Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 20.—Weather conditions in Kansas and Missouri today were little different from those of yesterday. In Kansas the maximum temperature reported was 105 degrees and there was no rain in any part of the state today.

Weather officials at Tojeka announced that the city has had less than one-half the usual rainfall according to the twentyseven year average, although more rain has fallen there than elsewhere in the state.

#### TEN DAYS VACATION

#### FOR GOVERNOR

Austin, Texas, Aug. 20.—Governor Colquitt is scheduled to leave Austin for Colorado on Saturday evening and will be out of the state for about ten days. Before leaving, he will more than likely dispose of the general appropriation bills and all other features now pending in the executive department.

The question of appointing a new penitentiary commission is also expected to be disposed of by the governor before he departs for the West. He has not as yet given any indication he will name for these important positions.

The general belief is that present commission will continue in office until their successors are appointed and qualified, which is authorized by a provision of the constitution.

## MAN RUINING HIMSELF AND RUINING OTHERS

Preacher Talks About Ruin. Largest Crowd of Week Attend Revival Wednesday Night.

Taking for his subject the one word, "Ruin," Rev. Broome preached to the largest crowd Wednesday night that has been present since Sunday night, the congregation listened with close attention to another splendid sermon. A great majority of the congregation at this service were church members, but Pastor Broome made his sermon appeal to them as well as to the man who makes no pretention towards being a christian. In this talk he gave a brief analyses of the life of Ahaz, obeying the man ruining himself, the man in ruin and the man ruining others. The principles thoughts brought out in the sermon was the road leading up to ruin, which is the indulgence in worldly things, and which leads to the ruin of the christian life and usefulness.

At the ten o'clock service this morning Rev. Broome used as his subject: "The Work of the Holy Spirit in the Believer." First the speaker outlined the Spirit's personality. The spirit in the believer is illumination; 2nd, sanctification; things in sanctification; a gift, an act—it is progressive. 3rd, in filling of baptism of the spirit. 4th. It causes the life of the christian to flow through the believer. Last, it brings restfulness of mind.

The subject for the sermon tonight is "Regeneration."

Those who are missing these services are depriving themselves of much benefit in christian work and strength. The music is good, and the church members of the town that are attending will be better prepared for living the life so much desired.

#### COLQUITT USING BLUE PENCIL

Austin, Aug. 21.—Many pet appropriations of the first called session of the Thirty-third Legislature are doomed to destruction. Whether in toto or partially will not be known for several days, but according to the Governor's statement today the blue pencil is working overtime.

"I am using a blue pencil in there a yard long," the Governor said, smilingly. It was first used last night when \$9,000 of the judicial appropriation bill was lopped off under the recently adopted method of shaving the items rather than vetoing them entirely. Backed up by an opinion of the Attorney General, the appropriation bill of the Thirty-third Legislature will be as the Governor wants it.

Early yesterday he passed over the minor bills, and now only the larger measures remain. The civil \$30 bill, the Allison bill, the "blue sky" law, the penitentiary bill, not to mention the remaining sections of the appropriation bill, are in the executive office.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 21.—Heavy rainfall that washed away some ground back of the court house at Conconully, Wash., uncovered a ledge of ore on municipal land, making the town the owner of a gold mine that has received favorable notice from mining men. #### MISSOURI TO SHOW THE WORLD.

Missouri is to "show" the world what can be done in good road making on the 20th and 21st of the present month. On these dates between 200,000 and 300,000 Missourians will, with mule teams, "work the road." It will be the greatest gathering of bucolic whisks and mules the world has ever seen. The governor of Missouri calls the occasion "the biggest and most stupendous two working days this country has ever known." If the rate of \$3 a day be accorded as fair compensation for a man and team then the 250,000 farmers of Missouri will have contributed \$1,500 to the cause of better highways. Nevertheless, it must be forgotten that one day of a gully washing rain in Missouri, soon following this stupendous contribution, will totally obliterate these two days of toil. The work of teams and scrapers on dirt roads is good only as long as the weather remains fair. The way, the lasting way, is to build the roads the way that Tarrant county is now building the cardinal and subcardinal roads across her territory. Make the road building a matter of permanence, and the workers will have something to show for their labor.—Fort Worth Record.

