Talk of reviving vocational agriculture as a course in Plains High School got me into an interesting conversation the other day.

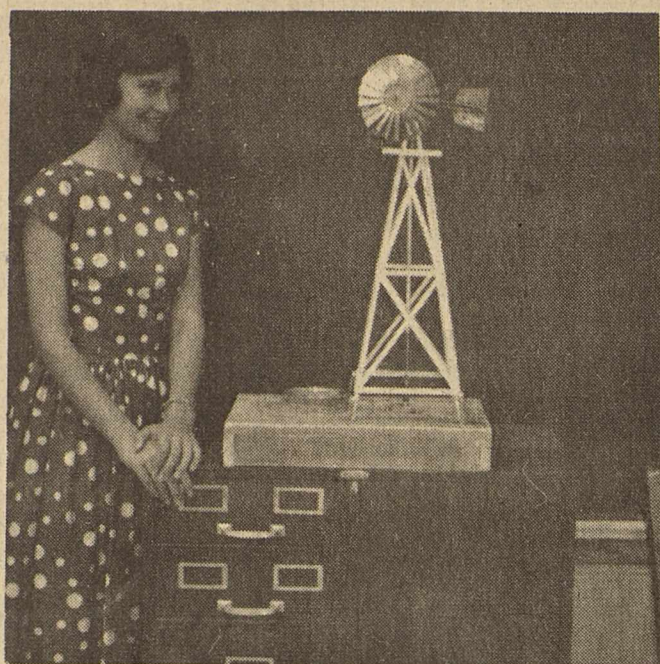

## Long Dream Of Church Is Realized

Formal dedication of the beautiful new sanctuary of Plains Methodist Church will be held Sunday. All residents of the community are cordially invited to attend the special services.

Bishop Paul V. Galloway of San Antonio, bishop of the Northwest Texas Conference, will bring the 11 a. m. service. Sunday School begins an hour earlier.

After church, members and visitors will meet at the school cafeteria for lunch. Local guests have been asked to bring their own food.

From 3 to 4 p. m. Sunday, a special program honoring "oldtimers" will be held. Guests also are invited to this service.

Completion of the new church sanctuary climaxed a long drive by local Methodists. Construction began last summer, but the building has been in the planning stages for years.

The brick building, equipped with completely new fixtures and carpets, is completely paid for, Methodists proudly claim. Church officials estimate the improvement project would have cost \$50,000. Actual cost ran \$33,000, but much work and many supplies were donated free of charge.

The old sanctuary of the church has been given a face-lifting and converted into classrooms. New brick extends all the way around the former sanctuary, as well as around a part of the Fellowship Hall.

Pastor of the church, the Rev. R. H. Meixner, explained that an unusual spirit of cooperation and enthusiasm has prevailed throughout the long building program. He said the church had received cooperation from many, many persons who were members of other churches.

Methodists left nothing undone in their efforts to build and maintain the modern church. New song books, vacuum cleaners and a lawn mower have been arranged for. A move now is underway to obtain an organ and a recording system to broadcast church music from the tower.

Contractor for the new building was the Rev. Hugh Hunt, Lubbock church architect.

