## Texas Highway Accident Report

The Tex. Highway Patrol investigated accidents, four, on rural highways in Yoakum County during the month of Sept., according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Hwy Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 2 persons killed, 3 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$3,025.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 9 months of 1968 shows a total of 4 persons killed, 20 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$26,730.

'Accidents go up when the sun goes down,' is a slogan so true. Darkness hides danger, giving the driver a false sense of security. This is the reason traffic accidents increase during Oct.'s shorter days and longer nights.

At sundown, long shadows and fading light make it increasingly difficult for drivers to spot traffic hazards and stop in time. The veteran Patrol supervisor said, 'Make it a habit to turn on your driving lights at the first sign of fading light and falling shadows.'

The evening was spent visiting and renewing old friendships.

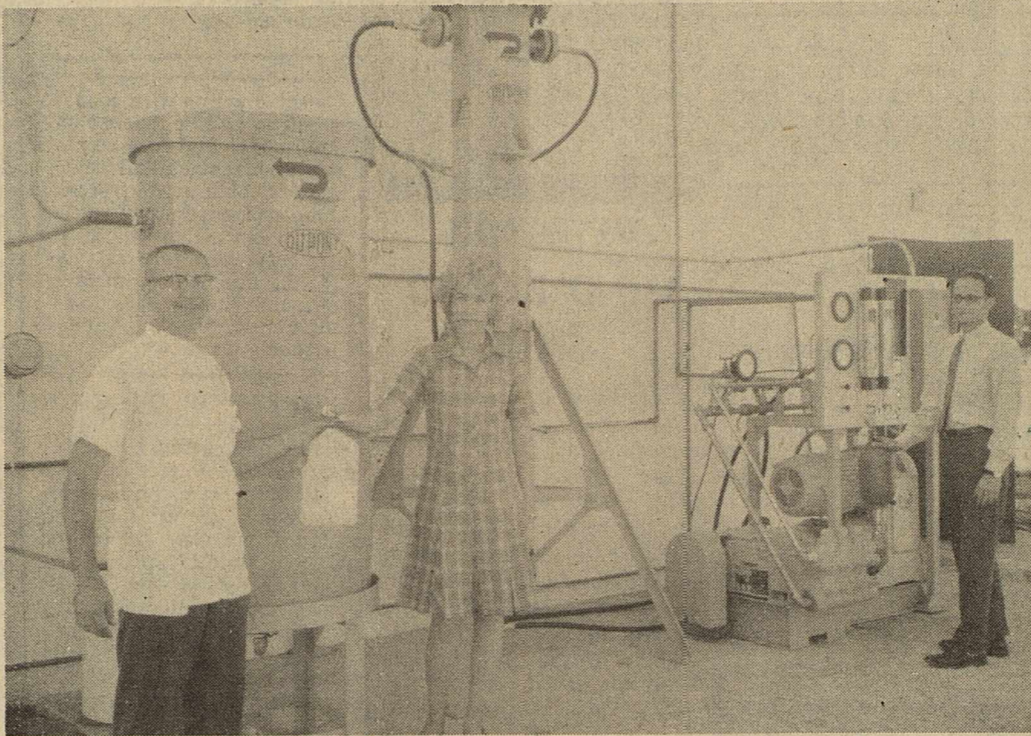
The Ex-students Association would like to express their thanks to the many businessmen and ex-students who helped with the homecoming activities.

### FRIDAY NIGHT

Last Friday night was a night that will be remembered in the hearts of all loyal Plains football fans. 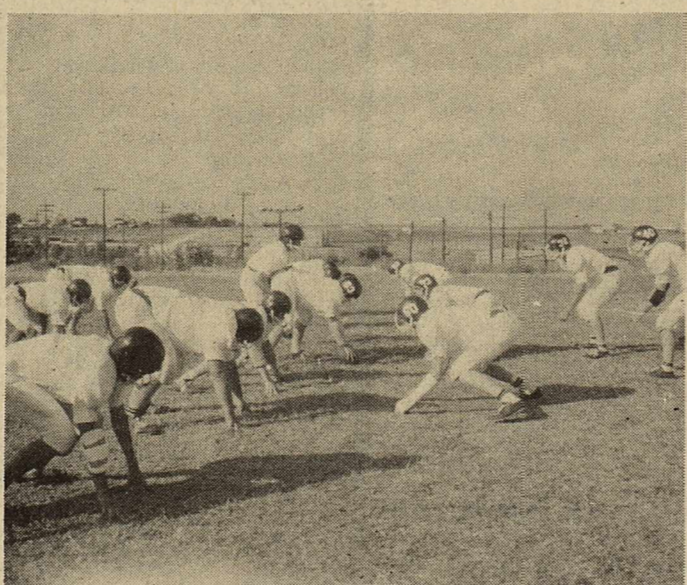

## Wreck West of D.C.

The dream of having good water is now a reality to some extent to the residents of Plains with the whole city to be served at their water taps in the very near future.

This reality has been made available through extensive research of the DuPont Co. in staging tests here to turn a hard, brackish water into a soft, mineral reduced water.

This research has been conducted for several months by DuPont with Plains being selected as the first city of the nation to have a full scale demonstration plant housing the newly developed Permasep Permeators.

Climate and brackish water supply plus the interest of the citizens in a better water supply were main reasons for DuPont setting a test station here.