## BOYS STEAL BEER AND LAND IN JAIL

Broke into ThroughCar in Santa Fe Yards, Extracted Keg of Beer and Celebrated.

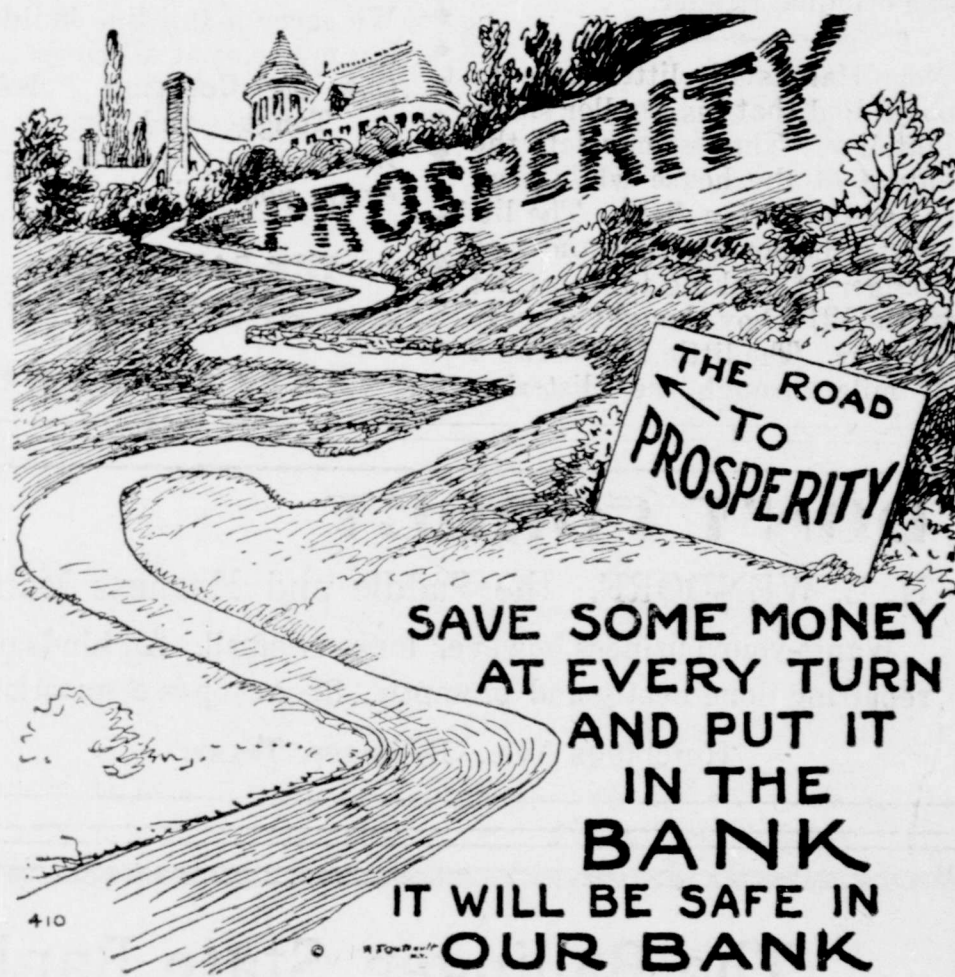

They went to a point below the pig dump being made in the east end of the yards, and tapped the keg in what seemed a safe retreat. One boy stood guard while the other three partook of the cooling beverage, and then the guard was changed. All had a merry time and all went well until the officers got on their trail next day. The boys were seen as they went under the bridge at Brady avenue, and from there the officers took up the trail and succeeded in landing the bunch in jail.
