## County Endorses Tower, Plains Votes for Wright

Carlos Z. Ynsfran

### Paraguay Native Visits Here

A University of Texas post-graduate student from Paraguay was a brief visitor in Plains Monday.

Carlos Z. Ynsfran stopped at the telephone company, the library and the newspaper office for short visits while waiting for his car to be cleaned up at a local service station.

The visitor has traveled more than 95,000 miles in an effort to see as much of the world as possible. This was his first visit to this area, he said. In fact, he has never been farther west than El Paso.

A history major, Ynsfran says he hopes to hit the Western states and New England before long, thus completing his tour of the US. "I hope to go to Japan one of these days," he remarked. "If I do, I'll embark from the Pacific Northwest and go by way of Alaska."

Ynsfran has traveled extensively in his native South America, as well as in Europe. He got his first glimpse of the US in 1928 when he moved with his family to Washington, D. C., where his father was in the diplomatic service.

The family went back to South America, but returned to Washington in 1938. The following year, the Ynsfrans moved to Buenos Aires where the father served as a writer for United Press and for La Prensa, the great Argentine newspaper which was later to make world headlines during the Peron era.

In 1942, young Carlos joined his father in Austin. The elder Ynsfran had taken a professorship at the University. Except for a part of World War II when he served in Army Intelligence with the Air Corps, he has lived in Austin since. He is a graduate of the university.

Although Paraguay was settled by the Spaniards and Spanish is the native tongue, Ynsfran is neither Spanish looking nor

### Blakley Is Distant 4th In Balloting

Yoakum County voters gave Republican John Tower a healthy edge in Tuesday's special Senate election, but Plains' four boxes gave Jim Wright a decided advantage.

Tower received 318 votes in the county, while Wright got 211. Will Wilson ran a close third with 194 and Senator William Blakley, Tower's runoff opponent, was a distant fourth with just 107 votes.

Thus, Yoakum County again voted for a Republican just as it did in November's presidential election. This is insignificant, however, since Tower was the only major candidate wearing the donkey tangle, while all of his chief competitors were Democrats.

Of the county's nine voting boxes, Wright carried six of them, including three of four in Plains. Tower led the voting in just two precincts, both at Denver City, and Blakley held a narrow edge in voting in the other Plains box. Tower built up his margin, however, with a good vote in practically every precinct.

While Wright led Tower in all four Plains boxes, 26-15, 13-8, 23-11 and 19-15, the Republican candidate led Wright in all three Denver City precincts, 101-57, 34-19, and 121-33. At Turner, Wright led by a 12-3 margin and at Sligo it was 9-5 in Wright's favor. Tower held the upper hand in absentee vote with 8, while Wright had not a one.

Yoakum County should be a hot bed for political activity in the upcoming runoff campaign. Tower supporters have every right to be pleased with his vote here. Blakley, banking his hopes on most of the support which went to Wright, Wilson and other contenders, apparently needs a lot of work here since his small vote indicates that he is not too popular in these parts.

**Velma Warren Is Elected President of Iota Pi**

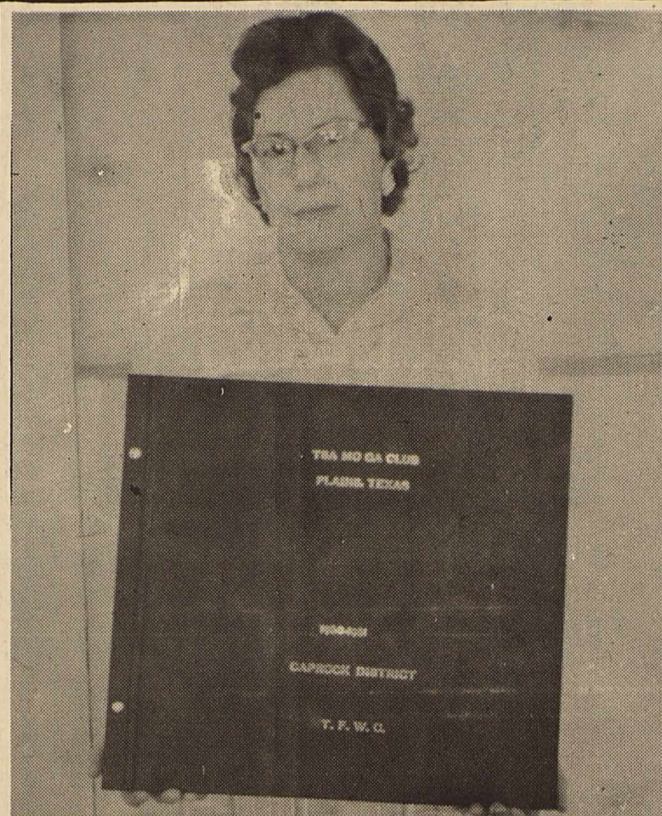
Velma Warren was elected

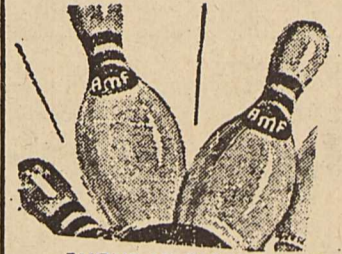

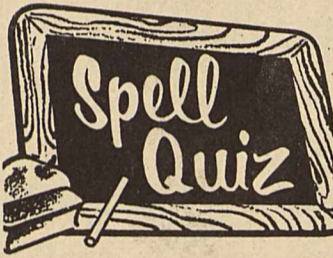

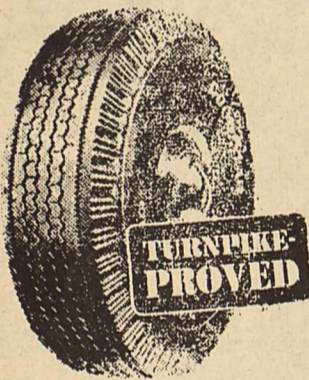

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families as any town its size. Conspicuous by its absence is the name of Johnson, the name which experts claim ranks next to Smith and Jones in national popularity.

