CITY DADS DISCUSS PHONES AND SANITATION

Pass Order Inviting Independent Line Into Ballinger—Employ New Street and Sanitary Man—Night Watchman Let Out—Will Fight Filth.

Several orders of great importance were passed at a meeting of the city council held Tuesday morning. Little time was lost in discussing small matters, and every alderman present talked business from the time the meeting was called to order until it adjourned, and demonstrated to an outsider by their remarks and their votes that they were interested in the welfare of Ballinger and her citizens. The first question to come before the council was the telephone rate question. Since the West Texas Telephone Co., had suspended the increase in rate, collecting the old rate for the present month, the council decided that there was nothing for them to do until the telephone company again made an effort to increase the rate. They decided not to take up the work of appointing an auditor to investigate the books of the telephone company until the rates were again raised.

The rural telephone question was discussed, and the council passed an order extending to the independent telephone company, "The Bool Weevil," an invitation to come into Ballinger with its system. The aldermen present were unanimous in voting for this motion.

The sanitary committee was instructed to employ Rad Brown to succeed John Todd, in taking care of the street cleaning and sanitary work, and that this work be turned over to Mr. Brown next Monday, Mr. Todd's time having expired.

In handling the sanitary work it was decided by the council that the scavenger have all closets cleaned twice a month through the

A committee of business men will meet the officials, bringing them to consider means of grievances.

Not a wheel is turning in the large plants today.

SECRETARY BRYAN IS HAPPY MAN

WASHINGTON, June 9.—So encouraging did Secretary Bryan consider the Mexican situation that he admitted that General Carranza would name an envoy to represent him at Niagara Falls, and the mediators would receive the representatives of General Carranza on his own terms.

It is expected that there will not be any interference with the docking of the Antilla, the Cuban vessel, loaded with arms for the rebels, when it arrives at Tampico tomorrow. It is understood that the United States will grant General Huerta an asylum should he ask it.

The cabinet officers are hopeful that the United States troops will soon evacuate Vera Cruz but cannot even suggest when the time will be.

CARRANZA'S REPLY MAY COME SOME TIME TODAY

Representatives of Rebels Admit that Carranza will Enter Mediation Conference "On His Own Terms."

WASHINGTON, June 9.—General Carranza's reply to the invitation dispatched several days ago to participate in the mediation conferences, is expected to be sent to the A. B. C. mediators today.

Constitutionalist representatives here admit that the reply accepts the invitation "on his own terms" whether the reply will be satisfactory to the mediators is doubtful. If it is accepted everything is ready for the drafting of the protocol, when the mediators meet tomorrow.

The proper financing of the provisional government will probably be arranged by a loan in this country when the United States and

the South American republics recognize the new government.

MESSAGE IS NOW EN ROUTE

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 9.—Representative Lehman, the American envoy, has informed the A. B. C. mediators that General Carranza's reply to the invitation of the mediators to join in the peace conference, is on the way. It is being transmitted through the constitutionalist junta at Washington.

'WILD WOMEN' STILL CHOPPING THINGS DRESS REFORM TO BE DISCUSSED

LONDON, June 9.—A Birmingham suffragette chopped a painting today into many pieces. Detectives raided the temporary headquarters and made several arrests.

CHICAGO, June 9.—Dress reform will be discussed generally at the Federation of Women's Clubs convention which is in session here, next Tuesday.

STEPHENSON, FORMER VICE PRESIDENT, IS DYING

CHICAGO, June 9.—Adlai E. Stephenson, former vice-president of the United States, is slowly

sinking at the Presbyterian Hospital. Death is expected within a few days. His family is at his bedside.

HUERTA AND CABINET MAY GO TO VERA CRUZ TO DISCUSS MEDIATION

Report that Dictator, Blanquet and Others Are Contemplating Going to Vera Cruz—Huerta Fears Enemies May Assault While Away.

SOCIALISTS IN ITALY CAUSE MUCH TROUBLE

ROME, June 9.—Socialists in Italy have struck a protest against killing several of their number in Italian cities, including Rome.

Street cars and cabs are not running today and newspapers are not issuing papers. Stores have been closed and business stands perfectly still.

