Brief Review

Texas Electorate to Vote On Amendments at Polls

Electors in the state of Texas will go to the polls soon to cast a vote to approve or reject 16 proposed constitutional amendments to their state constitution. State Representative Jesse T. George has requested that each amendment be explained in the Plains Record in order that the residents of this area will be acquainted with the proposed changes.

No. 4 Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

No. 5 Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others.

No. 6 Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full-paid firemen.

No. 7 Would repeal the constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

No. 8 Would authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the

United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

No. 9 Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

No. 10 Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election.

No. 11 Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board on two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

No. 12 Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

No. 13 Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

No. 14 Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to Texans in general.

No. 15 Authorizes the channeling of funds from private and federal sources through the state for use by privately owned or local agencies in establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed.

Establishes the date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature qualify and take office.

Dick McGinty, parade marshal for the Rodeo parade today announced that plans are complete to start the entries marching at 5 p.m. The route of the parade has been changed and it will proceed on the following route:

The parade will assemble at Guetersloh Anderson Grain at 4:00 p.m. and will proceed east through town to the Pic and Pay Grocery Store at 5:00 p.m.

The Chamber of Commerce will award three prizes for the top entries in the parade. First prize will be \$15.00, second will be \$10.00, and third place will be for \$5.00.

Gene Bennett reported that registration has been good and that we can expect top contestants this year in the rodeo. The first show will get under way tonight with another scheduled Friday and Saturday nights.

Cecil Williams is chairman for the Bar B.Q., and urges all people in the area to be certain to come to the Bar B.Q. Saturday at noon. Brother Williams also asked that the ladies be reminded to bring a salad or cobbler to the park for the noon meal.

The Queen contestants are still selling their tickets for the Official Rodeo Saddle, and the public is urged to help the young ladies in their bid to become our new Rodeo Queen. The ballots will be counted Saturday afternoon.

State Representative Jesse T. George will be here for the parade and will ride with Mayor Billie Ray Kennedy in the parade. District Clerk Blanche Dyer will also ride with Rep. George in their car.

Plains Mayor Billie Kennedy issued a proclamation of welcome to all rodeo visitors, and urged that the residents of Plains roll out the red carpet for all who attend the Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo. The mayor stressed that the people of Plains will extend that famous West Texas hospitality to all guests in our city, and he cordially invited them to return at their earliest opportunity.

Many business buildings in Plains sported attractive window pictures which were painted

ed by members of the garden club. Many new designs were used by the ladies this year, and festive spirit was apparent in the city this week.

Officials of the Plains Chamber of Commerce extended greetings to all who will find their way to Plains during the Reunion and Rodeo.

Gene Bennett and Pat Hendard reported that the stock is good this year, and that a good show is in store for those who attend. A dance is scheduled each night after the Rodeo is over at the slab at the county barns. Jimmy Mackey and his Western Band will provide the music.

Plan Old Windmill Return to Plains

In the early days of Plains the main water system was a well and windmill in the Southwest corner of the square. As Plains grew a better water system was needed and the windmill was sold to Claude Crisswell and moved to his place in the country. During the time the windmill stood in the square it was used for many things.

One incident called to mind by old timers is the time

the jail (a small wooden building located in the Northeast corner of the square) was burned. The sheriff (Mr. J. C. Keller) having a prisoner, and no place to lock him up, used the windmill's corner post to chain the prisoner. After several hours of yelling and cursing the prisoner decided he would have to spend the rest of the night there. He was given a bed roll and made as comfortable as possible. Soon a new jail was built.

The windmill having been in use all these years is about to fall apart. The Tsa Mo Ga Club having learned that it was to be destroyed ask if they might have it.

They plan to move the old tower to Plains and place it near the museum. It will be restored and preserved as one of the counties land marks.

G.I. Loans

Nearly 3,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill program have been received from Texas veterans, the Veterans Administration reported today.

