> The 1500 civilian refugees who rushed across the river when General Mercado went through the streets of Ojinaga telling the people to flee, suffered as much distress as the soldiers. Scores of women camp followers had lost were crying piteously in the corral provided for them or the Amer ican side. Others were without sufficient clothing and all were drenched from wading through the river.

The scene of disorder on the American side was almost as bad as on the Mexican. Scores of federal guns had been thrown into the river and were protruding from the mud Federal and rebel wounded who had crawled to the river bank side by side were wading across, aided by American soldiers. Mexican women and child ren who had escaped from the corral were trudging up the mountain road toward Marfa and had to be brought back.
