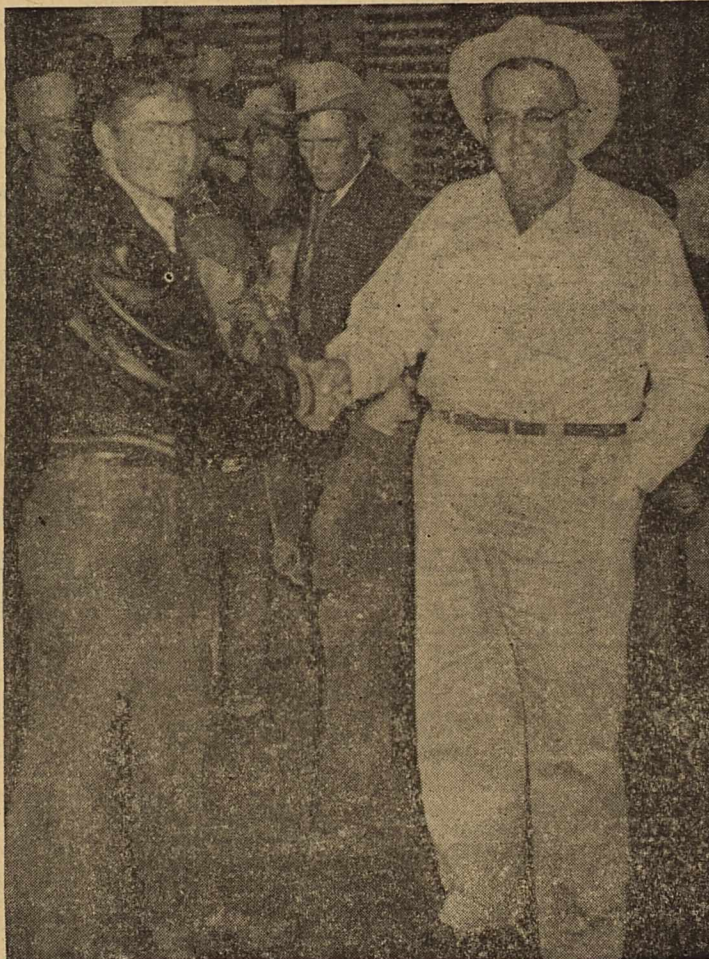