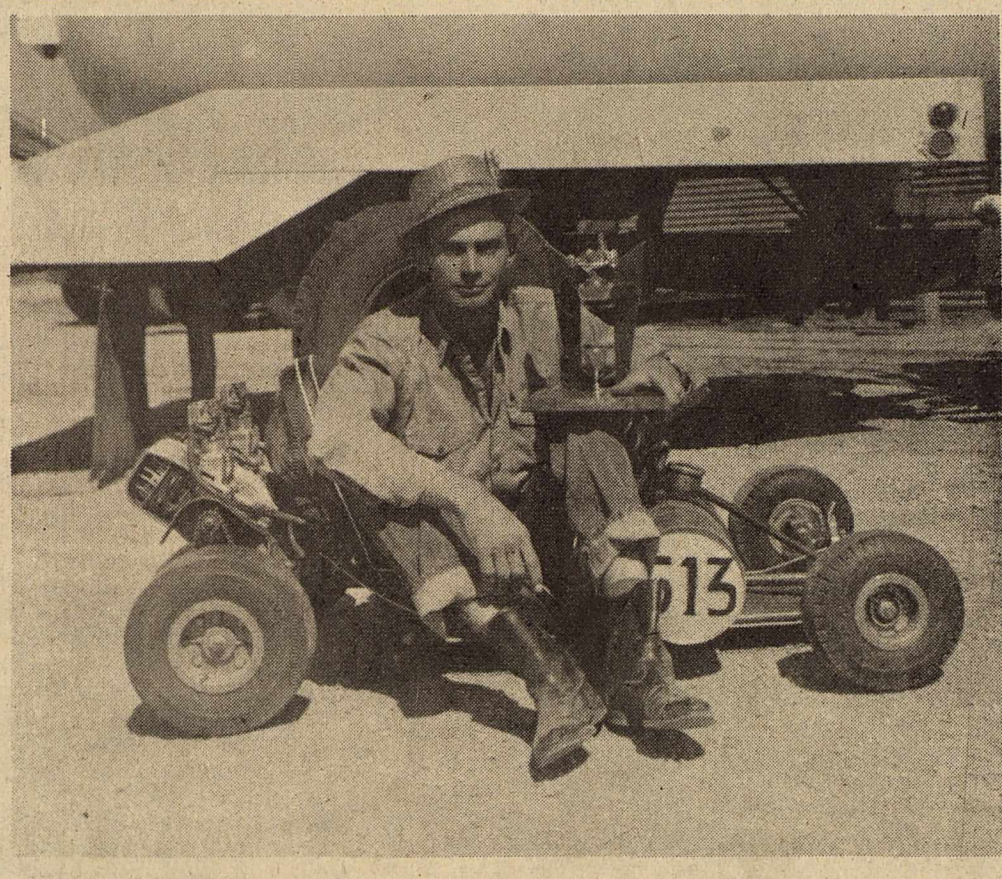

## Rodeo Plans Are Announced

The annual rodeo in Plains will be presented Aug. 10, 11 and 12, according to an announcement issued by members of the Roping Club, Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the event.

Dick Ratzen of Happy will produce the rodeo. Sponsors have entered into an agreement with Ratzen to furnish the stock.

Preliminary details for the summer show were worked out Monday night during a meeting of representatives of the three sponsoring organizations.

Duties of members of the three groups will be the same as last year, it was decided. Representatives will meet again in the Commissioners Court room May 8 to work out further details.

As in the past, a queen contest will be conducted prior to the rodeo. It was decided at Monday's meeting that clubs sponsoring queen candidates will be able to go together with one other organization in sponsoring a candidate. The fact that so many clubs have members who also are members of other clubs prompted this move.

Just what prize will be given away has not been fully decided. A Shetland pony was given last year. Officials are considering the possibility of awarding a saddle this time, while not dismissing the possibility of a pony.

Whether or not to conduct beard-growing contests was discussed at length, but no definite action taken.

A parade will precede the opening night rodeo performance. The parade will be on Thursday afternoon before the rodeo opens that night. Prizes may be awarded to the best parade exhibits. This was not done last year, but officials feel that it may be a good idea this time to reward those who spend so much time in getting ready for the parade.

A big barbecue and Old Settlers picnic will be held at the park, as was done last year. This event is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 12, last day of the rodeo. Plans for a dance during the rodeo also are being made.

Rodeo events will include bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, bulldogging, barrel racing, team roping and bull riding.

## New Building Planned

Construction was to begin this week on a large 50x90 foot business building north of the court house square. Ty Field is owner of the property and T. C. Hightower is building contractor.

The big brick and tile building will be located just east of Plains State Bank.

Modern in every detail, the new building will be divided into two different stores. The east portion will be 30 feet wide and the west part 20 ft.

Field said Monday that he had commitments from two businesses to lease the building. No contracts had been signed, however, and he withheld names of the firms.

Hightower said the building would be completed within the next few weeks.

Construction of the new business building, to be one of the largest in Plains, will go a long way toward building up

the north side of the square. Since the \$90,000 bank building was constructed more than a year ago, the bank has had the north side of the square all

to itself.

It has long been the goal of local business leaders to get the business district more concentrated.

# HOSPITAL WOULD BE CHEAP

It is rumors to the contrary, approval of a \$5,000 bond issue for a hospital in Plains would be virtually negligible to the Yoakum taxpayer.

According to a representative of a bonding agency, approval of the bond issue would mean the annual taxes on a \$10,000 home would be \$1.20. Very few, if any, landowners pay as much as \$5 a year in increased taxes.

Only those blind to the needs of others could dispute the need for a hospital. A hasty study of local conditions should convince all doubters.

Under present conditions, both Plains doctors are compelled to admit emergency patients to the hospital in Denver City. This necessitates frequent trips to Denver City. In a seven-day period, it is not uncommon for Plains doctors to make as many as 30 roundtrips to Denver City.

In maternity cases, local doctors stay with their patients until after the baby is born and they can be assured that all is well. It's not uncommon for this to take as long as 36 hours. Meanwhile, the needs of patients at home are being neglected.

Because of this arrangement, people of Plains and the Plains area are not receiving proper medical attention. Often, a person in need of hospitalization is forced to stay home so that he or she may be close to the attending physician. Consequently, doctors often take the attitude that a person is better off at home even if that person needs hospital care.

There are many other facts to support a hospital in Plains. Not the least of these is the fact that Plains and the Plains area are growing very rapidly. A 14-bed hospital in Plains is pretty well in line with the recommended population-hospital ratio recommended by experts. Failure to allow some room for future growth would be a fatal mistake.

