ELECTION SATURDAY

Citizens of Plains will vote in a referendum election Saturday, Feb. 24. The purpose of the election will be for the voters to decide whether or not the city should purchase electrical power wholesale from Lea County Electric Co-operative, and re-sell to city customers.

The election will be held in the city hall and the polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m.

Election judge will be Mrs. Mable Camp. Clerks will be Mrs. Nancy White and Mrs. Tiny Bearden.

To be eligible to vote you must have been a resident of Yoakum County for six months and resided within the city limits of Plains for the past three months.

We urge every qualified voter to vote in this election. A heavy turnout is expected.

"MISS COTTON" CONTEST SLATED

A "Miss Cotton of Yoakum County" Contest has tentatively been set for June 1, 1968, to be held in Plains, according to Mrs. Carl Lowrey, President of the Yoakum County Women's Cotton Promotion Club.

The contest will be open to all Junior and Senior girls in the Plains and Denver City High Schools. Plans are to contact each girl by letter to seek her interest in this event.

The winner of the local contest will participate in the state contest at Dallas during the State Fair of Texas.

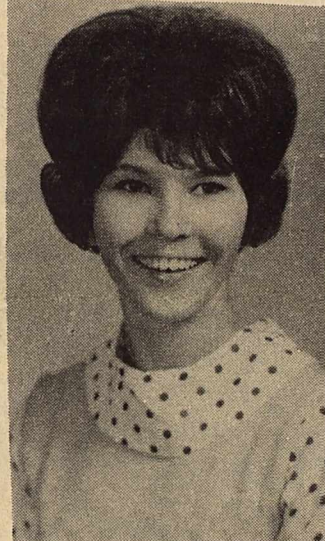

Junior Stockshow Big Success With Sales Of \$17,147.93

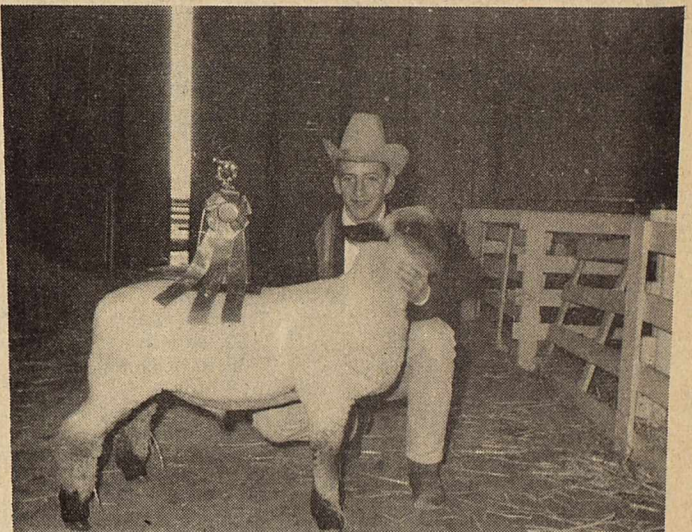

The one hundred forty-eight animals sold for a total of \$17,147.93 which compares favorably with the many other successful sales held each year since 1953.

The twenty-three beef calves accounted for a total of \$7,197.84 and brought an average price of \$37.35 cwt. The floor bid on calves this year was \$26.00. 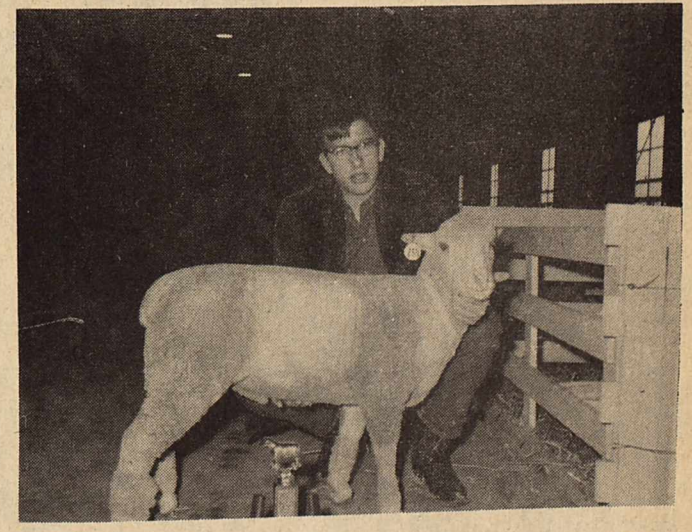

For billions of years the moon has been circling the earth, never varying. Even its eclipses are orderly and predictable. The great clock of our universe is never fast, never slow. All around we feel the marvelous balance and rhythm of it. Why then does man contrive to make such a mess of things?

Order and certainty govern nature. The moon obeys the law of gravity. The rabbit and owl are controlled by instinct. But in man there is nothing fully predictable, for man, and man alone can alter his environment or change his future. God has given him a will of his own and left it free. And so man worries and puzzles and gropes for answers.

