flower and sunflower. DIVERSION OPTIONS: Farmers that wish to participate in the cotton program must divert at least 5% of their allotment and may divert an additional 30% of their allotment. Small farms (10 acres or less or 3600 pound projected yield) may plant their full allotment and be in compliance with the program or may divert up to 35% and receive additional payments. Feed grain producers to comply with the program must divert 20% and may divert an additional 30%. Small feed grain farms, those with 25 acre base or less, may divert their entire acreage.

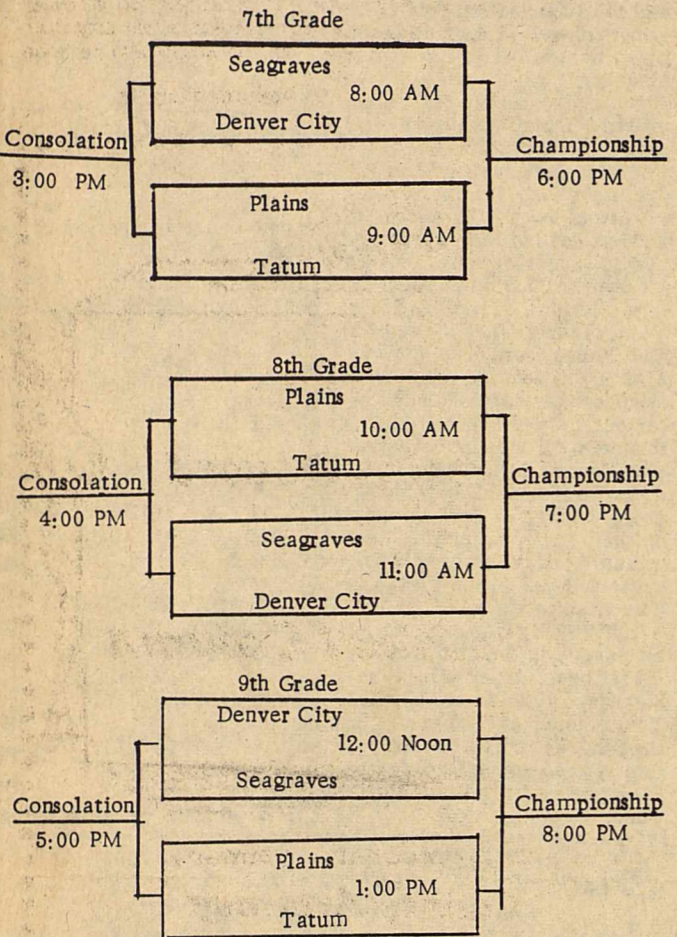
Roy B. Davis Elected New Cotton Chief

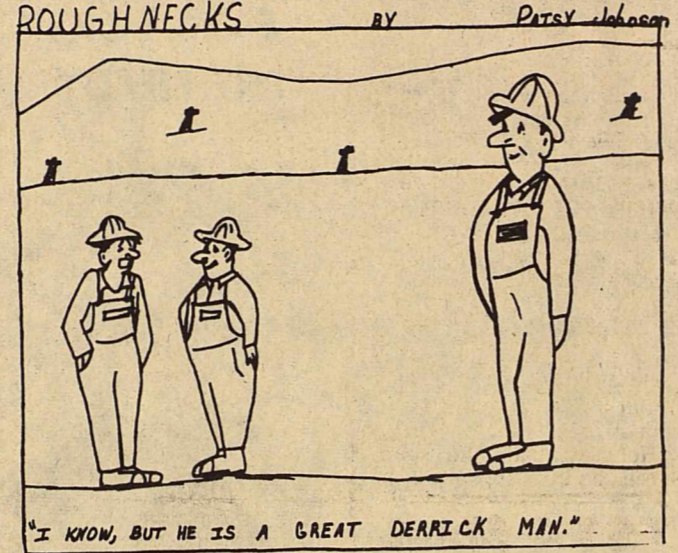

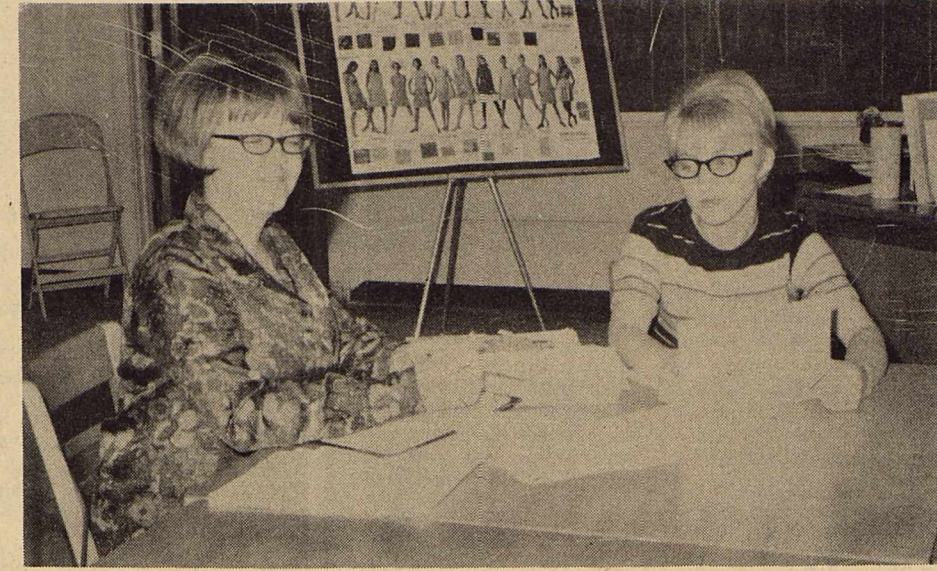

Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

A 20-minute "warm-up" at room temperature. Did you know that is the secret to serving Cheddar cheese at its peak? To store cheese safely, you must keep it in the refrigerator. However, just as soon as it is chilled, cheese develops "refrigerator inertial," losing some of its flavor and remarkable texture. The 20-minute warm up reactivates the flavor and texture, according to the US Department of Agriculture cheese graders. They use this technique to determine the grade of the cheese. Cheddar carrying the US Grade AA mark is the highest quality. It has a fine, highly pleasing flavor, a smooth compact texture, uniform color and attractive appearance. US Grade A cheddar cheese is also good quality with a pleasing flavor. However, there may be a slight variation in flavor and texture between packages. Plants producing federally graded cheese must undergo more than 100 checks based on USDA requirements for facilities, equipment, milk supply, operating procedures and packaging. What do you call cheddar cheese? In some regions it is called store cheese, mousetrap cheese, cracker barrel cheese and rat cheese. But in the trade it is commonly known as American cheese or American Cheddar Cheese. Regardless of the name, it is so popular that cheddar cheese accounts for more than 80% of US cheese output. Current stocks of cheddar cheese are above average, so it is listed as a February plentiful food by the Consumer and Marketing Service. Many requests have been received for this recipe:
JALAPENA CORN BREAD
3 cups corn bread mix
2-1/2 c. sweet milk
1/2 c. salad oil
3 eggs, beaten
1 large onion, grated
3 Tbsp. sugar
1 small can cream-style corn
1/2 c. jalapena peppers, chopped fine
1-1/2 c. American Cheddar Cheese
Chipped crisp bacon and/or chopped pimiento (Optional)
Mix ingredients in the order as given above. Bake in three well-greased 8X8 pans at 400 degrees F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown. Serves 12.

