## FERGUSON REFUSES BAILEY PROPOSITION

**EL PASO, Aug. 11.**—The W. P. Lane and Jeff McLemore contest over the nomination as Congressman-at-Large was referred today back to the sub-committee for final report tomorrow, by the state convention.  
James E. Ferguson, nominee for governor, refused to compromise with former Senator Bailey over his platform. He rejected bodily Bailey's proposition concerning his plank saying during the campaign that he promised the people to drop the agitation.

A contest is probable for the second place as congressman at large. Official returns give McLemore a lead of 159 over Lane. Secretary Kirk says these have been found correct. There are some counties missing. McLemore says if all were in his lead would be 1400. Lane, who arrived last night, has been getting returns from counties direct. He says he has a lead of 2500. If the convention declares against Lane he will have five days to give notice of a contest. Under the law, he may bring it before the state executive committee or a court. There has never been a contest for a state office under the primary election law.

## HOMAGE TO MRS. WILSON

**ON BOARD PRIVATE TRAIN, SENECA, N. C., Aug. 11.**—Through the south land today, homage was paid Mrs. Ellen Louise Wilson as the funeral train carrying her body from Washington sped to Rome, Georgia, where interment will be made this afternoon.

At almost every town, church bells tolled, and crowds stood at hot, dusty stations with heads bared.  
Flowers were presented by committee at several stops.

## Still High

**DALLAS, Aug. 11.**—Sugar increased \$1.80 per hundred weight. Wholesalers and retailers say this is the highest ever.  
In the north butter, eggs and flour are all up. A famine exists in some places in tea and spice supplies.

## OFFICIALS EXPECT EMBARGO TO BE LIFTED PRESENTLY

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.**—Officials here expect the word momentarily of the lifting of an embargo against the departures of foreigners from Germany. It is believed that before night the order for the raising will be issued.  
A new order, however, calling all Germans between seventeen and thirty-five to the colors was issued today and this is expected by some to cause further delay.

## Italians May Enter War At Any Time

**LONDON, Aug. 11.**—The Italians entrance into the general European war is momentarily expected.  
Her seizure of Albania is expected. It will probably be contested by Serbia and Montenegro who also covet the country.

## Servians Invade Bosnia and Are Being Welcomed

**NISH, Aug. 11.**—A combined Servian and Montenegrin army is pushing through Bosnia. The inhabitants are welcoming the invaders. It is reported that the Austrians have been defeated by the army at every encounter so far.

## AMERICA GOVERNMENT IS WARNED OF MINES IN SEA

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.**—The British embassy gave Secretary of State Bryan information today regarding mining the North Sea to warn American ships, particularly to as warning to the Tennessee and North Carolina which are proceeding to European coasts with several millions of dollars in gold for stranded Americans.

## CONFLICTING REPORTS OF SHIPS GOEBEN AND BRESLAU

**LONDON, Aug. 11.**—A news agency dispatch from Athens today said the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau rounded the southern extremity of Greece at full speed yesterday.  
A Rome dispatch said an unconfirmed rumor was to the effect that a British and French squadron were pursuing them.

## German Cavalry Moves

**LONDON, Aug. 11.**—It was officially stated today that two German cavalry divisions were operating in the neighborhood of Longers, Belgium.  
A large force of Germans is entering Belgium by way of Luxembourg and another along the River Aisne.

## Rivers Blood Stained; French Hold Forts Blood Curdling Tales Of German Bravery

**BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.**—The rivers in the vicinity of Liege are today stained with blood. The forts still hold out against the Germans who occupy the city. The garrison have made brilliant sorties, inflicting severe losses on the German invaders.  
The German heavy siege guns will doubtless attempt today to reduce the forts and force the Belgians to retire.  
Detachments of French artillery passed through Brussels this morning for Liege to aid the Belgians who are successfully holding back the Kaiser's troops.  
Fighting is reported to be still in progress on the North River Meuse. The allied army of the French and Belgians moved north from Namur to reinforce the Belgians and French army operating against the Germans on the Meuse.  
The war office here this morning announced that 9000 Germans had been taken prisoners within the past week in Belgium.  
Wounded brought here from the scene of fights along the Belgian frontier, tell interesting stories of the daring of Germans Sunday night in the attack on the Fort Zeroing.  
Several regiments rushed across

ed the open country and fired in massed formation upon the Belgian troops. The shells from the fort tore great gaps in their lines but the survivors kept on until the entanglements were reached. Protection was almost impossible from the rain of bullets. The German rear guard rushed upon the advance, in the face of the rapid fire guns of the fort. The slaughter which followed was enormous. The attacking column could not break through and no signal of retreat given, the army was decimated by the rain of fire from the fort. Not until 800 Germans had been killed and 3000 wounded was the signal for a recall blown.

## French Evacuate City of Mulhausen

**PARIS, Aug. 11.**—It was officially announced today that the French were compelled to evacuate Mulhausen.  
The French army which was operating above Neubroisac were driven back by an overwhelming German army which pushed the attackers back on Mulhausen. The French retired to the outskirts of the city where it is now standing.  
A general battle is probably in progress.

## England Will Declare War On Austria Next

**LONDON, Aug. 11.**—England will declare war today on Austria next. The English government demanded an explanation of the presence of Austrian troops now on the French border.  
It was also pointed out that France was England's ally in the struggle against Austria.

## LUSITANA IS SAFE

**NEW YORK, Aug. 11.**—The officers of the Cunard liners today stated that the Lusitana passed Pastnet this morning, proceeding to Liverpool.