Troops are patrolling the streets here. The cavalry today cleared a plaza where socialists gathered to hold a large meeting.

MADAME WINS DIVORCE SUIT

CHICAGO, June 9.—Madame Schumann-Heink won her divorce suit from William Rapp Jr., today. Judge Sullivan sustained the motion of the singer's attorneys and directed the jury to find for her.

Madame Schumann-Heink this afternoon is jubilant over her victory. "I can sing so much better when this is off my mind," she said today after the announcement that she had won her suit.

Rapp said, "The Madame is too temperamental for me. I doubt if any man could ever get along with her."

He said that he intended to return to New York soon but would not say whether he intended to marry Mrs. Katherine Dean.

VERA CRUZ, June 9.—General Huerta, Blanquet and the remnant of the dictator's cabinet are considering coming here to complete mediation conferences is the information from high sources today.

Blanquet, one of the few members of Dictator Huerta's cabinet, first asked for a conference with Brig. Gen. Funston of the Fifth Brigade, it is reported.

It is stated here from reliable sources today that Huerta fears treachery and his move to this city may give his enemies cause to assault.

OUR LIBRARY: WHAT IT IS DOING

What It Means To Our Citizens.

First and last a great deal has been said about the Carnegie Library. Nevertheless the board of managers have been going ahead with the scant means at their disposal until over three hundred well chosen books have been put in circulation. Last Saturday seventy-eight books were taken out, chiefly by the young people of the city. The work has grown until it requires two ladies to wait upon the crowd that gathers from four to six o'clock. Think of the good that will result to the young people of our city if they will only avail themselves of the opportunity to read the good literature suitable to their age. Except for the books on the one "rent shelf", those of the very latest publication, all others are free. After a book on the rent shelf has paid its cost price back in rent at ten cents per week, it is taken off and put on the free list; and with the rentals of this book a new volume is bought.

During the summer time is the chance for the school children to get a reading that ought to be put off during the main term. It is wholesome and profitable for them to create the reading habit while young. The books are watched and read by older heads, and as soon as a book is found that is unsatisfactory or unsuited to the reading public it is taken off the shelf and disposed of, as the board wishes to place only clean literature in the hands of the readers.

Since the only means of support is by popular subscription, and the few rentals from the auditorium, and since the expenses are considerable for insurance, etc., it may be well to call attention to the plan of giving to its support. A subscription list is in circulation. You may give any amount from twenty-five cents per month up to your limit of generosity. If every man and woman at the head of a home in Ballinger would give the above sum, soon we would have enough funds to fit up the main reading room and to equip it with choice books and magazines and would be able to keep it open to the general public. Will you help? Man or woman with moderate means, this is your opportunity. Young man and woman, the call is to you, that you may have abundant reading for your leisure hours. Again it may be reiterated that all who are working for the library are doing so absolutely free of any salary, but for the good they can do our city and its citizens.

summer months, May, June, July, August and September, and the collecting for same will hereafter be handled by the secretary and will be added to the water bills, the owner of the closet, instead of paying the scavenger, will pay the secretary when he pays his water bill. The rate through the summer will be 50 cents per month, and 25 cents per month through the other months in the year as heretofore. In making this change the aldermen feel that they are doing what they think is best for the sanitary condition of the town. The mayor was authorized to co-operate with the city attorney in having an ordinance drafted to cover this work.

A motion was passed rescinding the action of the city council in appointing I. O. Wooden night watchman, and the city marshal was instructed to notify Mr. Wooden that he was no longer serving in that capacity.

A motion was passed taking Jack McKay off the street work and he is now serving the city only as city marshal.

A statement from the secretary showed that the city had 455 water users and that the total collection last month from water revenue was \$754, and less than \$100 is delinquent.

The mayor was authorized to insist that the people cut weeds around their premises, cleaning up the streets and alleys. In discussing the sanitary condition of the town it was brought out that it was very necessary that the people co-operate in cleaning up and working for those things that make a city healthy. For some reason flies are worse this year than usual, and the council stand ready to do what it can in making war on these pesky spreaders of deadly diseases. Those present were: Mayor Powell, Aldermen, Nicholson, Ellis, Weeks, and Willingham, and Secretary Lusk.
