Nearly 3,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill program have been received from Texas veterans, the Veterans Administration

reported today. A VA study to determine what impact the Veterans Readjustment Act of 1966 has had on the nation's economy also showed 7,157 Texas veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility for loans, Jack Coker, Manager of the VA

Regional Office in Waco said. The number of applications for GI home loans is considered important because the lender usually makes the application, indicating the loan has gone ghrough the initial, or interviewing stage, Coker said.

Nearly 42,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill have been received nationally, the VA manager said. Throughout the country 135,000 veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility.

Amos Smith, manager of the Tokio Co-op said that \$65, 000.00 in dividends will be paid to the stock holders this year. Smith said that the Gin is in excellant economic condition, and that 8,547 bales of cotton were ginned at the co-operative last year. Smith extended his appreciation to the customers of the gin for making the year a good one.

Earl Kreig, bookkeeper for the Tokio Co-operative, said the membership has rown to 350 members, which is a considerable gain over the past ew years.

The gin machinery will be cleaned and ready for inspection Saturday. Hands have been working in preparing the equipment to be shown, and the gin has recently been painted. Smith said the gin is equiped as good as any other in West Texas.

Over a quarter of a million pounds of peas have been shipped from the gin this year for members. Smith explained that he is happy to see farmers in the area growing cash vegetable crops and that the employees at the gin will assist in any way possible to

ASC Money Due County Soon

Applications for final payments are now being accepted. Yoakum County farmers complying with the 1966 cotton,feed grain or wheat program must report their crop acreage and sign their applications for final payment on or before August 15th, 1966. W. M. Overton, local ASCS Office Manager, urges all farmers that have not filed their report and signed their applications for payment to do so immediately. Farmers that requested the local office to measure their crops must also file their report and applications for payment by the August

Immediately after the August

15th final date reporters will begin checking farms to see that theacreages have been correctly reported and farmers are again reminded that to comply with the program the farm must be in compliance by August 15th. Crops can not be destroyed after August

15th to get in compliance.

If Yoakum County farmers carry out their program intentions as filed the total feed grain payments will amount to approximately \$1,692,418. In addition to the above amounts there will be approximately 100 thousand dollars paid under the wheat, ACP, soil bank and the new land use adjustment program.



Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.





By Mrs. Joe H. Thompson Pressing can spell success or failure in the general appearance of a new garment, says Mrs. Joe Thompson, Co. Home Demonstration agent.

She points out that when clothing is manufactured, the person skilled in pressing earns more than the person who acutally sews the garment.

Don't confuse pressing with ironing, she cautions. Pressing is a lifting up and down, following the threads or grainline of the fabric. The weight of the iron never rests completely on the garment.

There should be a piece of fabric between the iron and the seam being pressed, even when using a steam iron. Cheesecloth canvas or wool can be used.

The home agent suggests that you keep the ironing board set up so that you are not tempted to skip this step even once when sewing. Press any curved seam over a tailor's mitt

Some fabrics will response to a steam iron, while others may need dampened press cloth to assure enough moisture to help in molding and shaping.

In fabrics that seem to shrink

you may want to use only the dampened press cloth, so you can control theamount of moisture. Do not over press or use too much heat on wool.

DONNY ANDERSON Texas Tech Co-captain

Like Texas Tech's latest representative to the Chicago College All-Star game, Donny Anderson, the school's first selection, in 1945, Walt Schlinkman, also was headed toward a pro career with the Green Bay Packers.

Parrellels involving Anderson and Schlinkman have been many. Both came to Texas Tech from Texas Panhandle towns. Anderson's home of Stinnett is only 31 miles from Dumas, Schlinkman's home.

Together they own virtually every Tech rushing record. When Anderson set a one-season mark of 966 yards, in 1964 he broke a mark established by Schlinkman 20 years

Both were No. 1 draft choices of the same pro club, Green Bay, with a year's eligibility remaining. And both chose to stay and play that last season with Texas Tech.

If Schlinkman had had his way, however, the parallels would have ceased with Anderson's final game. Schlink wanted Anderson to forego a Packer candidate and sign with Houston, holder of the AFL draft rights and Schlinkman's current employer.

about the proposed changes in the income tax regulations by the Internal Revenue Service as it pertains to school teachers in Texas and the Nation. The school teachers should be able to improve their own education and better serve their students, our children, without being penalized by the Internal Revenue Service.

Yet, strange as it seems, the Internal Revenue Service is not proposing regulations which, if adopted, will prevent the school teachers from going to school to improve their ability to teach. These rules deny education in summer schools and in institutes as an expense of their profession. I oppose these impending new Internal Revenue rules which would disallow these improvement expenses to school teachers for income deduction purposes. I do not think that our, teachers, and thereby our school children, should be denied this opportunity for additional teacher training by adding to the expense of the school teachers.

Our children, the students, will pay part of this price, because many teachers will not be able to obtain the required additional training. Therefore, there will be poor teaching.

Information given me shows that a teacher no longer will be allowed to subtract the money spent in meeting higher minimum education requirements. These include, for summer school example. courses to keep up or to learn new teaching techniques or to learn theuse of new electronic equipment in science and language laboratories. The teachers will not beable to subtract the cost of this from their income in computing the income tax.

This extremely unfair to teachers.

Most of our teachers are dedicated people. They seek to add to their knowledge and teaching skill through summer courses whether more schoolis required for their positions

or not. Many of our teachers have served for many years. They have given their lives to their students and their schools. Now they find that they have to take more courses to get a new teaching certificate in order to keep the job they

I believe that this suggested policy by the Internal Revenue Service is both unfair and unreasonable. Expenses for education by teachers should be subtracted from their gross income in order to determine their income for commuting income taxes, just as expenses for other professional workers such as lawyers and accountants, are deductible.

These other groups are able to subtract from their income themoney they spend to attend institutes, seminars and improvement courses in order to determine their net income on which their income tax is com-

Teachers should be treated on the same level and in the same way. Our teachers are professionals in every sense of the word.

In the proposed changes, it is my understanding that the Internal Revenue Service also plans to do away with deductions for money spent by teachers for courses that might qualify them for a different or better teaching job in their

This is wrong. Teachers should be able to have a choice of courses to improve their own teaching methods and go on to higher jobs.

If they work and study to become better teachers, they should not be penalized by the Internal Revenue Service, whether the job consequences are good or bad as a result. Actually, if the teachers make more money they promote income taxes and the Government will be better off in the long run, in addition to gaining better trained children.

There is an old Chinese proverb that says: 'Learning is like rowing upstream; not to advance is to drop back.' We cannot afford to let our teachers drop back. And we cannot afford to let our children suffer from studying under

teachers who are dropping back in education because the Federal government will not allow them the money to prepare themselves for the job.
