Rolloff Dumpster Provided

A citizen trash collection station is now being provided by the City of Plains at the former landfill site west of town. This station includes a 40 cubic yard rolloff dumpster and a ramp to provide access to the dumpster.

This collection station will be available to the public during regular working hours 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and will be for normal household waste only. Items that will be prohibited from disposal at this site include tires, wet cell batteries, oil filters, asbestos, liquids, yard waste and tree limbs, large appliances, fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides and insecticides, commercial waste, and any other waste that is considered hazardous.

A collection point for yard waste and tree limbs is also provided by the City of Plains as well as a disposal site for refrigerators, water heaters, washers and driers, and other large appliances.

If you have any of items to dispose of contact the City Hall during regular working hours for access to these disposal sites.



Our readers will notice this week the absence of the Pay-n-Save full page ad or insertion. The decision to discontinue advertising in all small town weekly papers was reached this week during a meeting of administrative officers in Littlefield, not by local manager, Frank Garza.

Will THE PLAINS PRIDE survive?

The answer lies with you, our readers, subscribers, supporters and advertisers. You (or You) determine the paper's future.

Newspapers are not assembled, printed and mailed without cost. Those costs have continued to escalate since the papers beginning in April, 1985.

From day one, we've had some very loyal advertisers and individuals who have sustained us through these seven years. It was Pay-n-Save Grocery that really gave birth to this little paper in the beginning and we are only grateful for that support. Perhaps they may decide to return to advertising in the future, but in the meantime, the Pride has lost the major portion of its income. We cannot continue unless other support is gained.

We must have additional revenue through advertising with prompt payments on all accounts which are due on the 10th of each month in order to meet the expenses of publishing this paper. We are required to pay each week for our printing and mailing and without the necessary cash flow we cannot do so. The majority of our accounts payable are two to five months behind, which means we are only financing advertising each week for a big part of the paper. (There are those who pay right on time and we've come to expect it and very much appreciate it.)

We are sincerely grateful for the ongoing support you have given us, especially the ladies at the library who have been so wonderful in collecting the news. We appreciate the businesses and the school support which has been with us each week - their loyalty makes it difficult to even consider ceasing publication.


There's so much going on in this small town, it's hard to believe Plains is really a "small" town of less than 2,000. It must be that every person is involved in some way or another in promoting and boosting Plains and its people.



Plains Tennis Teams Compete In Brownfield, Plainview

Plains High School's tennis teams competed last weekend in tournaments in Plainview and Brownfield. In Brownfield competition, Plains finished third overall back of Brownfield and Levelland. At Plainview, Justin Stowe and Brian Wilson placed second in doubles in a tournament which drew 212 entries, mostly larger schools.

Ladd Winn and Victor Bernal were second in doubles in Brownfield. After a bye in the first round, they defeated Wellman and Levelland in the quarter and semi-finals before losing to a Lubbock team. Lance Cole and Eric Cowart finished fifth. They had won their opener with Wellman, lost to Brownfield, then won over a Lamesa team and another team from Wellman.

In singles competition, Trey Cowart drew a bye in the first round then lost to a Lubbock player. He defeated a Levelland opponent and lost to yet another, finishing in sixth place.

Ashlee Winn and Stephanie Cole defeated Brownfield before losing to the eventual tourney champions from Wellman in split sets in the quarter-finals. They defeated Lamesa to reach the fifth place game against teammates Oglá Ramirez and Selena Humphrey.

Ramirez and Humphrey defeated Brownfield, lost to Levelland in the quarter-finals and defeated Lamesa to reach the fifth place game which was not played because of time.

In singles, Leslie placed eighth with wins over Wellman and Brownfield.

At Plainview, Stowe and Brian Wilson defeated Floydada before





Bids are invited upon the several items and quantities of work as follows:

Install approximately 11,100 LF of 6" water line, Class "C" bedding, 2 fire hydrants, 104 service connections, and necessary appurtenances.


