LITTLE DOG GIVES ALARM AS PRISONERS BREAK JAIL

Sheriff Perkins gives a little "pup" credit for preventing a wholesale jail delivery Monday night, and as it is only one prisoner, Tom Robertson, sentenced to three years in the pen for stealing a Ford car from J. L. Stroble, made his get-away.

The vicious attack of the dog on Robertson as he jumped from the jail window and dashed for liberty attracted Mr. Perkins' attention and he rushed out just in time to prevent four other prisoners from following Robertson. The prisoner escaped about two

o'clock Tuesday morning, at a time when Mr. Perkins was "dead to the world" having been up all the night before searching for a negro prisoner who escaped Sunday morning.

The sheriff says that he realized that something unusual was taking place around the jail by the way the dog acted, and he grabbed his gun and rushed out in time to see the dog chasing a man to the brush.

Mr. Perkins was in his night clothes and could not pursue the prisoner, and his first thoughts were of the other four men who were in the same cell with Robertson. He flashed on the light and rushed up to the cell just in time to see the other men untie the blankets which they had converted into a rope and used in prying open the bars which had been sawed.

The sheriff called the roll and found that he was shy one prisoner. He summoned B. W. Pileher to come to his aid and the four white men were transferred to the cell

where there were two negro prisoners and today they all occupy one cell.

The jail break is one of the most daring ever made at this place, and equals that of the escape of the bank robbers here last spring. The prisoners had worked for several days, it has developed in sawing the rivets which holds the bars in a frame to the jail window, and after removing a sufficient number of rivets they used blankets tied with one end to the bars and the other on the opposite of the cell and by twisting them pulled the bars open sufficient to permit a man to pass out.

At least a dozen rivets were sawed into, and according to a story told by one of the prisoners, the rivets were stuck back in place and could not be detected unless examined carefully. After a sufficient number had been removed the escape was easy.

If it had not been for the trusty little dog which was sleeping on the porch near where the prisoner jumped out of the window, all four of the other prisoners would have been out and gone within five minutes, and their escape would not have been discovered until feeding time next morning.

"I wouldn't take anything for that dog," said Mr. Perkins Tuesday when telling how he awakened and the good luck he had in preventing the other prisoners from escaping. The prisoners frankly told Mr. Perkins that the dog was in the way, or they would all have bid him a good night and pleasant dreams.

Robertson was under a three year sentence for stealing an auto having plead guilty here a couple of weeks ago and was awaiting to be transferred to the penitentiary.

In the cell with Robertson were Dave Henry, a partner of Robertson who was charged with the same offense and given two years; T. B. Jones, who was given two years here and four at Sweetwater for forgery; C. E. Cook and Lee Morris, who are being held on forgery charges, the forgeries having been committed since the last term of court here.

Mr. Perkins says that the prisoners have had only one opportunity to get possession of a saw since they were locked in jail, and that was thru Robertson's wife who was permitted to see him after he had been sentenced, and placed in his cell, but he searched her thoroughly, and kept a close watch on her while she was in the jail. This and the probable concealment of saws, about the clothing of the prisoners when they were locked up are the only means of obtaining saws that can be accounted for, and the prisoners too were thoroughly searched.

Robertson evidently carried the saws with him when he left the jail, or the other prisoners have them secluded about the cell, as all efforts to locate them have failed.

Sheriff Perkins stated that he expected to have Robertson back in jail within a short time, as it is almost impossible for a man to get ahead of the telephone and telegraph wires, and Mr. Perkins is keeping them hot.

FIRST FROST BITE OF THE SEASON

A light frost left its prints on tender vegetation Monday morning, and Tuesday the bite was a little deeper and the frost was pretty well formed.

The frost was what is commonly called a "wet frost" and the sting did not kill vegetation like a "dry frost," but it was the first real frosty morning of the season, and a class of weather which seems to be welcome to every one.

Green vegetation is heavier than was ever known here before at this season of the year, and due to the excessive rains all crops have been slow to mature. Cotton will now pop open and better progress can be made picking the fleecy staple.

The new comers venture the prediction that we are now scheduled for some pretty weather, while the old timers are free to concur in this opinion.

Conference to Settle Trouble Follows Ending Coal Strike

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Following the official ending of the coal strike and the complying with the Federal court's mandate to withdraw the strike order, the mine leaders set out today to formulate plans for bringing about a settlement of the differences between the miners and operators.

After a nation-wide tieup in fuel production for several days, the miners are expected to return to work, while their leaders will take immediate steps to settle the trouble between them and the mine operators.

It is understood that the cabinet has decided to call a meeting immediately of the miners and operators, and this conference will be held in Washington within two days.

It is believed that the government is planning to submit tentative proposals to the two factions who will be asked to attend the conference, "without reservations."

