1 BANK ROBBER WOUNDED; 3 ESCAPE TO MOUNTAINS

One bank robber is in a sanitarium at Abilene with a bullet hole through his stomach, and will probably die. A posse of several hundred men are scouring the mountains in the Southern part of Taylor county in an effort to capture three bandits who made their escape when the posse overtook them in a stalled car near Buffalo Gap at eleven o'clock Wednesday night.

The captured robber was wounded by a bullet from the gun in the hands of one of the three men. These men are C. Kornegay, C. R. Hightower and Guy McDonald, of Winters, members of the posse which was formed to hunt down the robbers when it was discovered that the Winters State Bank had been robbed early Wednesday morning.

The officers found a Hudson Six car broken down and abandoned at the foot of the mountains near Guion, early during the day Wednesday, following the bank robbery. They trailed the men who abandoned the car to the mountains and searched throughout the day for them.

The posse kept a close eye on the roads in that section of the country Wednesday night, and it was while driving down the road north of Buffalo Gap that Kornegay, Hightower, and McDonald came upon four men in the road trying to start a Ford car. They stopped and asked the men if they needed help. In reply to the offer of aid, the robbers opened fire on the three men. The three men returned the fire, and one of the robbers fell mortally wounded. The other three scattered and today after announcing that they made their get-away and at last his arrival there he would perfect plans for the manufacture by a new corporation of a cheaper automobile to sell for a lower price and rolled it by hand to the road, than any now extensively marketed and were attempting to start the car. Mr. Ford said he had designed the car while "resting" at Altadena, near here.

"Instead of blocking acreage, somebody is blocking the game," said a member of the committee, who had nothing at stake except to help do what he could to help the town.

There will be no oil drilling within the city limits, or any where near the city limits, until the people who control the acreage come to understanding, adjust matters and work together as common sense demands that they should do.

It is not for us to say who is at fault in the matter, but a few men control the situation which is retarding oil development in this county, and especially oil development in Ballinger.

As a result of this envious, dambale spirit which prevails among the people who are in a better position to help develop the oil industry here, nobody will be benefited and it is a case of bite your nose off to spite your face.

If there is oil here, there is a sufficient acreage to make every man, woman and child in the county independently rich, but we have about come to the conclusion that there is no oil in this county. It would be an unjust God to open His store house of worldly riches to a people who harbored within their hearts that spirit which seems to control in Ballinger at this time, and drouths and dust storms are no doubt coming as a just reward.

Oil men have been here "sized up" the situation, and returned to their homes disgusted. The condition which prevails here is becoming pretty well known through out the oil world, and those who are expecting other drillers to come here will be disappointed. The game is blocked and nobody wants to play in a blocked game. This is not a knock—it's facts.

NOTHING NEW IN SINCLAIR WELL

(Brownwood Bulletin)

No new developments have come to light in the Sinclair Gaines well during the past twenty-four hours, although drilling is continuing slowly and something of importance may occur at any moment. The drillers are very cautious in their work making light strokes of the drill and cleaning out slush at frequent intervals in order to keep informed as to the character of the formation being drilled. There is still a great deal of confidence in the theory that a second and much better oil producing sand will be found, and tests of the sandy lime now being drilled have shown that it is oil bearing.

There has been no change in the estimated production of the well. Large numbers of strangers have come here during the past two days and the jitney drivers have been busy carrying them to the scene of operations. Stimulated by the influx of new people and the excitement caused by the finding of oil in the Sinclair well, lease trading has been increasingly active and the purchase of several royalties interests in the neighboring places of the 3 important wells in the north end of the county is also reported.

SUTTON COUNTY HAS OIL SHOWING

There is oil in Sutton county on the ranch of Mr. Eastland of Sonora. This, in all probability is the reason why practically all the large tracts in that section have recently been leased for oil development purposes.

The oil on Mr. Eastland's place was discovered a number of years ago when three wells were drilled for water. The oil was struck in each hole at a depth of about 300 feet. Since then many individuals and oil concerns have made overtures to lease the property, but Mr. Eastland has held out for higher prices. Eventually he expects to lease the land and see several wells go down.

Lease prices have risen somewhat since the coming in of the Sinclair, but the prices of leases have been very high in that vicinity for the past several months.

1918 was \$1,000,000. Smithkins will pass the Collector \$30. His net income was \$2,500. Both are eminently respectable married men.

This is an illustration of the income tax provisions of the new revenue bill. "The income tax is no longer a rich man's tax," is a truthful but not a new saying. Smithkins, however, after contributing his just quota to the Government will have left a considerably larger portion of his income than Goldbonds.

The levy touches the pocket book of every person of moderate means in the United States, but is so graduated that the Goldbonds and the Smithkins each pay according to their income. Last year there were filed up to June 30, 2,319,929 returns of income less than \$3,000. The tax assessed on these incomes was \$22,395,262.40. The number of returns filed of incomes of more than \$3,000 was 665,623, the tax on which was \$592,613.241.12. Speaking for themselves, these

The estimated revenue to be collected under the new revenue bill is \$6,000,000,000. Returns are required on or before March 15th, of every single person whose net income was \$1,000 or more and of every married person whose net income was \$2,000 or more. The tax is assessed on net income in excess of these amounts.

In making out his income tax return John M. Goldbonds will deduct first his personal exemption of \$2,000 allowed a married man. On the first \$4,000 of his remaining income of \$998,000 he will pay a normal tax of 6 per cent, or \$240. On his income in excess of his exemption and first \$4,000 of income he will pay a normal tax of 12