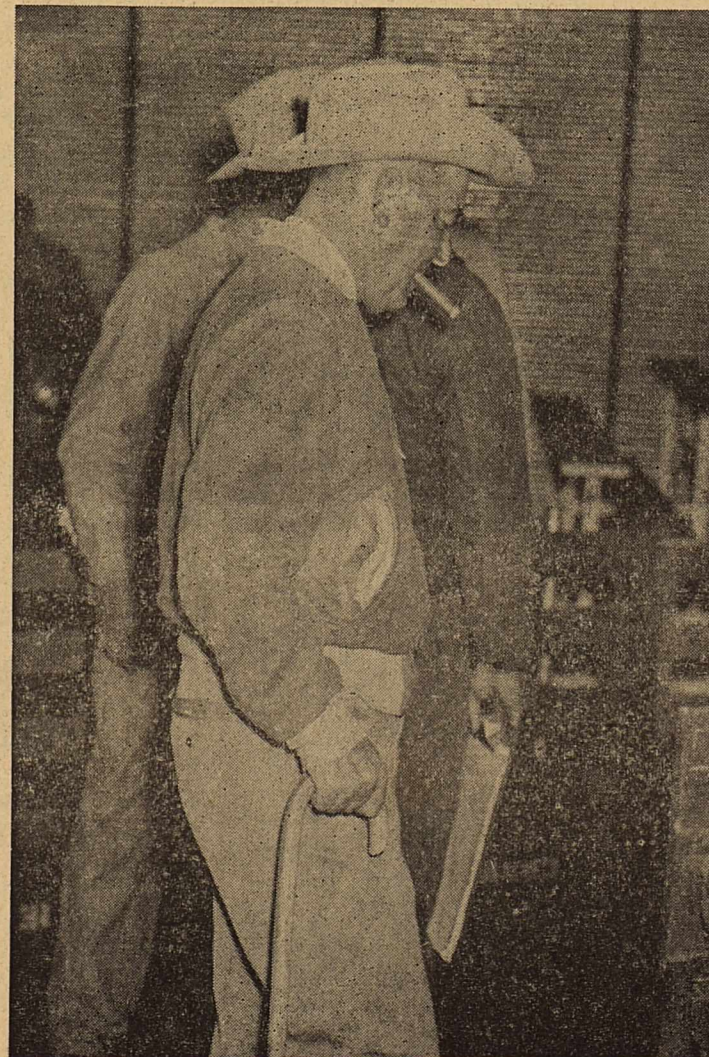

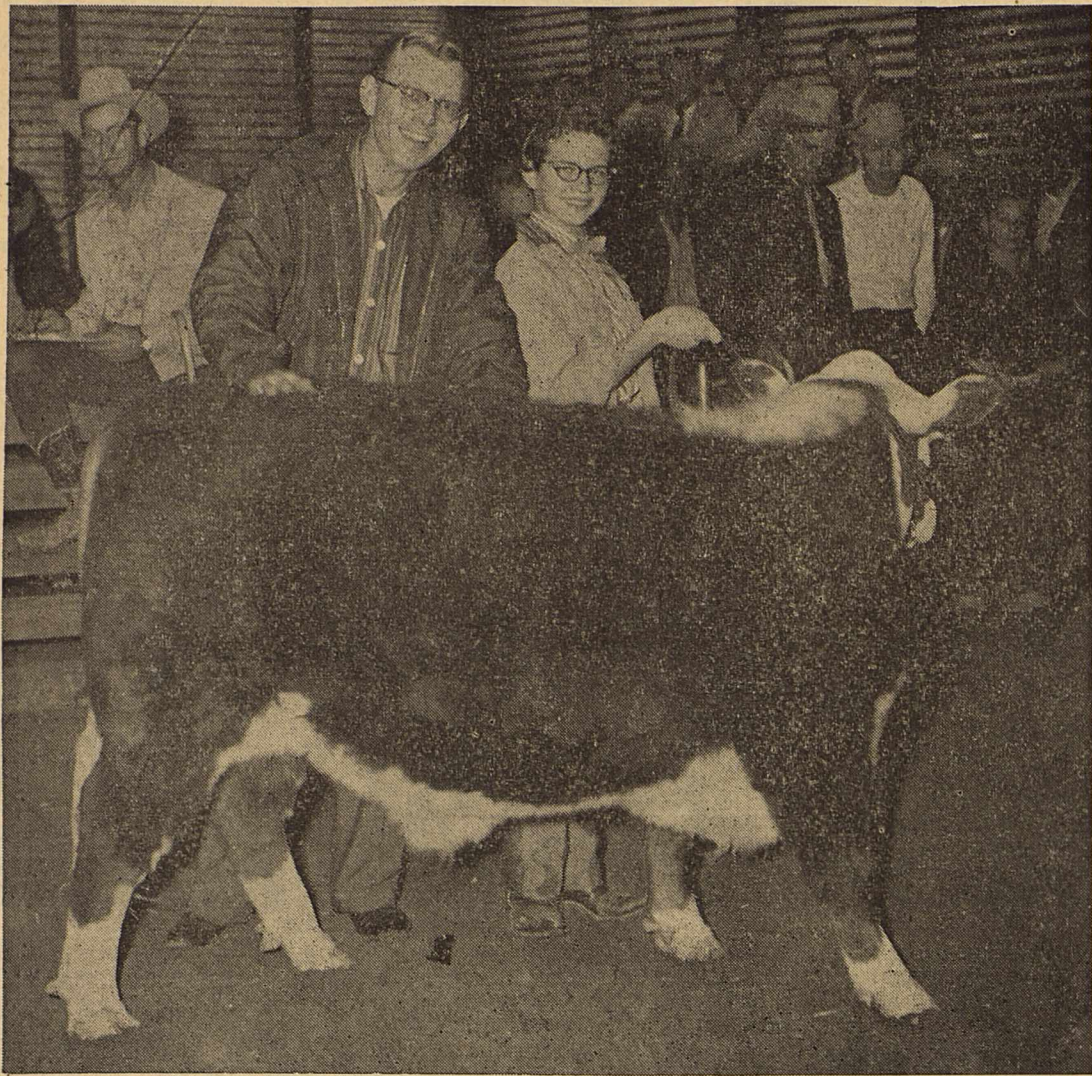