A VA study to determine what impact the Veterans Readjustment Act of 1966 has had on the nation's economy also showed 7,157 Texas veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility for loans, Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said.

The number of applications for GI home loans is considered important because the lender usually makes the application, indicating the loan has gone through the initial, or interviewing stage, Coker said.

Nearly 42,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill have been received nationally, the VA manager said. Throughout the country 135,000 veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility.

Ladies from the Turner and Stanford Valley Home Demonstration Clubs will serve the meal. The meat will be brought in from Underwood's of Lubbock.

Amos Smith, manager of the Tokio Co-op said that \$65,000.00 in dividends will be paid to the stock holders this year. Smith said that the Gin is in excellent economic condition, and that 8,547 bales of cotton were ginned at the co-operative last year. Smith extended his appreciation to the customers of the gin for making the year a good one.

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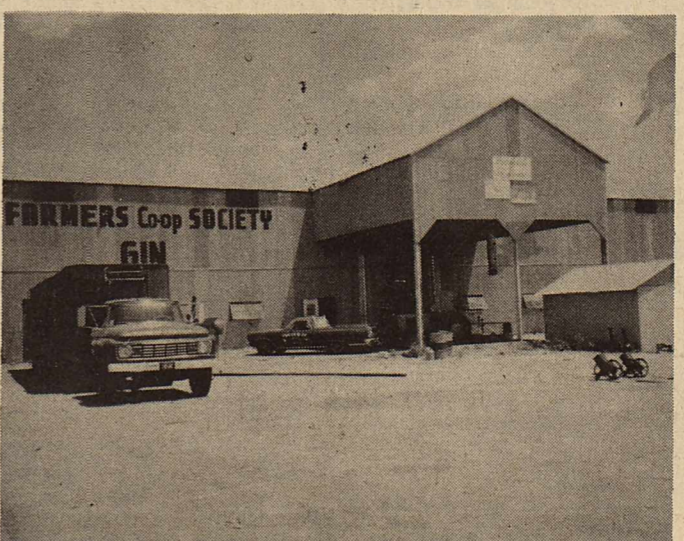
ASC Money Due County Soon

Applications for final payments are now being accepted. Yoakum County farmers complying with the 1966 cotton, feed grain or wheat program must report their crop acreage and sign their applications for final payment on or before August 15th, 1966. W. M. Overton, local ASCS Office Manager, urges all farmers that have not filed their report and signed their applications for payment to do so immediately. Farmers that requested the local office to measure their crops must also file their report and applications for payment by the August 15th date.

Immediately after the August

15th final date reporters will begin checking farms to see that the acreages have been correctly reported and farmers are again reminded that to comply with the program the farm must be in compliance by August 15th. Crops can not be destroyed after August 15th to get in compliance.

If Yoakum County farmers carry out their program intentions as filed the total feed grain payments will amount to approximately \$1,692,418. In addition to the above amounts there will be approximately 100 thousand dollars paid under the wheat, ACP, soil bank and the new land use adjustment program.

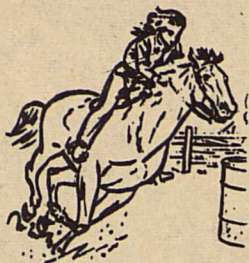

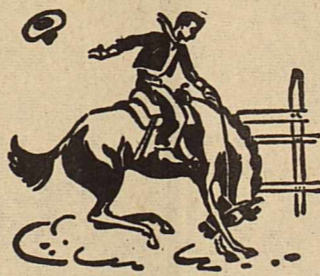

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or of full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

