TEXAS ASKS FREE HAND IN MEXICO

Austin, July 21.—The senate today adopted the resolution asking the United States government to allow Texas to take steps to protect her border as she did when independent, if the United States is unable and unwilling to do so.

STATE OF WAR IN HONDURAS

Washington, July 21.—A state of war has been proclaimed in Honduras, according to advice sent to the state department today.

The proclamation declaring a state of war is the result of a movement launched to depose the government by revolutionists.

H. Clements is here from New Braunfels, looking after his farming interest.

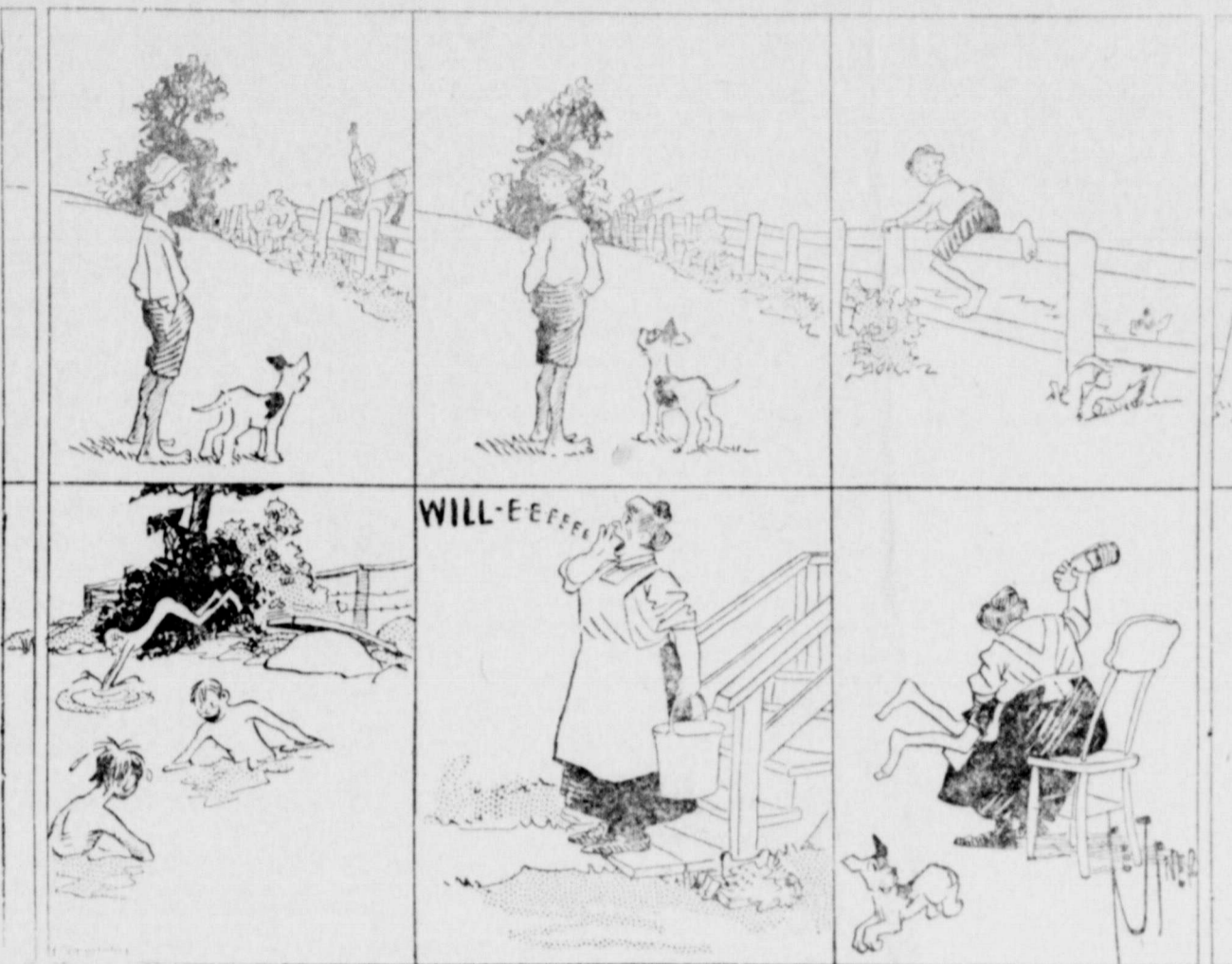

Carranza Promises to Punish Bandits for Correll Outrage—Sailor Robbery Still Serious

Washington, July 20.—While the state and navy departments tonight awaited further information in regard to the attack and robbery of a boat load of American sailors from the U. S. S. Cheyenne in the Thames River, near Tampico, Mexico July 6, the Mexican government through its embassy here, informed the state department that it would "omit" no efforts in prosecution and the punishment of those responsible for the murder of John W. Correll, an American citizen, and the attack on his wife, in the Tampico district last month.

