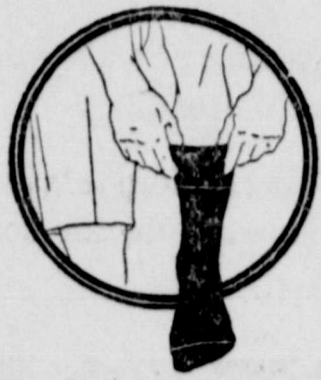

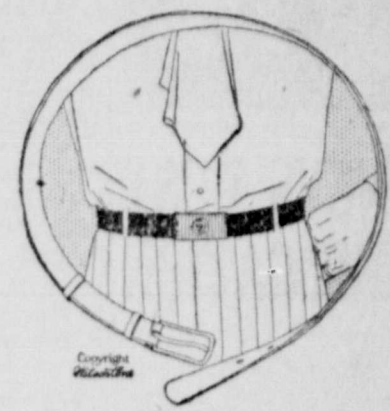

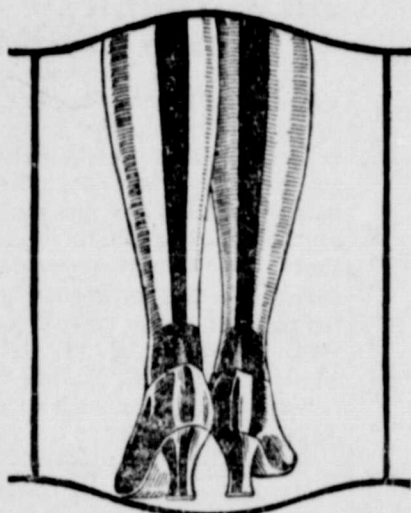

CROP PROSPECTS OVER STATE GOOD

HOUSTON, April 12.—Favorable crop conditions prevail generally over the state notwithstanding the severe set back given to all crops by the low temperatures of March 18 and 19, and conditions are only slightly below the average for this time of year, the April crop-report of the division of crop and live stock estimates, U. S. Department of Agriculture, issued today declares. The report summarizes conditions as of April 1.

March started with prospects excellent for an early season, the report declares, but the freezing weather changed conditions considerably. At the beginning of the month, most sections of the state were reported as having ample soil moisture, grass and weeds had started and early crops were making good growths. Only the South section escaped damage from the freeze, it is reported.

"The fruit crop has suffered in varying degrees, ranging in aggregate from slight damage in the case of apples, pears, grapes and berries to severe losses in figs, peaches and plums," the report continues. "Potatoes and corn that had come up were frozen back and wheat, oats, barley and pastures suffered a set-back. There were some losses of young live stock and cattle were drawn considerably by the cold. Pastures and range were put back at least two weeks.

"The condition of wheat is fully 20 points above what it was a year ago, but not quite up to the 10-year average. The freezing weather and high, drying, cold winds retarded the growth of the crop, but since the 20th of March considerable improvement has taken place. The long period of drought from July to early this year gave the wheat on the north plains in particular a poor start and many acres were abandoned. Durum wheat was sown on some land but the remainder will be used for feed crops principally."

"A most disquieting element," states the report, "is introduced by the presence of greenbugs in Wichita, Wilbarger, Young and Parker counties, a condition that may become bad with a continuation of cool weather which favors the pest but is unfavorable to the development of the insect enemies which normally hold the greenbug in control."

ROWENA SCHOOL TAKES OFF HIGH HONORS AT MEET

Prof. O. P. Lockhart, principal of the Rowena school, and J. A. Seidel, editor of the Rowena Review, were in the city Thursday afternoon, and left a report of the recent county interscholastic meet with The Ledger with the request that we publish it, and show what the Rowena school won in the county contests.

"Rowena carried off high honors in the Runnels County Interscholastic Meet at Miles," said Prof. Lockhart. "Although it is her first year to take part in any events of this kind.

"In the Declamation Contest Rowena won more points than any other school. Herbert Kettler won first place in the Junior boys; Ward Crager won second place in the Senior boys; and Marguerite Kubela and Bertha Baron won third places in the Junior and Senior girls respectively.

