## DIST. SUPERVISOR ON CENSUS WORK

District Supervisor A. W. Sledge left Friday on a tour of part of this district in the organization of his work. He will visit Coleman, Brownwood, Santa Anna, Comanche, and other towns.

Great difficulty is being experienced by Mr. Sledge in getting sufficient enumerators to take the census in January. He is having some trouble, too, in dividing the towns and counties into equal parts for each enumerator, especially in the oil towns, where the population is so dense and changeable.

The seventeenth district, of which Mr. Sledge is supervisor, probably is greater than any other district in the state, and is more widely scattered. This will require an unusual number of enumerators, and several clerks to handle the work.

## NOYES MONUMENT UNVEILED SATURDAY

It was announced Friday morning that the monument of Charles H. Noyes will be unveiled Saturday afternoon at four o'clock. It was at first intended that the unveiling should be postponed until Gus Noyes could return here from Orlando, Fla., where he is at present, but Mr. Noyes said that he did not want to be here at the exercises, and due to the fact that the sculptor Coppini wished to return to Chicago as soon as possible, it was decided to unveil the monument Saturday.

The monument is made in the exact likeness of Charles, standing beside his favorite horse. Coppini says this is his masterpiece, and is very proud of his work.

The base of the monument is made of granite, and the monument itself is fashioned from bronze, in life size. This is the first monument of its kind ever to be erected in Ballinger, and is a rare work of art.

The following program of the unveiling exercises to be held Saturday was handed to The Ledger. Music will be furnished by Passur's orchestra. The floral offerings will be arranged by the sculptor.

## CONCHO COUNTY OIL OPERATIONS

The following clipping from The Stan Angelo Standard tells the standing of the Leonard well on the Waring Ranch in Concho county, and also tells of the operations on the Schultz well near Paint Rock.

In Concho county the Schultz Oil Company on the W. O. Schultz Ranch near Paint Rock is engaged in underreaming 5 3-16 inch casing to over 3,100 feet. The depth is supposed to be nearer 3,200 feet.

Oil struck three or four weeks ago in the Waring well of the Leonard Petroleum Company near Eden, Concho county, tested out thirty-two gravity, so that it is of a low grade containing little gasoline. The petroleum was dark in color and very thick. The underreaming of 6 5-8 inch casing for a distance of 120 feet down to the 2,910 foot level is now in progress, the work having been started Monday, according to a report reaching this city.

## TO FINISH LACY WELL; OIL FOUND

D. G. Lacy is in Ballinger this week arranging to resume drilling on his well about seventeen miles southeast of Ballinger. It was at first reported that he had sold out but Mr. Lacy says that he has bought out all his associates in the holdings, and will complete the well himself.

Mr. Lacy will bring an entirely new crew of drillers here from Ranger, and expects to start drilling in a short while, although nothing can be done until some casing arrives. The hole was closed down at the report that Mr. Lacy had sold out at a depth of 1005 feet.

A good showing of oil has been struck, just a little less than a thousand feet deep, according to Mr. Lacy, and indications are especially good. He says that he confidently believes that he will get a good well in this location, and says that the fact that salt water was found in Russell No. 2 does not bother him at all in his well. He says that such a thing is apt to happen in almost any hole, and even then does not affect other holes drilled nearby.

A greater play on the land in the vicinity of this well is expected, and is even now being evidenced. The Gulf Production Co. will soon spend in their third well, and it is understood that they will drill it on a 4,000-foot contract. Nothing further is known as to the first two holes drilled by this company.

The Nelson Brothers' Mustang well has been shut down for about thirty days, and no cause has been assigned, but it is understood that they will resume drilling within the near future.

## SUGAR FAMINE MAY END SOON

Several merchant, received small shipments of sugar Thursday. They dished it out in two-bit and 50 cent packages, and in this way many customers were able to have sugared coffee for breakfast.

A carload of sugar is due here within a few days. When distributed out this will not go very far in supplying the demand.

The sugar situation will improve with the fixing of prices, and this has been done, according to reports from Washington yesterday.