The message from the Mexican government, replying to representations made by the United States immediately after the attack on the Correll family was reported, however, did little to lessen the gravity of the situation existing since yesterday to minimize the seriousness of the situation resulting from the assault on the sailors, dressed in American uniforms and in a motor launch at the mast head of which was an American flag.

In regard to the attack on the American sailors—an incident which eclipsed all matters of interest in the capital today—it is expected the state department, af-

ter receipt of further details will ask the Carranza government to apprehend and punish the assailants. If unable to carry out this request, according to diplomatic practice, the Carranza government next will be asked to disavow the attack.

Washington, July 19.—A boat from the U. S. S. Cheyenne occupied by enlisted men from the Navy, was held up by armed men in the Thames River, near Tampico, Mexico, on July 6th and the sailors were robbed.

The incident bears a resemblance to the celebrated Tampico incident of 1914, which resulted in the occupation of Vera Cruz. Urgent representations to the Carranza Government and the local authorities at Tampico have gone forward.

The department issued this statement:

"The Department of State has been advised that on July 6 a boat from the U. S. S. Cheyenne, occupied by enlisted men of that vessel who were on a fishing trip, was held up near Tampico by armed men. The sailors were robbed.

"Urgent representations have been made by the Department of State to the Carranza Government to apprehend and punish the assailants. If unable to carry out this request, according to diplomatic practice, the Carranza government next will be asked to disavow the attack." (Continued on Page 4)

RACE RIOT RAGES IN CAPITAL; BLACKS ATTACKING LADIES

Washington, July 21.—Following a night of clashes between the whites and blacks here last night in which at least one hundred negroes were injured, motor car negroes today fired on sailors in the naval hospital grounds.

The bullets went astray and no one was hit.

The whites pursued the negroes, who made their escape.

The trouble between negroes and the whites started two or three days ago when negroes made attacks on white women.

Several white women were attacked by negro soldiers before the whites became aroused and took steps to meet out punishment to the negroes.

Police officers are inclined to charge the crime wave largely to the results of bootlegging by negroes since the dry laws became effective.

FOUR INCH RAIN FALLS HERE; COLORADO AT FLOOD STAGE

The heaviest continuous rain in many years fell at Ballinger and over a large territory, according to phone reports, Saturday night and Sunday.

This rain came following the rain of Friday night, and the water flowed over the top of the rain gauge at the first National Bank. The gauge measured three and one-half inches of rain.

The rain began falling at Ballinger about eleven o'clock Saturday night, and there was no let up until about one o'clock Sunday afternoon. The first rain came in a general down pour, preceded by considerable wind, and accompanied by an electrical storm which did not cease until late Sunday morning.

The Colorado river was flowing at the eighteen and a half foot mark Monday morning, which is the highest since the winter of 1915. The flood stage of the river at this place is twenty-one feet. Billions and billions of gallons of water are racing to the Gulf, the water sheds of the Colorado river west of Ballinger having been covered by the heavy rains.

It is believed here that the river has passed the danger stage and was on a standstill Monday morning. The flood water, com-

ing down now are from the head waters of the river, and the river will carry them off without going out of its banks.

Orient trains are being detoured over the Santa Fe from San Angelo to Sweetwater on account of the high water and washouts on the Orient between San Angelo and Sweetwater. Reports received here state that the Orient bridge across the Colorado has been washed away, while another report says that the Oak creek Orient bridge is gone. Santa Fe trains are running on time.

The good rain practically insures a bumper feed and cotton crop. Threshing is of course delayed, and continuous wet weather will damage grain in the shock, while no damage will occur if threshing can be resumed within a few days. Farmers report that many fields of maize were laid flat by the wind and rain, and as the heads are unusually heavy it will remain down and require more work to harvest than if standing in perfect order.

All crops were needing rain, and regardless of damage to grain, the benefit to the feed crops and cotton crops will more than offset that damage, and the rain comes as a great blessing to the country.

GETS CASING FOR LOS ARROYO WELL

F. W. Hunter returned from San Angelo Sunday where he closed a deal for sufficient casing to put the Los Arroyo well down to a depth of 3500 feet.

Mr. Hunter stated that he purchased all the 15, 12, 10, 8 and 6 inch casing necessary for the well from the Snyder well four miles north of Coleman. This casing is all out of the ground and ready to be shipped to Ballinger, and will be loaded out at once.

"I am fortunate in getting this casing," said Mr. Hunter, "as it is impossible to get casing from the factory on short notice. I received a letter from a well supply firm stating that they could not guarantee the filling of an order for casing under less than fifteen or seventeen weeks."