"In the Music Memory Contest, Rowena won first, second, third and fourth places. The grades were 99, 96, 94 and 88. The first place was won by Lula Mae Sommers.

"The championship in volleyball was easily won by the Rowena team. As some of the bystanders observed 'It was a complete walk-away.'

"The tennis tournament was a close fight between Hatchell and Rowena. Hatchell won first place in Girls singles; Rowena carried off second place in Boys and Girls singles and in Boys doubles. First place in Girls doubles was won by Bertha Baron and Elsie Feist of Rowena. Hatchell and Miles were to play for second place in Girls doubles but on account of the lateness of the hour, Hatchell gave Miles second place.

"The most brilliant achievement was the winning of the Junior Boys tract by one boy alone, who won four first places out of a possible five. This was won by Willie Cervenka of Rowena.

"The county championship as yet is undecided. In all probability when all of the points are counted correctly, Rowena will be the champion of the county, but if she is not, she has put up a good fight."

Ballinger's Brief for Tech College is Given Approval

Ballinger's formal application for the Texas Technological College will be in the hands of the Locating Board at Austin Thursday. The rules governing the locating of the college provide that all applications be filed with the board by April 20th, which is Friday.

At a joint meeting of the Y. M. B. L. board and the local Tech committee, held in the directors' room of the League Monday night, each member of the committee and director was presented with a copy of the brief, and some time spent in reading and discussing it. The brief was approved—okayed, as covering Ballinger's claim for the school, and Stuart L. Williams, secretary of the committee, and also secretary of the Y. M. B. L., was delegated to go to Austin and appear before the secretary of the Locating Board and file the brief in person.

The brief not only serves as an application for the new college to be located in Ballinger, but is a valuable record of statistics and information and can be used in Ballinger, and the wonderful resources of this country. While the rules governing the locating of the institution require that a copy of the brief be filed with each member of the committee, or a copy filed for each member of the board, 500 copies were printed and bound in pamphlet form, and will be placed where they will be of value to the town as an advertisement after the Locating Board has passed on Ballinger's chances. For the present distribution has not been authorized.

Optimism of the local committee, and those who met with the committee Monday night, is one hundred per cent strong, and looking above the personal preference one might have for his home town, the local committee is unanimous in the opinion that no other town can offer a more desirable site for the school, and contend that Ballinger meets all requirements with reference to location, water, land, etc.

With the filing of the brief, the next step will be in making ready to receive the Locating Board when it visits Ballinger, and carrying out a program which complies with all the requirements of the board in presenting Ballinger's claim. The board was due to begin its tour of inspection about May first, but on account of the legislature being in session, it is probable that the committee will not start out until a later date.

It was estimated by the committee that it would require about \$750 to defray the expenses of the local locating committee, and the finance committee will begin raising this amount at once. The printing of the brief, which was done below actual cost, and other expenses such as telegrams, cuts, maps, expense of entertaining the Locating Board, etc., will be less than half the amount expended in the campaign for the West Texas A. & M., which Abilene did not get. This saving is due to the fact that the work was done by the Y. M. B. L.

After disposing of the matters coming before the local committee, the Y. M. B. L. board went into a short session and discussed a clean-up campaign, water and irrigation. UNABLE TO GET JURY IN PLAINS MURDER CASE

Moler is under indictment for the murder of Noah Samples, an aged stockman, whose body was found buried in a cellar. Moler is alleged to have made a confession admitting that he murdered Samples for his money.

When the case was called for trial yesterday the court overruled a motion of the defense for a change of venue, but after exhausting the special venire selecting a jury the court reversed its action and granted the change.

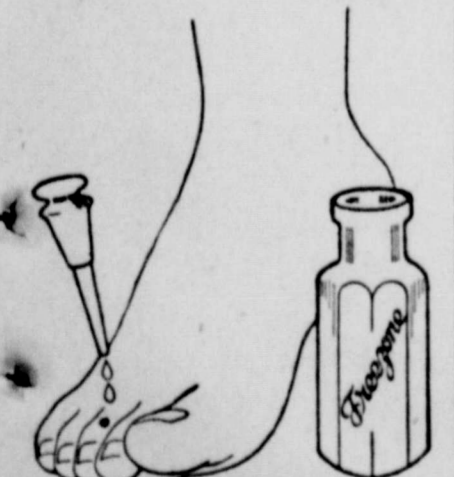

DALLAS, April 14.—The Texas cotton crop will suffer heavily from boll weevil damage this season in the opinion of John T. Orr, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association. President Orr bases his prediction on the grounds of a late and backward spring.