Tests in Plains have been conducted since Oct. of 1967 when a mobile unit housing a small permeator was stationed here. Tests went from the mobile unit into a small unit housed in the city power plant. This unit is to be kept running for a time yet, also.

DuPont has now full time operations of a single larger unit located at the City Hall for the purpose of letting the people come and get water for comparison with the present water supply.

Work on the permanent full scale plant is to be started in Nov. and plans call for the plant to be ready for full time use around Jan. 15, 1969. DuPont representatives met in Austin this week with the Texas Health Dept. to get final approval of plans

so construction can begin as soon as possible.

The full time plant is also being installed by DuPont as field test operations and is of no cost to the city of Plains. The city will have the option to purchase the plant at the end of a test period, running from 1 to 2 years. If all operations and water system is desirable by the people. This purchase will be strictly up to the city and its citizens since the plant is still an extensive study for DuPont.

City officials and DuPont representatives are encouraging the citizens to come by City Hall to take samples of the new, purified water. Bottles, courtesy of DuPont are available for ones not having their own containers.

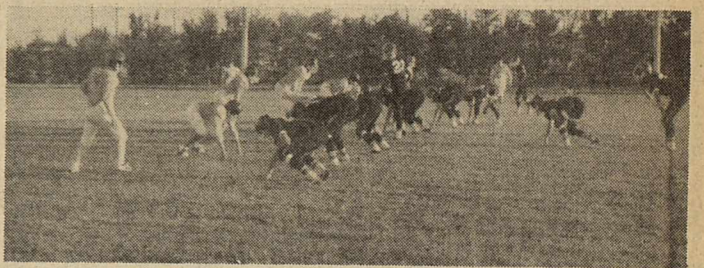
Locally, one of the best features of the new water is the fact that pinto beans can now be cooked in one and one half hours compared to 12-24 hours, if ever, in the present water.

Reports from citizens using the permasep pumped water have been that coffee and tea have a better taste and can be prepared with less ingredients. Some residents have been spending as much as \$15 per month on distilled water alone for use in cooking and drinking.

Local restaurants have been serving the new water and have received pleasant comments on the difference in the taste of the water.

Another point of interest on the subject of the better water system is that it does not upset the stomach tract as the present water supply has

THE PROCESS

dome. This has been a problem suffered by visitors and new residents moving in from areas with a softer, more drinkable water.

So far, City Hall has been the only business completely installed with the water system and again the public is urged to come and compare results.

Emphasis of cost was pointed out that it is not nearly what it is with the actual cost of using water as it is now.

A government survey on homes showed that an additional 75 cents per 1,000 gallons is being spent on water as it is for such things as replacing faucets, hot water heaters, wearing of clothes by washing, etc., because of the great build up of mineral deposits.

The Permasep Permeator is a device which is very simple in operation and operates by pumping water through a membrane, keeping minerals on top. This filtering action is called reverse osmosis. The Govt. at present is also in extensive research of osmosis. This is the passing of fluid through the separating membranes and is called semipermeable because they pass certain substances but not others. Living things depend on osmosis—our intestine walls pass food, and lung membranes pass oxygen into the blood.

With Plains' present water supply, well no. 1 registers 1600 ppm of total mineral content while well no. 2 registers 2100. The U.S. Health Standard by the Health Department does not regulate but does recommend that 500 ppm be the maximum.

Permeator results here have shown a 250-300 ppm and based on water supplies across the country, this is a good quality water being soft and pure.

Most people have thought of the tests being ones to soften the water, but it is really more of a filtering process. Minerals are being filtered out and removed and not exchanged for something else, such as in waste softeners. Although, results show a softer water.

The pilot plant will produce 100,000 gallons per day for municipal use through 16 permeators such as the one set up at city hall, housed in the plant.

The permeators are 14 inches in diameter and 10 feet long. The units require very little attendance and the reverse osmosis plan is simple, versatile and economical.

The permanent plant is

expected to furnish approximately half the city with soft water during the summer and the majority in colder weather, when water uses are at their lowest. However, during the summer, a better waste than the present supply will be available because the good water will be blended with the present system. This will result in a 700 ppm rate, which is still a good level below the 1600 and 2100 ppm rates now.

Jack Redshaw, market development specialist with DuPont and Daniel Crabbe, field engineer of the Co., were in Plains this past week checking out final stages of the unit at city hall. They also with Mayor Roy Edwards, and other city officials cordially invite and urge all the residents to come by for water and make individual comparisons.

The permanent plant is to be located in the south part of town and drawings of the plant can be seen on the advertisement inside.

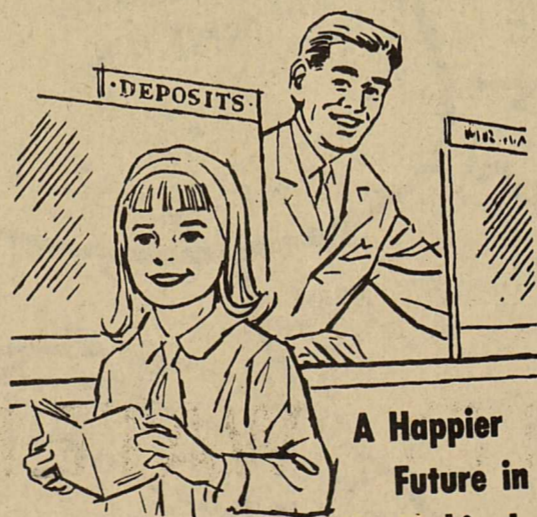
