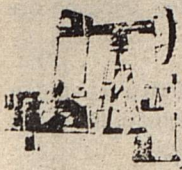

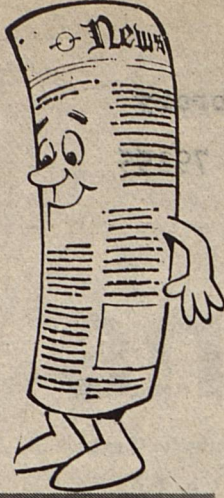

Five Plains Children Earn High Scores In State Drill

Five children from the First Baptist Church recently participated in the Children's State Bible Drill in Lubbock. They earned four superior ratings and one perfect score.

Those receiving a superior rating were Betsy and Valerie Blair, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Blair; Keri Powell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Powell; and Heather McDonnell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jackie McDonnell. April Horn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ken Horn, received a perfect score. To earn a superior rating the girls had to make two or less mistakes. A perfect score is no mistakes.

Each of the girls received a certificate and ribbon. April was also presented the Bible she drilled with in the state competition.

Kim McClure, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mike McClure, and Mindy Lewis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Lewis, also qualified for the state drill but were unable to participate.

To qualify for the state drill, children had to participate in a church drill and make 12 or less mistakes, which qualified them for the association drill. The children had to make eight or less mistakes in the association competition to be eligible to participate in the state drill. There are a total of 24 calls in each drill.

The local church drill was held March 15 at First Baptist Church and the association drill was held at First Baptist Church of Seminole, March 29. The state drill was con-

ducted at First Baptist Church of Lubbock, April 25.

The Plains girls began preparing for competition in mid-February. They memorized 25 scripture verses, ten key passages and their references. They also had to know the names of the books of the Bible in the proper order and be able to locate them in the Bible and also locate the ten key passages they memorized.

There are four types of drills with six calls in each category. For the question drill, the leader gives the reference of the verse and the driller must be able to quote the verse. In the completion drill, the leader quotes part of the verse. The driller then must complete the verse and give the reference. The book drill requires the contestant to find the book of the Bible that the leader calls within ten seconds. They must be able to name the book preceding the one called, the book called and the book following the one called. In the key passage drill, the leader gives the title of the passage and the driller finds the passage in the Bible, again within ten seconds.

JoAnn Barron, Judi Addison, Cynthia Blair and Kathy Holster were the leaders who helped and encouraged the girls to learn the material.

There were over 1200 children, ages nine through eleven in Texas who participated in a state drill.

Purpose of the children's Bible Drill is to help children increase in knowledge of the Bible, develop skills in effectively handling the Bible, and begin developing memory skills.

The Criminal District Attorney Reports:

Extensionist Advises Elderly Of Dangers In Being Anemic

Most of us think of anemia as a nutritional problem of young women and children. But if you're over 65, it could be a problem for you too and one cause for feeling a lack of energy. Anemia isn't a normal part of aging, yet it's very common among older people. Sometimes it's the result of physical conditions or certain drugs that cause internal bleeding. But usually it's due to not eating enough iron-rich foods, says Mary Dale Williams, Yoakum County Extension Agent, Home Economics. Meat, fish and poultry are especially good sources of iron. Slice these foods very thin, if you don't like chewing meats. Also, eating a food high in vitamin C, such as a cup of orange juice, with your meat will help your body absorb the iron.

If you're one of those people who snacks on tea or coffee and toast, rather than fixing yourself meals, anemia could be a special risk. There are only small amounts of iron in bread and substances in tea and coffee may reduce iron absorption. It's better to have your tea or coffee at mid-morning or mid-afternoon and drink something else with your meals. Breakfast cereals can be a good way to get some extra iron in your diet. But you need to check the label on the box to make sure it says iron fortified. Some other vegetables and grain foods have iron too. Try stewed prunes or prune juice, lima beans, tofu, spinach or split pea soup. These foods also have fiber which will be a plus for your diet.

Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in called session Monday morning. Bids were opened on a loader for precinct 4. A trade in bid of \$34,950 was received from Waukesha-Pearce Industries Inc. of Houston and \$40,000 bid plus \$2,500 maintenance for five years or 10,000 hours from West Texas Equipment Company of Lubbock. The bid from West Texas Equipment was accepted.

Correspondence was received from South Plains Association of Governments requesting support of a supercollider project in the region. A resolution was approved unanimously.

Correspondence from South Plains Rural Private Industry Council informed the Court that terms of the representatives from Yoakum County expire in August. Bill Gravitt and Bobby Dodson were re-appointed.

Transfer of Employees Deferred Compensation Funds to the National Association of Counties (NACo) Deferred Compensation Program was approved for immediate action.

A motion was approved to delete reference to Lynton G. Bauer as agent of record for the One Times Salary Group Life Plan and the Yoakum County Deferred Comp Paid Up Life Plan only. In event of a change, the County will give six months notice to Bauer and/or Bauer will give six months notice to county.

Line item transfers were approved and extra hire and other bills were given approval.

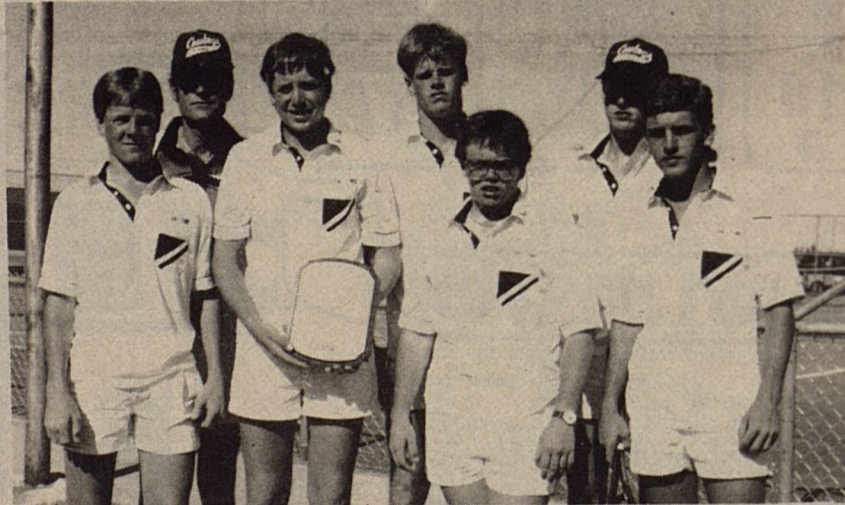

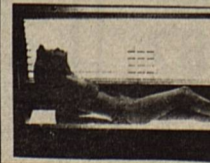

John Deere Celebrates Double Anniversaries

One of the oldest companies in American industry also is one of the oldest companies in the relatively new business of manufacturing lawn and garden equipment. John Deere the company began when John Deere the man constructed one of the first self-scouring plows to make prairie farming practical. That was in 1837. Since then, John Deere has moved into many new fields, including the consumer products business. In 1962 the company produced a sprayer for homeowners and began work on a lawn and garden tractor that was introduced in 1963. Since then, the John Deere consumer products business has doubled every five years to become an industry leader with more than \$700 million in sales.

In 1983 John Deere entered the commercial grounds care equipment market with a new front mower designed for professionals. Since then the company has expanded its line of front mowers and attachments, while adding the only U.S. made compact utility tractors and many more commercial machines.