"There will be very little early cotton because of the late spring," Orr declared, "and the late cotton will be fruiting at the right time for the weevil to do serious damage. The ground is still cold and seed that has been planted has either rotted or been killed by freezes. Cotton which was planted in the southern part of Texas will have to be planted over at about the time the cotton in the rest of the state is being planted. This fact will tend to a further advantage for the weevil as there will be a labor shortage. Labor for planting, chipping and picking usually moves northward as the season advances. The late spring and the resultant uniformity of cotton planting over the state will prevent this movement. The result will be that the cotton cannot be worked properly, and this condition will retard the growth still more. It will be held back for late fruiting, which means that it will be exposed to the boll weevil at the time when they are most plentiful.

"In formation obtained by us indicated that the recent freeze had very little effect on the boll weevil. The weevil multiplies rapidly, reaching the largest numbers late in the season. By reason of this fact, farmers try to get their cotton planted and made before the weevils get numerous. The carry-over of weevils will be sufficient to produce a large number just at the time that cotton will be fruiting. We can, therefore, expect more than the average devastation from the boll weevil this year."

SAN BENITO, Tex., April 14.—Considerable cotton planted early and deep has been replanted in this district, farmers report. Continued cold weather during March is said to have caused rotting of the early planted seed and replanting was found necessary.

Why the "Tech" Should Be Located at Ballinger

By Herbert Sledge (Awarded Second Prize)
That Ballinger should be chosen as the location for the Texas Technological College is very evident. Every requirement that the location Board calls for, Ballinger has or could easily get. When this committee visits Ballinger they will find that Ballinger has all any other town has to offer—and "then some."



I will briefly outline a few of the things Ballinger has to offer, and reasons why this college should be located at this place.

First, Ballinger is centrally located, being about thirty miles from the center of the state. It is also close to the center of population of the area in which the college is to be located. This city offers a ground of compromise, being at a point which would serve all sections of the state more equally than any other applicant for the college.

Ballinger is located in the center of a section in which all forms of agriculture and ranching are carried on; to the North there is cotton and grain; to the East there is cotton and feed; to the South sheep, goats and the pecan industry, and to the West there is cattle and all forms of ranching.

Second, climatic conditions are very favorable, having a very even temperature at all seasons. There are no extremes of either hot or cold weather. Ballinger is not a health resort, therefore, there is not any kind of sickness or disease that would hinder the work of the college should it be located here, and students from both the low and high altitudes could spend the college season here without coming in contact with contagious or other diseases. The average rainfall (about 23 inches) is sufficient to insure ample water supply and crop seasons, when properly distributed, and the seasons, year in and year out, are as favorable as any other section of the state.

Third, Ballinger can meet all requirements as to railroad facilities, and it is entirely accessible from all parts of the state which this great college will serve. Ballinger is located on two railroads, and two state highways. The Santa Fe which runs East and West and the Abilene & Southern which runs North, offer ample transportation with connecting lines to all parts of Texas.

In this day of auto travel, the two state highways leading from neighboring railroad points would insure quick and convenient connections by regular and reliable "jitney" lines which would no doubt be established, such accommodations already being given on a fairly good schedule by auto lines to neighboring cities.

Fourth, the proposed location is adjacent to the most substantial residential section of this city, and within the city limits, while the agricultural land included in the same site is of the best quality to be found in West Texas. It is high grade tillable land, ninety per cent of which is susceptible to cultivation, and seventy-five per cent could be put under ditch for the purpose of irrigating.