County-wide endorsement of the bond issue could be a tremendous step forward for Yoakum County. It would offer the badly needed proof that citizens of this county are not blind to the needs of others.

According to the Plains physician, whose experience qualifies him as an authority on hospital matters, proper management could make the Plains hospital on at least a break-even basis. Lone possible exception, he says, would be charity cases which already are the responsibility of the county.

People of Plains have worked long and hard on the hospital project. They have figures to support their beliefs that a hospital is needed. A professional survey team has confirmed their beliefs.

WHEREAS, a petition has been duly presented to the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, requesting this Court to order that an election be held at the earliest possible date in said County to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued to the total principal amount of ONE HUNDRED NINETY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$195,000), for the purpose of expanding Yoakum County Hospital facilities in the City of Plains, Texas.

AND WHEREAS, this Court, upon due advice and investigation has ascertained and determined that said petition is in compliance with Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended and is signed by more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of Yoakum County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and that such petition should be granted, and that the election as prayed for in such petition should be ordered; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 28th day of April, 1961, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED NINETY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$195,000), to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY FIVE (25) years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENT (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to levy ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging the present County Hospital facilities by erecting, constructing and equipping of an additional hospital building to be located in the City of Plains, Texas, and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution and Chapter 1, Title 22 and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and all persons who are legal voters of said Yoakum County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 8 V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

Plains. But both merchants were quick to point out that Denver City firms sold the same goods.

Although Brownfield is twice as far from Plains as is Denver City, people prefer to take the longer route for their needs. One reason is that Plains always has felt pretty closely associated with Brownfield. Many living here now moved here from Terry County. This has been true since frontier days, long before there was a Denver City.

But the main reason cannot be overlooked. It stems from the fact that Yoakum County's two towns have never been too friendly toward each other. Far too many small incidents have been made into treacherous mountains by those who delight in agitation.

Surely, somewhere, there must be a solution to this ticklish problem which has seriously injured this county.

# Pastors Have Served Methodist Church Here

The Methodist Church has had at least 21 pastors since it was organized in 1912. It has probably had more, but there is no record of pastors between 1912 and 1928.

The first minister of the local church was C. E. Jameson, who resides in Odessa. Jameson organized the church in 1912. He conducted Methodist services in the old court house since 1908.

In 1912, in November, the church obtained its first appointed minister, S. B. Cox. He served until 1914 when he was succeeded by Rev. Harry Fryar. Next was J. M. Fryar, who came here in 1916.

Following Fryar was a Rev. Harry. Church records fail to give his first name and the dates he served.

Oden was appointed pastor in 1921. No one is sure how long he served. Next pastor was C. M. Curry,

who assumed duties in 1928. W. L. Porterfield, still an active Methodist minister at Anson, came here in 1932 and remained one year. He was followed by A. D. Moore.

Jesse Young, now a minister at Sundown, arrived in 1934 for a two-year stay. Next came C. A. Duncan in 1936, L. C. Morrison in 1939, W. E. Anderson in 1941 and A. O. Graydon in 1942.

Allen Forbus currently a pastor at Ropesville, took over the local church in 1944 and served until 1946 when he was

succeeded by Conrad Ryan. Ryan now lives at Ralls.

E. L. Naugle, now of Hereford, became local pastor in 1950. He was followed in 1951 by Roy Patterson, now of Matador. Next pastor was F. R. Pickens, who now lives in retirement, at Stanford, and then Roy Havens, who lives in Snyder.

The Rev. R. H. Meixner, current pastor, came here in 1956. In all probability, he has held the pastorate of the local church longer than any man since the church was founded.