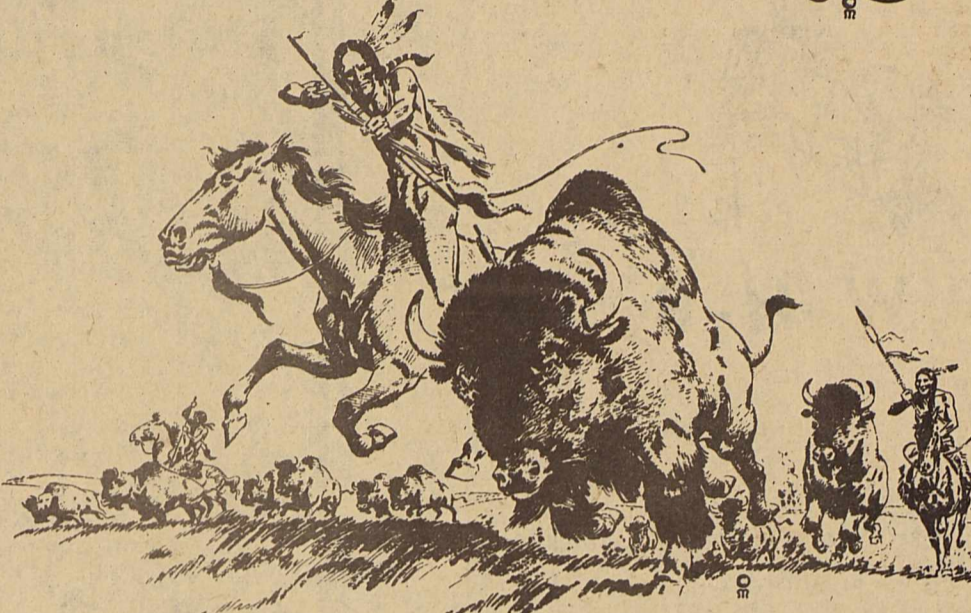

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every appointment, and the Senators elected after each appointment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Home Agent

By Mrs. Joe H. Thompson

Pressing can spell success or failure in the general appearance of a new garment, says Mrs. Joe Thompson, Co. Home Demonstration agent.

She points out that when clothing is manufactured, the person skilled in pressing earns more than the person who actually sews the garment.

Don't confuse pressing with ironing, she cautions. Pressing is a lifting up and down, following the threads or grainline of the fabric. The weight of the iron never rests completely on the garment.

There should be a piece of fabric between the iron and the seam being pressed, even when using a steam iron. Cheesecloth canvas or wool can be used.

The home agent suggests that you keep the ironing board set up so that you are not tempted to skip this step even once when sewing. Press any curved seam over a tailor's mitt or ham.

Some fabrics will respond to a steam iron, while others may need dampened press cloth to assure enough moisture to help in molding and shaping.

In fabrics that seem to shrink you may want to use only the dampened press cloth, so you can control the amount of moisture. Do not over press or use too much heat on wool.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Section 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction.

The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Section 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

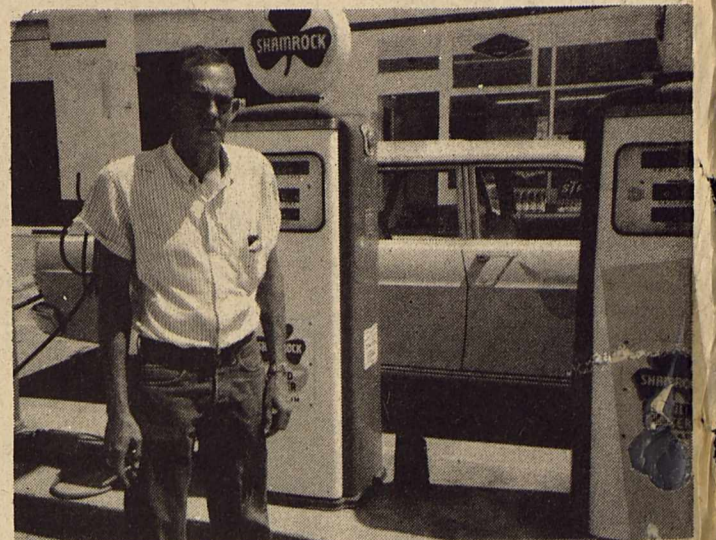

Sen. Tower Says Teachers Victims

There has been considerable talk in Washington of increasing taxes to fight the high cost of living. The federal government, rather than cut back its own unnecessary spending, has hit on this method, even though a tax increase would simply further increase the American family's cost of living.

