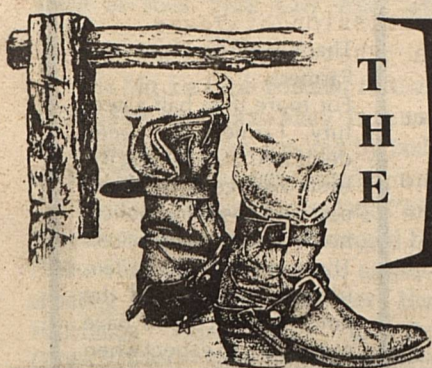

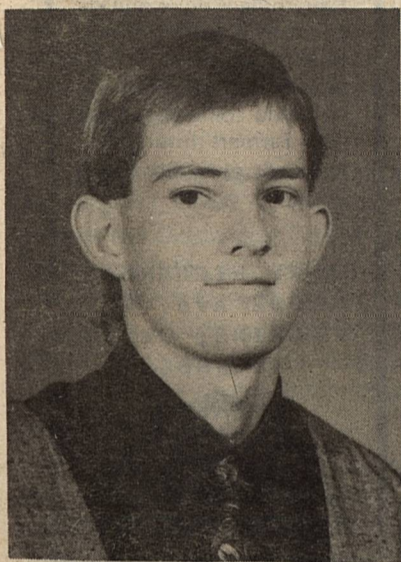

GFWC Celebrates 100th Birthday

GFWC/TFWC Tsa Mo Ga Club met in regular session May 14 to celebrate the 100th birthday of General Federation of Women's Clubs, organized in New York City April 24, 1889.

Tsa Mo Ga Club honored its own outstanding members. Mary Jo Luna St. Romain has been honored by both GFWC/TFWC Caprock District and Tsa Mo Ga Club as Outstanding Club Woman. She was recently honored by Plains Chamber of Commerce as Outstanding Community Volunteer. Her Federation appointments to the GFWC/TFWC State Board include TFWC Life Member and historian. She is a District Life Member of Caprock District and charter member of the Tsa Mo Ga Club in Plains, being active for over 50 years.

Zereta Winn was honored as past president of GFWC/TFWC Caprock District and Outstanding Club Woman. Mrs. Winn is the only member of Tsa Mo Ga Club to serve as District President. Other Federation appointments of FWC/TFWC State Board include Education Division Chairman for Caprock District.

Wilma Luna Powell was honored as a charter member of the GFWC/TFWC Tsa Mo Ga Club and as past president, serving from 1941-43.

Sit Jones was honored for her many years of work in Federation. She

was named Outstanding Poet Laureate and is a District Life Member of GFWC.

Mattie Field, dressed in attire relative to the early 40's, reviewed the book, "Reaching Out" by Mary Jean Houde. The book traces the issues and challenges which have expanded the interests of organized clubwomen over the last 100 years. Mrs. Field served as Tsa Mo Ga Club president in 1958 and again in 1982.

Installation of officers, held in commemoration of GFWC Centennial 1890-1990, was conducted by past president Caprock District, Zereta Winn. Installed were president, Louise Goehry; vice president, Kathy Jones; secretary, Janie Crawford; treasurer, Betty Rushing; corresponding secretary, Mary Lee Swann; critic, Dolores Davis; Federation counselor, Sit Jones; parliamentarian, Mary Jo St. Romain; and reporter, Diane Wilson. A collector's period dolls of 1890 were used for each station and a small replica was presented each person installed in celebration of the Centennial.

A business session was directed by president, Sarah Shelton. She wore a period dress and carried a basket that belonged to her great-grandmother that dated back 100 years.

Scripture was read by Carolyn Culwell and she led the group in the club collect.

\$250 Cookie Recipe Shared By Reader

The following note was with the recipe:

"A friend of a friend had lunch at the Zodiac at Neiman's in November and for dessert, she had a cookie. She thought it was the most wonderful cookie she had ever tasted and she asked if the recipe was available. She was told that it was for a price -- there would be a charge of two-fifty. She said that was fine. She took the recipe and told the waitress to charge it to her account.

"In December when her bill was received, there was a charge for \$250.00. She immediately called and told the store of the mistake -- the charge should be \$2.50. At that point, she was informed that there had been NO mistake. The charge was \$250.00.

"She had to pay the price, but she vowed to collect satisfaction. Therefore, she wants to get the recipe to everyone she can -- for free. She asks that every person who gets a copy sends it to everyone he/she knows...so here it is.

