FILIPINOS SEEKING FREEDOM

Up or Down Is Cause of Trouble in Fashions

WILD ANIMAL CIRCUS COMING TOMORROW

Washington, April 4.—Replying to questions of the Filipino delegation who are here seeking independence for the Philippines, Secretary Baker told the delegation that the time for Philippines independence had virtually come. Mr. Baker read a letter from President Wilson to the delegation thanking the Phillipines for the assistance they rendered during the war with Germany.

LIGHT COMPANY TO NAME PRICE

Mayor R. H. Henderson and city manager E. L. Wells, Jr., were authorized Tuesday morning by the city commission to open negotiations with the San Angelo Water, Light and Power Co., for the purchase of the local property of the Interstate Electric Corporation of New York.

This was done after a canvass of the votes in Saturday's election showed that the proposition to issue a half million dollars in bonds had carried. Six hundred and forty ballots were cast, 541 for the bonds and 99 against them, a majority of 442.

Complying with the commissioners order, Mayor Henderson and City Manager Wells before noon drafted a letter requesting the water, light and power company to fix a price on its plant. The full communication was not made public. It was to be mailed some time during the day, and will constitute the first step in negotiations that will be carried on between the commission and officials of the local utility.—San Angelo Standard.

106 AVIATORS KILLED IN FT. WORTH

Fort Worth, April 4.—Records show that at the three Fort Worth air fields, where flying practically ceased today and all enlisted men were discharged, 106 men were killed from Nov. 7th 1917 to April 1st, 1919. During the time the British royal Flying corps trained its squadrons here, fifty students, officers and mechanics met fatal mishaps. Since the Americans took over the fields, fifty-six have been killed. The most notable deaths here were those of Capt. Vernon Castle of the British royal flying corps and Lieut. Peyton C. March, Jr., son of the American chief of staff.

Fashion says "skirts up,"

And Paris is just opposite
To little New York town.

New York, April 4.—To be or not to be, that is the question, whether 'tis smarter in the main to suffer the slits and narrods of outrageous fashion, or to take steps against a sea of hobbles and by opposing, shorten them."

If Mr. William Shakespeare were only alive today, he would simply have to bring Hamlet up to date by rewriting the soliloquy around that burning topic of the modish moment—"skirts." The long and short of it is that not even the live ones seem to know much about it.

In Paris the skirts are climbing to even dizzier heights. In New York they are going to such desperately narrow lengths that you can't take steps about anything, any more, and a promenade is just one short jump after another.

It is indeed a ticklish moment. The fate of the future arbiter of fashion hangs by a skirt. Which way the skirt goes will determine without a doubt whether New York or Paris is to set the mode for future femininity. If Parisian skirts begin to come down, it means that Paris is coming down, too, from her perch as Queen of Fashion. If American skirts go up, it means that our hopes of leading the fashion parade will be cut off as shortly.

Making as much speed as my hobble skirt would allow, I have been on the jump the last few days from one leading American designer to another, craving their expert opinions. They all agree that the long skirt is here to stay and that American women never, never will accept the ballyhoo length garments, now revealing how perfect is the Parisienne understanding.

The head of a leading Fifth Avenue house, while admitting that the long skirts are here to stay and that the American women would have none of the short ones, contended with his marked Parisian accent that this by no means proves that America will wrest the fashion scepter from the Parisian digits. Only the fact that France has been crippled by the war has given us the advantage for the last few years. We have made great strides as designers on our own account, but now that the war is over it will be but a short time till Paris is supreme again and we but blind and humbly followers. It is true, he said, Parisian skirts are coming down a bit in the fall, but this does not prove that Paris is following our fashion in his opinion, when South America will only be the leader of fashion dictates. "Jamais! jamais!" America and Europe come to us for their fashion models as heretofore they have gone to Paris. Besides, he pointed out, the leading designers of our best American houses are not really Americans themselves, but of French descent.

His opinion would perhaps have impressed me as more free bats had his speech been more free from Parisian accent.

