Rough Riders Win Events for Honors

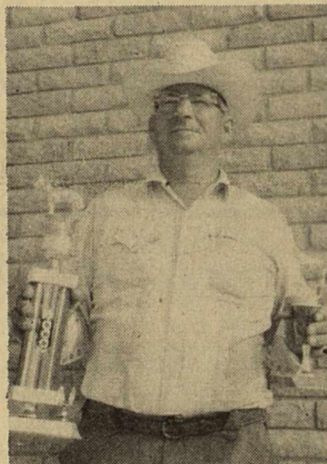

ASCS Office Manager Explains County Loan Rate on Grain Sorghum Here

W. M. Overton, office manager of the Yoakum County ASCS Office, reminds farmers that Sept. 18 has been set as the election date for electing one member and two alternate county committeemen for the 1969 program year. Persons eligible to vote will receive ballots by mail with election information will be furnished at a later date.

In the August newsletter the ASCS relates that the 1969 wheat crops program offers several options. They include diverting to a conservation use on acreage equal to 15% of the farm wheat allotment and planting wheat on all the wheat allotment acres. In addition

one can elect to divert an additional 50% of the allotment and earn diversion payments on the diverted wheat allotment acres. Farms with an allotment of 21.7 acres or less may divert the total allotment for payment.

Producers that comply with the program eligible for domestic marketing certificates by planting 43 percent of their allotment and meeting other program requirements. Farmers that have wheat allotments and a feed grain base may substitute wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat if they sign up and comply with both programs.

The diversion payment will be about 63 cents per bushell times the farm project yield. The certificates will be based on 43 percent of the allotment, if planted, and will be valued at approximately \$1.38. To take part, operators must sign up at the county ASCS office during the sign up period which will be announced later; keep within the wheat allotment or wheat permitted on any other farm in which they have an interest and meet other requirements which will be discussed at sign up time.

The County Committee, office manager and clerks wish to express their sincere appreciation to all farm operators for their splendid cooperation in reporting crop and land uses under the 1968 program. Operators on all participating cotton farms signed

their compliance report, and all feed grain farm operators with signed intentions except three turned in their compliance report by the Aug. 15 date.

The regulations require that at least fifteen percent of the participating farms be measured by ASCS reporters; and this is being done at this time. When signing an application for cotton or feed grain contracts all operators signed a statement giving authorization for our reporters to measure their farms.

The office expressed that they sincerely hope and expect to find most all farmers reported acreages to be correct as reported. Should any farmer receive a notice of measured acres and believe that an error has been made he should contact the office his measurement with those of the reporter.

Farmers are also reminded again that weeds must be controlled or diverted on land. Turn rows and idle strips in less than four rows in a cotton or feed grain pattern land. As in the past grain sorghum shredded is not an eligible way to destroy excess grain sorghum; nor will it be eligible for diverted land.

The loan rate for Yoakum is \$1.63 per hundred. Producers that signed up in the feed grain program and complied are eligible for grain sorghum loans.

Golfball size hail and downpours of rain estimated at 2-4 inches devastated crops and livestock plus heavily damaging buildings in the area, late Saturday afternoon.

Damage reports from the wake of the storm were total, 75 percent and 50 percent damages to crops in the area six miles west of plains. It was reported that Gary Stowe lost 50 head of sheep and Ed Ziegenfuss lost nine head of swine due to the 30 minute hail storm. Windows in the Yoakum County Gin, office and manager's home were knocked out by the hail stones. David Stowe is manager of the gin.

The downpours sent bales of hay washing across the highways near Plains and U.S. 82 six miles west of the city was closed late Saturday by high water. The old Lovington highway was also impassable.

Cotton and other crops of the area were severely damaged with the leaves being stripped off. Much of the cotton looked as though it had already been harvested by machine.

Up to four feet of water was reported running across one county road and smaller hail fell for nearly 10 minutes in Plains itself.

Much of Yoakum County was under a severe thunder storm warning for more than

an hour Saturday afternoon. Thunderheads topped out near Plains at 55,000 feet.

An unofficial report was made of a twister sighted near the Billy Winn home and trees damaged on the Foy Powell farm. Also reported was six inches of rain falling on the old Lovington highway and some of the new road was washed out. It was reported that one inch fell at Bronco with two inches reported along the state line. Only a heavy shower was reported in the New Mex. area. Almost an inch of rain was reported in parts of the Tokio area.

The picture ran with today's story could have been made on several farms although it was made at the Callaway Huffaker farm operated by R. G. Hartman. Others receiving severe damage were Leon Thompson, who operates the Presley White farm, Leland Ellison, Ed Ziegenfuss and Russell Faulkenberry, who operates the Foy Powell farm.

Others receiving damage to cotton and maize were James Warren, Billy Winn, Polly Rushing, J. C. Smith, Buster Graham, Robert Chambliss L. D. Hamm, Jr., Garland Swann, Tom Warren, Gene Ingle, R. C. Hartman, Kent Welch, Robert Box, Jim Barron, Ira Tidwell, and Bud Bailey.

There was no estimate of damage at press time.