ORDINANCE NO. 17 BUILDING ORDINANCE

An ordinance providing for the character of buildings erected, moved in or repaired within designated zones.

Section 6; Building Permits; No building, wall structure, or part thereof or addition to building within the City of Plains shall be erected, add too or removed, until a plan of the proposed construction, addition or other improvements, alteration or repairs shall be made, until a plan of the proposed work and the material to be used shall have been submitted to the City Secretary, who shall if in accordance with the provision of the ordinance issue a permit for the proposed construction, addition or repair. All buildings erected or repaired without a proper permit shall be removed if within the fire limits. No building shall be moved from one place to another outside of the fire limits and within the City limits without a proper permit thereof.

Section 9; It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to hereinafter erect, construct, remove, remodel or repair any building or structure within the City limits of the City of Plains without first having complied with the provisions of this ordinance, and any person, firm, corporation violating any of the terms hereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not to exceed one hundred dollars.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication, passed this the 4th day of September, 1953.

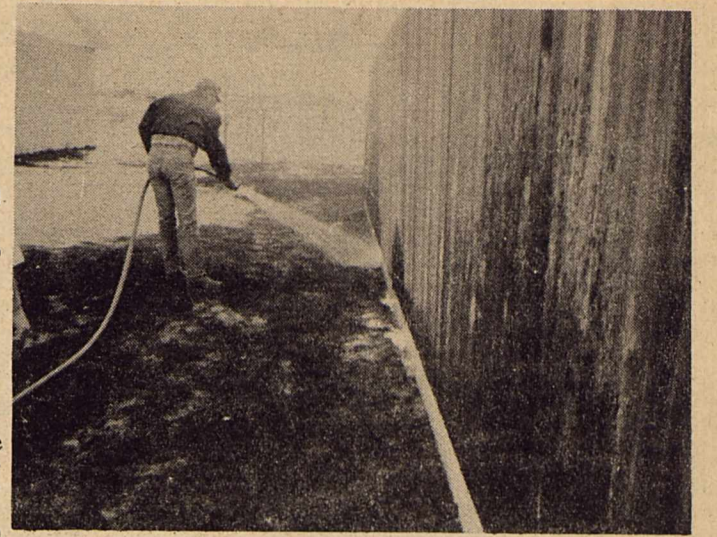

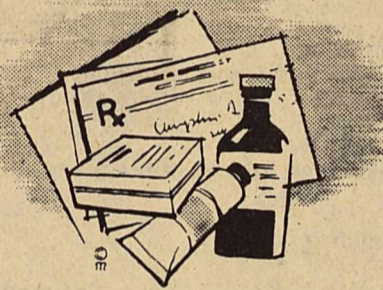

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Car Inspection Deadline Coming

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported Saturday that more than 4,250,000 vehicles still remain to be inspected for the 1968 sticker before the April 15 deadline.

Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, said that only 1,574,397 cars had been inspected so far this year.

Garrison urged motorists to have their cars inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid the long lines which will undoubtedly develop as the inspection period draws to a close.

Garrison reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law the inspection will include front seat belts in cars where anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment, steering, and wheels and rims.

Those motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period to have their cars inspected may find that they will need to install seat belts, Garrison said, "and with the last minute rush, there may not be enough seat belt kits in supply to take care of the demand.