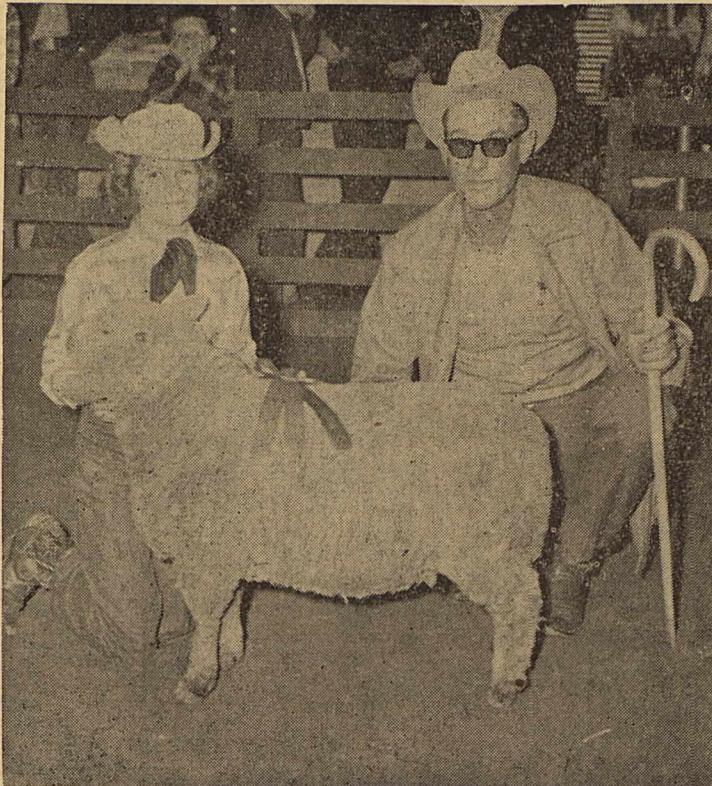

