GERMANS STILL BEING FORCED

Hoch

The Czar who proclaims Galicia as a Russian province, and Austrians are nearly outnumbered in Poland.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 8.—Galicia was formerly proclaimed a Russian province today by the Russian government. The country is invested by Russians and a military governor will be named soon.

The Russian troops have crossed the River Sol south of Przemysl and are proceeding upon this city. Jaroslav also seems to be the objective of the Russian troops.

The reports from Poland are to the effect that the Austrians are nearly surrounded by a much superior Russian army and there is much apprehension that the Austrians will be severely defeated or cut to pieces by the invaders. The Russian outnumber the Austrians many times. A surrender is expected here, although there is a strong possibility of the Austrians putting up a staunch fight to the very last.

Dysentery and disease are ravishing the Austrian troops all along the front, it is understood here, and this will probably affect the actions of the Austrians in giving up to the Russian troops.

Vienna is still making preparations for a strong resistance if the Russians gain the advantage of making an assault upon the Austrian capital. The city is being placed in siege. Entrenchments are being thrown up around the town by the Austrians remaining in the capital.

Allies are making strong effort to drive German right wing back while the invader orders more troops.

PARIS, SEPT. 8.—THE GERMANS ARE BEING DRIVEN BACK ALONG THE ENTIRE 150 MILES ACROSS FRANCE EAST OF PARIS.

THE FRENCH CENTER NOT ONLY WITHSTOOD THE ATTACK BUT REPULSED THE GERMANS WITH HEAVY LOSSES.

PARIS, Sept. 8.—The allies are making a herculean effort to turn the German right flank back. They have been partially successful, according to the latest reports from the front.

The Germans, it was announced have retreated five miles from their original lines.

If the German reinforcements arrive before the German right is turned back, the allies now having the numerical advantage of the enemy, the advantage will then be transferred to the Germans and the French and English position will be perilous.

The Germans are today pounding the French center with tremendous force. They seem to have centered upon this position and are trying desperately to break the line at this point. General Pau with thirteen of his picked French army corps is bearing the brunt of the attack from the invaders.

Kaiser

Loses heavily at Saint Amond when Belgian machine guns mow down whole companies.

ANTWERP, Spt. 8.—The Belgians routed the German attacking column on this city near Saint Amond.

The Germans were proceeding toward the city when a masked machine gun and the light artillery of the Belgians opened fire at short range on the Germans, mowing down whole companies, killing hundreds and wounding thousands.

AUSTRIANS READY FOR INVASION

VIENNA, Sept. 8.—An Austrian army of 70,000 defeated an army of Montenegrins in Dalmatia with enormous losses on both sides. The Austrians are concentrating for an invasion of Montenegro.

NO RUINS

BERLIN, Sept. 8.—(By Wireless through Sayville)—“I have just returned from Liege and various villages along the line of advance of the Germans into France. I found none of the alleged desolations. I failed to find evidence of the reported fearful atrocities of the German troops thru Belgium and France.”

5,000 SERVIANS CAUGHT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Five thousand Servians were captured by the Austrians near Mitrovitch, according to a Berlin wireless message to the embassy in this city. It declared that six hundred Russians had been captured by the Austrians in Russian territory.

Back With Big Losses

BORDEAUX, Sept. 8.—The war office announced here today the following:

“In the general battle, the Germans are being forced back all along the line. The French center between La Fere and Le francois and points south of Argenforet is being furiously attacked by the Germans and the enemy will be compelled to fall back, especially at Vitry.”

The Germans made a strong attack upon the French right but were repulsed with heavy losses.

The French by a series of offensive operations have taken many points in the Vosges Mountains.

No notifications have been made of the French position in Alsace. The left wing of the allies including the defenders of Paris are today engaged.

The Germans are retreating toward the River Marne between Meux and Soissons.

The French and English have taken many prisoners. The British regulars are doing great execution in their famous bayonet charges.

GHENT BURGOMASTER SAVES CITY FROM RUIN

GHENT, Spt. 8.—The burgo-master of this city and the commander of the German force sent to take the city, have agreed that the Germans should put only a small force in charge of the city and the Ghent population will furnish all necessary food to the Germans in charge and the German

troops outside the town. The civil guard in the city will be disarmed at once.

A large German army is taking the field today to wipe out the Belgians in the north.

By the agreement with the burgo-master, the German forces will spare Ghent a bombardment of siege.

SERVIANS' INVASION OF BOSNIA BEGINS

NISH, Sept. 8.—The Servian invasion of Austria has begun. The invaders have penetrated Bosnia and are proceeding well into Cro-

atia and Slavonia. The Crown Prince is leading the Servians to Austria. Yesterday he led his armies across the Save River in Bosnia, and is today marching northward.

NO GENERAL ENGAGEMENT SO FAR IN PRUSSIA

PETROGRAD, Sept. 8.—No general engagement has taken place in Prussia, according to an official statement announced here today. Fighting so far has been merely skirmishing.

ANNIVERSARY OF SEBASTOPOL SIEGE IS CELEBRATED

PARIS, Sept. 8.—In the midst of martial excitement, the anniversary today of the siege of Sebastopol was celebrated. On this date in 1855 European allies, then consisting of France and Great Britain, defeated the Russians, now their ally, at Sebastopol after a siege of eleven months.

ROUMANIA ASSURES RUSSIA THAT SHE WILL FIGHT TURKS TO END

BUKAREST, Sept. 8.—Roumania has assured Russia that she will positively not aid Germany if Turkey enters the general European war and helps Germany.

Roumania, it is known, will take the offensive against Turkey Bulgaria also will fight the Turks.

Roumania in return for helping fight the Turks will expect to receive the Austrian province of Bukovina from Prussia.