## RESERVATIONS TO TREATY PRESENTED TO SENATE

### COPPINI STOPS IN FORT WORTH

Coppini, famous sculptor, who was commissioned by the Noyes family to prepare the monument to their son on the plains of West Texas, has just been a guest in a Fort Worth home for several days. He was on his way to Ballinger to witness the unveiling of the statutory, which will be erected on the Noyes ranch on the spot where young Charles Noyes was thrown from his horse and killed.

Coppini was a guest of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Nunnally, 1414 Rio Grande Avenue, while here. A native of Italy, the sculptor came to America twenty-three years ago attracted here by his love of liberty and his admiration of the United States and its institutions. His success has been great. At present he maintains a studio in Chicago, but Texas has been the scene of many of his artistic triumphs and best endeavors.

"Texas," he has often said, "I love best of all."

Young Noyes, son of a wealthy West Texas family, met his death while riding on his father's ranch near Ballinger. Coppini was sent for and told to fashion the young ranchman's figure and steel in life size and to place it out on the plains as an everlasting memorial. —Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Mr. Noyes first planned to erect the monument on his ranch, where his son was buried, but decided later to erect it in Ballinger, where his son spent part of his boyhood days, and where the monument could be protected from destruction and defacement.

Coppini reached here in time to superintend the work of erecting the monument and seeing that the statutory was put up according to design.

Coppini says the Noyes monument is his masterpiece, and he had different views of the monument photographed after the work was completed.

Marvin Patterson, son of J. A. Patterson, of the Valley Creek country, won fourth prize in the maize exhibit at the Dallas State Fair. WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—The reservations to the peace treaty which were agreed on by the senate foreign relations committee were reported to the Senate today by Chairman Lodge. He said that the reservations would be backed by a majority in the Senate, but no vote will be taken on them until the proposed amendments are disposed of.

The preamble requires that three of the leading allied nations must agree to the reservations before the treaty will be ratified by the United States.

### PLAN SECOND ROUND TABLE

St. Louis, Oct. 24.—An "unofficial round table" industrial conference opens here November 17th, with the first session of the annual convention of the American Mining Congress.

The industrial convention will be in session five days. Plans are under way for the greatest industrial gathering in history. Promoters say. The American Mining Congress represents the majority interests in the coal fields, it is said.

President Wilson and Vice-President Marshall have been invited to gather with capital, labor and the public here to lend an official tone to the decisions on social and labor unrest. Prevented by illness from attending the recent "round table" conference in Washington, President Wilson was expected to take a hand in this congress.

The American Mining Congress plans to bring together all conflicting interests at the discussion. Through discussion and deliberation, it hopes to reach conclusions and definite policies of capital and labor to allay present unrest.

Increased production of coal, metal and oil, will be attempted.

"So long as production of coal, metal and oil are upon a minimum level, with maximum costs of labor, supplies and transportation, so long will complex readjustment problems grow more difficult," W. K. Kavanaugh, temporary chairman of the arrangement committee declared.

Inflation of currency, "labor radicals" continuing to demand nationalization of basic industries, and labor demands for shorter hours, were indicated by Kavanaugh as reasons for the existing situation.

### PARIS TO BERLIN JAUNT HAS NOTHING ON TOUR OF WAR RELICS TO WACO

Waco.—It is going to take a longer trip for the United States government war show to get to Waco this year than it did to go from Paris to the Rhine.

The show starts at Washington, D. C., travels to Sedalia, Mo., 1,092 miles; from Sedalia to Des Moines, Iowa, which is a 265 mile jump; from Des Moines travel is taken up to Hutchinson, Kansas, or 442 miles more. From there the war show starts its trip to Dallas, which is 469 miles, and then on to Waco, which is 100 miles more.

This makes a total traveling mileage of 2,369 miles, and by the time it gets back to Washington again it will be over 3,000 miles, all of which is some traveling to let the people of Texas view this exhibit at the Texas Cotton Palace and entails an enormous outlay of expense.
