At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League Wednesday night, a resolution was unanimously adopted urging the City Commission to proceed immediately with the construction of additional water filtration facili-

After a brief discussion of existing water conditions, the directors adjourned to the city hall at the invitation of the Commissioners, where the water situation was threshed out from all angles. It was the opinion of those present that the filtration plant should be increased about 150 per cent, and that a basin should be constructed sufficiently large to hold a reserve supply of clear water in order that nothing but clear water be pumped into the standpipe. While these improvements would insure a supply of clear water, it was decided that in order to have pure water it would be necessary to expend a few hundred dollars on a chlorinating machine.
