LIVE-WIRE clubs, all over the country, are busy these days, giving benefits. These benefits stress the spirit of sharing, rather than the old time "charity" spirit.

Recently the Tourist Club of Deland, Florida, gave a "Canned Shower" for the benefit of the Benson Springs Orphanage, and each member of the club brought canned foods to share with these orphans.

Give a "Canned Shower"

The hope has been expressed that other organizations will follow the plan of this Florida club, for two reasons. First, because in many cases the appropriations for orphanages have had to be reduced, owing to the lack of funds; and second, because this sort of shower is especially to be recommended for orphanages. In every institution, where budgets have to

be closely watched, variety in the diet presents a problem. Yet children not only need a variety of foods, but they eagerly enjoy surprises of any sort. Strawberries in winter, fish when one lives far away from the water, creamed chicken when beef stew is usual—these things make dinner a real event in lives customarily uneventful.

The economy of canned foods is another important item. The fact that there is no waste of time in preparing foods; no waste of the foods themselves when they come out of the can; and no waste in spoilage because the cans are opened as they are ready for use—these qualities make canned foods especially desirable. The safety of using canned foods and their high nutritional value have been proved by scientific experiment and vouches for by many prominent physicians who recommend their use.


"Wicked Weed"



London.—The world's most grotesque circus act, that of an actual hanging on the gallows, is being featured by a traveling show throughout Britain.

The spectacle is made the more authentic by the fact that the demonstrator was a former convict in England. With the gallows and a "dummy" body, he goes through the motions of throwing the trap. Gasps of horror greet him everywhere.

Attention of the government has been called to the act, but the home minister, Sir Herbert Samuel, said there was no reason so far as he was aware to prevent such a display.

Sentiment appears to be against the act, but a few, with humor, suggest that this sort of an exhibition might prevent serious crime.

Poison Gas Is Being Used in Squirrel Drive

Livermore, Calif.—Poisonous gas made from burning straw and sulphur, is being used by Alameda county agricultural authorities in a new attack upon ground squirrels.

T. S. McIraw, in charge of county rodent extermination, has devised a poison gas machine which he believes is 95 per cent perfect, as compared with the old method of extermination by means of poisoned grain.

McIraw's machine uses 12 sacks of straw and 40 pounds of sulphur, and is capable of an exhibition mixed in capacity on 40 pounds of crude sulphur.

The gas is generated in a steel tank and is carried through several lines of hose, with the aid of a blower, into the squirrel holes.

Unearth Indian Skeletons

Deerfield, Mass.—Three Indian skeletons have been unearthed in this town in recent months. The latest specimen was that of an adult male. An Indian pipe made of white sandstone was found nearby.