NEIMAN'S \$250.00 COOKIE RECIPE

2 cups butter (no substitutes)
2 cups sugar
2 cups brown sugar
4 eggs

2 tsp vanilla
4 cups flour
5 cups blended oatmeal*
1 tsp salt
2 tsp baking powder
2 tsp baking soda
4 oz chocolate chips
1 8-oz grated Hershey candy bar
3 cups chopped nuts

*Blended oatmeal: Measure and blend in a blender into a fine powder.

Cream butter and both sugars. Add eggs and vanilla. Mix together with flour, oatmeal, salt, baking powder and baking soda. Add chips, candy and nuts. Roll into walnut sized balls and place 2 inches apart on a cookie sheet. Bake for 9 minutes at 375 degrees. Makes 112 cookies. (Recipe may be halved).

"This makes me think of the lady that ate at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City, also asked about the recipe and was told that it was available, received a bill for \$500 and had to pay. She put the recipe in the Lubbock Avalanche for everyone. It is now called Red Velvet Cake. That was about 30 years ago.

"I don't think I will be asking for recipes in any eating places.

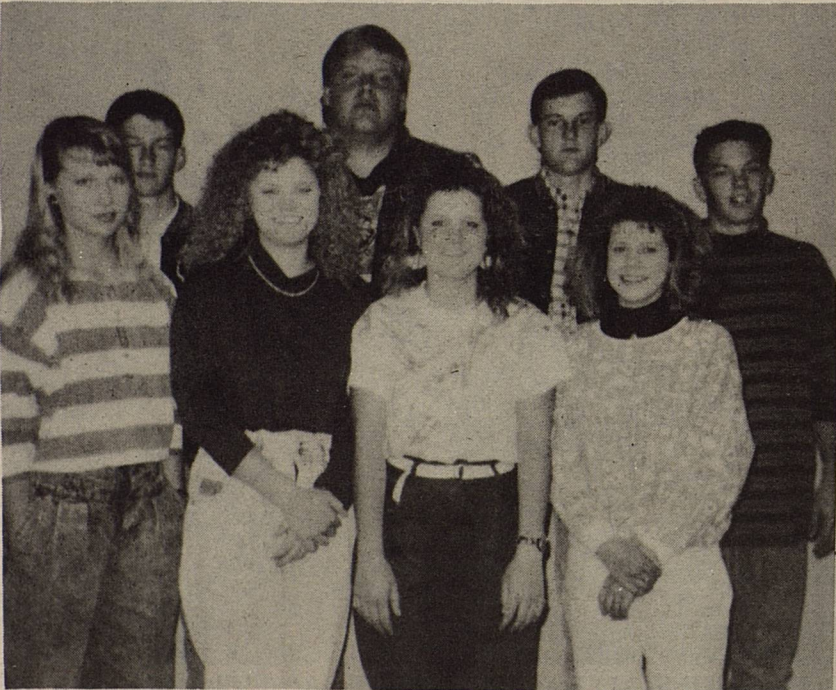

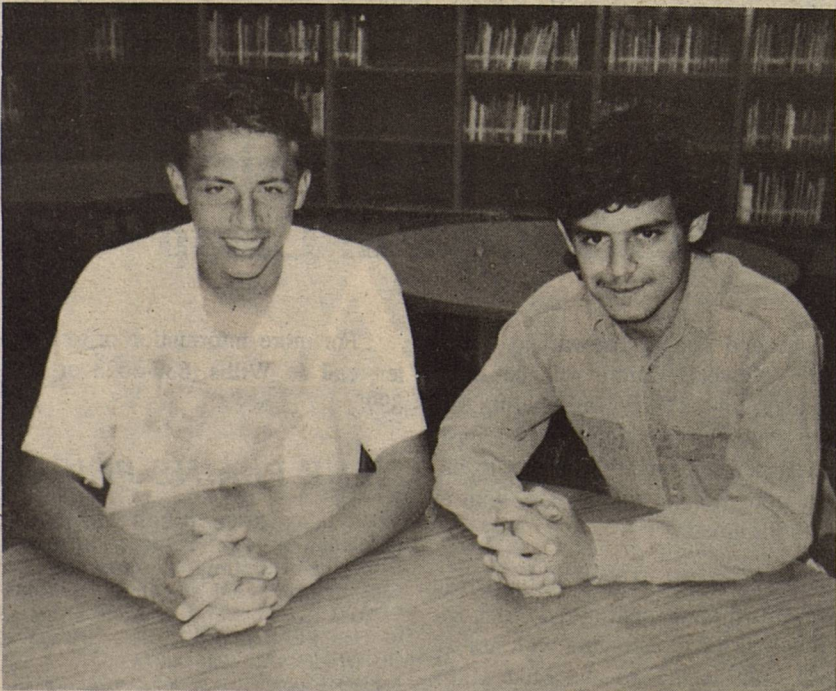