My next jump landed me at one of the smartest tailored gown and suit houses, whose real American head's only accent is a slight Hebrew one. He said that our skirts are coming up a little this fall, but that this doesn't mean we will be following Parisian fashion dictates. "Never! Never!"

He said that the enormous strides American designers have taken during the war have given them a permanent place on the Throne of Fashion and while perhaps Paris will not be pushed completely off, she will at least have to put up with a foreign consort. To prove his faith in his contention he is starting up a Parisian branch of his house where he will import strictly made-in-American tailor-mades, which, he said, South American and European maids and matrons are clamoring for.

And there you are! Sort of 50-50.

WILL FOREIGNERS CONTROL AMERICA?

The liquor interest see a gleam of hope in the results of the election in Chicago last Tuesday when that city defeated prohibition. It was the first time the question was ever submitted to the voters of Chicago, and when one stops to think of the element of humanity making up Chicago's population the vote in favor of liquor is easily accounted for.

It is said that every tongue spoken the world over can be heard on the streets of Chicago. With such a conglomeration of foreigners what else could be expected? A majority of them know no law, and if permitted to rule, anarchy and bolshevism would soon put down everything that stands for the uplift of man.

The Trades Unions, which during the last few years has fallen in to the hands of foreigners, and the Liberty League, issued a statement after the election saying:

"Through the overwhelming defeat of the drys Chicago has spoken in tones that will ring in the ear of those subservient lawmakers who have cravenly surrendered the liberty of American citizens at the dictation of a clique of paid prohibition lobbyists."

The labor unions made a mistake when they allowed that element to gain control of their order. Labor Unions can not expect to regain the confidence and sympathy of the American people until they have kicked the bolsheviks out. The slogan: "No Beer, No Work," adopted by certain unions for a proposed strike, is an insult to every decent thinking American.

No, not yet, nor never, will America fall into the hands of an element composed of bolsheviks under the disguise of labor unionists.

The death knell to the liquor interest in America was sounded when the way developed the fact that it was through the liquor interest that Germany was scatter-

ing its propaganda and seeking to gain control of the American government. Congressional investigations into the German-American alliance brought out the startling fact that the liquor interest was owned and controlled by men who were using Germany money, and whose views were antagonistic to the liberty and freedom for which the best men of America sacrificed their lives.

THRU PASSENGER TO WICHITA POSSIBLE

Here is work for the C. of C., which seems to have been born dead. Information received at Ballinger through railroad channels says that Ballinger could no doubt get a through passenger train to Wichita Falls if the citizens would ask for it. In fact it is reported that even a mild request coming from the citizens and business interest of this city, if brought to the attention of the superintendent of the road would be acted upon favorably.

Trains which were cancelled during the drouth and war are being placed on roads in Central West Texas, and the people of this territory are sleeping on their rights. No time should be lost in asking for the thru train to Wichita. Read the following from Stamford.

Stamford, April 2—Much satisfaction is expressed in this section over the re-establishment of the double daily train service on the Texas Central Railroad from Waco to Rotan. The new schedule begins in the morning, and the arrangements include standard Pullman sleepers between Waco and Stamford.

Application will now be made to have the double daily train service re-established on the Wichita Valley between Abilene and Wichita Falls. The request will be

made that two sleepers be put on the Wichita Valley between Abilene and Wichita Falls, one to be set out at the latter point, the other to be given over to the Fort Worth & Denver and carried in to Fort Worth. The fact will be set out that with the increasing travel between the Burk Burnett-Wichita Falls-Electric fields and Jones-Shackford, Stephens and Taylor fields, also the DeLeon and Brownwood fields makes a sleeper from Wichita Falls to Abilene to connect with the Texas Central at Stamford a necessity.

The sleeper to Fort Worth will be needed to accommodate the local travel between Abilene and Wichita Falls.

Elsewhere in this issue of The Ledger appears an election notice to the voters of the Ballinger Independent School District calling for the election of three school trustees next Saturday.