The leaders of the United Mine Workers submitted to Judge Anderson their formal recall of the strike order which they declared had been issued, and Judge Anderson said the order appeared to be "in order and of good faith."

AMERICAN LEGION GOES TO CLEVELAND

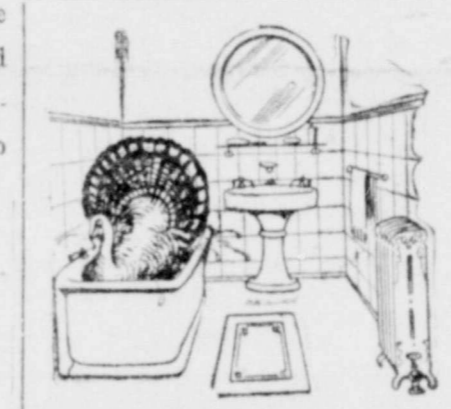

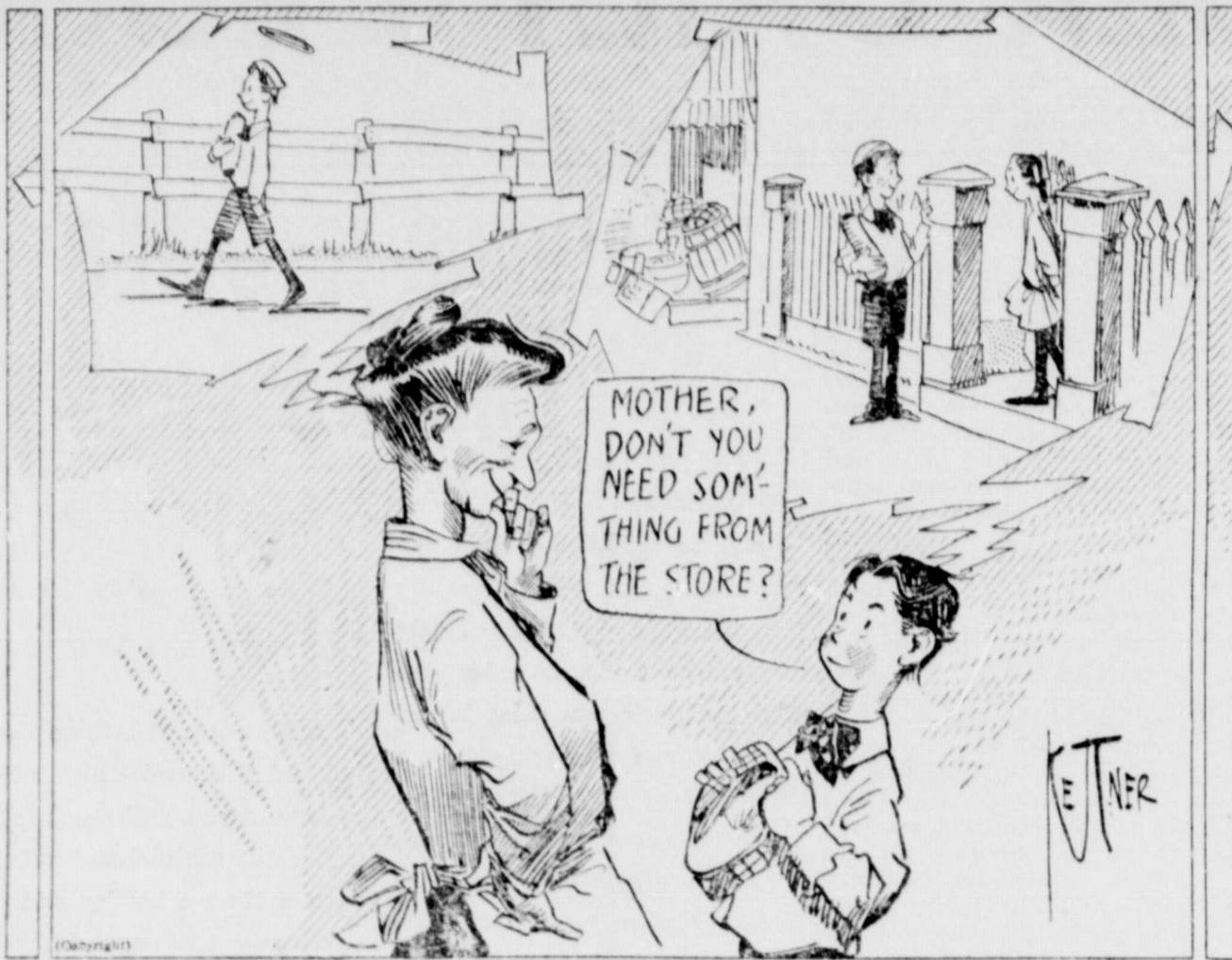

SEEKING PLACE FOR COTTON MILL

Will A. Harris of Ft. Worth met the Industrial Committee of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce Thursday afternoon and discussed with them the establishing and building in Abilene of a large cotton mill.