Several other popular names are listed just once. Among these are Wilson, Green, Hill, Hunter, Miller, Phillips, Price, Simpson, Stewart, West and Wright.

Appearing just twice in the directory are such popular names as Cox, Moore, Williams and Young.

The name of Plains precedes 19 listings, most of them businesses which incorporate the name of the town into their firm names.

By letters, the listings under C outnumber all others with 79, with 16 of these being county offices.

By contrast, there are no listings under O, X and Z, only one under I and two under V.

Crutcher Leads Junior Track Team to Title

Dennis Crutcher led the Plains Junior High track team to victory in the meet held here last Tuesday.

Competing against seventh and eighth graders, the Plains seventh grader captured three first places. He won the 50-yard dash with a 6.0 mark, the 100-yard dash in 11.4 and tossed the shot 38-11 1/2.

Contesting him for individual honors was Cathey of Seagraves who also won three firsts, in the low hurdles, discuss and high jump.

Plains piled up 37 1/2 points for the top team effort, barely nosing out Seagraves which had 36 and Frenship with 30. Tatum had 28 points in the evenly contested meet.

Cowboys Eye District

Their own meet title tucked safely away, the Plains Cowboy track team attempts to re-capture the district 5-A championship Saturday in Andrews.

Preliminaries in the district relays are scheduled for Saturday morning with finals following that afternoon.

Freshmen and junior high boys also will compete in the meet. Individuals and relay teams plowing first and second in the district will advance to the regional in Lubbock.

The Cowboys competed against all 5-A schools in the invitational meet held here last Thursday. Although they won, the hairline margin of victory indicated to all that a district championship won't come easy.

Plains wound up with 86 1/6 points, just one more than O'Donnell. The meet was run off in extremely bad weather conditions. It rained, sleeted, hailed and snowed during the day. Nevertheless, the Cowboys and the visitors posted some good times.

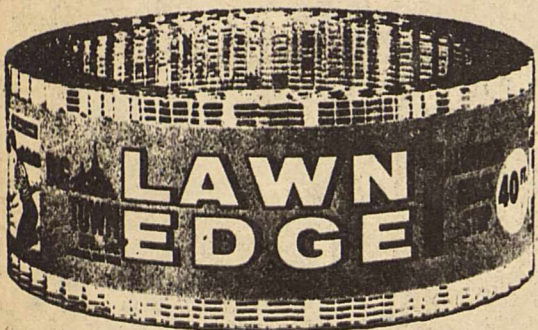

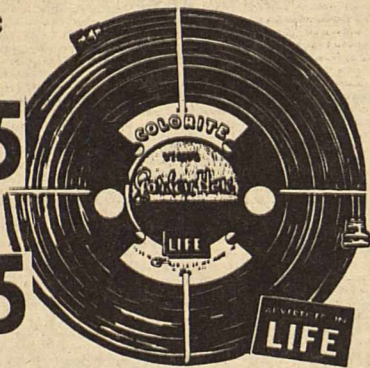

Principal speaker at the general convention session Tuesday was Dr. James H. Jauncey of El Paso.

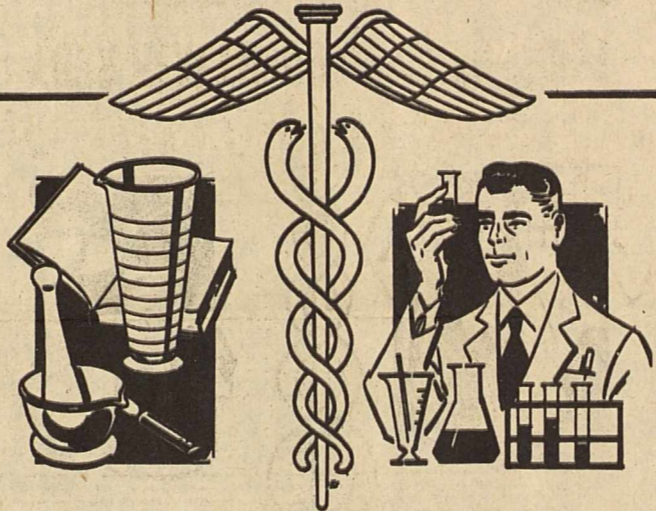
Dr. Cleo Dawson of Lexington, Ky., was featured at the "New Dimensions in Public Affairs" banquet that night.

Spanish acting. His mother came from northern Italy. As a child in Washington, he says he learned to speak English before he did Spanish.

Of his native country, the visitor depicted it as a strife-torn nation, ruled by a dictator and always in danger of revolution. "A revolution nearly always occurs during an election and they can be rough," he said, "Twenty-five were killed during the 1954 election."

Paraguay, despite its dictatorship and a well organized Communist party, enjoys very good relations with this country, according to Ynsfran.

The country is small---only 267 square miles---and has a population of less than a million. The population usually is listed as around one and a half million, Ynsfran says, but there are not that many people. He explains there are about 100,000 families and the average size is between 7 and 8.

The army has about 30,000 soldiers, quite a number for a country the size of Paraguay. "Add to this the number of policemen and you have a pretty good per cent of the population in uniform," Ynsfran said.

Ynsfran's grandfather was a senator who was killed in a shooting spree in the legislature before the turn of the century. His great grandfather was killed in 1870 during the war with Brazil.

According to Ynsfran, Havana is one of the most beautiful cities in the world. "I've been there several times," he says, "once since Castro took over. It's not the same any more."