As a rule such elections attract little attention and sometimes almost go by default, not a sufficient number of votes being polled to count.

This is not as it should be, and especially in view of the problems the next school board will have to contend with.

The legislature recently adjourned passed laws vitally affecting the educational interest of Texas. Large appropriations were made to carry on the work, and the next school board will have many new problems to deal with. The free school book law will demand new rules and call for the best thought of the men in charge of the public schools of Texas. The Ballinger school board should get on the job and get every cent of the appropriation possible for the improving of our schools.

Men who serve in this capacity do so at a sacrifice. It is a duty without remuneration, but it is a duty that should not go begging. The office of school trustee is an important office. The making of the destruction of our schools rest upon the shoulders of the men who make up the school board. Therefore patrons of the school should show more interest in selecting men to make up the board.

The president of the old board has requested that names to make up the ticket be filed with him by Friday. This is a matter the school patrons should not allow to go by default. There will be something for the next school board to do.

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION TOMORROW

Three school trustees are to be elected to tomorrow, and the ticket printed today shows the names of only three candidates, R. W. Bruce, S. H. Dougherty and R. A. Nicholson. The president of the school board issued a statement asking those who wished to place their names on the ticket to report names to him by this afternoon, in order that the ticket might be printed, and only three names were handed in.

HEROES TO BE BURIED AT HOME

Queries are being sent out to parents, or the nearest relatives to soldiers who fell on the battlefield in France, by the government asking whether they desire the remains of their sons brought home.

The queries are in the form of blank cards, and among the questions asked are whether the remains be allowed to rest where they are, or returned to America, and if returned to America whether they shall be buried in the National Cemetery or shipped to the home of the parents, or relatives.

J. A. Williams, who lost his son in the service is in receipt of one of the cards. Mr. Williams stated that he and his wife had thought over the question a great deal, and after talking with a number of friends had decided that they could not say "no" and if it was possible for the government to return the remains of

their son here for final resting place, it would be requested.

The government has kept a record of most of the temporary resting places of American boys in France, and the graves are marked so it will be easy to remove most of them and bring their remains home. We feel as Mr. and Mrs. Williams do in this, and if our boy had fallen on the battlefield, it would have brought a great deal of consolation to know that his remains could be laid to rest at home.

GRAIN CORPORATION TO HANDLE WHEAT

Several statements have recently appeared in daily and grain trade papers indicating that the Department of Agriculture is anxious to take charge of the work of carrying out the guaranteed price on the 1919 wheat crop. These statements misrepresent the attitude of the department of agriculture.

The department of agriculture, after this country entered the war, took the position that emergency food activities of a commercial nature should be directed by an emergency agency, and therefore participated in framing the Food Control Act giving the President power to create such an agency.

The food administration and its grain corporation were set up under the act and they have handled the wheat guarantees from the beginning. The secretary of agriculture has assumed until recently that these agencies would, without question, continue to handle the wheat guarantees until the emergency passed and the law ceased to be in operation. He still believes that it would be desirable for the Grain Corporation to continue to function and close out the matter. The corporation has gained much valuable experience during the war and should be able to deal with the problem as effectively as any other establishment. The recent Wheat Guaranty Act seems to contemplate that this agency would continue to act. Among other things, it authorizes the President to use any existing agency or agencies and to utilize any department of the government, including, of course, the Food Administration corporation. It would be difficult for any other existing agency now to set up the requisite machinery, especially in view of the short time intervening before the 1919 crop movement begins, and even if it were to undertake to do so, some embarrassment would result, because two agencies, over a part of the period, would be dealing with wheat.

The task is one of great magnitude and the time is short. The Secretary of Agriculture recently cabled to the President, pointing out the necessity for immediate action and urging that the present machinery, that is, the Food Administration Grain Corporation, be maintained and utilized. As a matter of course, if the President should designate the Department of Agriculture as the agency to handle the 1919 guaranty, it would assume the task and discharge it to the best of its ability.