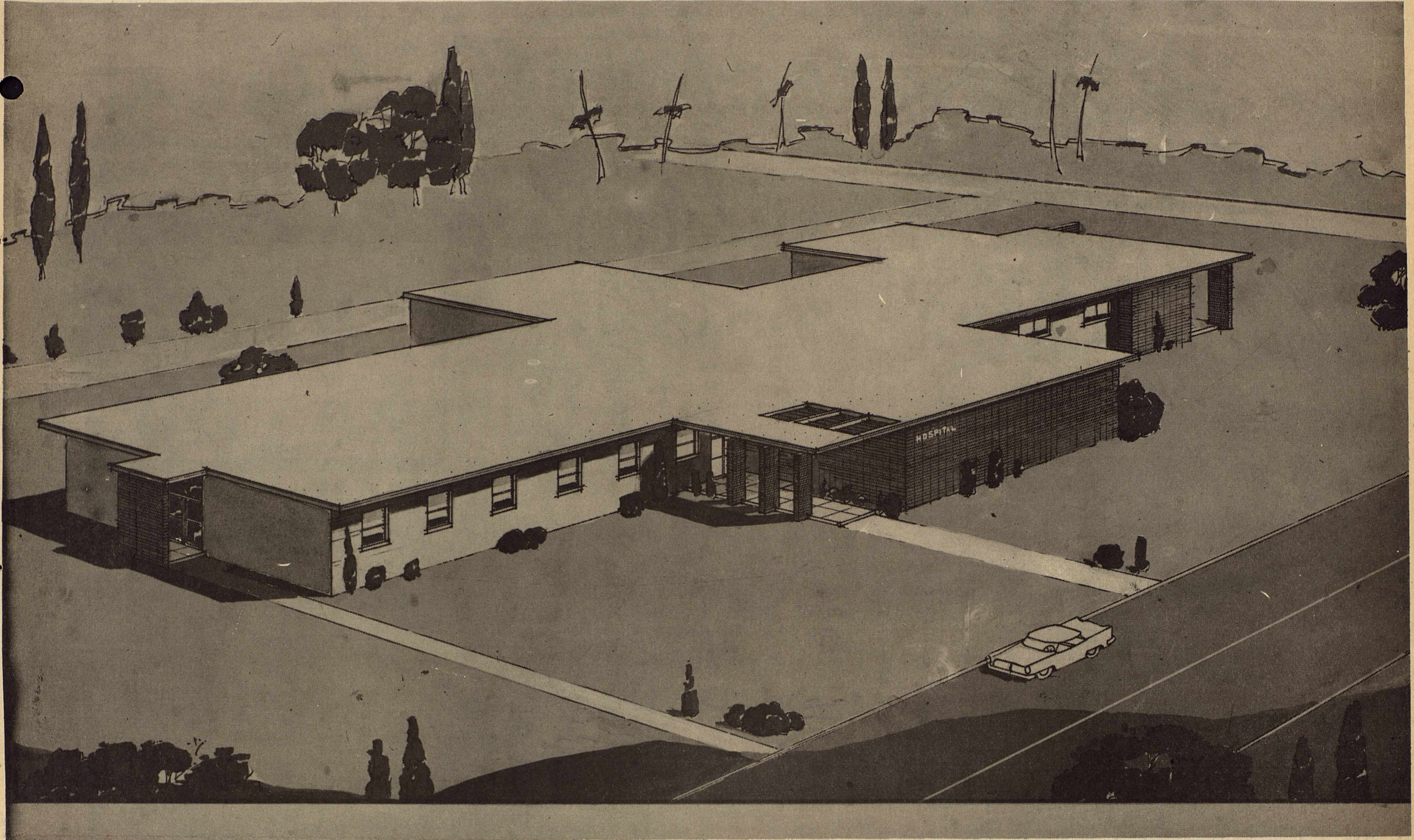

### Guetersloh Takes Second In 65-Mile Go-Kart Race

Roy Guetersloh of Plains won second place in a grueling 65-mile race Sunday at the International Kart Race in Lubbock. Guetersloh competed in the B Super class.

Two hundred and twenty-five of the top Go-Kart racers in the United States and Canada competed in the Lubbock event. All 225 of the Karts were on the track at the same time,