JAPANESE AIRMEN ACTIVE

TOKIO, Spt. 8.—In an official statement handed out today, the Japanese aviators greatly damaged the German fortifications at Kiau Chau. Poor roads are retarding the operations of the army.

475,555 BALES OF COTTON

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—The government cotton report issued today gives the information that 475,555 bales of the 1914 crop of cotton had been ginned up to September 1. On September 1, 1913, 799,990 bales had been ginned.

WILL PRAY FOR PEACE OCT. 4TH

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENT

1. Pupils in the High School who failed to pass in all branches or who were absent from examinations last May will be expected to be ready for thorough, rigid tests, beginning Monday, Sept. 14th.

2. Only such as have a clear record now will be admitted to the 11th grade. Others having partial credits will be considered for graduation in the spring, after they have worked off all back units.

3. We have always tried to make our schedule to fit the greatest numbers of cases of irregularities; after we have done our best at this, all who can not make the classes will have to take the next lower grade work until they have cleared up that deficiency.

4. Pupils coming on transfer from other county schools will do well to bring in their report cards, and books. It should be understood that the grading in the rural schools is not the same as in town. For illustration: A pupil who has covered the seventh grade in a rural school of six or seventh months term will not have gone as far as thoroughly as one who has been in school nine months. This being true, we shall try to assign new pupils to certain grades on trial; if they can hold up to the work done, the assignment will be made permanent.

5. Some parents ask that their children be allowed to drop certain studies. This is wrong; usually it is the case that the pupil needs development along that very line of study. School law tells us the required course to offer, and unless there is some definite, physical ailment, we shall try to treat all alike. Sometimes the pupil needs "glasses".

6. Concerning the assignment of pupils and grades, no permanent announcement can be made until later in the week; all we can say is that we shall do the very best we can to utilize the buildings where they are. The city is building some street crossings out toward the West End building that will enable our pupils to get there with less difficulty than in former years. It should be borne in mind that this building is new, clean, well lighted, well ventilated, and in every way superior to the present conditions at the Central building, hence a more desirable place to send to school. Ordinary walking will not injure any child; our most rugged students are some that come in from the country.

7. Complaints: If you have complaints; if your child is not going well; if you know that he has something the matter with him that the teacher ought to know, please see her or the undersigned at once. We believe we have a sensible roll of teachers; and that they will be glad to get any suggestion you may wish to offer. We are working for the best interest of your child. However, firm discipline must be maintained. Whenever any pupil can not or will not be amenable to that rule which seems best for the whole student-body, it will be necessary to ask the parent to withdraw such pupil from the school for the good of the large number remaining who are desirous of learning.

8. South Ballinger. To the patrons of this school we commend Prof. and Mrs. T. D. Mullins, who are located on the grounds and are anxious to serve your community in every way they possibly can. It is our wish that these good people may have your cooperation in any good work they may undertake for the building up of a splendid school spirit. We trust you will make them feel at home among you. It is suggested that all parents attend the opening next Monday morning and get acquainted with your child's teacher—the melon crop will keep for an hour or so at least one day. All pupils below High Sixth living beyond the river from town will report to this building for the present.

SLIGHT IMPROVEMENT IN COTTON MARKET

While the cotton market is anything but satisfactory, it has shown an improvement during the last few days, in that the buyers now have a limit. The Ballinger market today is from 6 to 6 1/2. Of course this is low, and little cotton will be sold at this price for the present. On account of the late rains cotton is opening slow in this county, and very few bales have been brought to market, and fortunately the local market and commercial interest have not felt the want of a market as much as will be the case later in the season.

A prominent cotton buyer in discussing the question today, stated that no one could forecast what the outcome of the present trouble would be. "While we are offering to buy cotton for 6, 6 1/4 and 1-2," said the buyer, "it is strictly a matter of speculation." While selling will be slow at these figures for some time, it is probable that much of the crop will be sacrificed at a latter date when the pinch comes, and both the retailers and farmers are called upon to meet their obligations regardless of what cotton is worth. It is to be hoped that such a time will not come, but who can tell.

The warehouse committee of the Y. M. B. L., is going right ahead arranging to build at least one warehouse and provide to meet the requirements of the money lenders and use the warehouse cotton in securing sufficient funds with which to tide over, pick the big crop and wait for better prices.

SANITARY FOUNTAINS OF FILTERED WATER

The new drinking fountains won by Ballinger in the recent Holland's Magazine Clean Up Contest have been placed and are now ready for service. They are indeed handsome and useful and form quite an acquisition to the several buildings. One was placed in the High School; one in West End; and two in Central.

In this connection it may be said that the two underground systems have been cleaned thoroughly and the drainage rain-fall pipes leading from the roofs have been cut away and the holes cemented up so that nothing can get into these cisterns other than water twice filtered; first by the city plant; and second by our own filter donated some years ago by the Mother's Club. For this reason we think our water supply is healthful and pure as it can be made. The water in the drinking fountains is filtered but once—as it comes from the city plant. All citizens and patrons are cordially invited to inspect these next Monday morning.

MEETING TO AGREE UPON PRICES FOR COTTON PICKING

A meeting will be held in Ballinger Saturday at 3 o'clock at the offices of the Young Men's Business League at which place and time, the farmers of this community will agree upon prices to be paid for the picking of cotton. The meeting was called Tuesday by Messrs. Haveley and Taylor, farmers living near Ballinger.

According to reports received here recently, many farmers over the Ballinger territory are not together on the prices to be paid helpers in the cotton field. On account of the variances in prices, the farmers in calling the meeting realize that something must be done immediately in the way of setting a uniform price for the gathering of the fleecy staple.