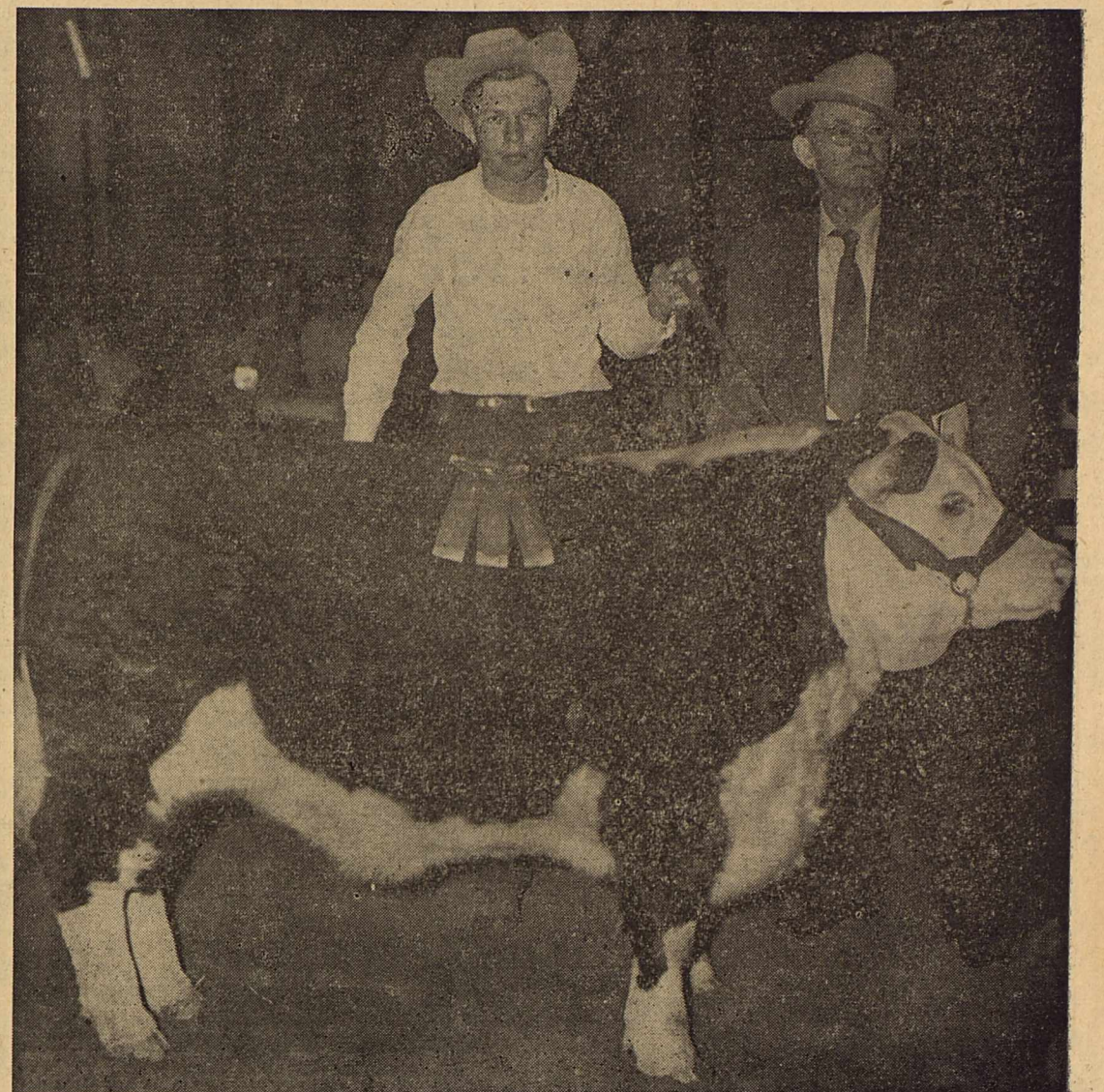