Man is free to choose - freedom achieved to suddenly often leads to confusion. People in the past were kept from unwise actions through commands, astraction or burning at the stake. Wasn't it possible in rebelling against old authority man neglected the building of inner con-

years. Every year the F. B. I. show a higher crime rate, especially among young people. The criterion is no longer what is right or wrong but what can we get away with. Dishonesty breeds dishonesty. The immoralities of a single individual can weaken the inner restraint of millions through the de- adly rationalization that "every body is doing it".

People who choose dishonesty go through life dragging invisible chains. Even when conscience is sifted with rationalization they look back always fearful of their wrong doing catching up with them. But if dishonesty and wrong doing load a person with invisible chains, conscious right-doing exhilarates and strengthens him.

If you really want to raise the moral standard of the world, what do you do? You begin with yourself.

Take inventory-- Do you condone things on the ground of liberalism or sophistication that you would have frowned on five years ago?

What about your children-- do you always tell them the truth? Do you set standards for them and refuse to meet them yourself?

Do you waver from your conviction and speak to please your listener?

Apply a yard stick-- Ignoring the guide lines that already exist is like going into unexplored territory without a compass or map. Religion offers such great guide lines as the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule.

Try thought control-- once by breaking a bad habit by concentrating on not doing it, the second time is easier.

Be yourself-- conformity is one of the most fundamental dishonesties of all. When we reject our specialness, water down our God-given individuality and uniqueness, we begin to lose our freedom. The conformist is in no way a free man. He has to follow the crowd.

Those who treat politics and morality apart will never understand one or the other. Rousseau said it, two centuries ago. The Form and philosophy of government under which a man lives can encourage his capacity for self-responsibility and inner directness, or stifle it. And since a republic is such a delicately balanced form of government, whether or not it survives depends entirely on the character of its citizens.