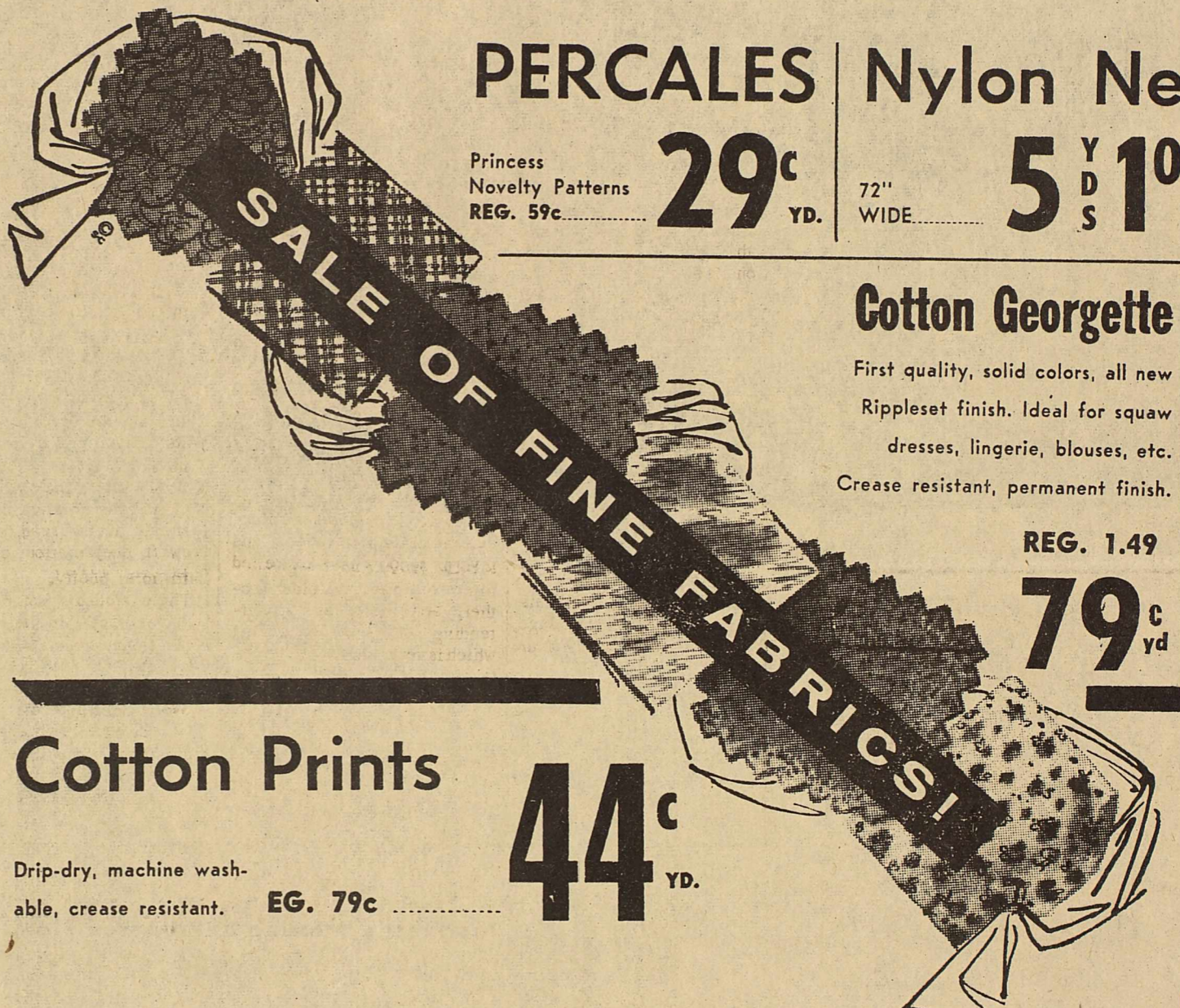

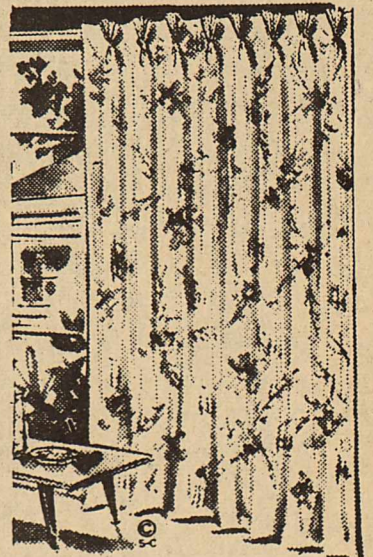

### New Sanctuary Marks 7th Church Building Program

Completion of the new Methodist Church sanctuary marks the seventh major building project completed since Methodist church services began here in 1908.

Early pioneers of the Metho-

dist faith worshipped in the old court house building. With the Rev. C. E. Jameson as pastor, Methodists continued to hold services there until the church was organized four years later. First building was constructed

at a cost of about \$2,500. This modest building remained virtually unchanged for 25 years. Then in 1937, a new \$5,000 church was built. Although there have been improvements and enlargements, this building still is used as part of the church.

Two Sunday School rooms and a kitchen were added in 1948 at a cost of \$1,200. Next major improvement project came in 1957 when \$5,000 was spent to add two more Sunday School rooms, rest rooms, a kitchenette and the Fellowship Hall.

Expenses on the new sanctuary and other improvements just completed came to about \$33,000. But church officials have pointed out that it would have cost at least \$50,000 had it not been for volunteer labor and donated supplies.

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 and fund raising Crusade. "Two of three families here and in the country at large will eventually be struck by cancer. Regular health checkups are their best protection against the disease, and checks are the means to support the scientists who are searching for a cancer cure or preventive."

Pointing out that 85,000 Americans die needlessly of cancer each year because they went to their doctors too late, Mrs. Payne said the Society gives top priority in its April Crusade to its educational effort to prevent the tragic loss of life.

"The free literature distributed by volunteers in their house-to-house calls," she said, "is designed to stimulate regular health checkups among all adults for early detection of cancer, when most cancers are readily curable."