## Moving German Prisoners

**ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 11.**—Six carloads of German prisoners are today coming north.

## RUSSIANS REPULSED

**VIENNA, Aug. 11.**—The war office here announced today that the Russian invasion of Austria had been repulsed all along the line.

**Caught Defrauding Citizens  
Made to Leave Country**

A ship sailing from New York some time this week will carry four Assyrians to their native country under orders from the United States immigration department.

It will be remembered by the citizens of Ballinger, at least it will be remembered by a number of Ballinger businessmen, that two foreigners, representing themselves to be preachers, working in the interest of orphan children in Kurdistan, Asiatic Turkey, solicited funds in Ballinger. The two beggars told a story most pitiful of the suffering of little innocent children in their native land and appealed to the hearer to do the noble thing and cast bread upon the waters that would return in the life to come. They got the money, having on their little honor book which they presented for the subscriber to sign, as much as one dollar from certain Ballinger citizens.

The immigration officers became just a little suspicious and taking

in charge the Assyrians they soon secured from them conflicting stories that caused further investigation, and as a result it was soon learned that the foreigners were grafters of the rankest type, and while being unable to speak very little English, they were shrewd enough to hold a sympathizing American up for sufficient funds to get by with in good shape.

The Assyrians had credentials from a bishop of the Eastern Church of Chaldeans; also credentials from ministers of the gospel and city officials in sixteen States of the Union, from the Governor of one State and from consuls or vice consuls of five different countries. It has developed upon investigation that the letters from Turkish church officials were forged and that most of those secured in the United States were based on the forged documents.

The Assyrians have been carried to New York and will be deported.

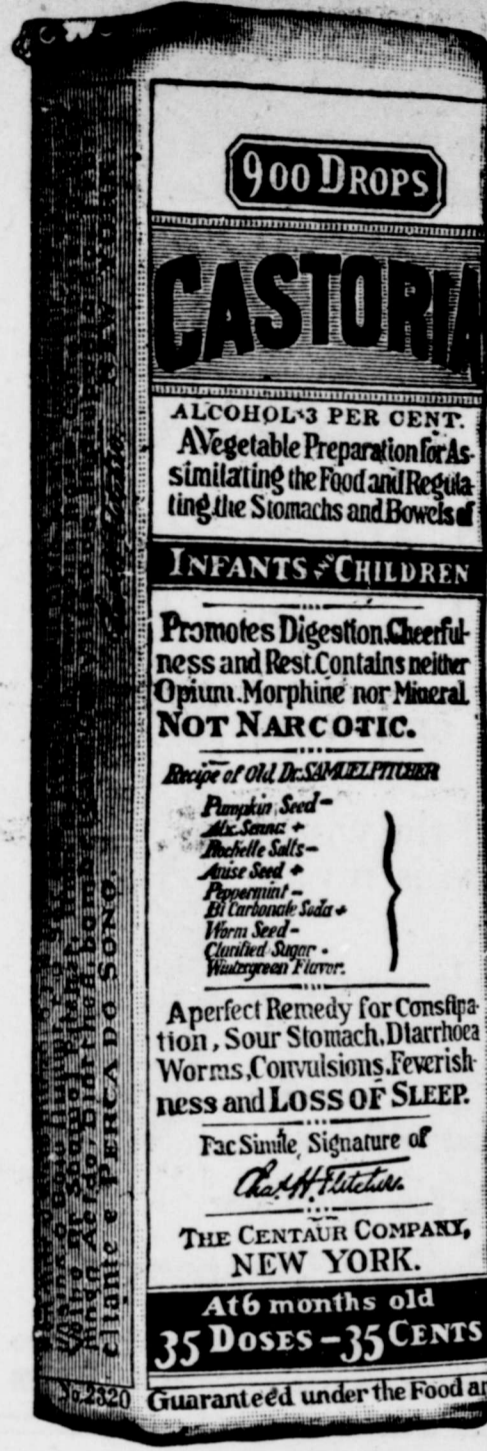

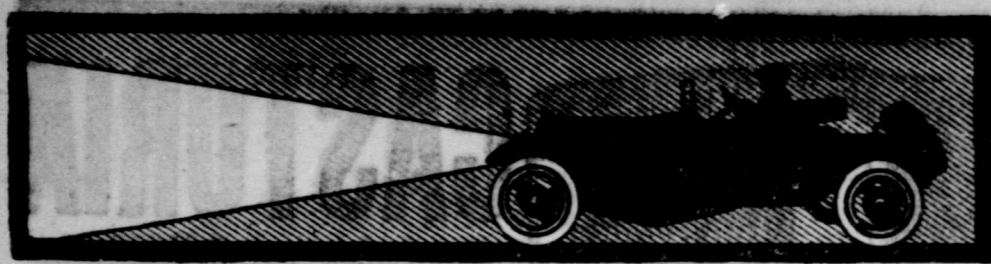

## FINANCING FARMING BEFORE CONVENTION

FORT WORTH, Aug. 11.—When the business farmers of thirty States assemble in Fort Worth September 1st for the annual convention of the Farmers' Educational and Co-Operative Union of America, it will be a "council of war" that will have an important bearing on the business interests of the United States.

Unprogrammed issues will come up for first consideration through necessity. The financing of the farming and ranching interests of the nation through the possible stringency that the European war may cause in America will be the prime object of the conference.

So far, no set program has been announced for the main body of the convention, but Charles S. Barrett of Union City, Ga., who was in Fort Worth a few days ago arranging for the approaching convention, said the European war and its effect on American farming will be one of the most important matters before the convention.

Warehousing and financing of cotton and other crops; the marketing of cotton, central selling agencies and rural credits will be among the chief topics of consideration in the convention's program.
