SENATE IN **ALL NIGHT SESSION**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. -After an all-night session, during many hours of which less than half the membership was present, a quorum was secured in the Senate this morning and a fillibuster against the Boulder Canyon dam bill was resumed.

When announcement was made that a quorum was present, Senator Phipps, Republican, of Colorado, took up the fight against the measure which Senators Ashurst, Democrat, and Cameron, Republican, both of Arizona, had carried on throughout the night. Other opponents of the bill were

prepared to relieve the Colorado Senator. Senator Johnson, Republican, of California, author of the bill is trying to force a vote before adjournment tonight to prevent

displacement of the measure. The session began at 11 o'clock yesterday morning and Johnson insisted that the Senate remain in session because he feared that his bill was having its last day in court for this congress.







The war planners are constantly in touch with State Department officials, military attaches in foreign capitals and numerous other government agencies. It is no secret that the plans in their keeping provide in detail for setting the military machine in motion with a full destructive force against any enemy at the earliest possible moment after hostilities have been declared. For a major or minor emergency, they tell not only how many men will be needed by the army, but how they are to be transported, equipped, trained if necessary, and supplied with the many essentials a modern army needs for field service.

The State Department usually refers new treaties to the war planners before they are given final approval and sent to the Senate for ratification, and sometimes even before they are formally drafted. 





Grey stucco is used for the first story, with weathered siding the rest of the way. give a little contrast, the roof should be of shingles stained


dark brown or moss green. The shutters and posts for the porch are rough hewn in keeping with the general tone of the house.