Last 4-H Playday Held to End Summer Season

The sixth and final 4-H Play Day of the 1968 season was held Monday night, August 19, in the Plains Rodeo Arena with trophies and perfect attendance pins being awarded.

Trophies were awarded to the winners in each of the four age groups. Irita Winn was winner in the senior boys and girls group, ages 15-18. In the junior division, ages 13-14, Tony Winn collected a total of 102 points. He led this group all during the season and it was no surprise to anyone when it was announced that he was the trophy winner. For the year, stated County Agent Leo White.

The young junior group, ages 9-12, was a hot contest from beginning to end. Guy Bownds, TQM Bowers, Mike Blount, Chris Winn, Bryan Lambeth and Kathleen McGinty were contenders all the way. When the final play started Monday evening, Tim Bowers

and Guy Bownds were tied for the lead with 52 and one half points each. Mike Blount had 47; Bryan Lambeth, 38; Chris Winn, 35; and Kathleen McGinty, 33. Twenty points is the highest possible score for any one performance and Tim came up with 15, Guy had 12 and the others were 9 or less. Tim Bowers won the trophy with 67 and one half points.

In the pee wee group, under nine years old, Brady Phillips was the winner with 61 points. This compared to 50 points for Amanda Phillips and 27 points for Sammy Bowers, the other two contestants in that age group.

Gold filled pins were awarded to all contestants who had perfect attendance at the six play days and those receiving pins were Pam Peterson Joetta Warren, Tony Winn, Mike Blount, Paula Blount, Tim Bowers, Amanda Phillips and Brady Phillips.

\$118,100 Appropriation for Farm to Market Roads

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$118,100 for highway safety and betterment and for Farm to Market Road improvement in Yoakum County during 1969.

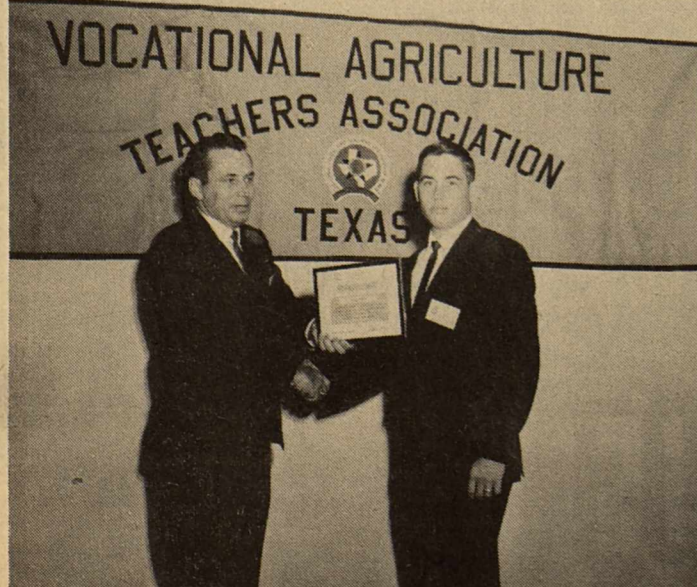
District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 42.9 miles in Yoakum County will be involved in the annual program. Work will be under the supervision of James W. King, district maintenance engineer, of Lubbock.

The work is part of the highway Commission's combi-

ned Farm to Market Road improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1969.

The safety and betterment portion of the program will cover 42.9 highway miles in the county at an estimated expense of \$118,000. The Farm to market road improvement program will cost an estimated \$3,000,000 for 562.3 miles of FM roads.

Mr. Crain stated that the proposed improvements play an important role in the department's continuing highway safety programs.

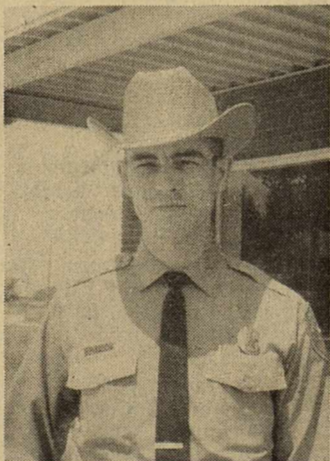
Martin Huerta serves as elevator superintendent for Anderson's.

Transferring of funds and county employee wage increases were the business of the day when the Yoakum County Commissioner's Court met in special session Monday with Commissioner Vance Brown serving as judge-pro-tem.

It was moved to transfer \$500 from general charity funds to civil defense funds and to transfer \$207.40 from general charity to capital outlay. The move carried 3-0.

It was moved that H. A. Tarkington be put on a monthly salary of \$335 to be effective August 12, 1968 and that Joe Gordy be raised from \$125 to \$140 per month effective September 1, 1968.

Also, H. G. Sprawls' salary was raised from \$517 to \$571 and Bonnie Heath's raised from \$517 to \$534 effective August 1, 1968.

The salary moves carried 3-0.

The court also hired H. L. Husselman as a road hand in precinct #2 at a salary of \$438.70, effective August 1, 1968.

In a telegram from Representative George Mahon, and a call from Senator Ralph Yarborough's Austin Office, the Record was informed Monday that Yoakum County was awarded a grant from the public Health Service for the Migrant Worker Health Service Project.