The boiler to be used for the Los Arroyo well is here and will be unloaded this week, and other machinery for drilling will be on the ground in time to spud in about the first of August when drilling will start and be rushed with a day and night shift.

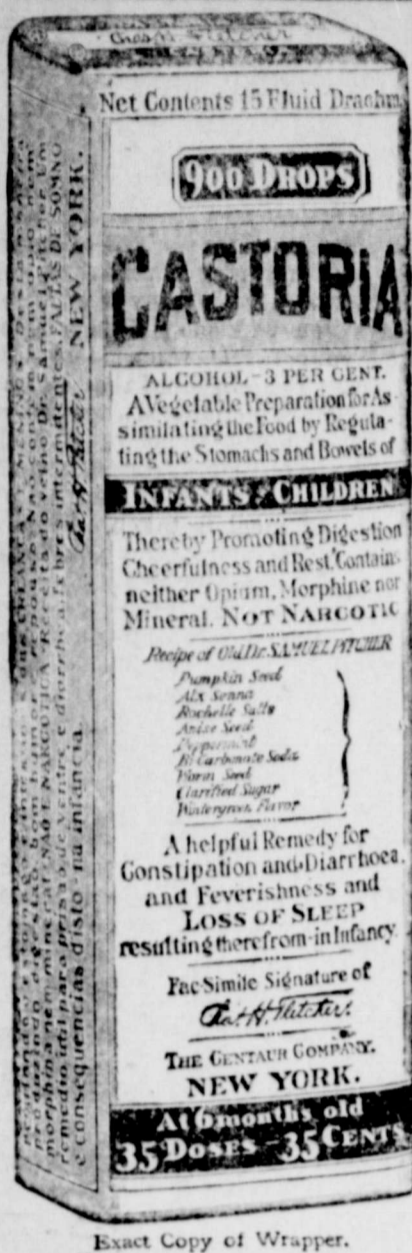

BLANTON FIGHTING RAISE FOR PORTERS

In opposing the Nolan bill, a bill introduced by the Republicans to raise the pay of negro porters at Washington from \$90 per month to \$110 per month, with a bonus of \$240 and 30 day vacation on full pay, Congressman Blanton, sounded a warning against extravagance and waste of government money.
The Congressional Record, in giving the proceedings of Congress of this bill follows:
Mr. Nolan. I reserve the remainder of my time.
Mr. Maher. I yield 10 minutes to gentleman from Texas (Mr. Blanton).
Mr. Blanton. Mr. Chairman, I am going to be one Member of Congress to vote against this bill, although I may be by myself in doing so. I am going to do this advisedly. If you go down the corridors without stepping on the feet of the numerous negro porters who sit at the entrance to the outside rooms that lead through two or three other rooms to where the chief of some department who you may be seeking can be found.
Mr. Sabath. Will the gentleman yield?
Mr. Blanton. Not right now. I have only 10 minutes. Hundreds of these negro porters idly sit in the halls at the numerous entrances in the various departments and bureaus of this government, rendering absolutely no service of any value whatever to this Nation. If they were white men, I would make the same criticism, but I mention that they are negroes because all of said porters are negroes.
They wear out the expensive carpets in the halls, they assimilate the breeze from the electric fans, reduce the quantity of ice water in the District of Columbia, and under this bill will draw not \$90 a month, but \$110 a month for doing nothing, because all will get the \$240 bonus. Every one of them ought to be put out of their jobs, because they are useless jobs worth nothing to this government, and such waste and extravagance should stop yet they will get \$110 a month for being on the job seven hours a day, six days a week, with one month vacation on full pay in each year, enjoying all the extra holidays and special privileged days that we have in the District of Columbia, and the extra 30 day's sick leave on full pay generally allowed. There are hundreds of charwomen working in the various departments of this government today who are supposed to put in seven