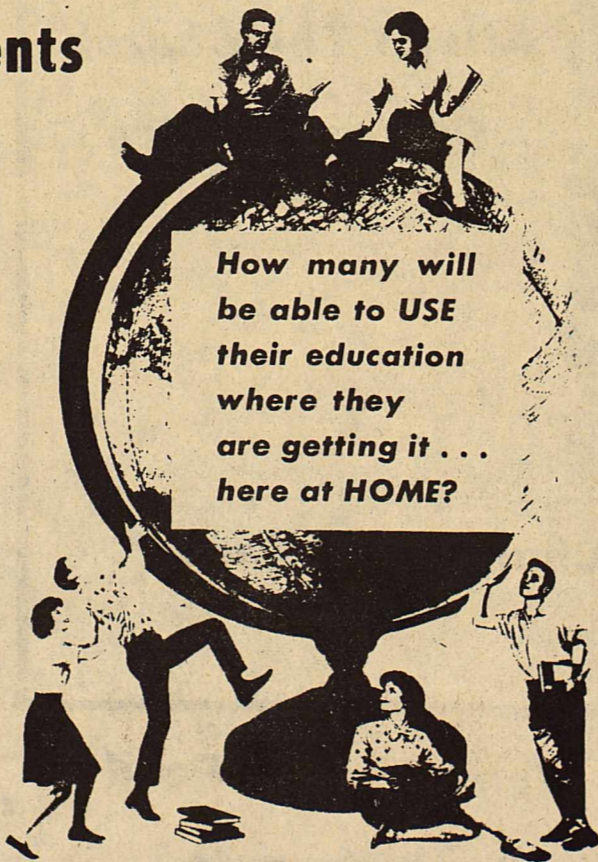

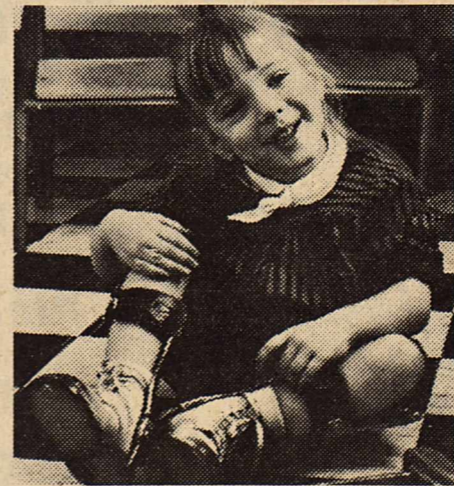

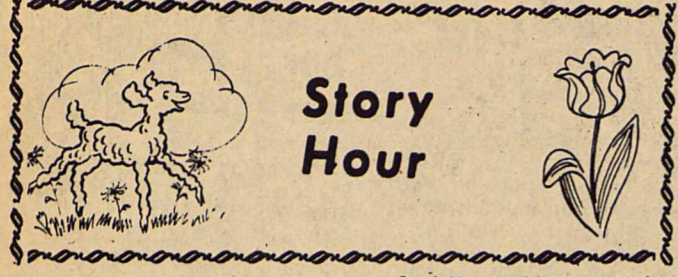

Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

Buyers frequently misunderstood or completely ignored the term "Colorfast" when purchasing textile furnishings for the home. Many overlook the importance of securing colorfastness in home fabrics because it is most commonly associated with the washability of apparel fabrics. Towels, table and bed linens and similar furnishings require dyes which keep their colors fresh and bright through repeated washings. But washability or colorfastness to laundering is only one side of the coin, says Jane Berry, Extension specialist in housing and home furnishings. Colorfastness relates to a fabric's ability to maintain its fresh, true color through repeated dry cleanings, exposure to harsh sunlight, wear or rubbing in service, or stains caused by body perspiration. Because curtain and drapery fabrics normally are exposed to sunlight for long periods of time, prevention against sunlight fading is an important consideration when selecting any draperies or fabric. Carpeting, upholstered furniture and fabric wall coverings exposed to sunlight may also show pronounced streaking, spotting and other discolorations if not colorfast to sunlight. Some fabric dyes are effected by perspiration and should not be used on upholstered or slip covered furniture in areas that might come into contact with the skin. Color bleeding or running on the arms or back of upholstered furniture may indicate that dyes used are not colorfast to perspiration. Crocking, another form of poor colorfastness, occurs when the dyes in a fabric rub off when exposed to hard wear, according to the specialist. Household fabrics present a big and costly challenge to consumers. Selection must be based on the best material for a specific end use.

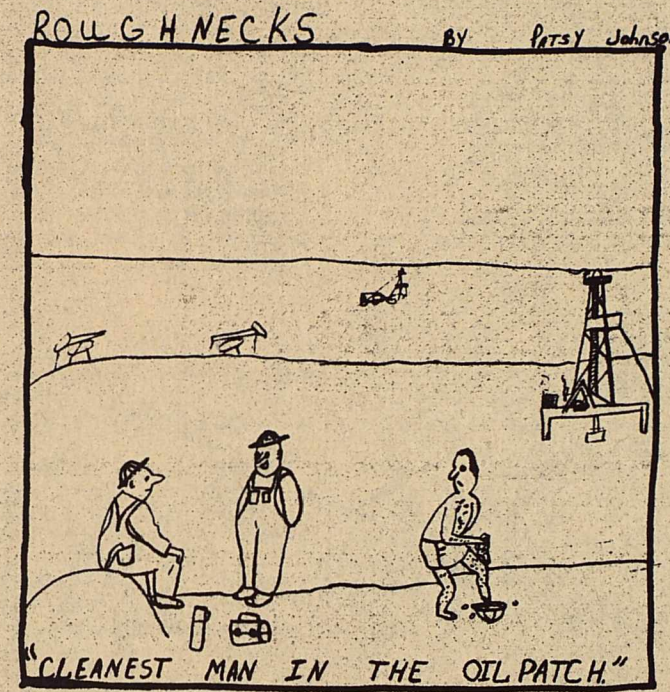

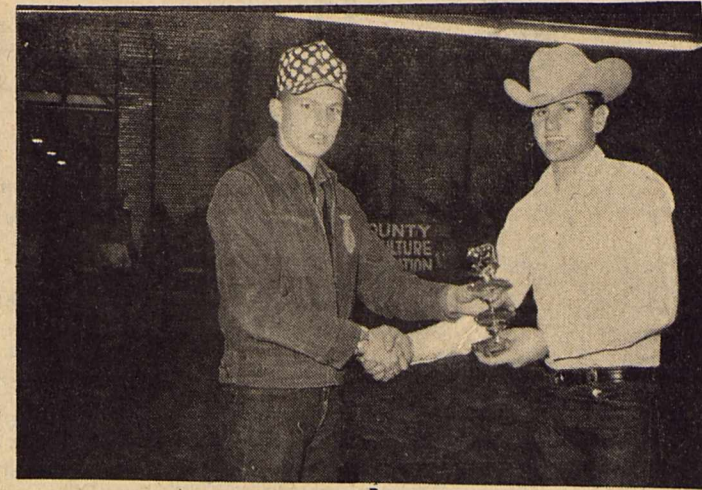

Riding With Rover
Some dogs just don't like to ride in cars and others get car sick. Either type will make a miserable passenger. However, you might be able to lessen or even eliminate the situation. Your dog's unhappiness might be caused by static electricity. A static belt hung from the axle and touching the pavement has cured many dogs of car sickness. It has also made riding pleasant for other dogs.
Veterinarians now have calming drugs for excitable dogs. If your dog actually gets motion sick consult the veterinarian for a remedy. Usually the drug recommended will prevent motion sickness for as much as 8 hours.
Some dogs insist on hanging their heads out of the window while riding. The experts at the Purina Pet Care Center advise you never to permit this. Bits of grit may easily be driven into his eyes. Or, your dog may get nasal and eye inflammation just from the wind. Either make him keep his place in the car or close the window most of the way.
If Rover is driving out of the country with you, don't forget to check health requirements. Canada requires a health certificate and a rabies vaccination certificate. Or, if you and your dog travel down Mexico way, your dog must have been vaccinated against rabies within the past year. A few precautions will make it a happier trip for both of you.

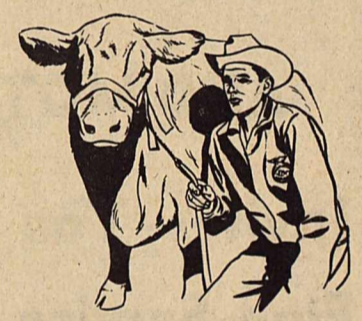