Mr. Harris stated to a representative of this paper Friday morning that he and his associates would build somewhere in this part of the state a modern cotton mill at an early date.

Consideration is being given the proposition by the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and in case the people of the city become sufficiently interested in the matter steps will be taken to organize the company and sell the stock in Abilene and within a radius of fifty miles.

The new company if organized will have a capital of \$1,000,000 and the plant will be modern and up-to-date in every respect.—Abilene Reporter.

BRITISH OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY

LONDON, Nov. 11.—Ambassador Wallas will be the chief guest at an "Armistice" dinner given tonight by the English Speaking Union.

Lord Reading will be in the chair, and the event of the evening will be the presentation of an illuminated address to the American Ambassador for transmission to President Wilson, signed by the lord mayors of London, Edinburgh, Liverpool, Sheffield, the lord provost of Glasgow, and the mayors of the chief cities and towns throughout the British Isles.

The address is as follows: "To the People of the United States of America: Be it known by these presents that we, the undersigned Lord Mayors, Lord Provosts and Mayors of the undermentioned cities and towns in Great Britain and Ireland, while rejoicing that

with the co-operation of the American Navy and Army and that of the Allies, the War has been brought to a victorious conclusion, so hereby declare on behalf of the people of these Islands our deep regret at the consequent departure from among us of the American Naval and Military forces, who have fought side by side with our soldiers and sailors with so much gallantry and success.

"We are sorry that we in this country have not been able to welcome as many of the American land forces as we should have liked owing to the exigencies of War. Those of your men, however, who have resided with us have made countless friends, among our people, and we shall always retain the happiest memories of their visit. The standard of conduct which they have set has indeed been a high one, and we can only say that we hope they will take away with them some of those feelings of affection which they have inspired during their sojourn with us."

In Italy.



Arriving at one of the most critical stages of the war, when the Teutons were forcing the Italian army back to the Piave, the American Red Cross rushed emergency relief from Paris and revived the drooping spirits of the whole country. Arrangements are complete for holding a Poultry Show at Brownwood December 4th to 6th next. At the same time there will be held a Poultry School under the direction of the A. & M. College. Entry to both Show and School will be free to all.

In addition to Poultry, there will be exhibits from the Boys and Girls Pig, Baby Beef, Corn, Cotton, Sheep and Peanut Clubs, with prizes for the best exhibits. There will also be a display of Pecans, and prizes in that class, and a sale of pedigreed pigs will take place during the show.

Mr. C. P. Van Winkle of Dallas, who is one of the Poultry Judges at the National Poultry Show, to be held at Kansas City, will judge the poultry. Mr. Van Winkle is one of the best judges in the country.

Birds competing at this show will have to be of high grade, if any hope is entertained of carrying off the blue ribbon. One of the foremost breeders of the Barred Plymouth Rock lives in Brownwood, and scattered all over the country are breeders of Black Minorcas, Rhode Island Reds, White Leghorns, Anconas and Black and White Langshans in fact almost every breed known has its devotee in Brown County, and the exhibits promise to be of a very high order.

MEXICAN KILLING AT SAN ANGELO

Juan Delgado, aged about 30, a Mexican sheep herder, was fatally wounded, and J. D. Hernandez, a local Mexican laborer, was shot in the foot and slightly hurt Sunday morning at one o'clock in the first homicide of 1919 in San Angelo. The shooting occurred on West Concho avenue near its intersection with South Irving street.

Officers were still engaged Monday morning in the search for the assailant, who is unknown. Before his death Monday morning at two o'clock, Delgado stated that he had never seen his slayer prior to the shooting and knew of no reason for the act of which there was no warning.

A crowd of Mexicans was standing in front of a restaurant within the outer circle of light formed by an arc lamp on the corner. Suddenly two men emerged out of the darkness from around the corner of the building, and one drew a thirty-eight calibre automatic revolver and from a distance of only ten or twelve steps poured 5 bullets into the group. Only two of the shots took effect. Delgado was shot through the left side, and Hernandez fell with a wound in his left foot.

A panic ensued, and when Sheriff Hawley Allen arrived a few minutes later the man who had done the shooting was gone, together with his companion. The excited Mexicans could give no information as to their assailant's identity and but a meager description of him. Officers are searching for the man on the basis of his description. His first name is said to be Napolomo, or something similar, meaning Napoleon in English. The belief is that the Mexican mistook one of the Mexican in the crowd for an enemy. —San Angelo Standard.

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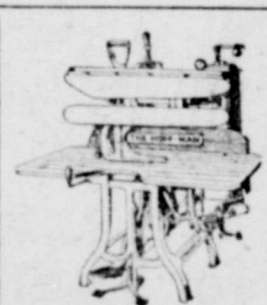