This splendid body of land is watered by one of the best and largest running streams (and this should be absolutely necessary in its location) in West Texas. This stream offers ideal sites for constructing a large dam and impounding sufficient water for all purposes, including irrigating of several hundred acres of land. The state's most efficient engineers have passed on the surveys made for this purpose. This lake would also furnish fishing, boating and other outdoor sports which are essential to the life of a student body.

Fifth, in the way of building material, Ballinger has something no other town can offer, and which would figure a big item in the cost of constructing the various college buildings. Within easy haul of the college site there is an abundance of high grade building stone, sand and gravel. Quarrying and hauling would be the only cost to the state in supplying the stone and sand and gravel for the college.

Sixth, Ballinger is a live town and has the college spirit to begin

with. People who spend a few months here fall in love with the progressive environment which prevails. Ballinger's pride in civic matters would make it easy to build one of the best college towns in Texas.

Seventh, Ballinger is supported by one of the best agricultural counties in Texas, and the best agricultural county in West Texas, and this would place the college in the midst of a people who would support it both financially and morally. Ballinger would support the athletics of the college and other college activities.

There is no argument to advance why Ballinger should not get the new college, and there is every logical reason why the school should be placed here. If the decision is made on merits and merits alone, the Texas Tech will be planted at Ballinger.

AN ORDINANCE

Prohibiting the driving or propelling of any Tractor or other Vehicle having any of its wheels equipped with Cleats or other protrusions over, upon or across any paved street in the City of Ballinger and prohibiting the moving of any heavy object other than the ordinary vehicle of regular traffic over, upon or across any paved street in said city, without a permit, and providing a penalty therefor.

Be it Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas:

SECTION I.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or association of persons or for any officer, agent or employee of any corporation to move, drive or propel, or cause to be moved, driven or propelled any tractor, engine, or any other vehicle, having upon the wheels thereof any metal cleat, knob, or any other protruding object, over, upon or across any paved street in the City of Ballinger.

SECTION II.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or association of persons or for any officer, agent or employee of any corporation to move or propel or cause to be moved or propelled over, upon or across any paved street in said City of Ballinger, any house or machinery, iron safes, or any other heavy object calculated to injure said paved streets and other than the vehicles of ordinary traffic, without first applying to the City Secretary of said city and obtaining a written permit signed by the City Mayor under the seal of said city, which permit shall specify the object desired to be moved and the route to be covered by such object on such paved streets, and without first having deposited with the City Mayor a sum of money to be designated by him, not to exceed the sum of \$500.00 for each block or part of block to be covered in the route of said object to be moved, which said deposit shall be taken and kept as security for any damage that may be done to said paved streets in the moving of said objects, and out of which deposit a sufficient sum of money shall be retained by said city to properly repair any damage done to such streets by the moving of any such objects; that the sum so deposited as security shall not be conclusive as to the amount of damage done by the moving of any such object, and in the event the damage done shall exceed the amount so deposited nothing here-in shall be construed as affecting the right of the city to recover damages for the full amount thereof from the offending party.

SECTION III.

Provided further that dealers in tractors and other machinery prohibited by the terms of this ordinance from being moved upon, over and across any paved street shall have the right to obtain the permit provided for in Section II above when moving such articles in or out of their places of business in the course of trade, but in all such cases such dealers shall place upon such paved street, a wooden floor or runners on which such tractor or other article shall be moved while on said streets.

SECTION IV.

Any person or persons, firm or association of persons, or any officer, agent or employee of any corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed, and all rules requiring more than one reading of any ordinance are hereby dispensed with and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

The Ballinger Oil & Gas Company has awarded the contract for further development in the Safety First well, and it is expected that work will be resumed on the well early next week.

A string of five inch casing has been purchased, and is due to arrive here the last of this week, or by Monday. Fuel is being planned on the ground, and other arrangements perfected for pushing the drill to the depth which will make a thorough test.

O. Wilson will be in charge of the work, and while Mr. Wilson has contracts for drilling in the Breckenridge field, he will spend one-half of his time in Ballinger giving his personal attention to the Safety First test.

Barring bad weather and accidents, the promoters of the local project hope to be able to determine at an early date what they are to get for their money. The log of the well down to the present depth is very promising, and those who are behind the project feel optimistic over the final outcome.
