# ARTIFICIAL GAS FROM SOFT COAL FOR AUTO POWER

PITTSBURGH, April 3 .- Autonobiles of the future may purr their ways over super-highways. propelled by artificial gasoline made from soft coal, when the predicted shortage of oil has be come a reality.

Discussion of methods for achieving this goal will probably form one of the principal topics of discussion at the Second International Conference on Bitumin ous Coal, here November 19th under the auspices of the Car