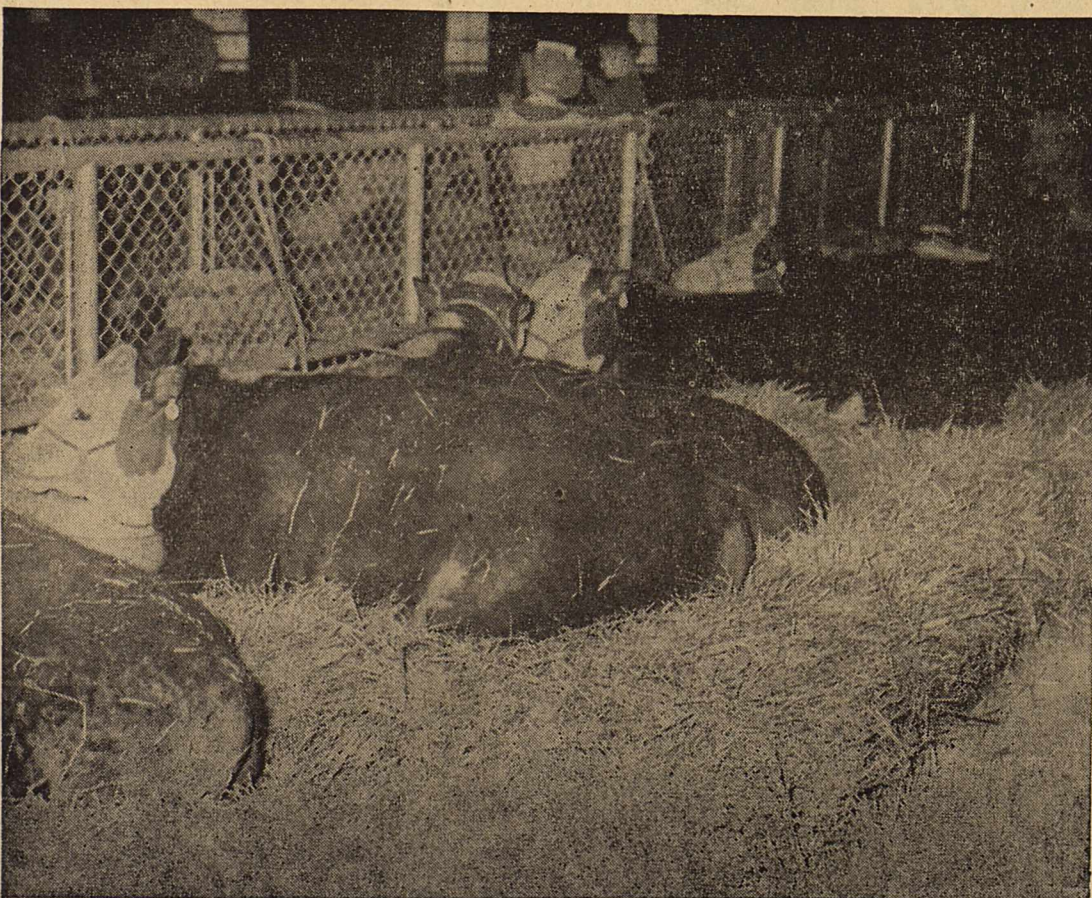

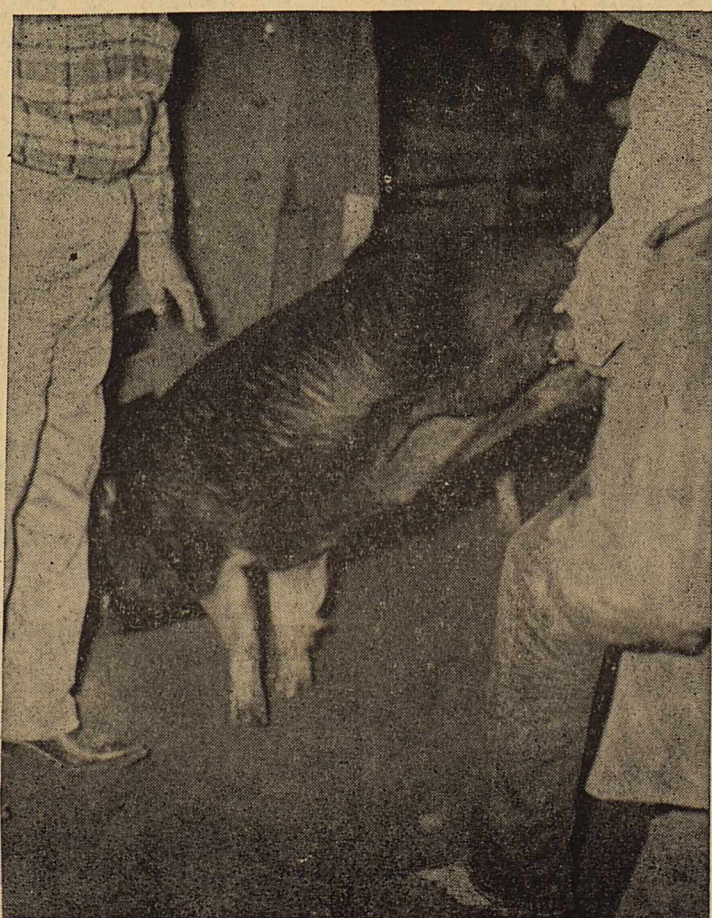