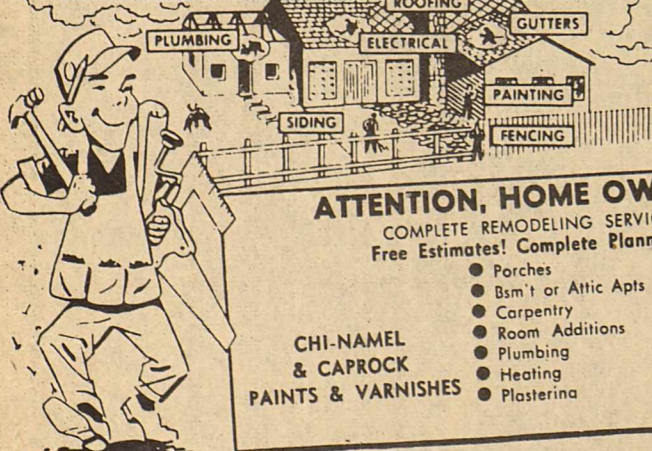

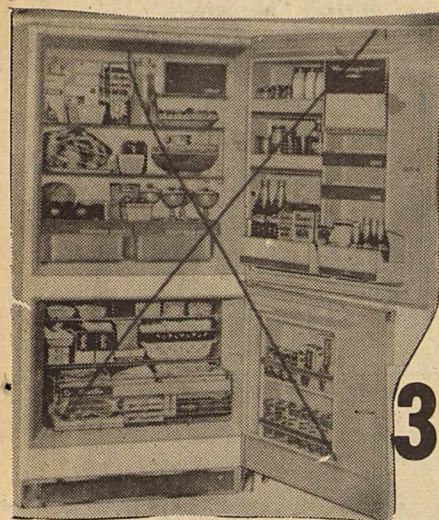

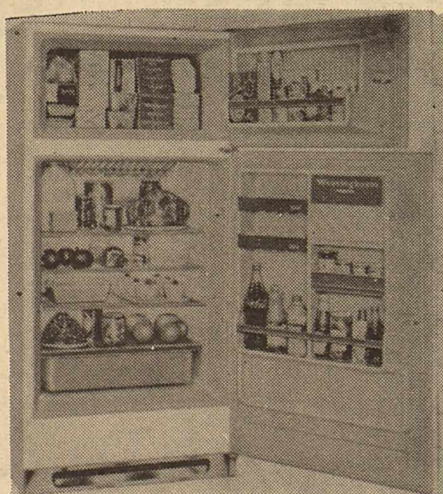

## Meixner Named All-Star

Much-honored Jack Meixner added another laurel to his list of basketball accomplishments with the announcement by the Texas Coaches' Association that he had been selected to play in the annual North-South all-star game in San Antonio.

The annual game, pitting together the cream of Texas' high school basketball crop, will be played the night of Aug. 9, during coaching school. Meixner will be a member of the north team, which will be coached by O. W. Follis of Lamasa.

Meixner will become the second product of Coach Rip Sewell to appear in the all-star classic. Two years ago, Jim Williams was chosen for the honor.

All-district, all-regional, all-state, Meixner this past season scored more points than any Cowboy in history.

He had 520 points in 28 games for nearly 19 points per game. He scored 159 of 368 field goal

attempts and 202 of 289 free throw tries for percentages of 43.2 and 69.8. He also led the team with 340 rebounds. His 520 points surpassed by 13 the 507 scored by Williams in the 1958-59 season.

With Meixner leading the way, the Cowboys surged to their fourth consecutive district title. They were eliminated in the regional, just as they were last year, but Meixner made the all-regional team two straight years, as well as all-district.

Sewell calls Meixner an excellent college prospect, and several schools have expressed interest in him. An older brother, Harmon Meixner, is attending Mc Murry, a school which is very interested in Jack. Harmon is another all-time Cowboy great. He twice was named to the all state tournament team.

