## English Believe German Assault Will Diminish

## Japanese Are Occupying Seven Islands

*By United Press.*  
LONDON, Sept. 3.—The English government continues to be confident that Paris will not be captured, according to an announcement made here this morning.

The belief is growing that the high tide of the German offensive is now being reached and the time approaching when the allied army will be able to assume the offensive.

The Germans have withdrawn from Alsace and the Austrian troops have been withdrawn from France to help hold back the Russians who are fighting stubbornly in Galicia.

The ferocity of the German assault is diminishing, according to messages received in London today from the front. On account of the removal of the capital of France from Paris to Bordeaux, the transmission of news pertaining to the war is rather difficult but the fragmentary messages received here, are to the effect that within the next forty-eight hours the fate of Paris will be known, if the Germans continue to push forward as rapidly as they have the past two days. If a continued advance is made by the invaders, they will be in contact with the outer defenses of the city within the next two days.

TOKIO, Sept. 3.—The landing of Japanese troops on Shantung peninsula began yesterday and is today progressing successfully, despite a terrific typhoon which has been raging in the seas. This was the news conveyed in an official announcement made today by the Japanese government.

### Japs Occupy Seven Islands

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The Japanese occupied seven islands about the German province Kiau Chau.

The adjacent waters are heavily mined by the Germans. Thousands have already been revealed by mine sweepers.

## HEAVY FIGHTING ON LEFT

PARIS, Sept. 3.—Paris awaits the coming of the Germans who are only thirty or forty miles away.

The allies are making almost their last stand in the hope of checking the Germans before they become in contact with the outer forts.

The French offensive movement in Lorraine is gaining ground, it was announced.

PARIS, Sept. 3.—According to refugees from the front, the heaviest fighting is still against the French left wing, which is now extending from Montdidier to Noyon. Most of the fighting is of a sanguinary nature.

The Germans have brought fresh troops to the front and it is now considered here inevitable that the allies will fall back to the new line now being prepared near France. It is earnestly believed in Paris that the fortifications outside the city will eventually be in line for an attack by the German forces.

Ambassador Herick is the only representative of any foreign power remaining in Paris. All others have gone to Bordeaux where the new capital has been established.

## INVASION OF TWO PROVINCES

CETTINJE, Sept. 3.—A Montenegrin invasion of Herzegovina in conjunction with the Serbian invasion of Bosnia has begun.

Two columns of Montenegrins defeated several bodies of Austrians.

## TRAIN ROBBER GETS DEATH SENTENCE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 3.—To listen to a second pronouncement upon him of the death penalty, Ralph Farris, 19, bandit, train robber and murderer, was scheduled to appear here today in the superior court. Farris as John Bostick, single-handed, held up the famous Sunset Limited of the Southern Pacific near El Monte, Cal., last December. After robbing several passengers of a quantity of jewelry, he shot and killed Traveling Passenger Agent Horace Montague, of the Southern Pacific, and escaped. He was arrested in San Francisco, tried and sentenced to death. The decision of the lower court was sustained by the court of appeals.

## AUSTRIAN ARMY IN RETREAT

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 3.—The Austrian main army in Galicia is falling back disorderly on its first line of fortifications just behind Lemberg.

The Austrian left wing in Russian Poland, which is only part of the original line that held province, is now being subjected to enormous pressure.

As a result of the last eight days' fighting, five crack Austrian corps have been practically annihilated by the Russians.

## GERMAN AIRSHIP BROUGHT DOWN IN PARIS TOWN

PARIS, Sept. 3.—One of the German aeroplanes which have been bombarding Paris, making flights over the city and dropping bombs here and there about the city, was shot down by specially designed guns today. Two of the German passengers were killed when the machine struck the earth.

## WILSON WILL ASK FOR WAR TAX FRIDAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—President Wilson will address congress at 12:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, when he will ask for a war tax of \$100,000,000. This was the official announcement made here this morning after President Wilson had a conference with Representative Underwood.

## STAR SPANGLED CELEBRATION IS ELABORATE AFFAIR

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 3.—Baltimore today opened an elaborate program in the celebration of the centenary of the writing of "the Star Spangled Banner." The range of the celebration will include Washington, Annapolis, Frederick and the whole of Chesapeake Bay with the main program at Baltimore. The program began today with a pilgrimage to War sites along the Patuxent River and to the grave of Dr. William Beanes, for whose release Key visited the British fleet. ## U. S. EMBASSY REMAINS ON JOB IN PARIS

## NOTIFIED CAPITAL CHANGED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—A cablegram received here officially announces the transfer of the government from Paris to Bordeaux.

It also declared that the allies stopped the Germans at Reims. The message was received at the French embassy. It asserted that Paris is prepared for a long siege if the Germans ever reach the city.