hours, lot of them at night, hired by the month, who will receive \$110 a month for seven hours work, six days in the week, and getting their month vacation on full pay every year, and they will come and hire out to you to be your cooks and charge you \$75 or \$80 a month in addition, and you have to pay that to get one to cook for you part of the time four or five days each week. If you do not pay that you will take your family to a hotel or do your own cooking.
Mr. Gallivan. Or go hungry.
Mr. Blanton. Or go hungry, something that the gentleman from Boston never did in his life.
Mr. Gallivan. I certainly never did and never will.
Mr. Blanton. Well, I have and others in the United States have. There are lots of ordinary messengers in the numerous departments who will be drawing \$110 a month, under this bill for 7 hours work a day, 6 days in the week, receiving the 30 days' vacation each year on full pay and their additional 30 days sick leave on full pay. The people are paying for all this.
The time is coming some day when the people of this country are going to call a halt and if we Members of Congress do not do it we are going to see more new faces in these seats in the future than we have seen in the past.
The war is now over. We will turn to normal conditions. We must awake and use practical common sense. Why, many bank clerks and even assistant cashiers or banks in my district do not receive more than this \$110 per month we are proposing to give janitors, porters, charwomen, messengers, and elevator boys. The people are going to get tired of it they are tax burdened too much now. These proposed wages are out of all reason. They are out of all proportion. No wonder we have over 100,000 negroes in Washington. This is certainly the place for them. If I were one, I would live here. The porters and messengers in your own town do not get \$110 a month, working 7 hours a day and only 6 days a week with a month vacation and 30 days additional sick leave on full pay, in each year. Your charwoman in your towns do not get \$110 a month all 12 months in the year, but working only 6 days a week, 7 hours a day, and 11 months in the year. Your porters in your banks and private offices at home towns do not get anything like that. It is out of all reason. It is creating a false idea of the value of some of these positions and of this kind of labor. We are simply going mad on this subject of extra compensation.
I want to say to you that I am glad it is a Republican who is the author of this bill. I am glad it

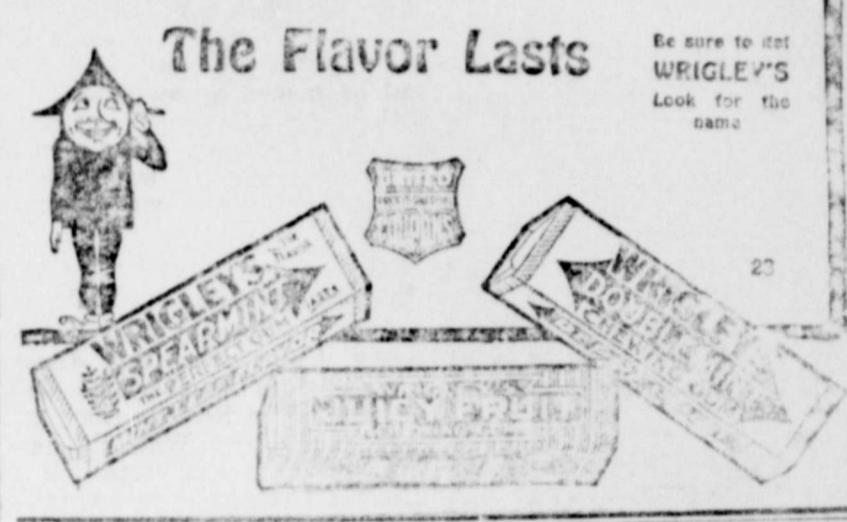

WAR ORPHANS DYING IN FRANCE

The children of France have not yet emerged from the shadow of the war. With peace assured, and a happier future opening before them, it became increasingly evident that the child life of France has suffered a shock from which it is difficult to rally; while the birth rate has dropped to 5 to each 1,000 population.

The Fatherless Children of France, an American organization co-operating with a similar one in Paris of which Marshall Joffre is the head, reports that of the children receiving American aid to the extent of 30 cents a day under its plan of securing American god mothers for the little French war orphans, its records show an average of 700 children's death per month since the armistice. The help of the American godmothers came too late to save these undernourished, nerve-shocked little ones.

Mrs. Walter S. Brewster of Chicago, vice-chairman of the Fatherless Children of France, has been appointed chairman of a campaign to secure American aid for the 60,000 little war orphans whose names were on the list of the organization as "adopted" before the signing of the armistice. Ten cents will care for a child for an entire day; \$3.00 for a month; while for \$8.50 a year the donor may select a child from the list at the organization's headquarters and be placed in correspondence with it. Carranza Promises to Punish Bandits

State to both the local Mexican authorities at Tampico and to the Federal Government at Mexico City and the authorities there have promised to investigate.

Although the sailors were fishing they were on official duty in the same way that Admiral Mayos boats were on official duty when they were carrying mail at the time of the flag incident at Tampico in 1914 which led to the occupation of Vera Cruz.

Although the official report does not identify the Mexicans who attacked the Cheyenne's boat, the War Department's official advises are that the Carranza forces are in complete control of the Tampico district. The scene of the robbery was three miles from the city. Although the attack occurred on July 6 and was reported to the Navy Department on July 8, it did not reach the State Department until today. No official explanation was forthcoming.

The report of the incident to the Navy Department received on July 7, came from Commander Finney of the cruiser Topeka. It said bandits had help up the boat and robbed the sailors of a ring, a watch and one pair of shoes.

Secretary Daniels said today he had not seen the dispatch from the Topeka until after his attention was called to the State Department's announcement today and that he would instruct the Topeka's commander to send full particulars.