Since the logic of raising the cost of living to fight the rising cost of living has

been somewhat lost on the taxpayers, the Internal Revenue Service has had to cast about for some way to increase taxes without calling it a tax increase. One way it found to do this was the curtailing of customary tax deductions which our tax laws provide many classes of citizens for many different reasons.

It was this attempt at a hidden tax increase which caught our teachers.

The Internal Revenue Service has decided that contrary to past practice, contrary to reason, and contrary to the intent of Congress, teachers no longer will be allowed tax deductions for study courses they take to improve their teaching qualifications.

Both the Texas State Teachers Association and the Na-

tional Education Association have protested this arbitrary federal tax action, pointing out that the curtailment would wipeout 25 years of programs aimed at encouraging and helping our teachers to train themselves so they may better train our children.

The effect of this IRS ruling, if applied to teachers, will be detrimental to the school children of this nation. The ruling will certainly discourage teachers from seeking additional training which they constantly need to keep abreast of latest educational developments in their field of specialization.

Thus, we see a surprising and shocking consequence of our inflation. Because of inflation, we find our federal government actually discour-

aging teachers from improving their teaching knowledge and from undertaking educational travel.

Let it be noted that this curtailment of tax deductions for education expenses also will strike at other Americans such as doctors, lawyers, dentists, accountants, and skilled technicians.

I have called upon the Internal Revenue Service to reverse itself and to restore the education-expense deductions. There is no doubt we have inflation, but teachers are not to blame and should not be singled out as victims.

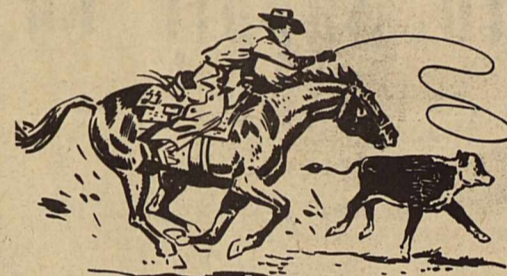
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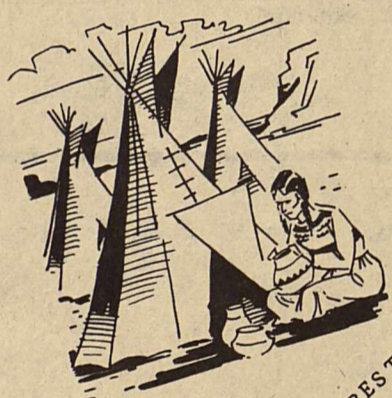
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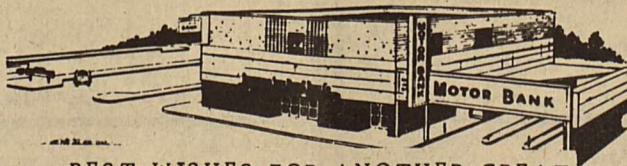
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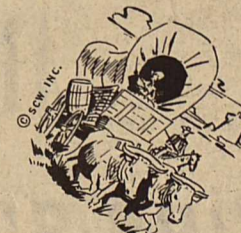
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Anderson to Play Sen. Yarborough in All-Star Game Capitol Report



DONNY ANDERSON
Texas Tech Co-captain

Like Texas Tech's latest representative to the Chicago College All-Star game, Donny Anderson, the school's first selection, in 1945, Walt Schlunkman, also was headed toward a pro career with the Green Bay Packers.

Parallels involving Anderson and Schlunkman have been many. Both came to Texas Tech from Texas Panhandle towns. Anderson's home of Stinnett is only 31 miles from Dumas, Schlunkman's home.