## 'TIS SAID THAT AUSTRIANS ARE NOT LIVE WIRES

It was a fierce battle. The dead after they had turned up their toes, raised on their hands and looked pleadingly into the enemy's eye. The dead asked for mercy, but instead of getting it, they were killed. It is a gruesome tale and it beats all the refugees stories which are now filling the newspaper columns over the country in the absence of censored matter. It was just a bulletin which was posted on the streets yesterday, about the great war which is now being waged in Europe. It read, "Five thousand dead Austrians are reported to have been killed." "It was a fierce battle," one gentleman remarked, and another with tears rolling down his cheeks, replied, "Yes, indeed."

## NEW POPE ELECTED IS BENEDICT XV

ROME, Sept. 3.—Cardinal Giacomo della Chirsa was elected of the Roman Catholic Church on the ninth ballot.

He has adopted the name Benedict XV and is receiving the adoration of fifty-seven cardinals who attended the conclave.

It has been announced that Benedict will carry on the policies of Pius X. The coronation of the new pope will be later.

Cardinal Chirsa was born 1854 and was ordained in the year 1878.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—An unconfirmed report is in circulation here that Cardinal Della Chirsa, assistant papal secretary of state, has been elected to succeed the late Pope Pius the Tenth. Cardinal Chirsa is the archbishop of Bologna. He was made a cardinal last May.

**HOW ARE YOU GOING TO VOTE ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS?**

The Ledger has just completed the publication for three successive weeks, as required by law, the proposed amendments to the state constitution, which will either be adopted or rejected by the voters of Texas at the November election.

The law requires that these amendments be published in a newspaper in every county in Texas, where there is a newspaper, and they are published for three weeks in order that every voter may have an opportunity to study them and decide for himself whether he thinks the proposed measures are for the good of the people. If you have not read them, you are not qualified to have a voice in the election.

We feel sure that every voter who has the best interest of his country at heart wants to vote intelligently, and for the benefit of those who have not read the amendments, we are giving them in brief herewith, and at the same time stating how we shall vote on the question.

One of the amendments is for the purpose of authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to organize themselves into a district and build seawalls, for this purpose to condemn land, issue bonds, etc. In detail the amendment is lengthy, but does not involve or interest any counties bordering on the gulf. This amendment is nothing more than the principle of local government and is to be applied where conditions make it necessary to protect lives and preserve property from gulf storms. It is a good law, in that it gives the people in the counties effected an opportunity to take just such measures as they see fit, and we shall be glad to vote for it.

Another amendment to be voted on is that increasing the compensation of the members of the legislature, and is substantially as follows:

The members of the legislature shall receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200) for the year in which each regular session of the legislature is held, payable in equal installments on

the twentieth days of January, April, July and October of the year in which the regular session is held and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held in the next year succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route to travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the comptroller of the state shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.

We approve this measure and shall vote for it.

Texas will suffer for the want of men to frame its laws as long as the remuneration is not sufficient to attract men of ability. It is true that there are a few able men in Texas who will sacrifice their time for the good of their country. It is a fact that no one can deny that Texas needs lawmakers instead of petty politicians and it will take a better salary to get them.

We will scratch the third and last amendment, providing for the initiative and referendum, the substantive part of which read:

The legislative power of this state shall be vested in a Senate and House of Representatives, which, together shall be styled "The Legislature of the State of Texas," but the people reserve to themselves the power, as herein provided, to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any law, or any part of any law enacted by the legislature. The legislature shall provide by law for submitting to the vote of the people, upon petition of twenty per cent. of the state the enactment of laws and the approval or rejection of any law enacted by the legislature.


With such a law on the statute books of Texas, the people would be continually voting. Texas is burdened with elections now, and we oppose any measure that will cause a continuous campaign for or against somebody's pet measure. When we elect men to the legislature we should elect men of ability, and men in whom the people can confide, and pay them for their services. We have not reached that point in life where we have lost all confidence in man, and we trust that we never will. Our law makers should be men who study the needs of the people, and if they are not familiar with the conditions of their respective districts they should acquaint themselves with the needs of their constituents, and then act accordingly on every measure that comes up in the legislature.

When a man is elected to represent the people he should be their representative, without being compelled to come back to them and ask them how he shall vote on every measure that comes up.

We are opposed to the initiative and referendum as provided for in this amendment. We don't need any more election days in Texas, but we would be glad to

**POULTRY AT STATE FAIR.**  
Big Organizations of State Will Meet in Dallas.

Dallas—This city will be the Mecca of poultry fanciers during the 1914 State Fair of Texas, which begins Saturday, October 17. The occasion will be the great annual poultry display, thousands of the bluest blooded birds in the Southwest entered for rich prizes, and also the annual meetings of the Texas White Wyandotte Club, the Texas Rhode Island Red Club and the Texas Barred Rock Club. 