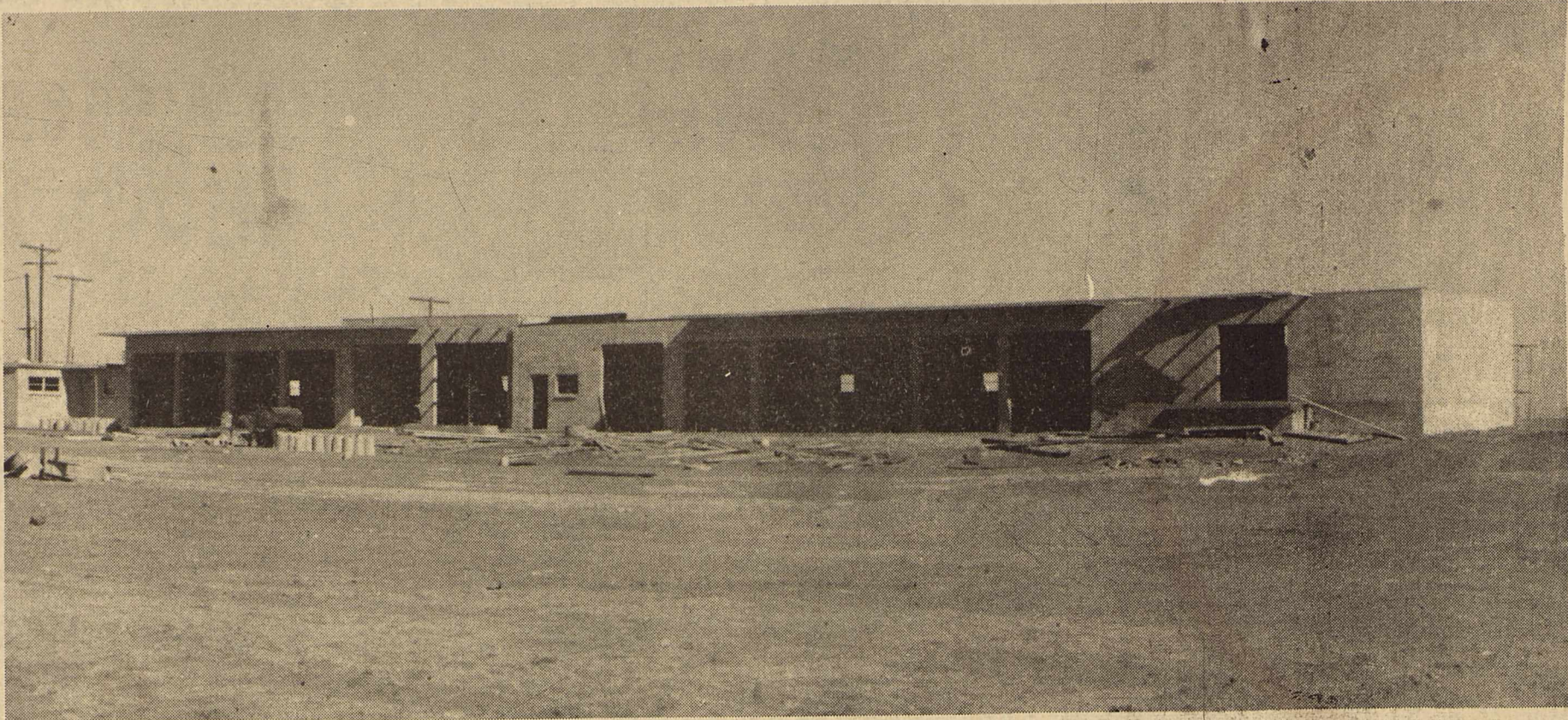

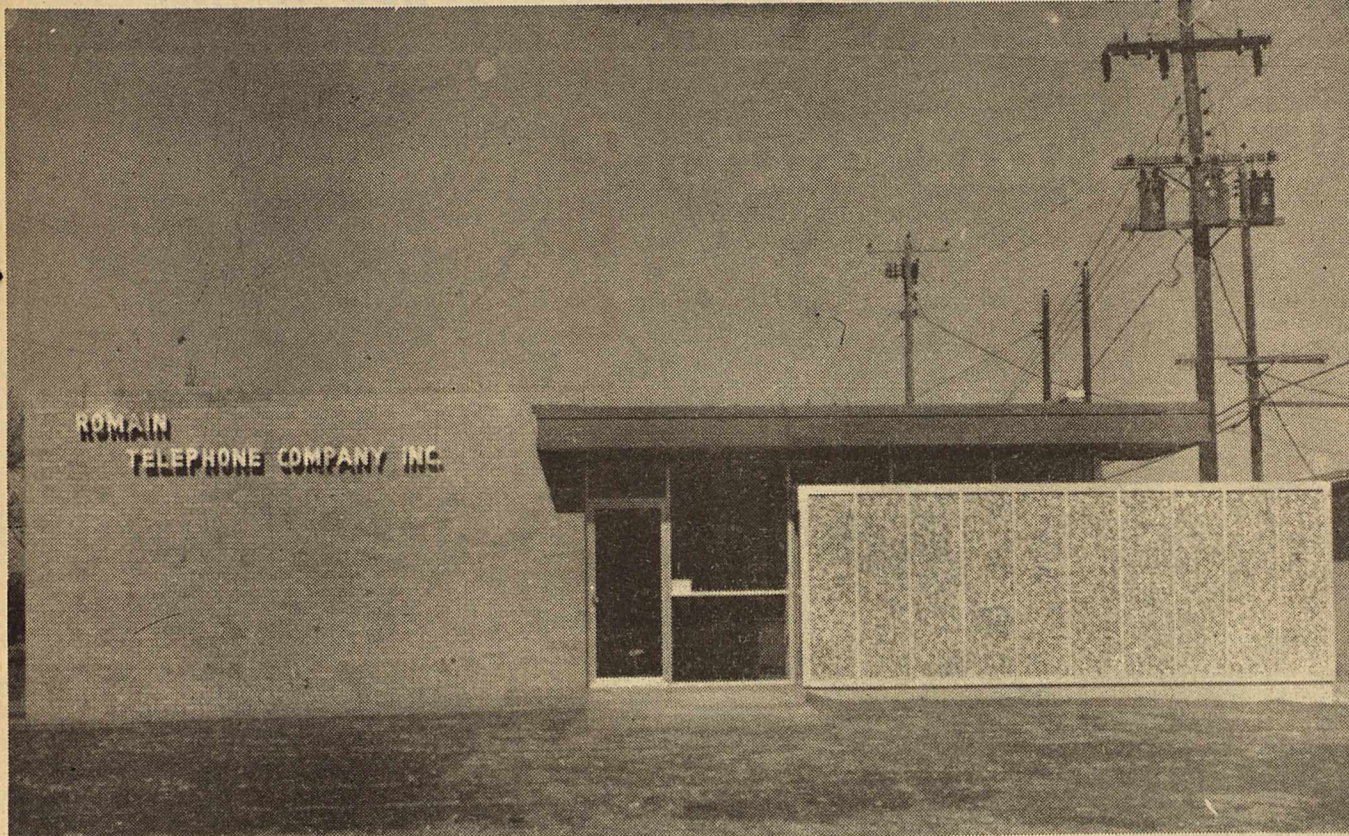

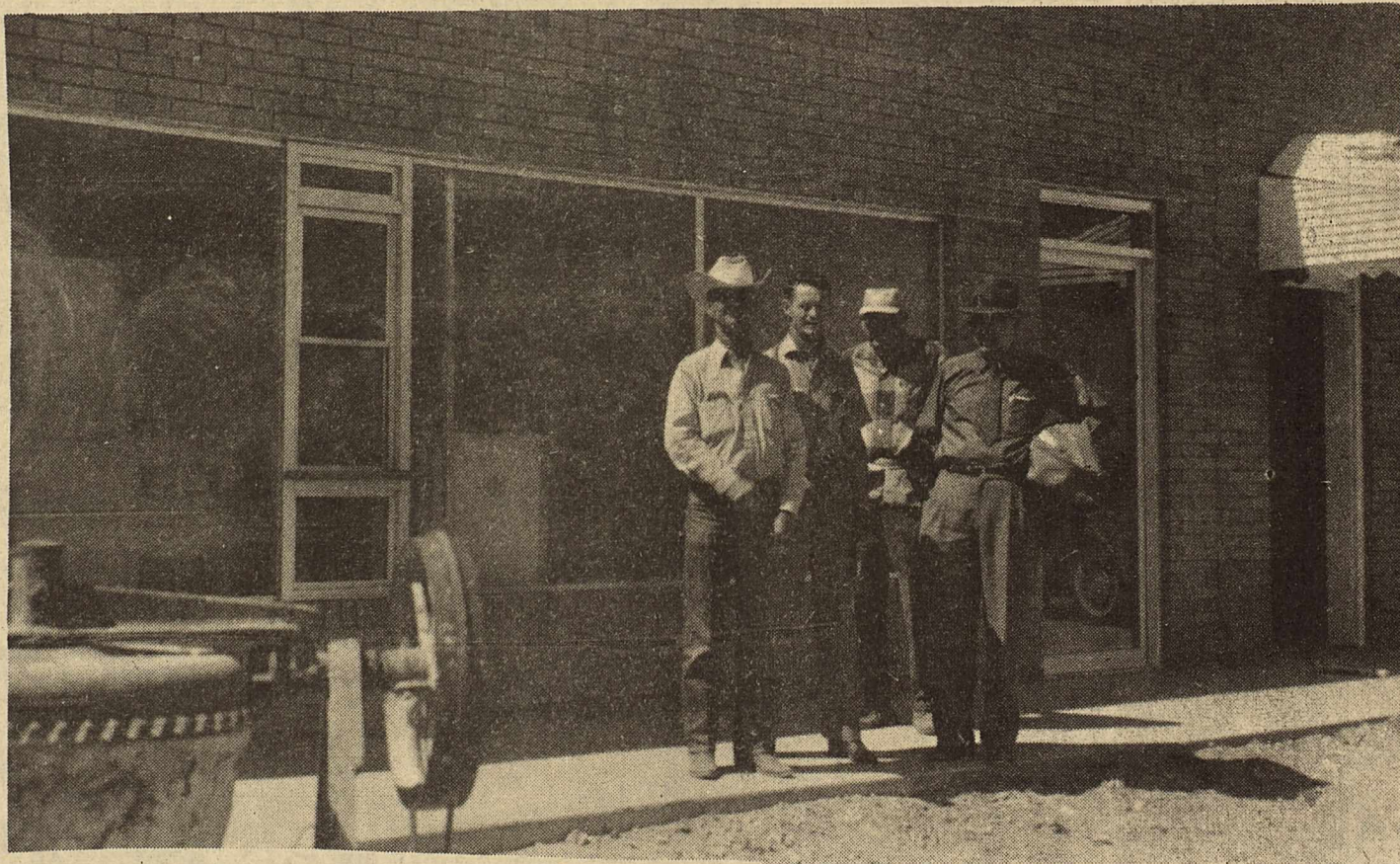


LEFT---Rising rapidly at the east edge of Plains is this large building of the State Highway Department.