Together they own virtually every Tech rushing record. When Anderson set a one-season mark of 966 yards, in 1964 he broke a mark established by Schlunkman 20 years earlier.

Both were No. 1 draft choices of the same pro club, Green Bay, with a year's eligibility remaining. And both chose to stay and play that last season with Texas Tech.

If Schlunkman had had his way, however, the parallels would have ceased with Anderson's final game. Schlunkman wanted Anderson to forego a Packer candidate and sign with Houston, holder of the AFL draft rights and Schlunkman's current employer.

The game, matching the All Stars and the Green Bay Packers will be played Friday night, Aug. 5, in Chicago.

This week I wish to tell you about the proposed changes in the income tax regulations by the Internal Revenue Service as it pertains to school teachers in Texas and the Nation. The school teachers should be able to improve their own education and better serve their students, our children, without being penalized by the Internal Revenue Service.

Yet, strange as it seems, the Internal Revenue Service is not proposing regulations which, if adopted, will prevent the school teachers from going to school to improve their ability to teach. These rules deny education in summer schools and institutes as an expense of their profession. I oppose these impending new Internal Revenue rules which would disallow these improvement expenses to school teachers for income deduction purposes. I do not think that our teachers, and thereby our school children, should be denied this opportunity for additional teacher training by adding to the expense of the school teachers.

Our children, the students, will pay part of this price, because many teachers will not be able to obtain the required additional training. Therefore, there will be poor teaching.

Information given me shows that a teacher no longer will be allowed to subtract the money spent in meeting higher minimum education requirements. These include, for example, summer school courses to keep up or to learn new teaching techniques or to learn the use of new electronic equipment in science and language laboratories. The teachers will not be able to subtract the cost of this from their income in computing the income tax.

This extremely unfair to teachers.

Most of our teachers are dedicated people. They seek to add to their knowledge and teaching skill through summer courses whether more school-

is required for their positions or not. Many of our teachers have served for many years. They have given their lives to their students and their schools. Now they find that they have to take more courses to get a new teaching certificate in order to keep the job they have.

I believe that this suggested policy by the Internal Revenue Service is both unfair and unreasonable. Expenses for education by teachers should be subtracted from their gross income in order to determine their income for commuting income taxes, just as expenses for other professional workers such as lawyers and accountants, are deductible.

These other groups are able to subtract from their income the money they spend to attend institutes, seminars and improvement courses in order to determine their net income on which their income tax is computed.

Teachers should be treated on the same level and in the same way. Our teachers are professionals in every sense of the word.

In the proposed changes, it is my understanding that the Internal Revenue Service also plans to do away with deductions for money spent by teachers for courses that might qualify them for a different or better teaching job in their schools.

This is wrong. Teachers should be able to have a choice of courses to improve their own teaching methods and go on to higher jobs.

If they work and study to become better teachers, they should not be penalized by the Internal Revenue Service, whether the job consequences are good or bad as a result. Actually, if the teachers make more money they promote income taxes and the Government will be better off in the long run, in addition to gaining better trained children.

There is an old Chinese proverb that says: 'Learning is like rowing upstream; not to

advance is to drop back.' We cannot afford to let our teachers drop back. And we cannot afford to let our children suffer from studying under-

teachers who are dropping back in education because the Federal government will not allow them the money to prepare themselves for the job.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III, authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivisions located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63.
(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:
"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

