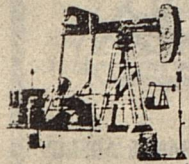

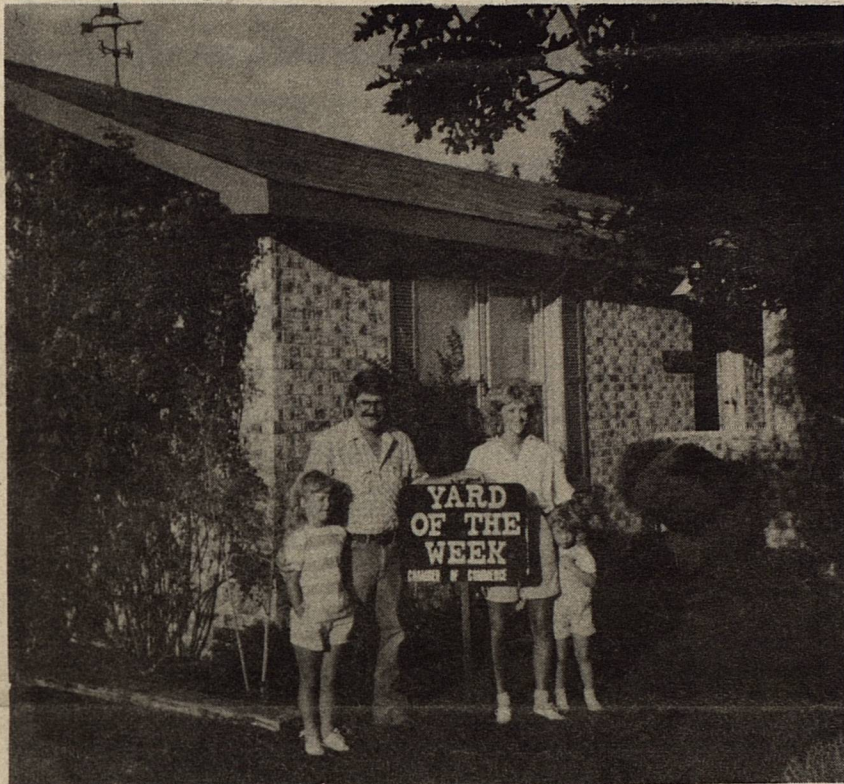

From The Superintendent's Desk

The legislature met in regular session and now they expect to accomplish such in thirty days the one thing they were unable to resolve during the 180 day regular session. Many bills were passed that have an effect on education but I think the ten that will effect our school most are as follows:

HB328 - Guerrero, adding additional information to requirements for quarter page advertisements for possible school district tax increases, including providing information about the effect the proposed tax increase will have on the average district residence.

HB377 - Grusendorf, setting the deadline for filing as a school board candidate to 45 days before the election.

HB1007 - Beauchamp, et al., requiring vehicles owned by public universities and school districts to bear the name of the institution, with criminal penalties assessed drivers of vehicles without such identification.

HB1010 - Roman Martinez, requiring the State Board of Education to develop a comprehensive dropout prevention program. The Texas Education Agency will collect dropout statistics by grade level and by ethnic groups. School districts shall comply with a variety of regulations established by the agency, including appointing an "at risk" coordinator to oversee dropout prevention programs, etc.

HB1421 - Rudd, changing Texas Public School Retired Employee Group Insurance Program eligibility requirements to also include surviving spouses and dependents of deceased active members. Also provides for program expulsion for fraud, and makes other changes.

HB1619 - Grusendorf, allowing the State Board of Education to establish by rule the topics to be covered by school district employee in-service training. Suggested topics include dyslexia, child neglect/abuse, special education, etc.

HB1650 - Polumbo, allowing districts to receive additional state money if a district taxpayer wins a tax appraisal appeal involving more than 5 percent of the district's budget for that year. In the event of a successful appeal and refund, the adopted tax rate for the following tax year would be required to exceed the rate under Tax Code Sec. 26.004 by 8 percent - plus the percentage increase necessary to impose taxes in an amount equal to the refund amount.

HB1758 - Culberson, requiring every campus to post specified information in a public place. The information may include student test data, teacher/pupil ratio information, student demographic information, etc.

HB2106 - Patronella, requiring single-member school board election boundaries to conform with established voting precinct lines.

HB2347 - Colbert, changing the requirements for the State Board of Education to issue a report to the Legislature on annual average accountable costs of school districts. The new requirement calls for a report on minimum basic costs per student. Also the majority of the nine-member accountable costs committee must not consist of school district employees or officials.

The Governor has now signed thirty-one bills relating to education and has about twenty-five more on his desk awaiting signature.

Electric Safety & You...

FAN EFFICIENCY is a measure of the number of cubic feet of air moved per minute (cfm) per watt input and fans vary in ventilation efficiency from 10 to 20 cfm. In general a larger fan is more efficient than a smaller one. The larger blades will move more air per minute per unit of input power. For any two fans with the same diameter the one with the smaller motor is usually the more efficient.