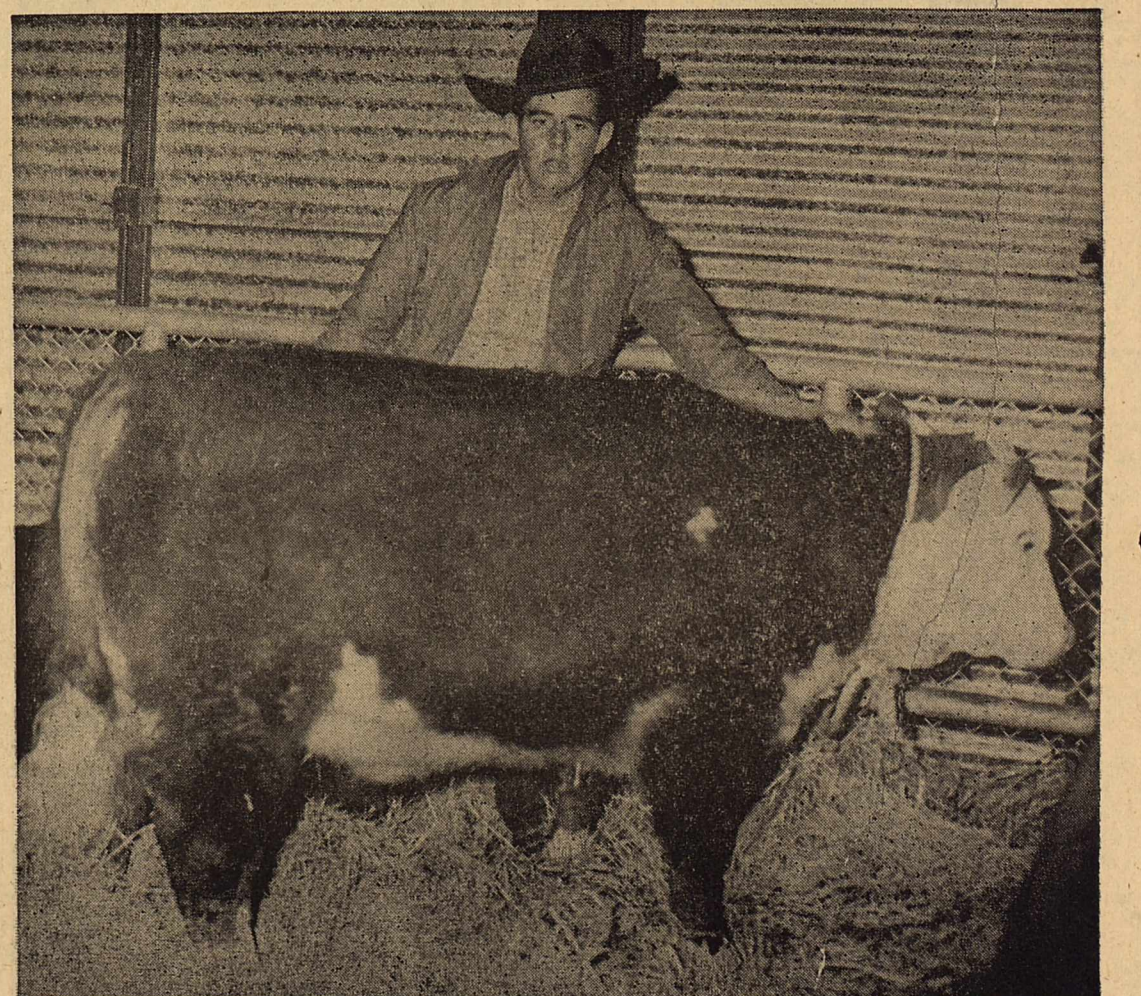