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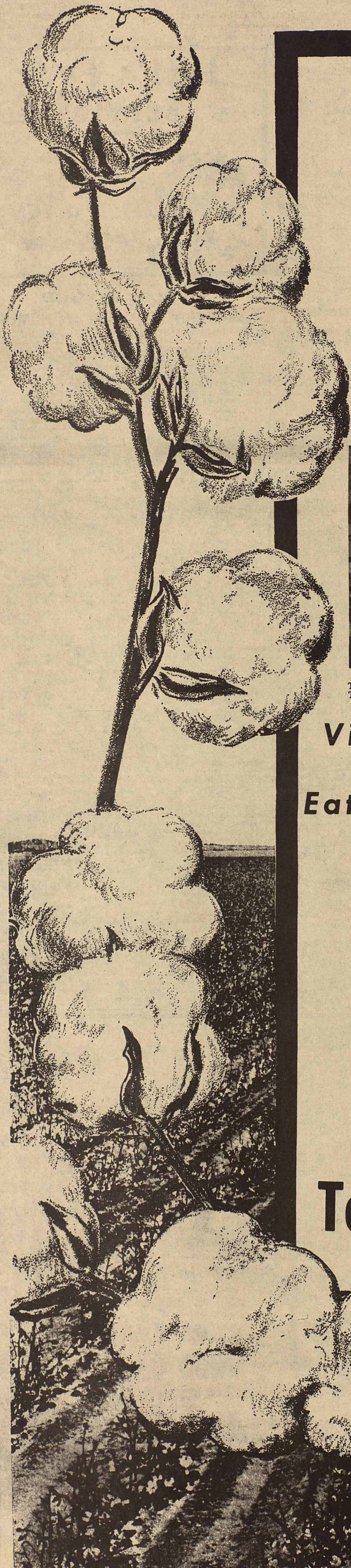
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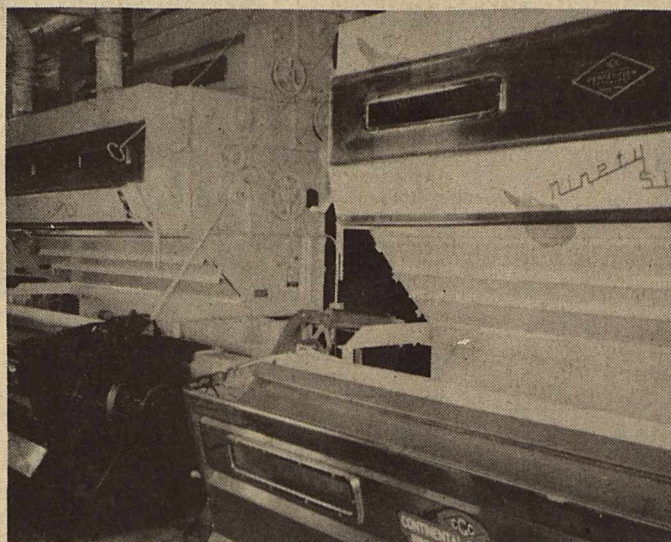
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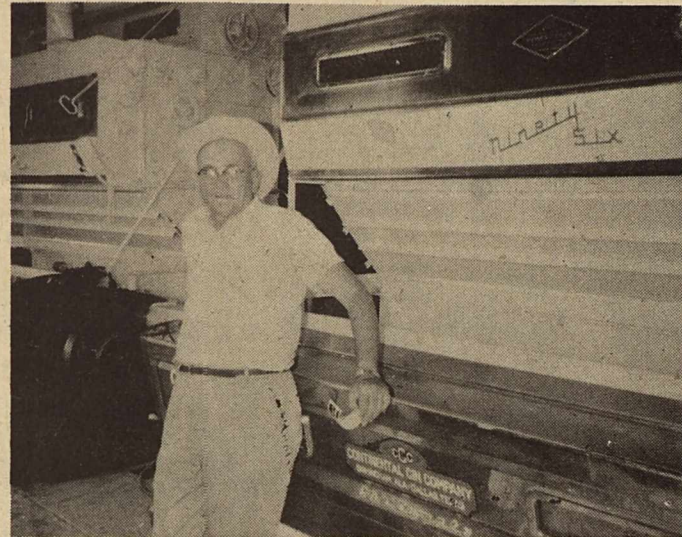
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
